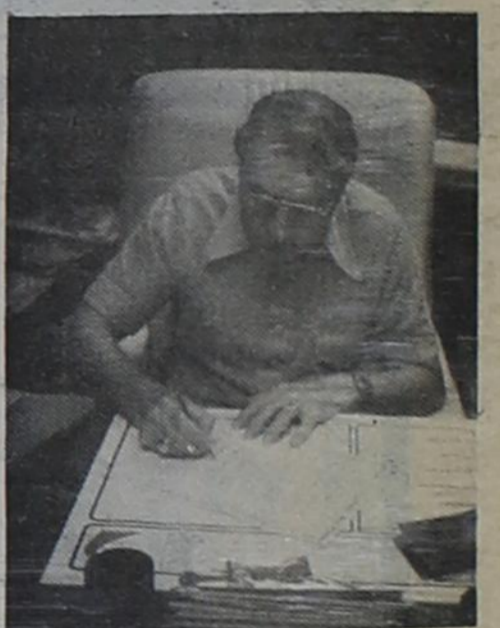

# Wheeler Library Receives \$2500

**WHEELER PUBLIC LIBRARY WINS J. FRANK DOBIE LIBRARY TRUST AWARD**  
 On Friday, April 18, 1980, Wanda King, Librarian, for the Wheeler Public Library attended the General Session of the Texas Library Association Convention held at the Hyatt Reagany Hotel in Dallas, Texas, and accepted a \$2,500.00 check for the library earmarked for childrens books.

This grant was awarded for a proposal submitted by the Librarian back in January 1980. The contents of the proposal is as follows: Wheeler, a small town of only 1,143 residents (per 1970 census) in the eastern part of the Texas Panhandle boasts a library in incomparable pride. It serves a clientele of approximately 4,000 in the area. The latest annual report indicates a collection of 14,390 volumes, per capita expenditures of 7.13, circulation per capita of 3.94; The per capita figures indicate that Wheeler's library, although small, is well used and enjoys a lively reputation in the community. Wanda King has served as the librarian for eight months

and has initiated numerous activities to promote quality library collection and service. The collection includes books, art prints and cassettes. Janice Albright is the CETA employee who has been very helpful in the operations of the library. The president of our Library Board, Roberta Adams, is a qualified school librarian and is very instrumental in its workings. She spends three months during the summer cataloging our non-fiction collection and she is also available during the remainder of the year when she is needed.

Library met the requirements to become a member of the Texas Panhandle Library System and have been active participants in the Wheeler Public Library Application for the Frank Dobie Library Trust Award system. An active Library Board meets regularly to discuss matters of concern and within the last few years the renovation and construction of its present facility was of the utmost importance to the board and the citizens of the Wheeler community.

Prior to its move to the new facility in 1977, Wheeler Public Library was in the "dark ages", due to limited management, lack of funds, know how and room. The collection was primarily donations from local patrons and on the most part, the books were old, and in need of repair. What new books were purchased were mostly light romance and western type reading. The children's collection was best described as being archaic and almost non-existent. Things are somewhat better now, but there still is lots of room for improvement. If the trust is awarded to our library, its monies will be used to update this area. We know it is essential to develop the joy of reading as a young child in order to have readers and supporters as adults.

Financially, our support comes from:  
 (1) City of Wheeler - They furnish our building, all utilities including telephone and \$1,800 which goes towards the Librarian's salary.  
 (2) Wheeler County - Contributes \$2,400 a year which also goes towards the Librarian's salary.  
 (3) Texas Panhandle Library System - 1978-79 funding - \$810.00;  
 1979-80 funding - \$948.00\* (used exclusively to purchase children's books)  
 (4) Undesignated amounts from local clubs, interested persons and memorials (donations). These monies are used for adult collections, supplies, postage and other operating expenses. The library facilities are open 26 hours a week.  
 1978 budget - \$6,580.00  
 1979 budget - \$7,500.00 (not to exceed this amount)  
 We now have a committee working on plans to go before the City and County governments to see if we cannot get support for books and supplies so that a clear-cut budget can be made and allocations proportioned as the Library sees fit. At present, our budget consists entirely of donations which is totally unsatisfactory. If the committee's recommendations are approval, it will allow us to better develop our collection with an upgrading in quality as well as quantity. The Wheeler Public Library is very important to the community. The people need it, want it and are starting to support it. Where else can a person go to see the invisible man, the eclipse of the sun or the fall of the Roman Empire; or, ask questions, find answers; be thrilled, be informed and be entertained all in the same location for free. Again we are really proud of what the Wheeler community has done for our library. We have some wonderful people behind us and have come a long way, but we still have a long way to go. We would appreciate your considering the Wheeler Public Library to be the recipients of the Frank Dobie Library Trust Award.

## Guthrie Completes Jailer's Academy

The first class of the Correctional Officers Training Academy in the Panhandle was completed with 54 sheriff's officers graduating.

Potter County Sheriff T. L. Baker, academy director, was asked by the Texas Commission of Law Enforcement Officers Standards and Education to conduct the school for the northern counties of the Panhandle.

