## SOLAR POWERING STUDY UNDERWAY

A half-million dollar solar re-powering study for the Department of Energy (DOE) by Southwestern Public Service Company and General Electric to determine the feasibility of a solar powered electric generating unit has been launched. The project could result in the installation of an \$80-million solar-powered unit at SPS's Plant X near Earth, Texas.

A great deal of research has been done on solar-powered plants but not much has been done on the concept of adding solar units to existing plants. This study will determine the engineering and economic factors of repowering an electric plant — if it can be done on a large scale and if it would be more economical than building new solar plants.

In recent years, as the search for feasible alternatives became more intense, Southwestern Public Service Company began an effort to assess those options that might have practical utility application. Solar power was one of the alternatives selected for consideration. The Company's involvement began with a data collection and literature review

program of the latest developments in solar energy. As early as 1975, Southwestern became an active participant in a solar program called the Southwest Project. The objective of this study was to examine the technical, economical and institutional barriers to the rapid implementation of solar energy. A final report was drafted in January, 1979.

Southwestern's second solar project involved participation in a General Atomic study (sponsored by DOE) of a 100 MW Line Focus Solar Central Power System (LFSCPS). General Atomic's Fixed Mirror Solar Concentrator tracks the motion of the line image of the sun. Southwestern provided information on utility load profiles, the present and future worth of conventional power generation, utility requirements that could affect the design of the LFSCPS and performed an assessment of the limitations of the proposed system configuration. This study was completed on October 1, 1979 and a final report from the DOE is expected soon.

Six utility-industrial groups, including SPS and GE, were

chosen by the DOE to develop designs for combining a solar energy plant with an existing electric generating plant. Six similar contracts were awarded by the DOE for research on repowering units for industrial use.

The repowering of existing plants, both for electric generation and industrial use, is a relatively new idea and is being developed more as a fuel saver than an alternate fuel source. The proposed plan calls for about 60 percent of the thermal energy of the retrofit unit to be supplied by the sun, and, if feasible, could save approximately 1-billion cubic feet of gas annually. It could also increase or recapture the life of an existing plant. By adding an alternate fuel supply to an existing plant, that plant could last beyond the use of restrictive fuel supplies.

The proposed solar unit, at Plant X would produce enough energy to drive an existing steam turbine. The steam turbine would, however, be capable of using natural gas or a combination of natural gas and solar power.

The solar portion of the plant would consist of a mirror field, a central receiver mounted on top of a 300-foot tower, a liquid sodium heat transfer system and three steam generators. The mirror field would include approximately 5,000 steerable sun-tracking mirrors called heliostats occupying 276 acres.

The central receiver of the system will be cooled by constantly flowing liquid sodium, which will maintain a constant temperature. GE has been interested in the use of liquid sodium for many years and has found it to be a highly efficient source.

The liquid sodium as a heat transfer agent, could be a major area of consideration by the DOE when it begins reviewing the

Underground cable will soon be utilized to reroute long distance lines from Wheeler and Mobeetie to Amarillo via Pampa, according to J.H. Davis, Memphis Division Manager for General Telephone.

These facilities will replace pole and open wire type facilities between Wheeler and Shamrock that were more subject to icing and adverse weather conditions, Davis said.

Davis added that additional personnel have been working in Wheeler and Mobeetie for the past few months to complete installation of the cable facilities. It is estimated that all work can be completed and ready for service by November 30, 1979.

"This is just another step toward total communications for customers of General Telephone," Davis added.

All of the estimates published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service are based on the data provided by Texas farmers and ranchers, County Extension Agents, ASCS offices, and many others in agriculture. This

cooperation provides the necessary data which is, in turn, returned to farmers and ranchers and others in the form of accurate estimates, which are so essential in making the wisest production and marketing decisions. Each farmer or rancher receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.

