Mrs. Emma M. Weatherly, 74, died Friday, August 24, 1979 in Borger.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Sunday, August 26, 1979 in First Baptist Church of Wheeler. Rev. M. B. Smith of Pampa officiated and Rev. Jerry Hogan, pastor of the Wheeler church assisted. Burial was in Wheeler Cemetery by Wright Funeral Home.

Mrs. Weatherly, born in Whittier, Ga., married Roy Weatherly in 1923 at Childress. She lived in Wheeler from 1933 until 1978, when she moved to Borger. She was a member of First Baptist Church of Wheeler. Pallbearers were her grandsons.

Survivors include her husband of Borger; a son, Leon Weatherly of Amarillo; two daughters, Mrs. Neva Maxwell of Borger and Mrs. Anita Gynes of Phillips; three brothers, Bryan and Howard Sams, both of California, and Toy Sams of Lubbock; four sisters, Mrs. Velma Cline of Amarillo, Mrs. Doris Longbine of Estelina, Miss Dorothy Sams and Mrs. Nors Carney, both of Bryan; seven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

ACCIDENT WEDNESDAY LEAVES WHEELER WITHOUT ELECTRICITY

An accident Wednesday afternoon at the Southwestern Public Service booster station at the southeast edge of the city limits left Wheeler without electricity for a period of time Wednesday afternoon.

As a result of the accident Joe Wilson, 52, of Pampa was taken to Parkview Hospital suffering from burns to the right hand, right shoulder, right arm and face; his left arm was broken when he fell.

Wilson was working on a ladder at the station; he was attempting to remove a bird nest near some to the high voltage wires. The pole being used came in contact with the wires and knocked Wilson from the ladder.

Wilson was alone at the location. When the power failure occurred, the local servicemen attempt-

ed to contact Wilson by radio, knowing he was in the area, and headed for the booster station to see if the problem was at that point in the Southwestern Public Service system. Wilson was found on the ground; he was conscious. The Wheeler ambulance was called to the scene and Wilson was taken to Parkview Hospital. The victim was transferred to Highland General in Pampa later in the afternoon.

Wilson is reported to be recovering and doing fine at this time. The burns were not as bad as first feared.

The incident occurred at 2:26 P.M. and Wheeler was without power until 4:50 P.M.. Due to the power shortage and the heavy use of the city water system, Wheeler was out of water for a period of time; the water supply in the tower was used, leaving no way to pump water to the local citizens.

on-year head man Joe Allen. "We're not as deep as we've been in the last few years, but we've got more depth than anybody in the district. If one back gets hurt, we've still got one or two more that can do a decent job."

That fact alone makes Wheeler, state Class B runner-up a year ago, the solid favorite once again in I-B.

To be sure, there are problems. Gone from the unit which saw a 31-game winning streak snapped by Union Hill in last year's state final are all-stars Mike Lee, Marvin Grimes and Myron Jolly. Only four two-way starters return.

But again, it's back to numbers. Wheeler returns 30 lettermen as it bids to capture a third consecutive I-B title, and among the returning regulars are running back Benny Baker, Globe-News Panhandle Plains Super Team Sophomore of the Year in 1978, and all-state two-way tackle Vic Bradford.

"I think it's pretty well settled that Wheeler is the favorite," says Miami coach Dennis Anderson. "But I think it's going to be a real tight race for second place. I think there are four or five teams that can come up and take second."

Best bets in that scramble, however, go to Booker and Miami, teams which return a batch of starters but, in the event of injury, can't reload with the effectiveness of Wheeler. Miami has only 19 in the entire football program, while Booker has 26

playing football. "I think it's (the district outcome)

going to depend on several things," says Allen. "Whether the kids we've moved can play where we've moved 'em, and of course, injuries."

Returning Mustang starters are Kevin Andis and Bret Mosley, in addition to Bradford and Baker. Andis, a 6-0, 160-pound senior, doubles as a split end and defensive back.

