Samnorwood came to the Wheeler gym for one thing last Friday night, and that was to beat the Mustangs. But the Mustangs kept their poise and took game number six in district. The official started to throw the ball up to start the game, but Samnorwood stole it and scored eight straight points before the Mustangs had realized the game had started. Midway through the first quarter the Mustangs were down 2-12 before showing any signs of playing offense. It was only a slight sign as Wheeler managed to pump in 8 points when the quarter ended 8-17 in favor of Samnorwood. The Mustangs poise began to show in the second quarter as they showed no signs of being rattled and scored 20 points. Samnorwood, however, showed no sign of letting up and scored 14 points of their own to take a 28-31 half time lead. The Mustangs regrouped at halftime and brought back on the court a little "Black Magic" and found themselves with a 46-36 third quarter lead. Samnorwood never gave up and matched the Mustangs point for point in the fourth quarter which was not enough to win and fell another victim of the "Black Magic". Final score Wheeler 64, Samnorwood 55. Wheeler had four people in double figures. Russell Gaines led the pack with 19 points followed by Benny Baker with 16 points, John Harris with 13 points, and Boyd Waldo with 12 points.

## James Fling Files For County Attorney Position

Jim Fling, a local attorney with the firm of Adkins & Fling in Shamrock, Texas, has announced his candidacy for the office of Wheeler County Attorney subject to the approval of the voters in the Republican Party primary on May 4, 1980. Mr. Fling lives in Shamrock with his wife, Marsha, and their two sons, Daniel, age six, and Michael, age 3 1/2.

Mr. Fling is a member of the Shamrock Boosters Club and the Shamrock Rotary Club and the family attends the First United Methodist Church of Shamrock.

Mr. Fling graduated from Eastern Illinois University in 1966 and, after a 3 1/2 year tour with the United States Army, attended the University of Texas Law School from which he received a Doctor of Jurisprudence Degree in December, 1971. Mr. Fling recently moved to Shamrock after having served as the attorney for communications Properties, Inc., a large cable television company operating in eleven states, for the past five years. Prior to that employment, he was involved in both corporate and private practice in Fort Worth and Austin, Texas. Mr. Fling also is an Army lawyer with the United States Army Reserve.

In making his announcement, Mr. Fling stated: "I decided to seek the position on the Republican Party ticket because, although previously designated a Democrat, I believe that the ideals and goals of the national Republican Party most closely reflect my own views and those of the people of Wheeler County. I believe in a strong two party system and intend to work toward that end. I also believe that the people of Wheeler County need fresh ideas and new people in Local Government and hope that I can contribute in this

regard and work for fair and impartial justice for all of the people of Wheeler County. The people of Wheeler County have been most gracious to my family and me since our arrival, and I hope that I can show my appreciation by bringing new and higher standards to the office of County Attorney."

## Gerald McCathern Files For District 31 State Senator

Gerald McCathern, who announced his intentions to run for State Senator from District 31, on September 19, has now made it official by sending in his filing fee to the state Democratic headquarters.

McCathern, farmer and rancher, from Hereford, has been traveling extensively through the district since September, talking with people in all walks of life. "I am convinced," he said, "that the people of our district are as concerned as I am that our state government has not been responsive to the needs of our district and the needs of our people. Large special interest groups have been far too influential in securing legislation which is beneficial to those groups at the expense of small businesses, ranchers, farmers, and other working people. My platform will always be to act as a servant of the people and to protect their interests in all forms of governmental action."

"I can relate to these problems of our people," McCathern said, "because I grew up in the eastern part of our district during the depression years of the thirties. I have worked in the oil fields as a rough-neck, roustabout, and welder. After service in the Aviation Engineers during World War II, I attended Texas Tech under the G.I. Bill and graduated with a degree in Petroleum Geology. I worked as a geologist in the Permian Basin

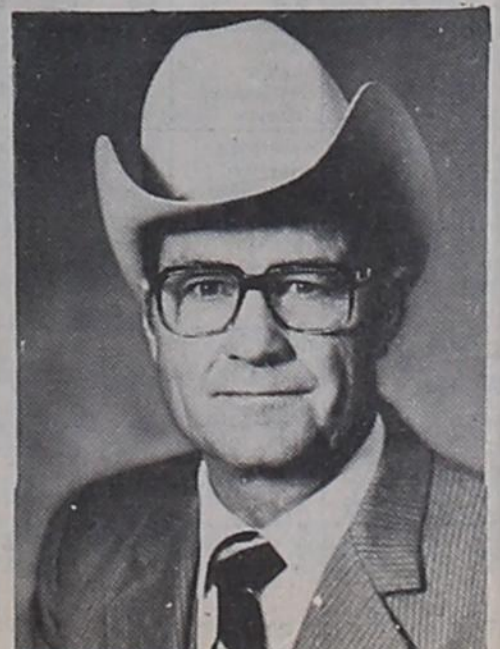
before moving to Hereford and beginning business as a farmer and rancher.

