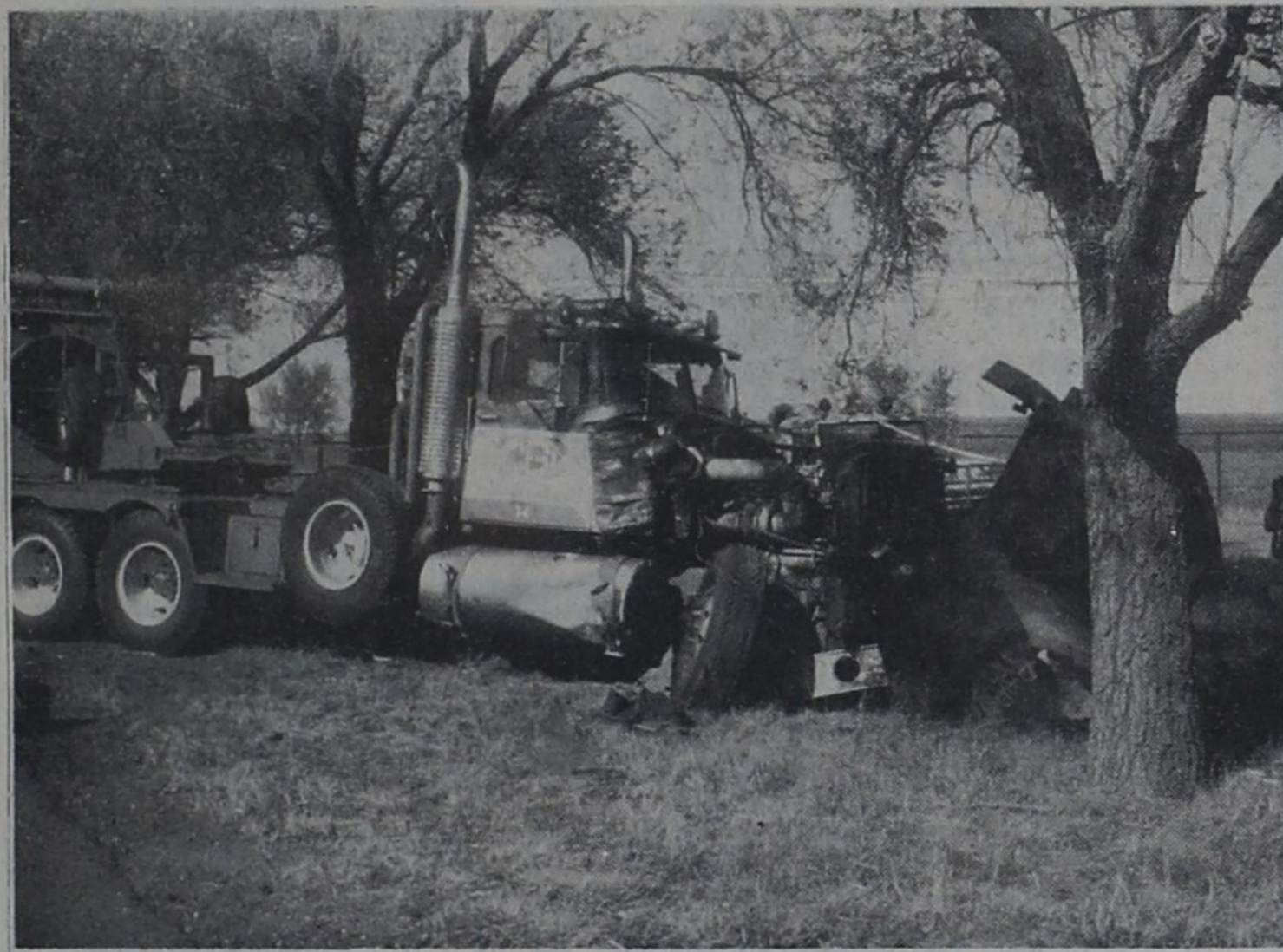
# MUSTANGS STAMPEDE BY FOLLETT, 57-19

This clinic is sponsored by the Retired Senior Volunteer Program and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