## Marriage Game By Local Sorority

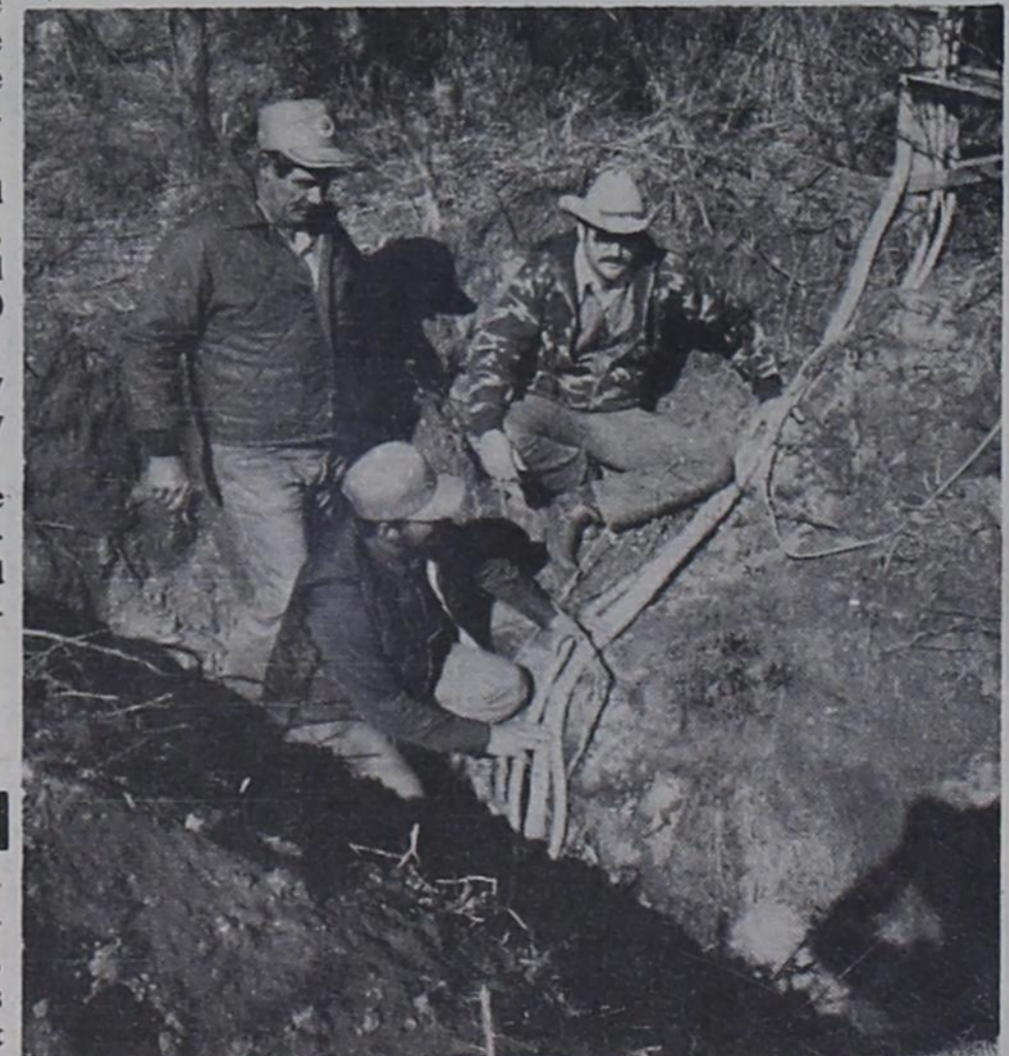

**Car Service Contract Plans**  
Coverage and cost vary on service contract plans, so decide if the extra expense is worth the added insurance and security before buying one for your car. Generally, they require a payment in the range of \$100-150 for a sub-compact and \$300 for a luxury car.

tenance plans on new or used cars that extend much of the the coverage that is included in the original warranties.

Service contracts are essentially a form of insurance in case the need for costly repair occurs after the regular warranty expires. The plans usually include a deductible of \$25-50.

While the traditional one-year, new-car warranty covers the entire car against defects, extended plans generally cover the transmission, rear axle, brakes, steering, air conditioning and the electrical suspension system. They usually do not cover brake linings, the evaporator and accessories such as power windows, power door locks, and power seats.

Are the plans worth the price? They are to the dealer. With an average \$100 profit on each plan, a dealer selling 50 plans a month can net an additional \$60,000 for the year.

The plans also enable dealers to write additional service business, improve used car merchandising and make customer contracts which result in repeat new car sales.

The value to the customer is less certain, depending on the circumstances.

The chance the car will require a costly major repair on parts covered by extended service contract is small.

In addition, extended service contracts generally require a car buyer to perform routine main-

tenance that is outlined in the owner's manual.