Some of the key position changes take place in the backfield, where Baker, a fullback for the most part a year ago, will be shifted to tailback—"We want to give him the ball as much as we can, and we think we can do it more at tailback," explains Allen. Baker, a 6-0, 200-pounder, checks in at linebacker on defense.

Mosley (5-9, 175) will make the move from last year's wingback position to fullback, and he'll check in at another linebacker spot.

Bradford (6-1, 210) anchors the line but is expected to get support from Russell Gaines (6-1, 210) and 5-11, 182-pound Kyle Lasley.

Rich Brown will be trying to step into the shoes of the graduated Jolly at quarterback. The 5-10, 155-pound senior threw three touchdown passes in spot action a year ago.

"He throws the ball well," says Allen. "He can't throw it 60 yards, but he throws it good medium range. We threw about seven or eight times a game last year. We're probably going to throw maybe double that this year but still not 40 times per game."

Among the others Allen said he'll be counting on for key production are

split end Mike Evans and backs Mike Gallagher and Tommy Calverley.

Booker, second in the loop a year ago, returns seven offensive and five defensive starters, but head mentor Hal Porter is looking beyond those performers.

"The coaching staff and I have been here for three years," notes Porter. "The kids have been through the program. We think we have good quickness and some super young people at skill positions. And if they come along by the time district starts we can be a good contender."

"Most of my enthusiasm comes from what I think the young kids can do."

Bolstering Porter's unit are six returning veterans who a year ago gained at least honorable mention all-district accolades. They are Brad Helfenbein (first team all-loop at placekicker), Carl Guy (linebacker), Louis Godino (offensive tackle), Clint Nowlin (center) and Darren Meyer and Mark Bechthold.

But adding support are juniors Kevin Mounsey and Les Born, along with freshman Gary Mills—"probably the fastest kid on the football team." Sophomore quarterback Brett Maxfield, Bechthold (tailback), fullback Meyer and slotback Guy complete the backfield.

Miami's bid comes care of 10 returning starters on offense and another nine on defense. The best of the bunch figure to be all-district returnees Brad Billingsley (first team offensive tackle) and Randy Stone, running back and defensive end.

Stone (6-0, 200) rushed for 868 yards in eight games a year ago, and should—barring injuries—follow the lead blocks of 6-3, 190-pound Billingsley to big yardage this time around.

Other offensive returnees are tight end Ron Francis, guards Darrell Dodson and Bill Burgeon, tackle Donnie Newman, halfbacks Keith Gray and Kevin Jenkins, and quarterback David Haws, moved from last year's tight end spot.

But nearly every performer must go both ways. "Depth hurts us real bad," says Anderson. "If we lose any of our offensive linemen, we don't have any depth."

Groom's chances rest with a quality offensive backfield. The Tigers offer all-district fullback Dwain Weller, a 1,300-yard rusher in '78, to go with quarterback Gary White and Vince Britten.

Others expected to be of immediate help are seniors John McConnell (guard) and defensive tackle Cary Reed.

Speed figures to be the key word for Follett, 5-4 a year ago. The Panthers offer a set of burners behind the line in wingback Clay Tyson and halfback Dirk Wright. They complement junior quarterback Mike Freeman.

Also expected to assist are fullback Randy Redelsperger and lineman Jeff Bourquin, a 200-pound senior.

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"BACK-TO-SCHOOL SAFETY WEEK"

Calling children "our greatest natural resource," Governor Clements has asked all drivers to become "especially aware of the need for increased safety and vigilance, particularly around our school zones."
Clements proclaimed Back to School Safety Week, from August 24 through September 1, to draw attention to this need for added caution during the start of school. Clements cited the nearly 4,000 traffic deaths in Texas last year and the 389 children killed because of traffic accidents in setting aside this week for particular driver awareness.