The people of our district are well aware of the need for a senator who, first of all, is willing to devote 11% of his time to represent them, and secondly, that he should be well versed in all aspects of our districts' economy. I am well pleased with the reception and the support I have received in my travels, consequently today, I officially filed as a candidate."

Concerning his platform, McCathern said, "As a taxpayer and a businessman, I understand that profit is not a 'four letter word'. Our business people must be allowed to make a fair profit in order to generate the jobs needed by our laboring people. In the same sense, our working people must be allowed to receive a fair days' wage for a fair days' labor if they are to be able to carry their fair share of the tax burden and to buy back the goods and services offered by our business community."

"I believe that it is time to start seeking new methods of securing finances to support our educational system. We must maintain the best educational system possible for our youth, and to do so, we must be able to compete with other states and industries with equal salaries, equal facilities, and the latest teaching aids. However, we can't afford to bankrupt our property owners by continually increasing property taxes to finance our educational system. There are other means of financing available, and I feel we should immediately begin looking for answers to this grave problem, whether it would be some form of sales tax where everyone would share in the burden of responsibility, or perhaps diverting more of the oil and gas royalties received by the state from wells on state-owned property to our primary and secondary educational program."

"I certainly feel that water will

## Make A Valentine Cake With Ordinary Pans

Make a perfectly shaped Valentine cake with just two cake pans—a square one and a round one—and share it with someone you love.

Here's how:

From a commercial cake mix or from a scratch recipe, make one eight-inch square layer cake and one eight-inch round layer cake.

Cut the round layer into two equal parts.

Place the cut edge of each round layer portion on adjacent edges of the square cake, and you have a heart-shaped cake without having to buy a heart-

shaped cake pan.

Use your favorite icing and decorate the cake as desired for a quick and simple Valentine treat.

If you're history-minded, here are some other tidbits for mulling as you make the cake or share it with someone.

There are many ideas about how the name Valentine came to be connected with the day on which lovers sent tokens of affection to one another.

One is based on the belief throughout Europe during the Middle Ages that the birds began to mate on February 14.

In addition to honoring Saint Valentine, February, 1980 takes on an extra special air of romantic antiquity—with the observance of "Lovers Leap Season," or "Leap Year."

This holiday occurs once every four years with the appearance of an extra day in February—"Leap Day"—and retains the mysterious belief that women may propose marriage to men with perfect propriety throughout the entire year.

According to an old English saying, ladies may propose during Leap Year, and, if rejected, they may claim a silk gown.

And in many a European town

or country, there allegedly have been laws to legalize the custom! But the mystery remains to be solved: nobody knows just how this tradition got started, and no satisfactory explanation has ever been offered.

In the United States, in New England there used to be a curious belief that during Leap Year beans grow on the wrong side of the pod.

No matter what the origin or belief of Valentine customs, you will still share the heart-shaped cake with a special person.

## Parallel Terraces Benefit the Land

For many years farmers and ranchers that have been concerned with the conservation and the building up of their soil have realized the value of terraces.

They are valuable not only for the conservation of rich top soil, but for the part they play in increased production.

The conventional type terrace has always been inconvenient in the farming operation. There has always been the point rows and the odd areas between the terraces that were a nuisance to work.

With a new type of terrace (parallel Terraces) that can be built where topography permits, most of these point rows and odd areas are eliminated. Parallel terraces will also do the job of erosion control and the preservation of moisture. When a farmer decides to construct parallel terraces on a field, one of the first jobs to be done is to make a topographic map of the field. This will show all of the high points, the low points, draws and ridges that may exist. From this map the parallel terrace system can be designed. Then a guide line terrace, or key terrace will be located and staked. From the topographic map it may be determined how many terraces can be staked parallel to the guide line. The amount of terraces that can be staked parallel will depend on the roughness of the field. A certain amount of land forming must be

done in order to build as many terraces parallel as possible. The channels of the terraces will have to be cut in places and filled in others giving a certain amount of land leveling resulting in better water distribution. Anyone desiring to control the erosion on their land may contact the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service, and they will assist with the engineering work.

