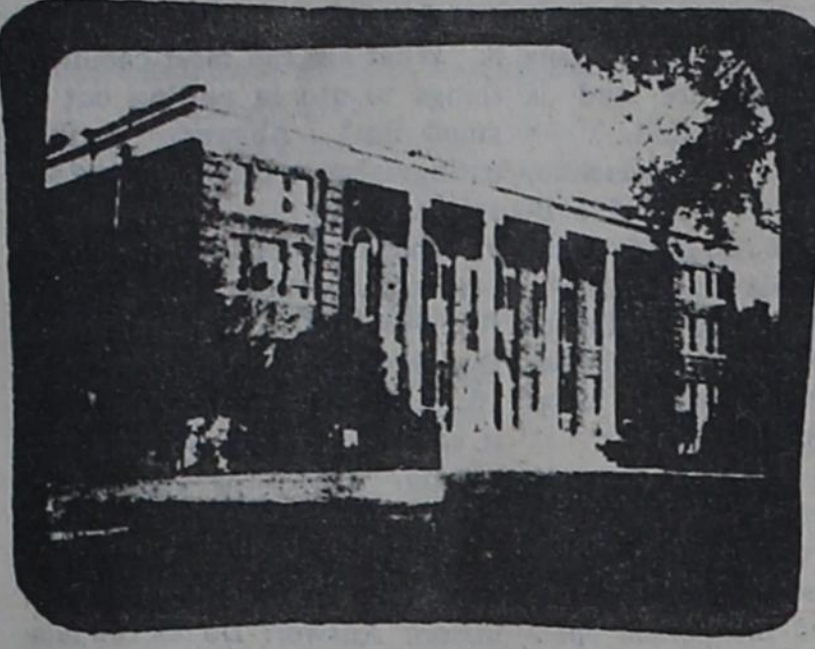

EMT CLASS TO BE OFFERED

The North Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance Service will sponsor a course offering Emergency Medical Technician certificate. The class is open to anyone interested in learning how to treat victims of heart attack or accident. The students will learn CPR, care of accident victims and bandaging and splinting.

Those interested in the course are asked to meet at the Ambulance Barn at 300 Alan L. Bean Blvd. Thursday, evening, August 30, at 7:30. There will be no charge to the student for the course to the students—the costs will be absorbed by the North Wheeler County Ambulance Service. Benefits for taking the classes for personal knowledge include the learning of CPR—the action taken when a patient suffers complete heart failure, the care of accident victims and bandaging and splinting. The completion of the course will qualify the student to help with the Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance Services. The course requires 120 hours of classroom, and in-hospital time. The classroom work will be at the ambulance barn; taught in

three hour sessions, (80 hours) this time includes a 1½ hour skills practice. Skills practice is the application of your classroom work, CPR, vitals and bandaging and splinting. Toward the end of the class, the students will be required to spend 40 hours in a hospital putting their knowledge

to work—this will be at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo and/or Parkview. The 40 hours in hospital time gives the individual an opportunity to be around sick people and become accustomed to working with them. Included in the emergency room at Northwest Texas.

CPCA Directors Attend Conference

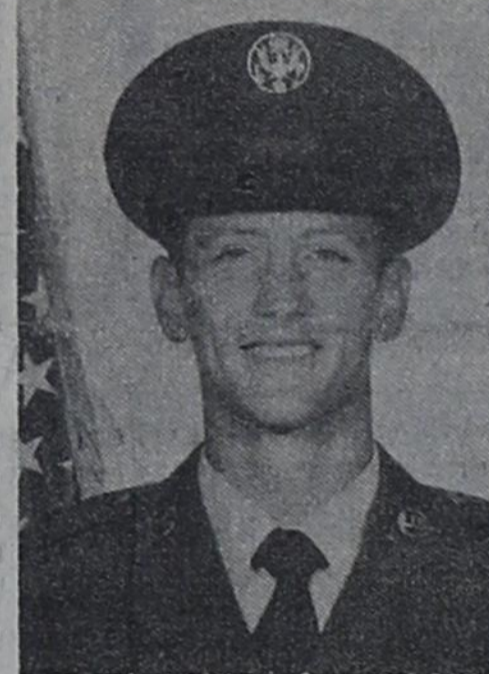

According to Larry Albin, PCA president who will accompany the group, the conference is designed to bring PCA directors up-to-date on services provided to PCAs by the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, source of most PCA loan funds. Wheeler Rodeo To Begin August 31

