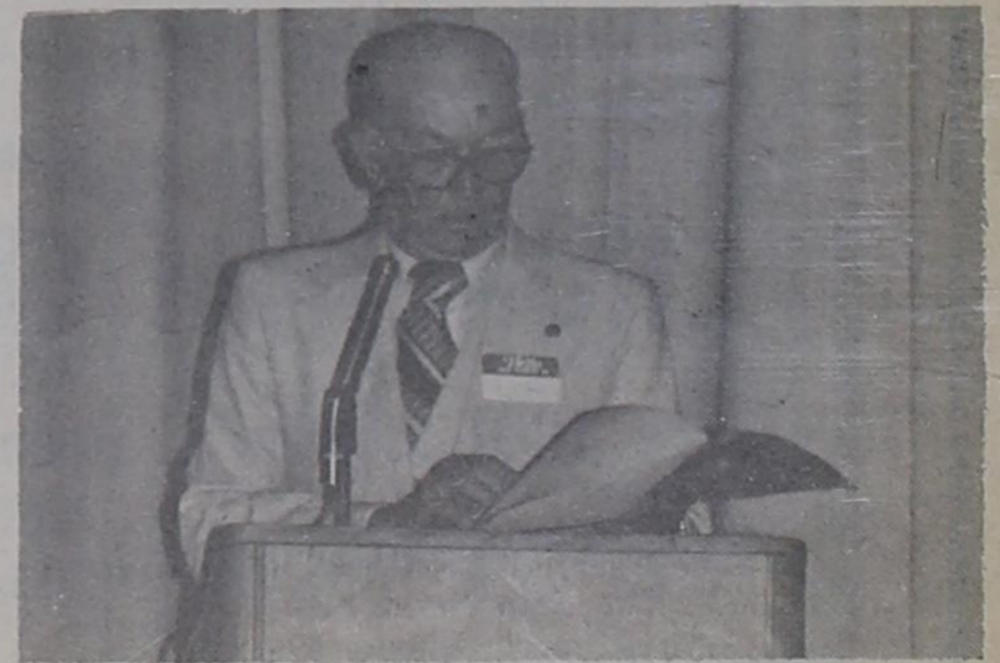

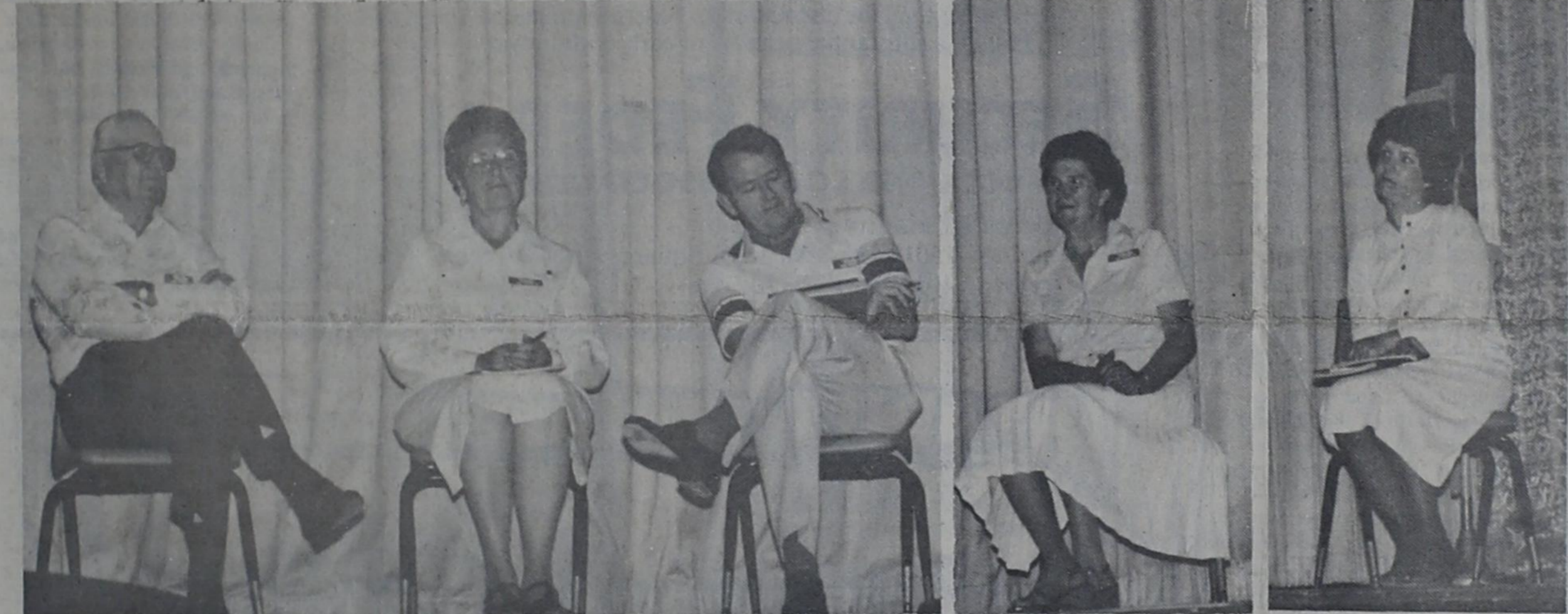

Termite Control
Termites cause wood decay and damage that threaten home upkeep.