Bobcat Pelt Tags Procedure Hearing
A public hearing is scheduled for 2 P.M. August 31 by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department concerning proposed changes in bobcat tagging procedures.
The main changes under consideration would require registration of any buyer of bobcat pelts, allow fur dealers to tag bobcat pelts, and eliminate the requirement of retaining the animal's skull.
Under the current system only designated department employees are allowed to tag bobcat pelts.
The tagging program was started as the result of requirements set by the federal Endangered Species Scientific Authority (ESSA). Although the bobcat is not an endangered species in Texas, the tagging system helps determine the bobcat population and allows legally tagged pelts to be sold on the international market.
The hearing will be held at the P&WD's headquarters located at 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, Texas.

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Wildlife Habitat Management Easy

There are several inexpensive methods to improve wildlife food and cover. One of the best is discing areas of rangeland.
Small areas of rangeland or old cropland can be disked each year to provide more of the better food plants for game birds. This ground disturbance encourages such plants as sunflower, ragweed, dove weed and some annual legumes.
These disc areas do not need to be over one disc width wide. Good areas to put these are around shinary motts, along fence rows or along tree rows. About one-third or one-half of the areas should be disked each year which will make the entire area disked each year which will make the entire area disked every two to three years.

Be 'Energy Smart'—With Utility Records
Be "energy smart" with utility records, especially in buying or selling a home. They give a quick picture of a home's energy usage, and they tell you about local utility rates.
Idea For Sellers
If you're selling your home, consider making a summary sheet about your utility costs for prospective buyers. It's easy to make a summary sheet using past utility bills. Just write down two figures for each month during the past year — the amount of electricity and gas used and the total cost each month. Electricity amounts appear on your monthly bill as "kilowatt hours," and gas amounts appear on your bill as "cubic feet" or "therms."
Energy consumption reflects your home's energy conserving features, the heating and cooling facilities and the energy-conserving features, the heating and cooling facilities and the energy-use habits of your family.

questions about utility costs and the amounts of used and cost. Ask about the energy-use habits of family members and the appliances in the home, especially those that will stay with the house. Ask if you can see copies of past utility bills. If that isn't possible, ask for an estimate of energy amounts used and cost. Also ask about any energy-saving features of the home, such as insulation, caulking, window types, heating and cooling features and any others that may exist. Also notice window exposures — west-facing windows need special protection from afternoon sun in the summer.
New-Home Buyers
New-home buyers may have more difficulty estimating utility costs. Ask your real estate agent or builder for information, or ask others already living in the neighborhood. Call the utility companies to obtain specific rate information.
Make 'Energy Check-up'
Once in a home, keep accurate records of utility costs and energy amounts you use. Read electric and gas meters once a month. Read them even more often if you want to check the effectiveness of any "energy changes" you make — such as a new appliance, a new energy-saving feature or a new energy-use habit. Jot down the information on your calendar or some other handy place. Then you're ready to compare and make changes that will save energy and money as needed. Also, this system is helpful in solving any billing problems that may arise.