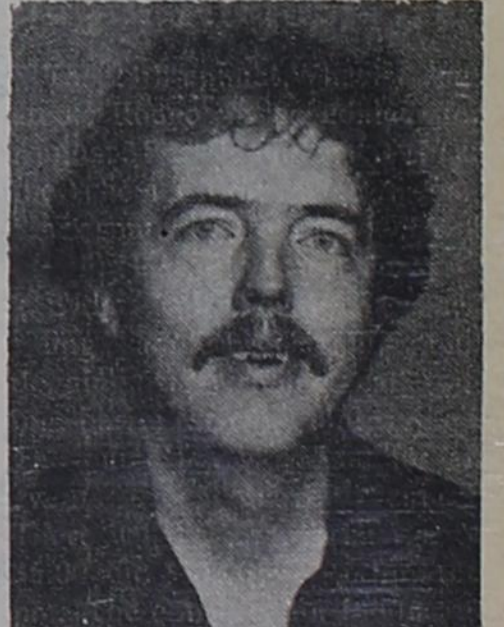
The 24th annual Wheeler Amateur Rodeo is scheduled for August 31 - September 1, 1979 at the Wheeler Riding Club Arena. Stock contractor for the rodeo will be Bill Hext of Glazier, Texas.

Events will include bareback riding, saddle bronc riding, bull dogging, steer roping, calf roping, barrel race and bull riding. The entry fee is \$35.00 for all events except barrel racing. There will be a stock charge of \$5.00 and \$30.00 will go into the pot. The entry fee for the barrel race will be \$20.00.

All events except steer roping and barrel race will be limited to 45 contestants with 12 riding in each performance. The limit on steer roping is 60 teams. All slack will be run Friday night after the rodeo. Barrel racers will be limited to 15 per performance and each night will be jack-potted.

LEARN NOT TO BURN

The following questions are designed to help citizens learn how to prevent and control fire.

1. Fires burn because three elements are present, heat, fuel and oxygen. What happens when one of these three elements is taken away? Answer: The fire goes out. A fire needs all three elements.
2. What are some ways that heat can be removed from a fire? Answer: by putting something on the fire that absorbs the heat like water, steam or a foam.
3. How can you take oxygen away from a fire? Answer: By covering the fire with a wet blanket, throwing dirt on it, by putting a chemical foam on it.
4. What method of extinguishing a fire would be safest or best for wood, cloth, or paper fires? Answer: Water, because it cools the heat of the fire and is plentiful and easy to find.
5. A fire starts from gasoline, greases or other flammable liquids. What are two good agents used to stop this kind of fire? Answer: Smothering the fire or covering it with a dry chemical, a foam or other chemicals found in fire extinguishers.
6. Why is it dangerous to try to put out an electrical fire with water or a water-type foam? Answer: Because water conducts electricity and the person operating the extinguisher could be seriously injured or killed from electricity traveling through the water.
7. What is safe to use when putting out an electrical fire? Answer: Dry chemicals, carbon dioxide, a blanket or rug to smother it.
8. What are the most common things to use in putting out a small fire? Answer: A fire extinguisher, a blanket or rug to smother it.
9. What kind of fire extinguisher is acceptable to use in putting out a vehicle fire? Answer: Dry chemical or carbon dioxide.
10. If you are riding in a car and it catches on fire, what should you do? Answer: Get out of the car and call the fire department.
11. What do you do if you smell smoke in a building and you are inside? Answer: Do not run into the hallway. Place the palm of your hand against the door. If the door feels hot, the adjoining hallway is already filled with deadly heated gases. Therefore, use another escape route. Arouse people by shouting. If the door does not feel hot, open it slightly and pass your hand through the opening. If the air seems cool, enter the hallway with caution. Leave the house immediately, THEN call the fire department.
12. For wood and grass fires outdoors what type of fire fighting equipment is most important? Answer: Anything which will smother the fire such as water, rugs, sand, etc.
13. If you were going to make a fire strip or dig a trench to stop a big grass fire, where would you begin? Answer: The fire strip should be ahead of the fire so that when the fire reaches the burned strip, there will be no fuel for the fire.

Lines From Linda
Courtesy, Manners—Still in Style
 Despite the everyday hustle and bustle of daily living, families should teach and practice courtesy and good manners at home.

A knowledge of etiquette helps anyone relate better to other people, become accepted into a group more readily and helps him feel confident because he knows what to do.

