MOBEETIE METHODIST CHURCH WILL CELEBRATE 80TH ANNIVERSARY SUN.

Sunday, December 30, 1979 has been set aside to celebrate the 80th Anniversary of the Mobeetie Methodist Church. The Methodist Church had its beginning in Old Mobeetie somewhere in the 1890's. Since that time it has grown from a struggling Circuit appointment to a station (full time preaching) which at one time had 220 church members.

During the beginning there were three churches, the Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian, but it is believed the Methodist Church was the first to be organized in Mobeetie, and in Wheeler County. The Fort Elliott

troops were stationed there at that time and there were no local ministers but the two enjoyed transient ministers of various denominations who happened to be passing through. Before the troops were moved the Methodist and Baptist got together and organized a union church. On May 1, 1898 a cyclone swept through Mobeetie, wrecking nearly every business house and all the homes. The shacks that had been used for worship services were totally destroyed so there had to be a complete new beginning for the people who felt the need for worship in Mobeetie. Following the storm two faithful ladies took it upon themselves to take up donations to build a new church. They were Mrs. George B. Dunn known to everyone as Granny Dunn and Mrs. J.J. Long. The baby of the Ben Matthews family was killed in the cyclone of '98 the family left the country, giving their six lots to Uncle Johnny Jones who in turn gave the land for the building of the union church. As the two grew it was decided to desolve the union church so the Methodist church bought the Baptist Church interest. About 1911 the Baptist people built their church.

Mobeetie was a circuit appointment with the pastor going to different country school houses to preach. Among the early circuit riders are the Rev. S. Sam B. Sawyers, P.H. Huffman, R.B. McSwain, A.G. Cole, R.M. Morris, P.E. Yarbrough, John Crow and U.S. Sherrill. Following the pastorate of Rev. Sherrill the Mobeetie circuit was made a station, preaching every Sunday with a full time pastor.

In 1930 the Santa Fe Railroad was built a mile north of Mobeetie so the town began to move to the railroad, creating New Mobeetie. The Church followed in the move and under the direction of the late Rev. Sam A. Thomas the old church building was torn down and brought to New Town and a new church basement was built in New Mobeetie where it now stands at the corner of Wheeler and Third Street. For seventeen years the

congregation labored and worshiped in the church basement. Rev. Thomas lived on his farm on Sweetwater Creek while a parsonage was being built by the church basement. In 1947 while the Rev. Homer Salley was the church pastor, the present sanctuary was built. The Rev. Hugh Hunt who was at that time the pastor of the Wheeler Methodist Church drew plans for the church building and made the Cross at the back of the choir loft and the church steeple, which are both still on the church. The first service in the new sanctuary was on Mother's Day in 1947 and the first funeral in the church was Mrs. George (Granny) Dunn, whose daughter, Mrs. Hattie Lee lives in Wheeler at this time. Granny played the organ and piano in the church for more than forty years. At that time Clarence Dyson was Church School Superintendent and Jim Selby was his assistant. Both are still active in their church today. The first marriage held in the church was for Maurita Lamon and Clinton Stribling. Two young men, F. Eugene Matthews and Hugh T. Reed have gone into the ministry from this church.

The Mobeetie Methodist Church was dedicated on May 16 1948 with Rev. Salley still the pastor. New pews were installed in March of 1950 during the pastorate of the late Rev. Vernon E. Willard, climaxing long years of hard work and waiting.

Pastors serving since the time of Rev. Sam A. Thomas are the Rev.'s Cecil R. Matthews, John R. Bright, W.H. Strong, G.L. Keever, C.W. Young, W.B. Gillham, G.W. McLean, J.N. Tinkle, Homer Salley, Vernon E. Willard, A.D. Moore, C.C. Lamb, Albert Cooper, Bruce Matthew, A.J. Jackson, C. Ray Copeland, Elton Wyatt, D.C. Read, Ray Forbes, L.V. Grace, Bob Green, Phillip Lopes and L.V. Grace. Rev. Grace first came to Mobeetie in 1970 and served until 1974, retiring at that time. In 1976 they returned to Mobeetie and again became the church pastor, and at the present time is still serving the church and community.

