

The solar portion of the plant would consist of a mirror field, a central receiver mounted on top of a 300-foot tower, a liquid sodium heat ransfer system and three steam generators. The mirror field would include approximately 5,000 steerable suntracking mirrors called heliostats occupying 276 acres.

the central receiver of the system will be cooled by constantly flowing liquid sodium, which will maintain a constant temperature. GE has been interested in the use of liquid sodium for many years and has found it to be a highly efficient

The liquid sodium as a heat transfer agent, could be a major area of consideration by the DOE when it begins reviewing the Continued Page 7

Cost of the salad supper will be \$2.50 for adults (12 and up) and \$1.50 for children. Members of the club will be selling tickets prior to the supper.


Underground Cable

Underground cable will soon be utilized to reroute long distance lines from Wheeler and Mobeetie to Amarillo via Pampa, according to J.H. Davis, Memphis Division Manager for General Telephone.

These facilities will replace pole and open wire type facilities between Wheeler and Shamrock that were more subject to icing and adverse weather conditions, Davis said.

Davis added that additional personnel have been working in Wheeler and Mobeetie for the past few months to complete installation of the cable facilities. It is estimated that all work can be completed and ready for

service by November 30, 1979. "This is just another step toward total communications for customers of General Telephone," Davis added.

Local Garden Club Takes Foliage Tour

Four members of the Wheeler Garden Club visited Canadian and went on the Annual foliage tour on Sunday, October 21st. Making the tour were Sallie Harris, president, Jewell Moore, Opal Hefley and Willie Mae Stevens.

We visited the Arts and Crafts show, ate lunch in the country kitchen, viewed slides of wild flowers native to the area, made the tour out to Lake Marvin, and visited two lovely new homes.

Wind Erosion Attects Production

Wind erosion plays a major role in the productive capacity of our soils. Fractions of the soil, which contain the nutrients, are removed by the erosive action of the wind. Wind will act as a sorting agent and separate the lighter materials and carry them off, leaving the less productive materials behind.

Each wind storm serves to remove more plant nutrients. After a number of wind storms the remaining soil is reduced in organic matter and plant nutrients which could be used by crops in years to come.

We see that the potential productive capacity is lowered by each wind storm on uncovered land. To combat this the land needs to be covered during the critical blowing period. Some crops which are adapted for this purpose are small grains and sorghums. The residue from these can be left undisturbed, shredded, mowed or knocked down with a stack, cutter. if insufficient residue is available tillage can be used to roughen the soil surface to help prevent wind erosin.

Added benefits from this crop residue is conservation of moisture, increased infiltration of moisture, and improved soil tilth. Crop residue use should be an important tool in a good cropping

Handling Fire Emergencies

panic! Take a moment to decide What would you do if a fire on a plan of action. Your best while it's still small.

In The Kitchen

If a fire erupts in a pan on top. of the stove, immediately turn off the heat. Try to smother the flame with a lid that completely covers the pan. If this fails, use a fire extinguisher that all family members know how to operate.

If a fire breaks out in your oven-turn off the heat. Try smothering the fire by keeping the oven door closed for a few moments. If this fails, slowly open the oven door just far enough to use your fire extinguisher (dry chemical or carbon dioxide type).

Even if you think the fire is out, call the fire department, they'll make sure!

Never risk carrying a burning pan out of the house, and never pour water on grease fires-this will spatter and spread the

Above All-Never Try To Fight Anything But A Small Fire! Clothing Fires

Never fun or remain standing if your clothing catches fire. Drop down immediately. If indoors, roll yourself into a rug, blanket, or heavy coat to smother the flames. It outdoors, roll in the ground. Remove smoldering clothing.

Electrical Fires

In case of an electrical fire, unplug appliance or turn off electricity. Never pour water on a connected appliance-you may get electrocuted.

Trash Fires For trash, paper or fabrics, use

water and soak thoroughly. **How To Treat Burns** Plunge burned skin into ice

water and keep it there until pain disappears. Or, apply towels that have been soaked in ice water. Don't put greasy ointments on burns. Call your doctor immediately if burns are serious. Reporting a Fire

Keep the fire department number (826-5537) posted next to your telephone. If you can't use your own phone, plan to use a neighbor's. Speak slowly and plainly. Say, "My name is and I want to report a fire at . . . Then wait to answer questions. If you have trouble, dial 0 for operator and ask for assistance. Be sure to report all fires to the Fire Department.



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
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