Termite Varieties
"Subterranean" or "ground nesting" termites are a serious problem in Texas.

Subterranean termites live in colonies in the ground and require moisture to survive. The worker termites attack damp wood which is in contact with the ground. They may build earthen tunnels from the ground up to the wood. They will sometimes completely eat away the inside of a piece of wood while leaving the outside surface intact.

How To Check For Termites
Homeowners can follow these steps to check for termites:

- (1) Check for termites at least twice a year.
- (2) During the spring the summer (termite mating season) call an exterminator to identify large numbers of flying insects that you cannot identify.
- (3) Look for earthen tunnels in the following locations:
—along masonry foundation and basement walls,
—along openings where pipes enter walls, and
—along the surface of metal pipes.
- (4) Examine all cracks in slabs and loose mortar in masonry walls. Check all joints where wood meets with concrete or masonry, at walls, slabs, piers.
- (5) Inspect all wood and wood structures that are near the

ground.
Pay special attention to any that touch the house, such as fences, wood trellises, carports.

Examine crawl spaces that provide moist conditions.

(6) Check windowsills, door thresholds, porches and the underside of stairs.

Be on the lookout for peeling

and blistering paint.

(7) Where termite damage to wood is suspected, probe with a sharp point, such as an icepick or penknife. If the point penetrates the wood to a depth of one-half inch, when using only hand pressure, wood damage by termites is likely indicated.

How to Protect Against Termites

Chemicals needed to control termites are toxic to animals and plant life. There is also danger of contaminating the water supply. Therefore, the chemicals should be applied with extreme caution and preferably by an experienced person.

Follow this procedure when chemical treatments are necessary for an existing building:

- (1) Dig a trench, approximately one foot wide and three feet deep adjacent to the foundation wall.
- (2) Prepare a solution of the insecticide. Consult your county Extension office or local exterminator regarding the recommended type of mixing instructions.
- (3) Pour the insecticide against the exposed wall surface and into the trench as it is backfilled.

Apply the solution to all other locations where wood and masonry meet at a joint. It should also be applied to other areas that have earth floors.

(4) Use extreme caution with these chemicals since they will also be poisonous to humans and pets.

If a chemical is used inside the house, the room or space must be well ventilated and vacated for a period of time. Other considerations should include:

- * All surface water should be directed away from the building, allowing no water to accumulate at the foundations.
- * cover the earth of unpaved basements with plastic film four millimeters or heavier.
- * Keep crawl spaces well ventilated. A house of 1,000 square feet should have at least eight vents, 16 by eight inches, open at all times.
- * Crawl spaces should be at least two feet in height. Keep space clear of wood scraps.
- * Untreated wood should not come closer than six inches to the ground.

CORRECTION

A grasshopper bait can be made by following this formula.

- * 100# - Mill run bran
- 1 1/3 pts. Toxaphene 6E
- 7-8 gallons Water
- 2 Gallons Molasses
- * Sawdust can be used to replace

up to 75% of the bran
Mix the Toxaphene, water and molasses and then mix with the bran to form a crumbly mash. The bait should be uniformly moist and scatter into small

flakes when broad cast. It should be applied at the rate of 10 - 20 # per acre. The most effective applications are made in the morning hours and when the bait is still wet.

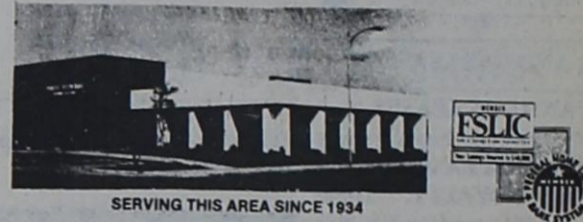

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Changes Necessary For Fuel Conserv.

Change is inevitable in today's farmer's search for ways to maintain yields in the wake of fuel shortage and very high prices, Lavon Williams, District Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler says. Minimum tillage, including no-till is proving to be the most promising fuel saver for farmers. "This practice," says Williams, "has especially high potential for feed grains, food grains and cotton - those crops most in demand on today's world market."

Switching from conventional to minimum tillage conserves about five gallons of fuel per acre per year. Since Texas farmers used minimum tillage on about 476,000 acres last year, some 2.4 million gallons of fuel were saved. USDA predicts that twenty years from now, minimum tillage could save some 850 millions of fuel annually.

