LEARN NOT TO BURN

HEATING DEVICES

Heating devices are also high on the list of fire starters and should receive periodic attention. The best time to check them is just before the heating season. Most stoves and furnaces do their jobs pretty well when the weather outside isn't severe, but when they're overtaxed, usually during the coldest part of the winter, they may let you down with disastrous results. Before each season, inspect all parts, including smoke pipes and flues; repair all defective or questionable parts, and give your system a good cleaning to insure safe operation.

PORTABLE ELECTRIC HEATERS

Portable electric heaters should be installed and used according to manufacturer's instructions. Keep them away from combustibles like bedding, drapes and furniture. Keep people away too, especially children and people wearing loose clothing. Children should be warned never to insert fingers or objects through the protective guard.

FIREPLACES

Have the brickwork checked in older fireplaces. Use a screen to prevent flying sparks and logs

from rolling out of the fireplace. Keep dampers open, never use flammable liquid to start or freshen a fire.

PORTABLE CHARCOAL BURNERS

If an outdoor grill, hibachi or brazier must be used indoors for

heating or cooking, place it in a fireplace where the chimney will draw off the carbon monoxide. (Carbon monoxide is a deadly poison gas.) Open the damper. Use paper or kindling to start a fire, never flammable liquids such as gasoline or kerosene. Never freshen the fire with gasoline or other flammable liquid.

COOKING DEVICES

Cooking with a fondue pot or chafing dish may add a festive or

elegant touch to a meal, but it also requires special care. Never fill an alcohol burner more than half way - the flame may spill over and ignite the table cloth. Always use a heat-resistant tray under the burner and be certain that the flame is out and the liquid cooled before refilling.

Make A 'Zabuton' - For Elegant Comfort
 Make a "zabuton" for elegant comfort - it's a Japanese floor cushion. Its added beauty lies in easy construction. Basically all you need is a square of fabric, stuffing and decorative tassels. And, if you make several zabutons, you can stack them to function as a chair. By placing them on a platform with rollers, they'll be even more functional.

How To Make
 Four easy steps will create a zabuton.
 1. Cut a square of fabric - for example, from a 45-inch width (115 centimeters). Fold it in half (matching raw edges) - putting right sides together. Stitch the two short sides together. Press the seams open.
 2. With right sides still

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together, match the two seams. Pin them in place, as this will be the final seam to complete the pillow. Before sewing that seam, mark off a little, and leave it unsewn as it can be the opening through which you will stuff the pillow. To leave this opening, use a pin to mark about six inches (15 centimeters) away from the center down each side of what will be final seam. Stitch from the pin marking to the point of the pillow down each side.
 3. Turn right-side-out and stuff, carefully distributing the filling evenly. Slip-stitch to close.
 4. To make the pillow even more authentic, push a crease at each corner, tuck and decorate with tassels.

Making Tassels
 Cut cardboard the length you'd like the tassels. For the cardboard width, allow about two inches (five centimeters) more width than the bulk of the tassel - so it won't slip off the cardboard. Next, wind yarns or threads around the cardboard - lengthwise. When you reach the desired thickness, strand a needle with a double strand of yarn or thread. Draw it under the wound yarns or thread at the top of the card. Pull it tight and know it to tie them at the top. Cut the tassel ends at the bottom of the cardboard. Then, with the same thread or yarn used to knot, make a tassel top binding - about one-half inch down from the tassel top itself, wind enough around the tassel to form the binding. Then secure it.