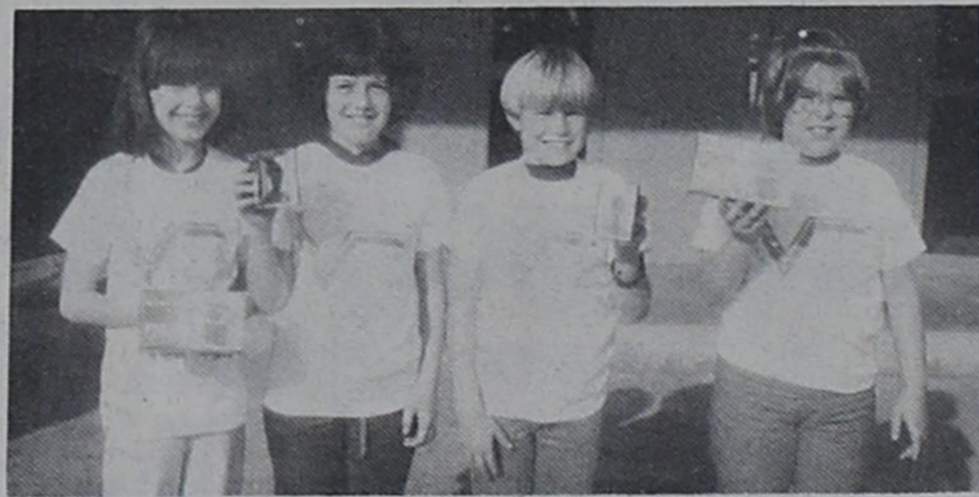

One Hospitalized Following 2-Truck Accident Monday

James P. Lindsey, 20, of Elk City, Okla., was hospitalized at Parkview Hospital for observation following an accident Monday morning, December 24. Lindsey suffered minor injuries in a two truck collision on highway 83, 2 miles south of the Wheeler County line.

Lindsey was traveling north on 83 in a 1978 Ford truck, used in oil field work; he slowed to make a left turn onto a side road. A second truck driven by George Steward of Hampstead, Tex., also traveling north, came over a rise in the road and was unable to slow his vehicle enough to avoid the collision. Steward was not injured in the accident.

Lindsey was pinned in the wreckage for 30-45 minutes following the 11 a.m. collision. The Briscoe and Wheeler Fire Departments and the Wheeler Rescue Unit were on the scene to assist.

The 1977 Kenworth tractor-trailer driven by Steward received only minor damage to the right front.

Lindsey was brought to Parkview Hospital by Wheeler Ambulance.

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LEARN NOT TO BURN

ALUMINUM WIRE HAZARDS
After studying a number of complaints on burning, glowing or smoking electrical outlets, the Consumer Product Safety Commission has initiated action to declare aluminum wire electrical systems a hazardous consumer product for home use. A number of fires have been reported from improper installation of aluminum wire in Norman household circuits of 15 or 20 amperes. Individual circuits to appliances such as dishwashers and air conditioners are believed to have the same hazard potential.

These areas where problems have been found include: cover plates on switches and outlets which are warm or hot to the touch; outlets, lights or entire circuits which fail to work; lights which flicker periodically (this can be caused by other electrical difficulties); and strange odors, specifically the smell of burning plastic, smoke, or sparks and arcing coming from switches and outlets.

Problems may take several years to develop and the absence of the above indicators does not mean there is no hazard. Unused outlets may experience problems since appliances working elsewhere on the circuit may cause the overheating of those not in use. Difficulties have been found in dwellings and apartments built between 1965 and 1973 or where an addition was added then. Any new wiring or rewiring done during this period in existing buildings is also suspect. Aluminum wire, switches and outlets manufactured after 1972 have been altered, but sales of stock on hand continued after that date.