When examining certain extended service contracts, consider the following points:

1. Carefully examine what repairs the policy covers. Look at what's excluded.
2. Remember that many policies are for independent dealers, and the car-buyer must make a claim for payment of repair costs.
3. Check whether the extended service contract is transferable. Many policies cannot be

transferred to a subsequent buyer during the coverage period.

4. Check the conditions on where the customer must get repairs.

5. Remember that there is often a mileage limitation.

6. Remember that there is a manufacturer's warranty for the first year or 12,000 miles. A three-year-36,000 miles extended service contract only provides extra coverage for the two years of the 24,000 miles after expiration of the manufacturer's warranty.

7. Check whether the policy carries any stipulation on the types of repair parts to be used. Some require the use of used parts.

8. Shop for price. Premiums charged will vary quite a bit.

Kim is one of our regular patrons that keeps us informed of what she likes in the way of the published word. We appreciate her and other faithful readers like her that support the Wheeler Public Library. We would again like to invite each and every one of you to come see what Wheeler has to offer.

*Love, Etc.* by Bel Kaufman. Printice-Hall, Inc. 410 pp. To the millions of Bel Kaufman's fans who made *Up the Down Staircase* (64 weeks on the best-seller list) into one of the most phenomenal international best sellers of the decade (and the movie of the book into a cinematic blockbuster) *Love, Etc.* is a welcome return and a daring new departure.

All of Miss Kaufman's familiar virtues are abundantly here—warmth, grace, humor, compassion, wit—yet in theme and texture, this second novel is far more subtle and complex than the first.

On one level, this is an intensely romantic story of a

mature woman's star-crossed love affair with an enigmatic stranger. On another, it is an exploration of that strange process by which a creative artist transmutes life into fiction and fiction back into life. And on yet another, it is the triumphant account of a woman's voyage from the shattering trauma of divorce toward wholeness and fulfillment.

But above all, this is a book about how people fall out of love and into love and about the joy, the despair, the poetry and

passion—the manifold etceteras of love.

Four members of the Wheeler Garden Club visited Canadian and went on the Annual foliage tour on Sunday, October 21st. Making the tour were Sallie Harris, president, Jewell Moore, Opal Hefley and Willie Mae Stevens.

We visited the Arts and Crafts show, ate lunch in the country kitchen, viewed slides of wild flowers native to the area, made the tour out to Lake Marvin, and visited two lovely new homes.

### Wind Erosion Affects Production

Wind erosion plays a major role in the productive capacity of our soils. Fractions of the soil, which contain the nutrients, are removed by the erosive action of the wind. Wind will act as a sorting agent and separate the lighter materials and carry them off, leaving the less productive materials behind.

Each wind storm serves to remove more plant nutrients. After a number of wind storms the remaining soil is reduced in organic matter and plant nutrients which could be used by crops in years to come.

We see that the potential productive capacity is lowered by each wind storm on uncovered land. To combat this the land needs to be covered during the critical blowing period. Some crops which are adapted for this purpose are small grains and sorghums. The residue from these can be left undisturbed, shredded, mowed or knocked down with a stack, cutter. If insufficient residue is available tillage can be used to roughen the soil surface to help prevent wind erosion.

Added benefits from this crop residue is conservation of moisture, increased infiltration of moisture, and improved soil tilth. Crop residue use should be an important tool in a good cropping system.

