## A BIT OF HISTORY WHEELER POST OFFICE

The 9th post office applied for in Wheeler Co. was for the town of Wheeler. This was granted November 9th 1905 according to records that Sallie Harris applied for from Washington D. C. Robert B. Rogers was appointed Post Master. Remember that Mr. John F. Witt applied for a Post Office in 1904 but was turned down then Mr. Ripply finally got the post office that Mr. Witt tried to obtain and this was called Larspur. According to the Washington appointive records there have been quite a number of persons serving as postmaster. The records show as follows: 6 of July 1906 Joseph E. Kelchersed succeeded Rogers. 9 of March 1909 Arlas A. Knight began and served for 6 years. 25 of March 1915 L. Spikes was appointed serving until 1 April 1919, John T. Hilburn served. 27 June, 1923 Maude Anglin. 18 November 1925 Alonzo Wood presided at postmaster. Later changes in the Wheeler Post office were: 5 October 1926 Joe K. Clark; Chester Lewis followed in March 1932. Mr. Lewis transferred to the Rural Route on June 16, 1950. Then Virgil Jameson who had been clerk took from 1 April 1946 and when Lewis took the route Jameson was appointed Lynn Master 16 June 1950. Hiram Whitener was hired as his clerk in 1950 then appointed Postmaster in April 17, 1971 and continues to serve. Roy Bradstreet was hired as clerk 23, November 1958. Dick Guines retired as carrier 15, June 1950. H. (Dub) Goad was clerk in the office for awhile before his appointment as substitute Car-

## ENERGY CRISIS PROGRAM TO AID WHEELER COUNTY CITIZENS

Wheeler County residents who qualify under Department of Housing and Urban Development poverty guidelines can apply the week of May 29 for help with their energy bills through the Energy Crisis Assistance Program (ECAP). The program, administered locally by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, makes as much as \$400 per family available for the payment of overdue energy bills or for prepayment. The first step is to fill out questionnaires. Those sessions will take place twice in Wheeler County on the 29th. The morning round will be from 8 to 12 a.m. in the Wheeler County Court House then from 1 to 4 p.m. in the Shamrock Senior Citizens' Center. Each person who wishes to qualify for funding must provide proof of income eligibility. That could include a food stamp authorization card, payroll check stub, social security certification letter, supplemental security in-

come letter or any other document that provides proof of earned income. That kind of document should cover the six months prior to application. Families in the eligible income class range from a single occupant in the non-farm category making \$4250 or less annually to a six-member farm family making less than \$9450. Those guidelines are not absolute and decisions are made on a case-by-case basis, according to David DeGrassi, director of the program for PRPC. Payment can be made directly to the utility or fuel supplier or to the landlord in the renter's case. The renter should supply a letter from the landlord detailing the amount of each month's rent that is applied to utility bills. The program will eventually touch all 25 counties of the Panhandle. A quarter million dollars in HUD funds are available for the local program that runs through June 30.

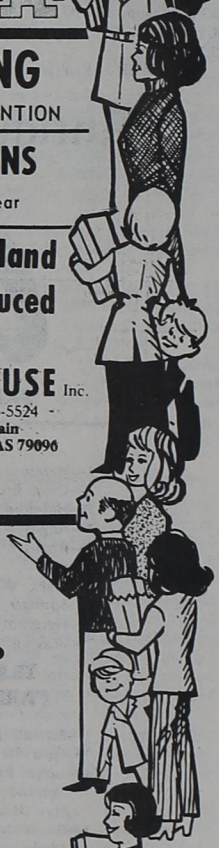