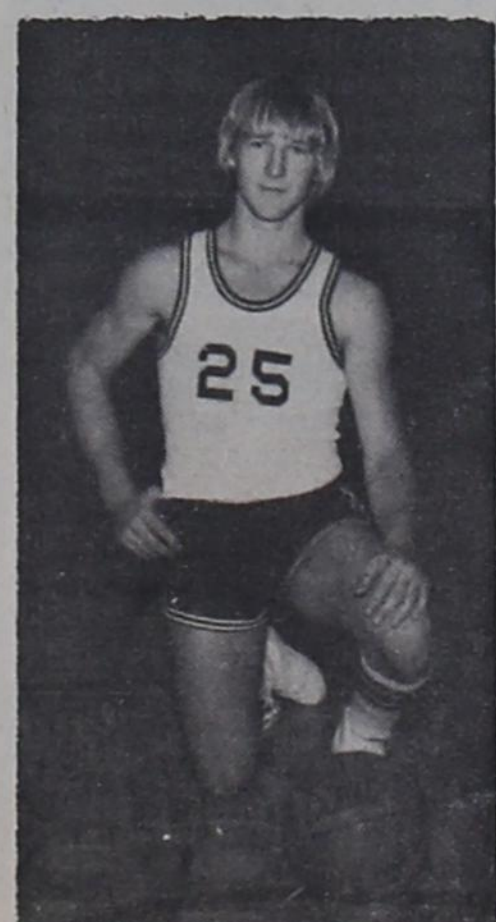

# WIND, RAIN & HAIL HIT AREA, CROPS DESTROYED

Wheeler and the surrounding area waited through the month of October for moisture needed for the crops and grass. Only a sprinkle had fallen during the month until Monday evening when clouds unexpectedly built up and dumped 1.78". A second shower around 2 a.m. Tuesday brought an additional inch of rain. The amounts reported in the immediate area ranged from 2.7" to 3.5".

The Wheeler Volunter Fire Department was called into action early in the evening and spent approximately 3 hours watching clouds build and approach the Wheeler area. Surrounding communities were warned as possible severe weather approached their area. While on watch, a heavy hail storm hit 5 miles west of Wheeler; the cloud moved on to Mobeetie and from there moved to Briscoe community where as much as 5" of rain was reported. The gage by community had a report of 6".

Crop damage from the heavy rain and hail was severe. James

## SWCD Directors Elected To Office

Darville Atherton was recently elected to a five year term on the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors. Atherton was appointed to the position in 1978 and has been very active in SWCD work since that time.

The purpose of the Wheeler County SWCD which is headquartered in Wheeler is to promote sound conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the District and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers in conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights.

The District Directors coordinates conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and has authority to enter into working agreements with these agencies to carry out its purpose.

All conservation programs managed by the District are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Wheeler was .07 on September 17; as a comparison, September, 1978 produced 4.33 inches of moisture in three showers during the latter part of the month.

The front which moved in Monday brought cooler temperatures and more wind. The temperature Wednesday morning at 6:00 was 42 degrees.

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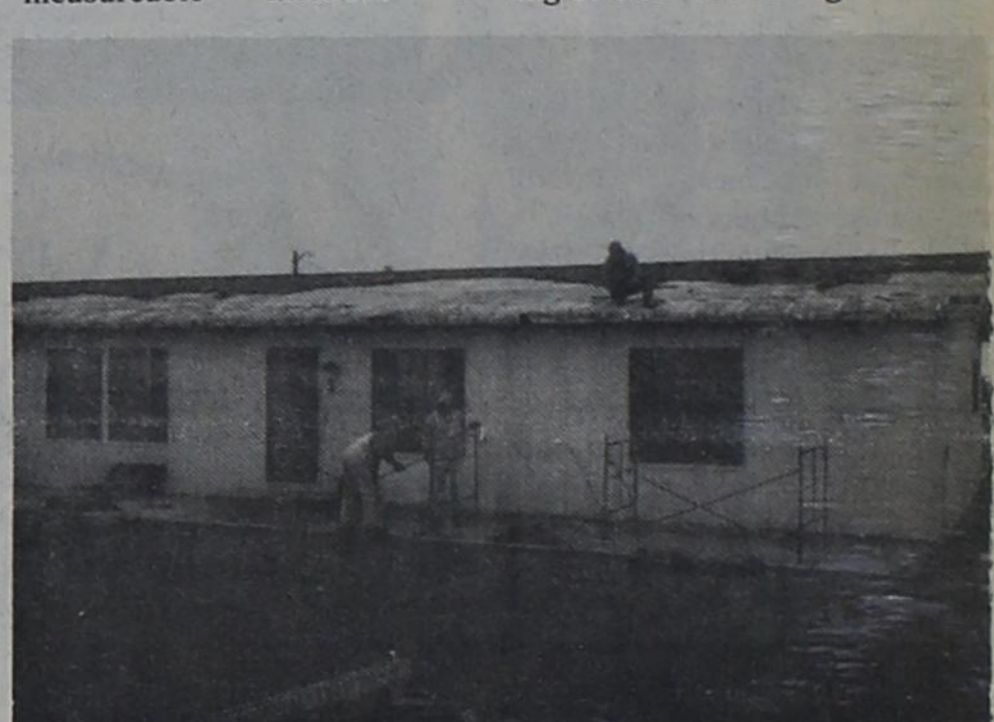

