THREE MUSTANGETTES NAMED TO ALL-DISTRICT BASKETBALL TEAM

The Wheeler High School girls basketball team, which won this year's District Championship, received another honor in a recent district coaches meeting. The other coaches of our district voted Beth Brown, Elise Christner and Missy Wiggins to the All District Team. They also placed Lynette Gaines, Mona Jennings and Tanya Rarden on the honorable mention squad.

Beth Brown lead the Mustangettes in field goal percentages with 48 and free throw percentage with 74%. She was also tied with Missy Wiggins for the most defense rebounds with 33. Beth's scoring average was 10.5 points per game.

Elise Christner averaged 9.0 points per game. She shot 43% from the field and 66% from the foul line. She was tied with Missy Wiggins for the most starts with 25.

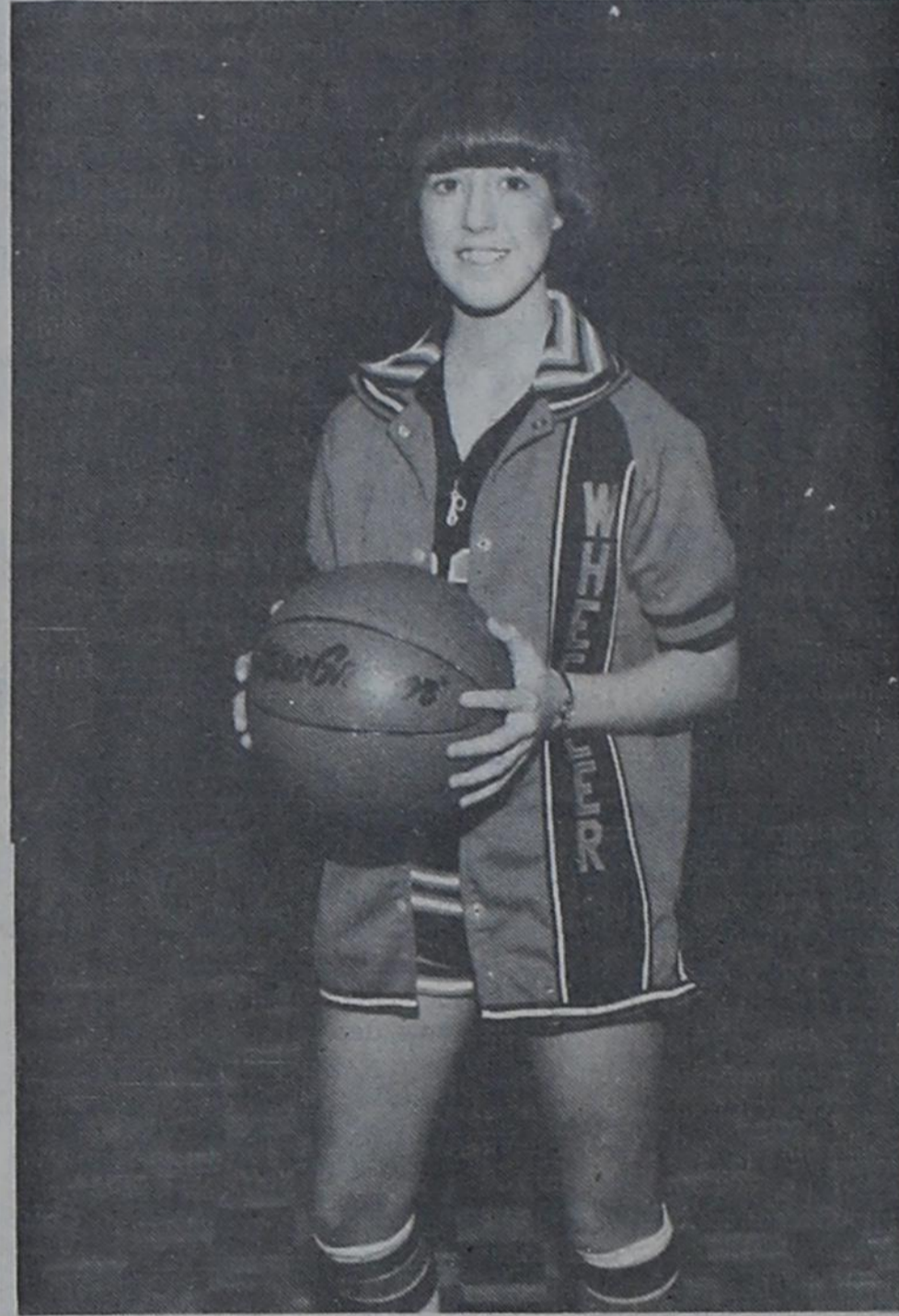

RABIES CLINIC IS SET FOR SATURDAY, MARCH 22

All Dogs and Cats Must Be Vaccinated

Dr. Tommie Hennard will hold a Rabies clinic Saturday, March 22. The purpose of the clinic will be to vaccinate all pets against rabies. At the same time the City of Wheeler will have dog licenses on sale.

The clinic will be held at the Wheeler Veterinary Clinic on West Highway 152 from 1:00 until 5:00. Pet owners are urged to have their pets on a leash to better control them.

A state law, H.B. 1323 passed in 1979, requires all dogs and cats to be vaccinated against rabies. The law reads: "the owner of each dog or cat shall have the dog or cat vaccinated against rabies by the time the dog or cat is four months of age and at regular intervals thereafter..."

The city at the present time does not require a license for cats inside the city limits.

The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year. The shot will cost \$5.00.

The licenses will cost \$1.00 for males and spayed females and \$2.00 for females.

For those people who have had their dogs vaccinated, but have not purchased a license, it will be necessary to take the animal and proof of vaccination to the clinic to obtain the dog license. All dogs in the City Limits are required to be licensed and vaccinated.

Area citizens are urged to bring their animals in at this time to be vaccinated against rabies. For those owners who are unable to bring their pets to the clinic, call 826-5821 during the time the clinic is being conducted and a member of the Key Club will be on duty to pick up the animals.

Wheeler entered their first track meet, the Miami relays, Saturday. The Mustangs finished 4th out of 8 teams while scoring 61 points. Wellington won the meet with Panhandle trailing closely behind and Miami finished 3rd, slightly ahead of Wheeler.

Wheeler's 400 meter relay, ran by Toby Bradstreet, Benny Watson, Boyd Waldo, and Mike Gallagher, finished 4th with a 47.4 Mike Gallagher had a fine day finishing 4th in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles with a time of 45.94. He also won the discus with a throw of 127'2", a new meet record. Ricky Bond placed 3rd in the discus with a throw of 122'6" and 3rd in the shot put with a toss of 41'1". Wes Westmoreland placed 5th in the discus with 116'3".

Wheeler's real bright spots came in the 800 meter dash and 1600 meter run. Kevin Andis won 1st place in the 800 meter dash with a fine time of 2:08.92 and Robert Ford placed 6th with 2:17.1. 



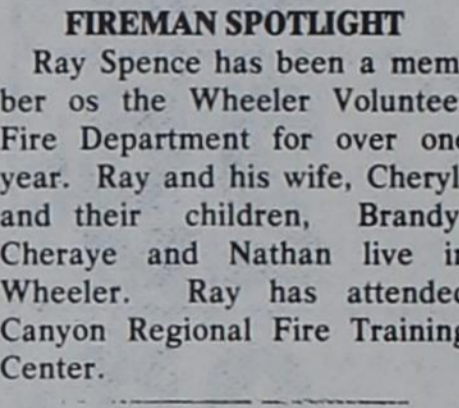