# SCS Public Review Week

Last week was the start of a 60-day public review period, during which time interested people are being asked to comment on the direction they think future U.S. Department of Agriculture programs should take.

The public review period started January 28, and will end March 28.

Four draft documents describing the Nation's non-federal soil and water resources, their condition, projected demands, and seven proposed alternative strategies can be reviewed at the local Soil Conservation Service office at 112 W. Oklahoma in Wheeler.

Lavon Williams, District Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, said the proposals for a national soil and water

conservation program were developed by a coordinating committee made up of members from nine U.S. Department of Agriculture agencies plus the Office of Management and Budget and the Council on Environmental Quality. The process, mandated by the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA), included consideration of public input from 9,000 public meetings held in the United States in 1978.

The Act directs the USDA to appraise the condition of the Nation's renewable natural resources and to propose alternative programs to guide the Nation's conservation activities. The appraisal revealed that one-third of the Nation's cropland—136 million acres—is eroding at

an excessive rate.

Basic information about the RCA process and proposals may be seen in four documents:

The first document, "Draft Appraisal Part I," describes the status and condition of our natural resources and provides information on their quantity and quality and major uses of non-federal land. The completed draft identifies national conservation objectives for:

- Reducing erosion and preserving prime farmlands.
- Improving water quality.
- Conserving water
- Improving fish and wildlife habitat, including the preservation of wetlands.
- Reducing upstream flood damages.
- Conserving energy
- Solving related resource problems.

The second document, "Draft Appraisal Part II", projects demands on soil and water resources to the year 2030 and suggests levels of management that could be used to preserve these resources. It also summarizes trends in rural land ownership and describes the contribution of state and local programs to soil and water

conservation.

The third document, "Program Report and Environmental Impact Statement", outlines seven possible approaches—called alternative strategies—for changing USDA conservation programs and outlines the probable environmental impact.

The fourth document, "Summary of Appraisal, Parts I and II, and Program Report", is a brief summary of the other three documents.

During the public review period, three public meetings will be held in Texas to discuss content of the documents and provide an opportunity for comments. The meetings will be held in Arlington on February 26; Lubbock, March 4; and San Antonio, March 6.

# REMINDER TO VOTE

Cattlemen in Wheeler county are reminded to vote in the upcoming referendum on the Federal Beef Research and Information Order, according to Paul Macina of Shamrock, president of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau.

Eligible producers may vote anytime between February 19-22 at the county ASCS office, the county farm leader said. Registration for the vote was held January 28-February 6.

"Beef producers have a big stake in the Beefeferendum," Macina said. "After all, it's their money that will be collected for use in beef research and promotion. We need a large turnout of producers to get a consensus of thinking on this matter."

Macina said the issue is whether or not cattlemen want a mandatory check-off program that is run by a quasi-governmental agency.

The county FB president said, the proposed Beef Research and Information Order, if passed, would:

The county Farm Bureau leader said that, for the Order to be approved, ballots must be cast by at least 50 percent of producers registered to vote in the referendum, and a majority of those voting must favor or approve the issuance of the Order.

be one of the major problems for our district in the 1980's. Ground water is fast depleting, and if we are to keep our municipal needs supplied, our industrial areas growing, and our agricultural industry prospering, we are going to have to start a crash program to build water storage facilities in the form of small surface dams all over our district.

We must pursue with greater effort our water importation program, and I am committed to this effort.

"Much can be done on a state level to encourage and expedite alternate energy production facilities, including alcohol, wind, and solar. I am committed to take a leadership role in seeing that the state of Texas would offer tax incentives, research programs, and less red tape to make these energy sources a reality."

"The most important aspect of my platform will be that I pledge to be an extension of the wishes of the people of our district. In order to stay close to the people and close to the problems, I will incorporate town hall meetings on a regular basis as well as to establish scheduled conference telephone calls with our county and city commissioners during the legislative session to keep them informed about pending legislation and to seek their advice concerning this legislation.

McCathern has worked extensively in his community, district, and state. He is past chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, voted outstanding farmer in Deaf Smith County in 1968 by the Lions Club, served as Vice-President of the Texas State National Farmers Organization, Secretary of the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, a Director of the U.S. Feed Grains Council, and past delegate of the American Agriculture Movement.

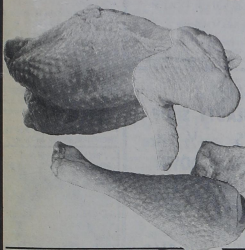