The first class was made up of officers from Hemphill, Oldham, Hartley, Randall and Potter counties. The 40 hours of training were in various areas of correctional facility procedures. Besides the normal procedures such as booking, fingerprinting and searching prisoners, the officers study included human relations and emergency plans for riots, fires and disturbances.

Those from Hemphill County Sheriff's Office include Mae Steen, M.L. Guthrie, Ray Holland, Susan Inns and Gary Pettit.

Since June 1979 Corky Guthrie has been deputy in Hemphill County.

The Wheeler Public Library was started in Wheeler in 1954 by a group of concerned citizens. The idea caught on and space was made available initially in the basement of the courthouse, then moved to the old jail, and when the local museum was also transferred to the old jail, the library had to move its facilities to the confines of the back room. In 1977, a permanent home was provided in the Nicholson Memorial Hospital Building as a result of the dedicated activities and labors of concerned citizens. The hospital site had to be completely gutted, wired and refurbished prior to moving. This was all done by volunteer help and contributions of our people.

In 1976, the Wheeler Public

## Sheriff's Report

Sheriff Doyle Ramsey reports that three Mexican Nationals, Antonio Duenas 24, Francisco Duenas 18 and Jesus Duenas 22, were charged in Justice Court, Precincts 1 and 2, with Felony Criminal Mischief on April 23rd. The charges stemmed from an incident at Borsberry Trailer Park on the north side of Wheeler during the early morning hours of April 21st. An occupant of a mobile home at the trailer park is alleged to have gotten into an argument at the State Line Bar east of Wheeler with the three Duenas' which ended in Wheeler with the Duenas' accused of trying to push the mobile home over with their car and two pickups which belong to Borsberry Construction Company. The mobile home also belongs to Borsberry. Jesus Duenas was found unconscious at the scene by Sheriff Doyle Ramsey and Deputy Lonnie Miller. Antonio and Francisco Duenas were arrested at Canadian by Miller and members of the Hemphill County Sheriff's Department. The Duenas' have been living in Canadian and Antonio and Francisco are former employees of Borsberry Construction Company and are brothers. Jesus Duenas is their cousin. Damage to the two pickups and the mobile home was estimated to be \$12,500.00. The Duenas' are in the Wheeler County Jail in lieu of bond.

## Doing Your Own Minor Home Repairs

Wish you could do your own minor home repairs?

Maybe you can — many homemakers are reporting success in learning these skills.

They're also saving money and time, along with cutting down on the frustrations of trying to hire repairmen.

Even novices can do many household improvement, maintenance and repair jobs.

### CONSIDERATIONS

Before trying to tackle a project, consider these factors:

Do you have time to do the job?

Do you have the necessary tools and supplies on hand?

Can you rent, improvise or buy the needed tools, parts and

supplies?

Are you physically able to do the work? (Usually you won't need great strength, just stamina.)

Do you have the interest and patience to study a problem and devise a workable solution?

Also, compare costs of a do-it-yourself job versus hiring a professional.

Professional fees usually include a basic service-call charge an hourly labor charge, and a parts and supplies charge.

In some cases it's wise to ask for an estimate.

### TOOLS—BASIC, QUALITY

If you decide to go ahead yourself, pay special attention to tools.

In buying tools, start with basic tools.

Buy tools in good quality — "Premium" tools are not necessary, but make sure they are good-quality.

Very cheap tools often are unsatisfactory, especially edged tools, such as saws and chisels, because the edges dull rapidly or chip and break.

In selecting basic tools and supplies, be sure to insist on adequate quality for your needs.

You can always rent costly tools that you'll use only occasionally.

Then keep your tools in good condition so they are ready to

If you lack the know-how or the equipment to sharpen tools, have a skilled craftsman do it for you.

Store tools safely, both to avoid damaging the tool and to avoid injuring yourself.

Read the instruction booklets and information labels that come with tools and supplies.

File them for future reference.

placement part lists and special instructions on use, repair and maintenance.

Include the make, model, serial number, date of purchase, and service record of all equipment in your files.

## Census Reports Good Progress

Census District Manager, William E. Soule reports good progress in this area of the follow-up phase of the 1980 Census of Population and Housing. Census takers are following-up on missing census questionnaires by visiting addresses from which householders have not yet mailed theirs back, as well as telephoning most households from which questionnaires were returned inadequately filled out.  
The manager asks householders to welcome these census takers when they call and to give them full cooperation in supplying the required census information. but you should always ask to see their official credential before admitting them to your home. It is a red, white, and blue ID card bearing the U.S. Department of Commerce seal.  
The manager stressed that, because the count of the Nation's population was to be for one day, April 1, everyone who was in the household on that day should be listed on the questionnaire, but not anyone who has moved in since.  
"The information given the Census Bureau cannot be used to identify anyone in any way at all," the manager said. "Facts about individuals are lumped together to arrive at statistical totals, averages, and percentages, figures in which no one can be identified. Information about a person cannot be given to any other agency of government, or to a public or private organization of any kind, or to any other individual."
