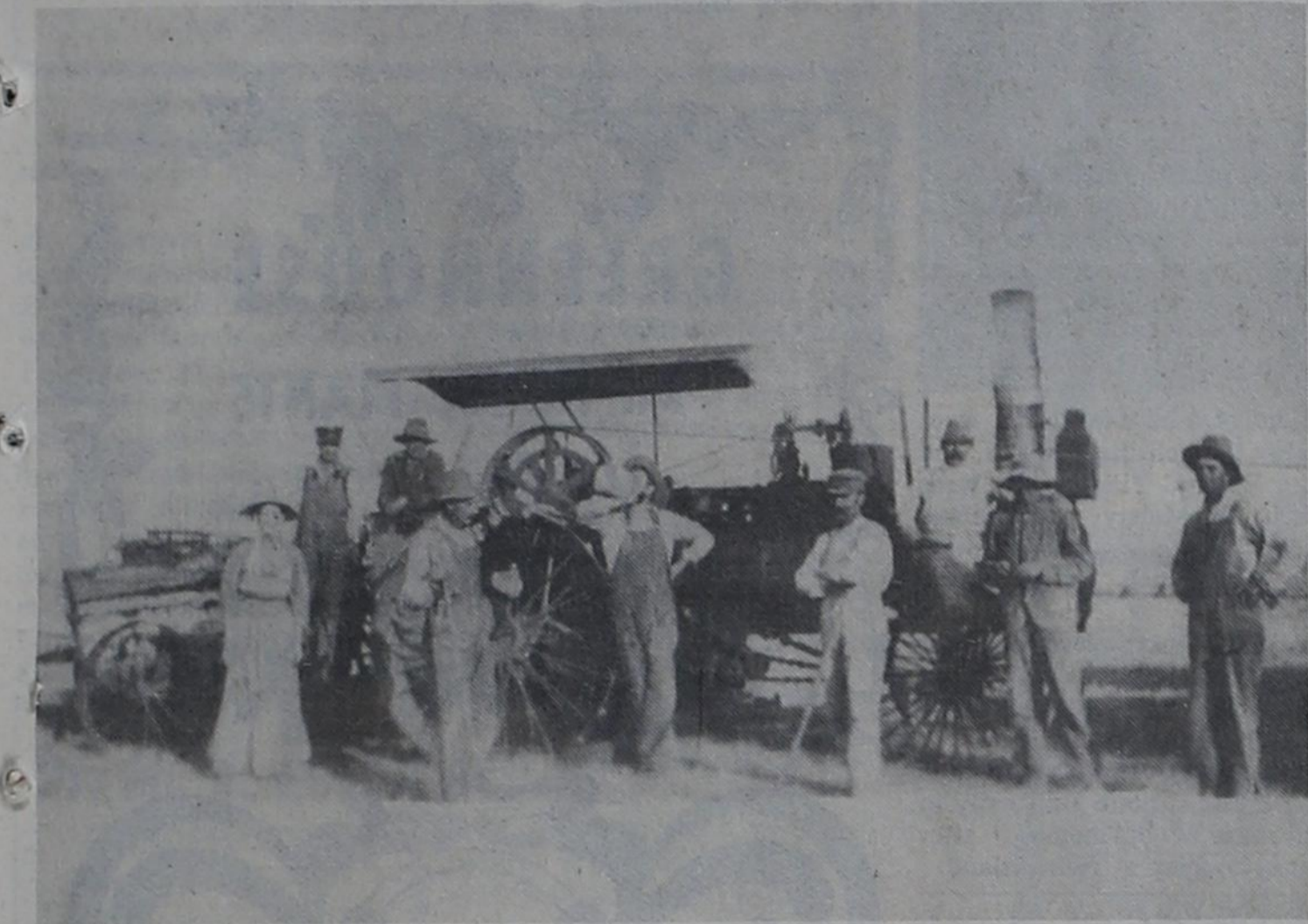

Kellye Richardson Is High Point

Pampa's Kellye Richardson earned another honor when she guided Texas to a 66-56 win over Kansas in a high school all-star basketball doubleheader here Saturday night.