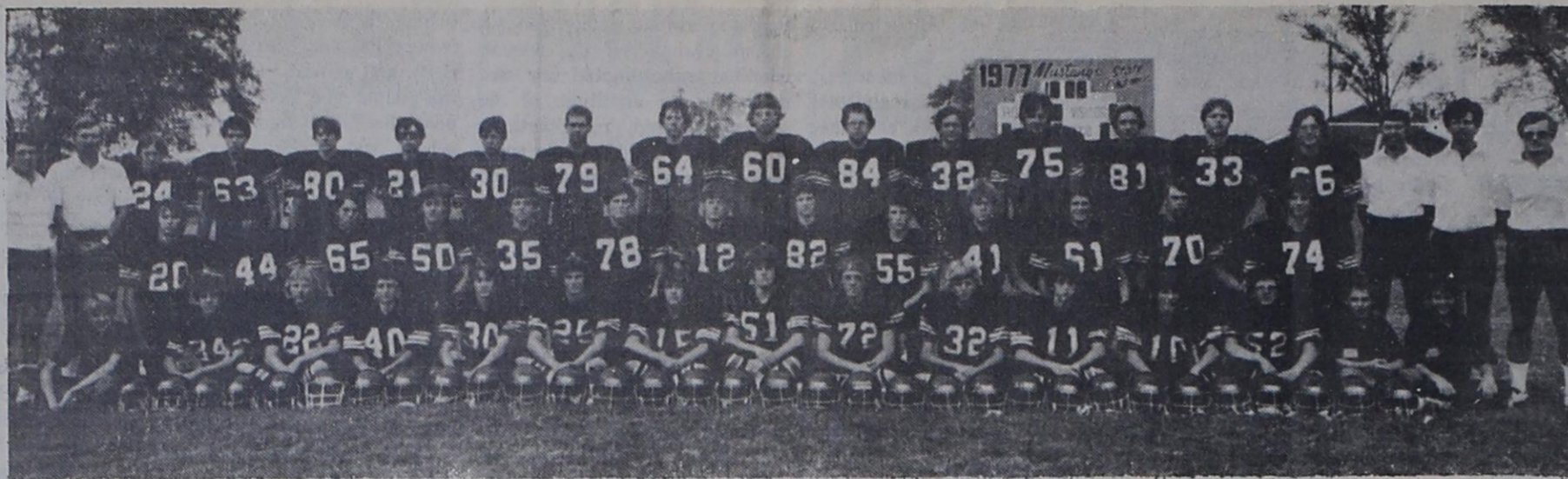

### COUNTY'S SHARE OF TOURIST DOLLARS

Wheeler County received \$5,506,000 of the State's \$7,032,369,000 travel receipts in 1978, a national study commissioned by the Texas Tourist Development Agency has disclosed.

The 1978 figures reflect an increase of 12 percent in travel receipts over 1977 for Wheeler

County.

In addition to gross receipts, the study found that Wheeler County in 1978 and 237 of the state's 243,887 travel-related jobs, with an annual payroll of \$1,393,000.

It also estimated \$220,000 in state and \$27,000 in local taxes were paid by county visitors in 1978.

The study was done by the U.S. Travel Data Center in Washington, D.C., an independent travel research organization funded jointly by public and private sectors.

It was based on the Center's Travel Economic Impact Model which breaks out a state's share of the national travel market on a county-by-county basis.

The model measures the economic impact of all travel involving overnight trips away from home, and day trips at least 100 miles or more from home. Thus it includes travel by Texans as well as out-of-state visitors, for all purposes.

It includes estimates of the traveler's spending at home in preparation for the trip, his

spending en route, and that at his destination.

Basic data for the model comes from the National Travel Survey, conducted every five years by the U.S. Census Bureau, and from the Center's own National Travel Expenditure Model.

It was the latter which estimated that in 1975 Texas had dislodged New York for third place in the nation's travel industry. The 1978 figures, however, show Texas back in fourth place behind California, Florida, and New York.

"We're pleased that travel research techniques have finally developed to the point that states can determine where, within their boundaries, travel dollars are spent and travel-related jobs exist," said Frank Hildebrand, executive director of the Texas Tourist Development Agency.

"Now we can trace travel's considerable economic impact on a county-by-county basis, observe changing patterns annually, and help direct the rapid growth of this burgeoning industry."

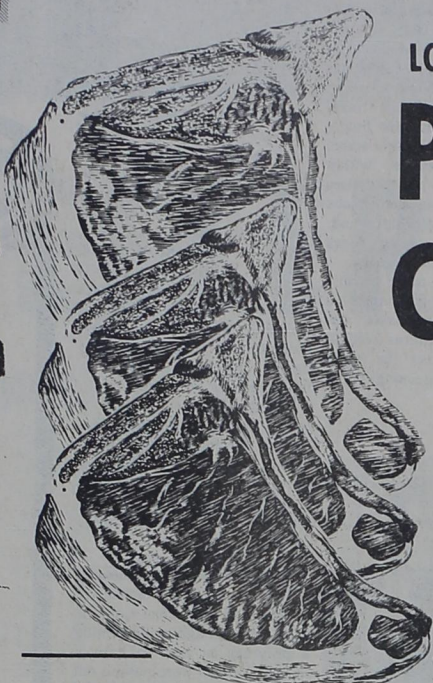