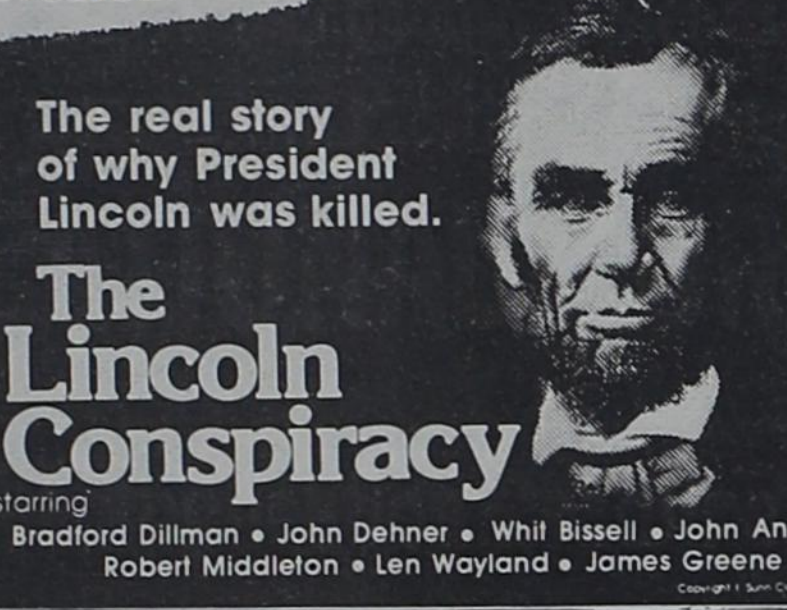

Buy closely woven, heavy weight, smooth finished, non-flammable fabrics that provide a reasonably close fit.

In a specially equipped car the following persons drove tests to demonstrate the distance required to react (move the foot off the accelerator to the brake pedal) and to brake (stop after you have reached the brake pedal):  
Male Student-Greg Hampton — 20 MPH — 13 ft. reaction + 22.2 ft. braking = 35 ft. total.  
Female Student-Lynette Gaines — 20 MPH — 15.2 ft. reaction + 25.6 ft. braking = 40.8 ft. total.  
Teacher-Mr. Simpson — 30 MPH — 18.3 ft. reaction + 52.1 ft. braking = 70.4 ft. total.  
Officer-Mr. Sutton — 40 MPH — 22.4 ft. reaction + 22.4 ft. braking = 44.8 ft. total.  
Note the greater distance to stop as the speed was increased. Mr. Bullard explained that the reaction distance will be necessary to stop at a given point. Mr. Bullard said that excessive speed is the greatest single cause of traffic accidents and that most drivers really believe that "they can stop on a dime." He pointed out that most makes and sizes of cars will require the same distance to brake whether small or large, when everything is equal; surface, brakes, tires, load, etc.  
Mr. Bullard emphasized that a driver who observes speed laws but neglects other items of importance such as proper signaling, intersection approach, proper lane for turns, etc., is not a safe driver. We should drive near the speed limit to avoid the hazards of passing and of being passed, he said. Give signals in plenty of time to better communicate our intentions to our fellow drivers. Today's program was brought to Wheeler under the sponsorship of Wheeler County Farm Bureau, and has been conducted since 1957 by the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department.

## ANTELOPE PERMITS ARE UP

### In the Kitchen

**Kitchen Planning**  
Well-planned kitchens combine organization and function. When building a new home, remodeling an existing kitchen, or adding on to a present home, study specific ways to plan the kitchen.

### Function

Remember, the kitchen contains important areas, such as counters that provide work and storage space, built-in appliances, fixtures and floor space.

Like a well-fitted jigsaw puzzle, the pieces must fit properly to insure personal satisfaction and to meet functional requirements. Also, preparation or cleanup tasks.