To determine if aluminum wire is in a building, the wire cover may be checked for the word ALUMINUM or the abbreviation AL printed or stamped on it, the contractor who installed the wiring may be contacted, or the wiring may be inspected by a qualified electrician. Since special tools are necessary for connecting aluminum wire and to torque connections properly, a licensed electrician should be called to check or replace aluminum wire. Specifically designed switches and outlets may have to be installed. Residents should not attempt to remove cover plates or electrical

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Fireplace Cleaning and Care

Properly clean and care for your fireplace to put it in condition for months of wintertime enjoyment.

Fireplaces used year after year without cleaning can become unsightly and often dangerous due to the formation of soot deposits on the inside of the chimney.

Cleaning a fireplace tends to be a "dirty" job, but it's not hard.

It's possible to hire a "pro" for a chimney cleaning job, but an agile and determined do-it-yourself can do this task.

In addition, when it comes to cleaning the masonry or stone face of the fireplace, no one will do a better job than the do-it-yourself.

Cleaning Chimney Interior

If you use your fireplace frequently and burn resinous woods such as pine, spruce or fir, flammable deposits may form on the inside of the chimney making an annual cleaning a "Must".

Check the unit with a flashlight to determine condition of the chimney walls. If they appear "furry" and flake off when brushed, clean them before the fireplace is used.

Cleaning the interior chimney requires agility and care because the operation is carried out from the rooftop.

Begin by placing a plastic dropcloth inside the fireplace to catch dropping debris. Then, fasten another piece of plastic over the opening and attach securely around the outside with duct or masking tape. This important step will protect furnishings against soot and dirt.

Cleaning equipment is simple and inexpensive.

If the house is single-story, try using a long-handled broom to

dislodge the sticky deposits.

If the chimney height prevents use of a broom, try a cylinder of chicken wire or a rock-and-straw filled burlap bag suspended by a rope.

From the roof, the cleaning device is lowered and raised to dislodge soot deposits from the interior wall of the chimney.

Precautions are in order if your home is old or has a poorly constructed chimney.

Where this is the case, it is best to have the cleaning job done by a professional with modern suction equipment.

Cleaning Fireplace Face

Black, sooty stain on the fireplace face is usually caused by overloading the fireplace.

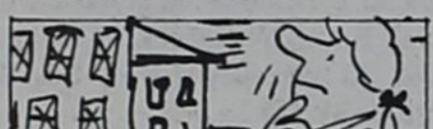
Whether brick, stone or other masonry products are used, remove soot deposits by washing with either of two solutions:

1. one-half cup vinegar or acetic acid, one-eighth cup detergent, and one gallon water, or
2. for more stubborn stains, use one to two cups trisodium phosphate, one-half cup household bleach, one-eighth cup detergent, and one gallon water.

Apply either solution with a stiff (natural or plastic bristle) scrub brush. Wear gloves and protective clothing to avoid skin irritation.

Once the stain is dislodged, rinse well with clear water.

When masonry is completely dry and free of stain, a clear masonry sealer may be mopped or sprayed on to prevent deep penetration of stains.

"Collar" the now look. Update your collars, with a special emphasis on size.

Smaller collars are fashionable now. Most important in updating is to make the collar look like it's the original. Before you can do that, take a quick look at collar styles and reshaping limits. Basic collar styles are flat, rolled

or stand up at the neckline. Those standing up at the base of the neck, such as mandarin, usually are small, and they don't need changes this season.

Flat Collars

Flat collars, often called "Peter Pan" collars, are a duplicate shape of the bodice area they cover. In other words, the collar neckline curve is identical to the bodice neckline curve. Because it's flat, this collar can be any

width or shape. To redesign a flat collar, mark the shape you want along the outside collar seam. Add seam allowances. Turn raw edges inward and topstitch. Or trim collar to the size you want and bind the edge.