Richardson paced the Texas Panhandle team with 15 points and was named the game's most valuable player.

Richardson, who is headed for Amarillo College to play basketball next season, was the MVP in the Gold Spread East-West game earlier this year.

Kellye Richardson, a third-team Class AAAAA all-state selection, has signed a basketball letter of intent with Amarillo College, according to Lady Bagger coach Kelly Chadwick in a press conference yesterday.

Miss Richardson, a 5-10 Pampa High School standout, was a three-time district 3-AAAA all-league choice and was a second-team Globe-news 1980 Panhandle-Plains Super Girls' Basketball Team selection.

"I want to play in a winning program," said Miss Richardson, who averaged 23 points, 10 rebounds and seven steals per game. "I think AC is going to have a great season next year."

"I know I need some help on my fundamentals and I have a lot of confidence in Coach Chadwick. "I decided on a two-year college because I think, hopefully I'll have more playing time.

"This is a tough conference and I know it's going to be hard. "I chose AC because it has a good academic program and a good basketball program. Plus it's close to home and I want my parents to be able to see me play."

"I think there are four top college prospects in the Panhandle this year and Kellye is the third one we've signed," said Chadwick, referring to Stratford's Lisa Albert and Amarillo High's Marcey Dale, who inked earlier with AC.

"And Richardson may be the very best college prospect in that she has size and quickness, especially in the first two or three steps. That's probably the reason she's a good hurdler (She advanced to the regional meet this season.)

"She can play anywhere outside. . . wing or point guard. She can handle a press.

"Right now, I'm looking at Kellye as a good wing player." Kellye Richardson is the grand-daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Richardson

Miss Sherri Lynn Lewallen, age 16 daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Lewallen of Wheeler, Texas has been selected to be a State Finalist in the 1980 Miss United Teenager Pageant to be held at the Sheraton-Dallas, Dallas, Texas at 7:30 on August 2, 1980. The Pageant is the official State-wide Finals for the Miss United Teenager Pageant.

Contestants from all over the state will be competing for the title. All contestants are between the ages of 14 and 18 and must have at least a "B" average in school. They are requested to participate in the Volunteer Community Service Program of the Miss United Teenager Pageant. EMERGENCY LOANS AVAILABLE FROM FARMERS HOME ADMIN.

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers or rural residents are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Billy R. Chance, FmHA county supervisor, said today.

Chance asked that those who need farm credit as a result of the May 28th tornado make needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at Wheeler.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken communities in Wheeler and Hemphill county will be accepted by Farmers Home until March 5, 1981 for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings, (including homes) last through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and cattle debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make

major adjustments in a farming or ranching operation.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Chance said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent and are scheduled for repayments as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicants reasonable ability to pay.

Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of this loan.

The interest rate for short-term loans for farm operating purposes is fourteen percent. Long-term loans are being made at an interest rate of fourteen percent also.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

According to Millie Porter, Broncho School was first built in 1900. Emma Wine was the first teacher. Emma Martin taught the second term and Miss Wine was back teaching the third term of 1903.

Mrs. Porter further stated that a group of people north of Broncho school petitioned for a school and decided Broncho would be moved to their convenience even though it would inconvenience the settlers children who the school was originally intended for. After some discussion it was moved north of its first location and the inconvenienced patrons proceeded to build them another school and named it Porter. This was the 17th school formed and as it was moved north to the present location of the cemetery it (Broncho) became the town of Wheeler's first school. In 1909 the trustees, R. E. Blackerby, G. B. Cole and R. B. Rogers were authorized to sell the old frame house and the money to be applied on a new concrete block building.

Margaret Truman Murder in the White House Arbor House 235pp.

Written with the unmatched authenticity only a former First Family member such as Margaret Truman could provide, **Murder in the White House** is a gripping, original novel of unprecedented crime in the cloistered precincts of the highest office of the land.