A well-planned kitchen includes centers designed for specific foods personal satisfaction to meet functional requirements. Also, preparation or cleanup tasks.

Besides its appliances, each center needs counter surface and storage space. Effective centers allow work to move continuously in one direction.

### Organization

The arrangement of the centers within the floor plan usually take a basic kitchen shape: the "U" shape, broken-"U" or island, "L" shape, two wall or corridor, or, the one wall or Pullman shape.

Too much space is an unnecessary step and wastes energy—so, plan ahead to side-step any excess space.

Recommended work areas distances are as follows:

Sink to refrigerator—four to seven feet

Refrigerator to range top—four to nine feet

Range top to sink—four to six feet

### Smooth-Top Ranges And Energy Efficiency

Smooth-top ranges get the "ok" on energy efficiency — if they have thermostatically controlled elements. They'll save even more energy if their owners learn to finish cooking food by using "retained heat." That means turning off the burner before food is completely cooked and letting it finish cooking with heat that the element retains.

Smooth-top ranges have excellent retained-heat capabilities, researchers say. Also, most researchers report similar amounts of energy used by smooth-top ranges with thermostatically controlled elements and by conventional ranges.

Although cooking is about 15 percent slower on smooth tops,

their efficient transfer of heat makes energy-use figures similar with those of conventional Ranges.

On the other hand, smooth tops with non-thermostatically controlled units will use slightly more energy than other models, and they do require about 23 percent more cooking time.

Smooth-top ranges have been marketed for just over 10 years, and consumers buy one smooth-top for every 10 ranges and countertop ranges they purchase.

Most smooth-top owners say

eye appeal and easy-cleaning were major reasons for their choice.

However, popularity of these ranges is declining somewhat.

Consumers have voiced worries regarding energy consumption and slowness of cooking.

### Cleaning 'Hopeless'

**Ceramic Tile**  
Badly stained tile—especially in showers—presents a cleaning problem. Often, there's a rough, white build-up on them, a brownish soil along the grout lines and a dark, varnish-like stain in the center of the shower base. Avoid using abrasive cleaner—they harm the ceramic glaze.

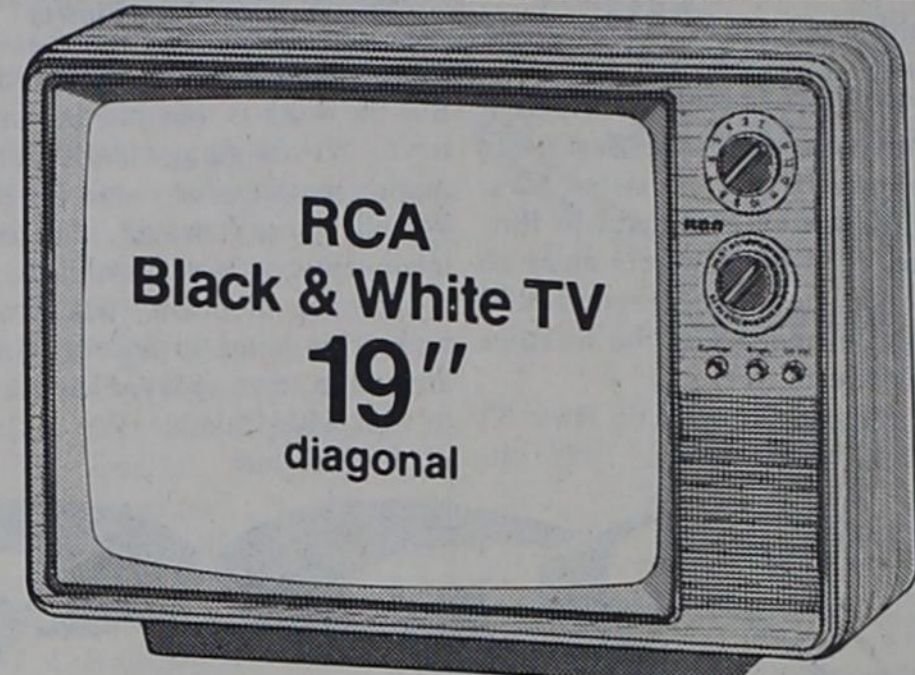

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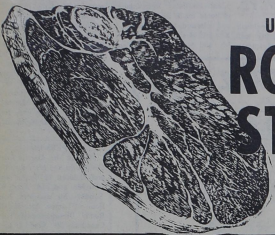