"Although we can save a substantial amount of fuel using our current technology," Williams said, "USDA plus many private groups are researching ways to save even more."

Williams appeals to all farmers to stay abreast of continuing research on all fuel saving methods and their possible benefits and drawbacks while applying our current technology.

LEARN TO READ YOUR ELECTRIC METER AND SAVE!!!
 It will let you determine how many kilowatt hours you use in a given period of time - an hour, a day, a month or a year. That's how electricity is measured - by kilowatt hours (kwh) used.

Your residential electric meter will have either 4 or 5 dials.
 Electric meters are easily read from right to left as you look at the meter. If the pointer on a dial is between two numbers, write down the smaller number. When the pointer is directly on a number such as one (1) (see center dial above) then read it as 1. If the pointer on the next dial immediately to the right has passed zero (0). However, read it as zero (0) if the pointer on that dial to the right has not reached zero.
 The dials above read (from left to right) 9-3-1-1-5. If, however, the pointer on the second dial from the right above was between 9 and zero then the center dial would read as a zero.

Now let's read the same meter 24 hours later

The later reading is 9-3-1-3-8. Subtracting the first reading, 9315, from the new reading of 9318 - the answer is 23. Thus you would have used 23 kilowatt hours in the 24 hour period. Each kwh costs approximately five cents.

When you learn to read your electric meter, you will be able to see where your energy dollars go, then learn to use energy wisely & save!

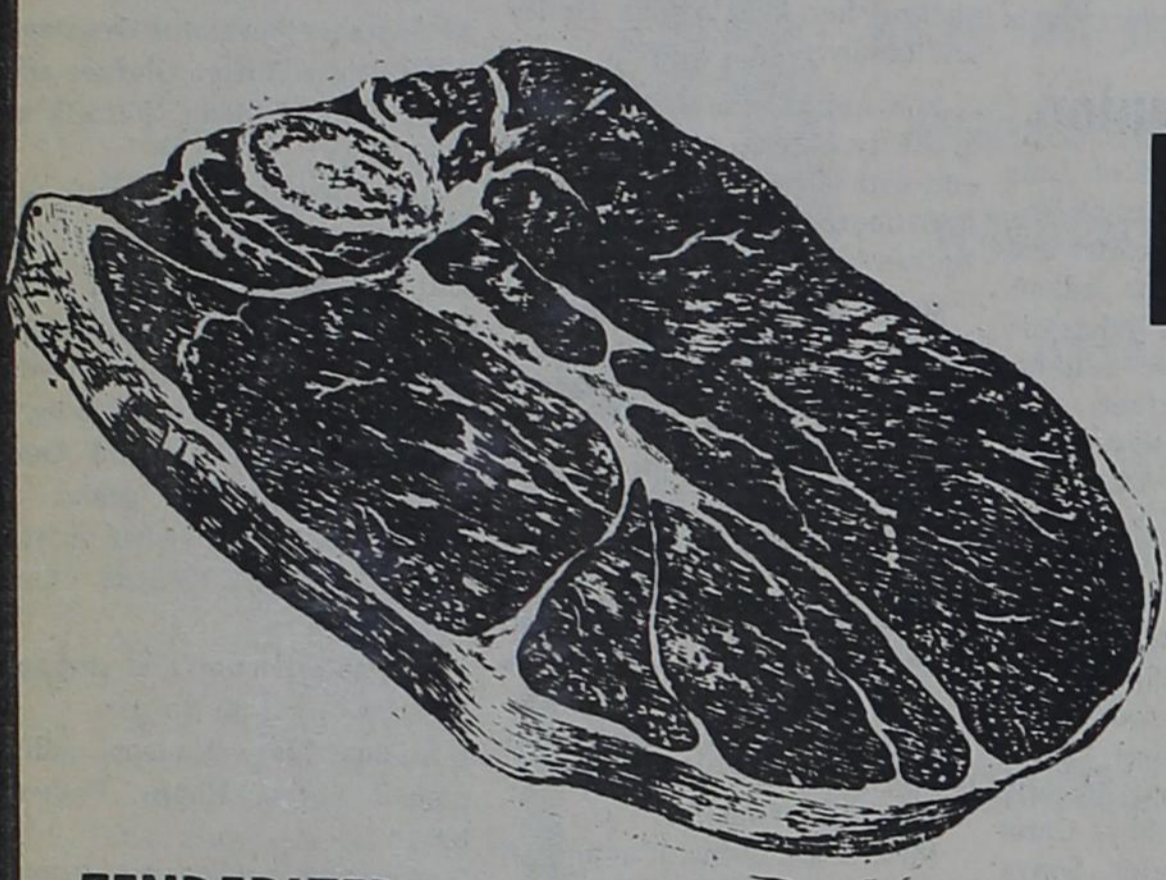