The White House has always been witness to history-in-the-making, but never to murder most strange within its own walls... until the body of the distinguished if raffish Secretary of State is found garroted. No one is above suspicion—not the White House Chief-of-Staff, not the Cabinet members, not even the First Family, including the President himself. It is a murder for which too many have too many disconnected motives, or so it would seem.

Mills of the Gods by Daoma Winston Simp and Schuster 320 pp.

MILLS OF THE GODS is an engrossing saga of love and revenge set against the steely backdrop of turn-of-the-century industrial New England.

For Victoria Davelle, the beautiful, high spirited, seventeen-year-old daughter of an English parson, the visit of her wealthy American cousin Richard Cavendish inspires dreams of a life of freedom and adventure in America. Cavendish, the dark, domineering owner of a New England textile mill, is immediately taken with Vicki, and soon after his return to America he invites her to visit his family in Fall River, Massachusetts.

Aboard ship to America, Vicki meets Leslie Winton, a tall, handsome, golden-haired bachelor on his way to Fall River to establish a new school. Before long she has fallen passionately in love with him but knows she must keep her love a secret when she reaches America, and the Cavendishes.

Vicki finds Fall River in 1901 a city of deep contradictions, darkened by the specter of the Lizzie Borden case nine years earlier, and divided by a struggle between the wealthy industrialists, like Cavendish, and a growing labor movement seeking better wages and working conditions.

Grasshopper Control

I have had calls recently asking how to control grasshoppers in home gardens. Insecticides lable for gardens include:

Malathion 50 EC	2 tps/gal
Diazinon 25 EC	2 tps/gal
Sevin 50 WP	2 tps/gal
Sevimol 4	1 tbs/gal
Sevin XLR	1 tbs/gal

The grasshoppers are easiest to control when they are small, concentrating insecticide applications to the border areas of the gardens will help in controlling the grasshoppers.

Also, in keeping grass and weeds around and near the garden mowed will lessen the damage.

Meeting About Grasshoppers
A meeting was held Thursday, May 15, in the District Courtroom to discuss the grasshoppers situation in Wheeler County, according to Don King, CEA.
According to adult counts last summer by USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) personnel, approximately 360,000 acre will be infested with economic levels of grasshoppers this summer. Eight grasshoppers per square yard is considered the economic level (that level at which it will pay to spray)
Under the control program sponsored by APHIS and the Texas Department of Agriculture, (TDA), APHIS, TDA and the land owner each pay one third of the cost of spraying. Teh cost to the landowner should be about 70 cents per acre this year.
Only range land and pasture-land can be sprayed; cropland is not eligible. To qualify for the program there must be at least 10,000 acres in a sprayable block.
The program is using 8 oz. of malathion per acre. Although no kill rates are guaranteed, a kill rate of 60-70 percent can be expected in tall grass range with some brush. Kill rates can be high as 90-95 percent on smooth, short-grass range.
More than 7 million acres are expected to be infested in Texas this year and TDA has funds to spray 1.5 million acres. Therefore, it is important that land be signed up as soon as possible. A cut off date of June 3 has been set. By that date the land to be sprayed must be plotted on a map and money collected and on deposit in a bank.
Any producer who would like to sign up land to be sprayed or would like further information should contact Don King, CEA at 826-5243 or 826-3249 after office hours.
It is important that action be taken quickly if Wheeler County is to qualify for the program.

LOCAL CITIZENS ARE CLOSE TO ST. HELENS

Mr. and Mrs. Frak Walker, Jr. just returned from a tour of the Northwest where they were exhibiting in Antique Shows. Mrs. Walker reports her wish for the trip came true only a little too much so - to see Mt. St. Helens.

They were participating in a show in Spokane, Washington on May 18th when the mountain erupted. Spokane is about 250 miles from the mountain so no one was alarmed at this point.

About 4 hours after the initial eruption the ash began slowly falling in Spokane. By 3:00 in the afternoon it was completely dark outside with the ash falling like a heavy snow storm. Mrs. Walker reports it was a little scary at this point because the scientists or no one knew exactly what the make-up of the ash was and if it was extremely dangerous or not but it was thought at this point that there could be an acid content.