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

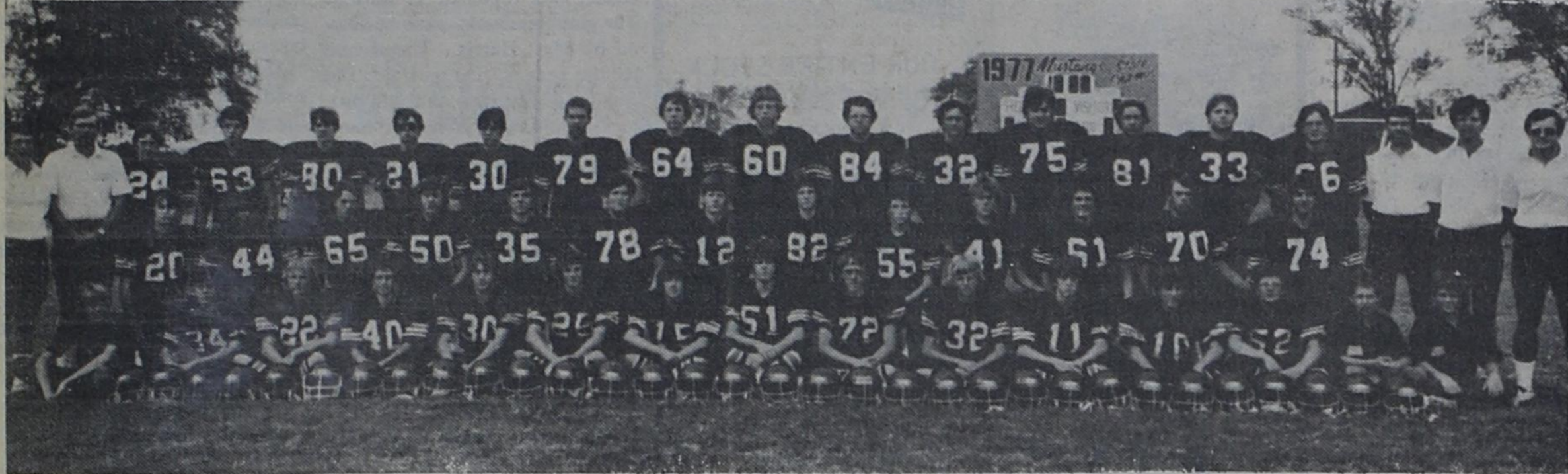

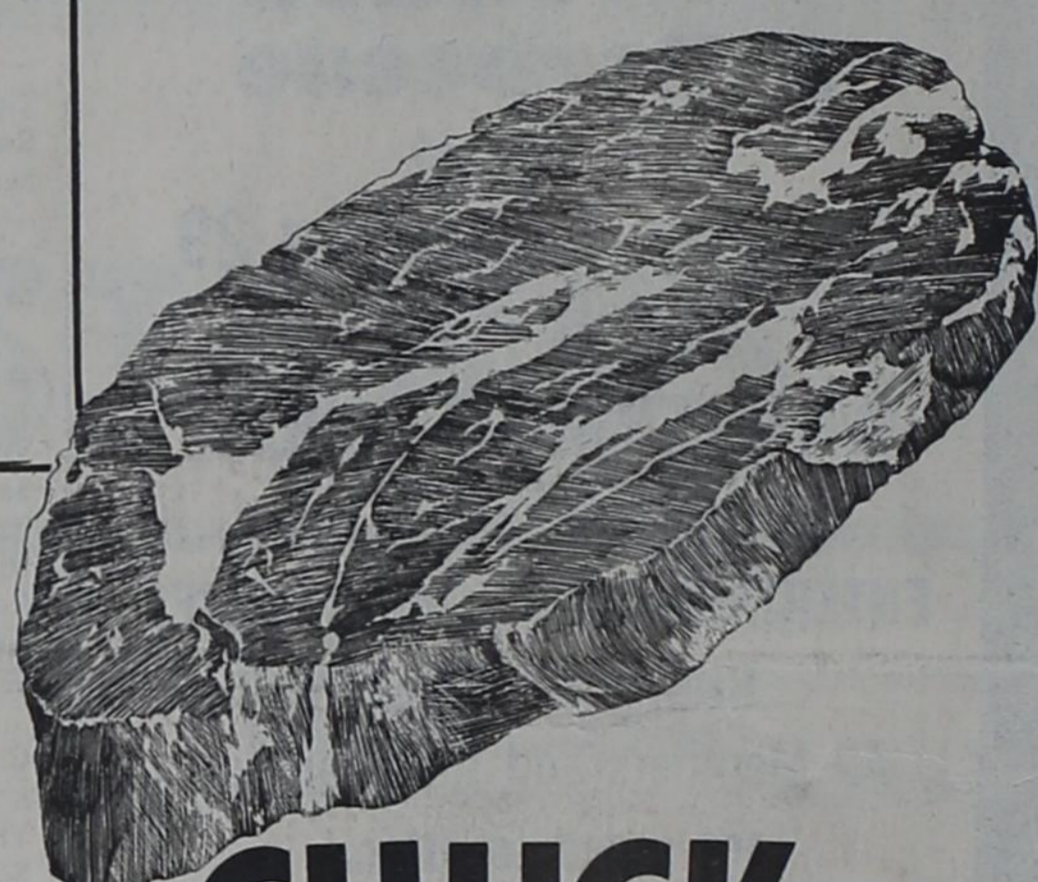