Rolled Collars

A rolled collar stands up and turns back over itself at the base of the neck at the center back. This collar's neckline shape itself will be different from the bodice neckline shape, varying from straight to slightly curved. Remember, the outside shape of the collar must cover — or meet — the neckline seam at the center back.

You can reduce wider rolled collars in the same manner as the flat collar described above.

Other Changes

Other changes that will update a collar include these: rounding collar points and changing the angle of the seamline edges at center front.

Also, you might remove an original collar, face the neckline, and cut a new collar from matching or contrasting fabric scraps.

Or you might add a commercial lace collar.

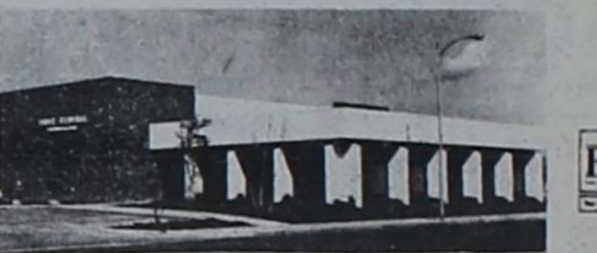

Commissioner Atherton motioned-seconded by Commissioner Harrison to approve the following permit. All voted aye.

A PERMIT

Line F-1 Moore Field, Texas Land C O 22994

granting Colorado Interstate Gas Company the right to construct, operate and maintain a pipeline on, under and across a certain roadway and public road in the County of Wheeler, Texas.

SECTION 1 Be it ordered by the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, in legal session convened, that the right and privilege is hereby given, insofar as said Court has the authority and jurisdiction to give the same, to Colorado Interstate Gas Company, its successors and assigns, to lay, construct, maintain, operate, repair, replace and remove a natural gas pipeline under, across and over the roadways and public roads on the section lines of Sections 2 and 6, AB&M Survey, and Sections 4 an 7, Blick L, JM Lindsey Survey, Wheeler County, Texas, and along and over substantially the following line, course, and distance as noted in the two attached plan and profiles, and made a part hereof.

SECTION 2 Be it further ordered by the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, that the said Colorado Interstate Gas Company, its successors and assigns, shall replace and repair all roads and ditches in the same condition in which they were before any excavations or alterations were made in the exercise of the right and privilege hereinabove granted to the satisfaction of and with the approval of the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, and its lawfully designated engineer and agent in such matters.

SECTION 3 Be it further ordered by the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, that the said Colorado Interstate Gas Company shall have the right to transfer and assign this permit and its liabilities accruing thereunder to anyone it may choose, with the distinct understanding that any such assignee or transferee shall assume and have all the liabilities herein provided.

SECTION 4 Be it further ordered by said Commissioner Court of Wheeler County, Texas, that said pipeline shall be constructed in such manner that the same will have not less than forty inches (40") surface cover.

SECTION 5 Be it further ordered by the said Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, that the said Colorado Interstate Gas Company its successors and assigns, shall hold said Commissioners Court harmless from any and all expenses and/or any act or omission of said Colorado Interstate Gas Company relating to the installation, operation, or maintenance of said pipeline.

SECTION 6 Be it further ordered by the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, that this permit is granted with the express understanding that it shall in no manner conflict with any Permit heretofore granted by said Commissioners Court to any other firm, person, or corporation

for the purposes of constructing oil, gas, or other pipeline, water line, telephone and telegraph lines over, under and across said County road between the points hereinabove provided, and that the right, authority and permission granted herein shall be subject to any other former grants made by such Commissioners Court; and the Grantee herein, its successors and assigns, shall be fully bound and required to Court; and the Grantee herein, its successors recognize such other and former grants as may have been heretofore made by said Commissioners Court.

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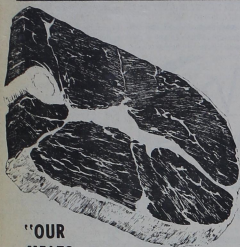
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