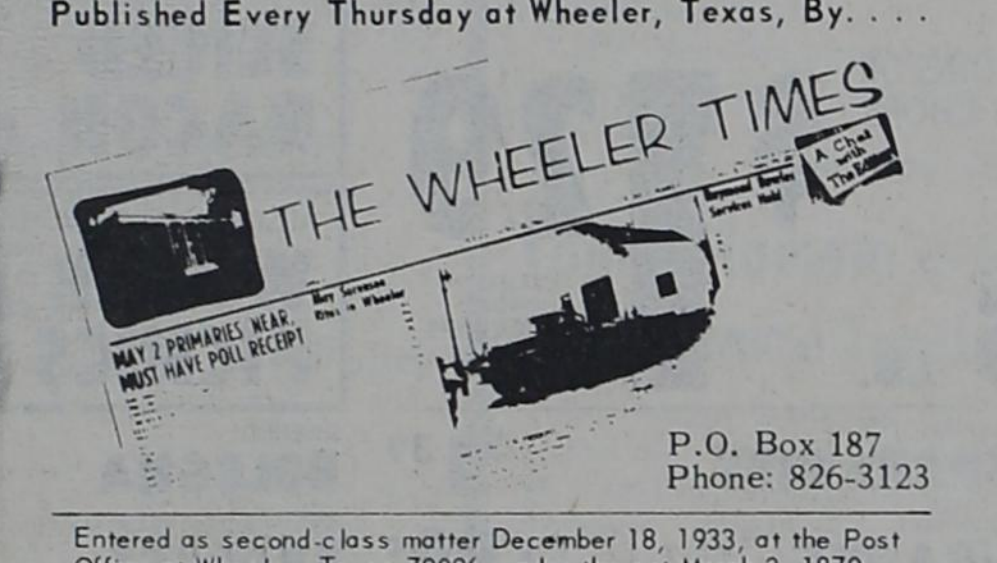

"Wee to those of us who are going to Spain, because neither we nor the fleet will arrive there. Most of use will perish . . ."
The prophecy of doom delivered by Fray Juan Ferrer came true 29 days later. A spring equinox storm of rain, lightning, and the small Spanish fleet due west through gulf waters. The Costa Dela Madalena loomed on the horizon. Minutes later three of the fragile wooden vessels were pounded against the white sand beach. Thus begins the story, "Treasure, People, Ships and Dreams," an exhibit of the 1554 Spanish shipwreck artifacts. The wreck touched off an immediate salvage and rescue operation by Spanish officials, and other events lasting to the present; beachcombing, treasure hunts, court fights over artifact ownership, and scientific archeology and conservation efforts.
The artifacts featured in this display include cannons, silver coins, gold bullion, an anchor, a crossbow, and the oldest known astrolabe in existence. Text, photos, drawings and maps give the background of the Spanish shipwreck off Padre Island in 1554.

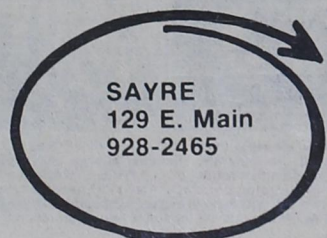
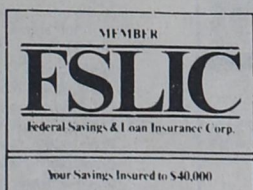

LEARN NOT TO BURN

Ken Daughtry, Fire Marshal Follow Safety Rules If Storing Gasoline

Is it worth risking your life, your home and your car just to avoid running out of gasoline? Every consumer who "stockpiles" gasoline exposes his

family and his possessions to the real danger of deadly explosion and fire, warns the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

In the face of gasoline shortages, many householders and motorists are hoarding fuel without thinking about the tragedies

they could cause, says the international center of fire safety information.

Be alert to gasoline's danger signals, NFPA urges consumers. Any smell of gasoline in a storage room or automobile trunk is good evidence of a vapor leak in the container and should be taken care of immediately.

To store gasoline at home, it's best to use an approved safety can—never a glass jug, discarded bleach bottle or other make-

shift container.

Keep the gasoline in a well-ventilated area where it can't be tipped or damaged accidentally, and keep it well out of the reach of small children. Never store it in the same room with hot water heating equipment, where a pilot light or sparking switch could set off an explosion of accumulated vapors. This means that home storage areas such as utility rooms and garages shouldn't be used for gasoline especially if heating equipment is located there.

Carrying extra gasoline in the trunk of the car also can create an explosive situation. Gasoline vapors can filter from the trunk into the car's interior where the striking of a match or an electrical system spark can set off a powerful explosion.

If spare gasoline must be carried on the road, use a metal or approved plastic can that is absolutely vapor-tight, NFPA recommends. Approved safety cans, which should be used elsewhere, are designed to vent vapors which makes them unsuitable in an automobile. Instead, use a container with perfect seals on both the cap of the fill opening and the pouring spout. Also, never fill the container completely—leave a little room for the gasoline to expand as it's warmed by the heat of the day and of the car.