Basics in etiquette should include knowledge of letter writing introductions, table manners, conversation conducting and work conduct.

Follow these basics for letter writing, introduction and dining:

Letter — Writing Basics
 Convey the intended message—thank you for gift, hospitality or message, congratulations, invitation, sympathy, or special occasion. Use correct spelling and grammar. Avoid slang or archaic terms. Use correct stationery, form and punctuation. Personal messages are still appreciated when handwritten. Business letters should be typewritten.

Introduction Basics
 When introducing people of different ages, introduce the younger to the older. When people are the same age, it doesn't matter whose name is mentioned first.

Dining Basics
 Start eating a meal when the hostess (female) begins to eat. Napkins are placed in the lap (only children tuck them in the collar) when the hostess removes hers from the table to her lap. After the meal, the napkin is laid neatly at the left of the plate but is not refolded.

Courtesy, Manners
 The woman is always head of the table and responsible for leading the conversation. The mother and father share the responsibility when it is just the

family. Keep topics of conversation pleasant. Death, health, religion and politics are not always dinner topics.

Select silverware from the outside of the place setting first, then work toward the plate. For instance, the salad fork is on the far left side of the plate and the teaspoon is on the far right.

Expect to use the salad fork as the first fork and the teaspoon as the first spoon. When in doubt, follow the hostess.

Drink when you do not have food in your mouth.

Soup is served in a bowl or cup. Drink it from a cup. Spoon away from your body when eating a bowl of soup.

Dunk doughnuts, crumble crackers in soup or cover foods with ketchup, only when eating informally at home.

Fish bones, prune seeds, olive pits and other inedible parts are removed from the mouth with the thumb and forefinger, not your fork.

When getting into a chair, get in from the left side and slide to the right. Get out of the chair on the left side.

New Decor With Old Furnishings
 Go creative! Blend old furnishings into new decorative schemes.

Start With Slipcovers
 In the case of upholstered furniture, slipcovers offer an ideal solution for recycling the couch or chairs.

Go Bold With Old
 Wood furniture also will integrate into a new scheme with some ingenuity—and a touch of boldness.

Heirlooms we inherited from our parents will not give us decorating trouble, but those first purchases we made as newlyweds probably will. That blond wood dining set, for instance, or that dark wood Mediterranean bedroom suite, need special boldness.

Overpower Blond Wood
 To play down blond wood—in the dining room, for example—try a bold wall color of red, charcoal brown or emerald green. This makes the furniture secondary in importance. Also, a new lighting scheme can remove emphasis from the furniture.

'Re-Fresh' Dark Wood
 For the darker woods of the past, such as a Mediterranean bedroom set, try a "total" decorating scheme based on printed fabrics—new bedspread, draperies and carpet. They may transform the room into that "all-fresh-and-new" look.

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Dove Hunting Forecast Is Good

The dove forecast for the north zone of Texas is good according to reports from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel and hunters should find ample birds on the annual opening day, September 1.

The dove is a migratory game bird affected by both food and weather conditions and local populations can and will change between now and the first of the season.

Ample rains in Texas have produced good weed / wild sunflower patches and water holes for the birds and hunters should find doves at any of these areas. The counties off the Caprock are well-known for their high dove populations and good to excellent dove populations were observed in mid-August.

Northern dove hunters are hoping for some warm, dry weather to hold the birds on the plains till the season gets underway.

The north zone dove season will continue through Oct. 21 and open again next winter from Jan. 5-13. The north zone includes all of Texas north of a Del Rio, San Antonio, College Station, San Augustine line.

The south zone mourning dove season will be Sept. 22-Nov. 4, and, Jan. 5-20, 1980. Dove hunters in both of these zones may harvest birds from 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset daily. The daily bag limit is 10 birds per day and 20 birds in possession.

The white-winged dove season along the Rio Grande has been set for the two weekends of Sept. 1-2 and 8-9. Shooting hours for white-winged dove will be from noon to sunset daily.

Dove hunters are reminded that a new Texas hunting license is required on Sept. 1. Also, the shotguns used to hunt the migratory dove must be plugged to hold no more than three shells in the chamber and magazine combined.

Texas dove hunters will be allowed to hunt free of charge on both the Gene Howe and Matador wildlife management areas come September 1 according to a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department spokesman.

"All the hunter will have to do is check in at either area headquarters prior to the hunt with the season set for Sept. 1-31," said Vernon Morse, P&WD wildlife management area supervisor.