The emergency station on radio was put into action to give

directions, comments and any information received. A state of emergency was declared throughout the city and all roads were barricaded out of the city. People were asked not to go out at all except for an emergency and speed limits were lowered to 20 m.p.h.

The Walkers, who were scheduled to leave that evening for Portland, Ore. were of course delayed. There was nothing moving for 3 days as the ash fell and billowed in the air. There was 6/10 to 8/10 all over everything. The ash resembles powdered concrete and is very hard to dispose of.

On Tuesday several of the exhibitors met and wrapped the air filters and everything they could in paper towels and headed north out of Spokane at 20 m.p.h. they had a very long trip north to just below the Canadian border then West to Hwy. 5 above Seattle and then back south to Portland, about 400 miles out of the way. On the way they had to pass through the area where the Toutle River had been flooded with the water and logs, etc. from Spirit Lake and that area was really a mess.

Portland is only about 40 miles from St. Helens but because of the direction of the winds they had not received any ash. However, the next weekend when the Walkers were exhibiting in the show there the mountain had another eruption and yes, the winds had shifted and they got it again. By this time it was known that the ash, although not being especially good for you, was not as harmful as had been thought - just a dirty nuisance.

Needless to say they were happy to leave the normally beautiful northwest and, oh yes, they never did get to see Mt. St. Helens as it was to overcast the whole time they were there.

Tanya Stuart On Pres. Honor Roll

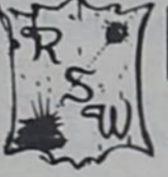

Judge Morgan submitted a sketch of the floor plan on the above building to the Commissioners, and suggested that he would draw the specifications, etc and advertise for bids on the work. The Commissioners agreed.

Doyle Ramsey-Sheriff-Feeding Prisoners

Upon a request from the Sheriff for the County to pay \$4.00 per day for feeding prisoners instead of \$3.00, Commissioner Harrison motioned, seconded by Commissioner Atherton to grant the request. A unanimous vote followed.

Weldon Simmons Hired as Road Hand-Precinct #1

Elmer Ray Harrison motioned, seconded by Billie V Atherton to hire Weldon V Simmons as a road hand for precinct #1 at a salary of \$850.00 per month, effective June 1, 1980. Motion carried.

Reception Honors Thurman Adkins

On June 11, 1930, Thurman Adkins became a licensed attorney of the State Bar of Texas and entered the practice of law. Now, fifty years later, Thurman is still practicing law. Thurman Adkins has seen many changes in the legal profession in his fifty years of practice and is to be highly commended for his many years of serving the public.

Thurman was born in Upshur County, Texas, on February 21, 1905. He was the son of a cotton farmer, J.W. Adkins, and Lillie Sewell Adkins. His early childhood was a happy one, though the family was poor, and Thurman has many good memories and tales to tell concerning his early childhood in East Texas.

Thurman received his undergraduate degree from North Texas State University in Denton, Texas, and he taught school for a couple of years before deciding to enroll in the University of Texas Law School. Thurman graduated from the University of Texas Law School in 1930 and, as luck would have it, did not have to take the State of Texas Bar Exam since it was considered, at that time, that University of Texas Law School graduates were of such high calibre that it was not necessary. This rule changed after 1930, whether because of Thurman or not, we do not know, and all future law school graduates had to take the Texas Bar Exam before they could practice law regardless of where they graduated. While in law school, Thurman also worked in the State Legislature as the Representative from Upshur County, Texas and he was a member of the Texas Law Review to which only the outstanding law students were members.

In 1932, Thurman packed his belongings and moved to the Texas Panhandle and went into partnership with R.H. Forrester in Wheeler, Texas. In 1933, he decided to go out on his own and set up an office in McLean, Texas. Also, in 1933, Thurman, being tired of the nomadic bachelor life he had been leading, was married to Jerome Stanley of Wheeler, Texas.

In 1938, Thurman and his family moved to Shamrock.