The rules are the same for each area as the surrounding county regulations which include shooting hours from 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset daily with shotguns plugged to a three shell capacity," Morse continued.

The daily dove limit on each area will be 10 birds with a possession limit of 20 birds.

The Matador area located near Paducah has been open to dove hunting in the past, but the Gene Howe area located near Canadian has always been closed to the dove Hunter.

Her fiance' graduated from Wheeler High School and holds an Associate of Art degree from Texas State Technical Institute. He is employed by Gibsons, Amarillo.

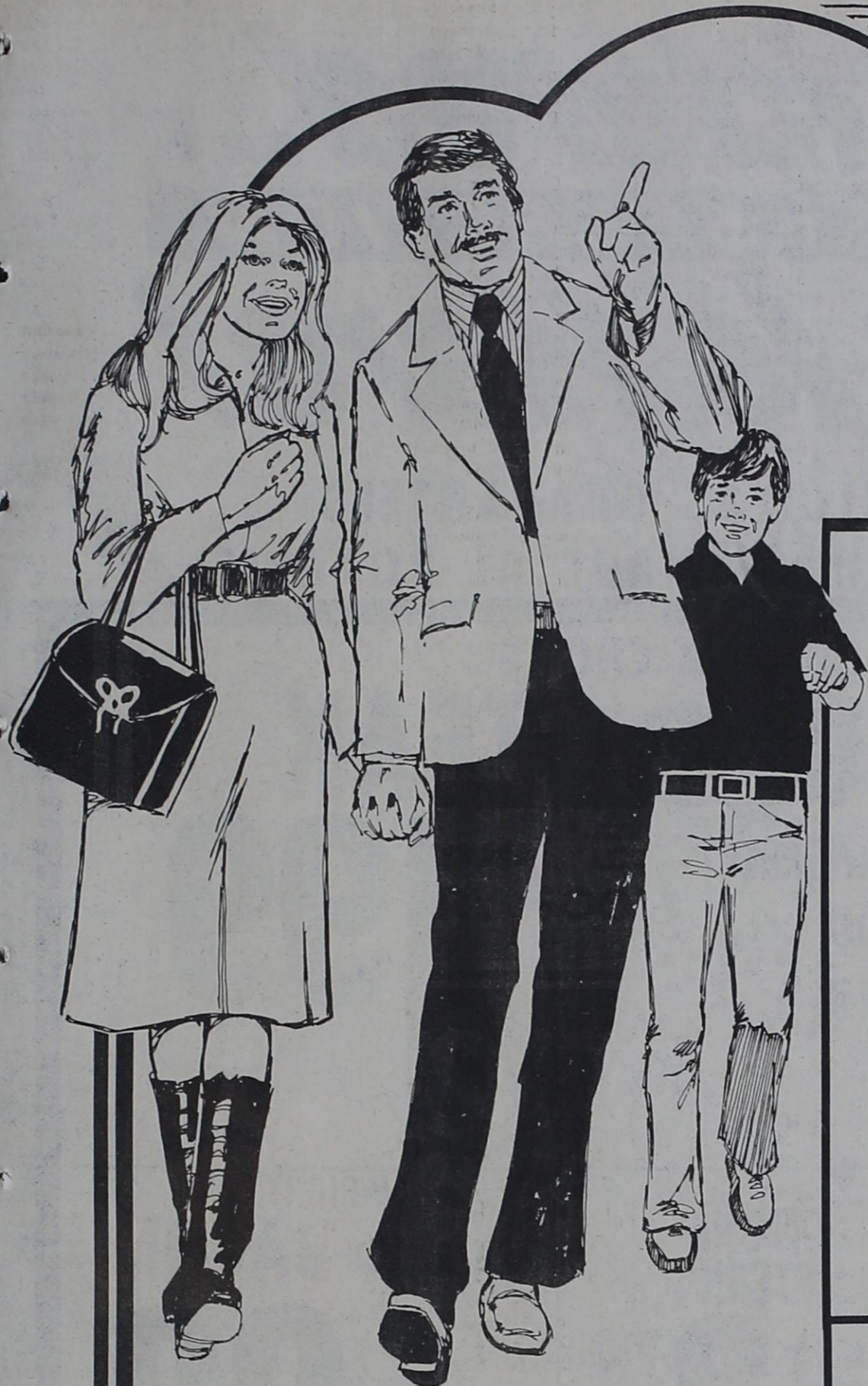
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
