4-H JUNIOR RODEO RESCHEDULED, PERFORMANCES THURSDAY & FRIDAY

The Wheeler County 4-H Junior rodeo originally scheduled for May 25-26, was rained out and has been rescheduled for this Thursday and Friday, May 31 and June 1.

The books have been reopened and entries will be accepted until 7:30 p.m. each night. The pre-school and 6-9 age groups will compete Thursday night and the 10-14 and 15-19 groups will go Friday night.

The young cowboys and cowgirls will be in action Thurs. night when the preschool and 6-9 year age groups are scheduled to compete.

Events for pre-school include Stick Horse Barrel race, boot scramble, goat ribbon race and sack race.

Boys 6-9 years of age may compete in barrel race, calf

riding, pole bending, flag race and golfette. Events for girls 6-9 include barrel race, walking lead, pole bending, flag race and golfette.

On Friday night the 10-14 year old and 15-19 year old age groups will compete.

Boys 10-14 can choose from steer riding, breakaway roping,

bareback ponies, barrel race & calf daubing, walking lead, barrel race, and pole bending.

In the 15-19 age group, events for boys will be calf roping, ribbon roping, bull riding, bareback riding and calf daubing. Events for the girls will be steer undecorating, calf daubing, flag

race, barrel race, and pole bending.

There will be a jackpot steer saddling on Friday night. The steer saddling will be open to boys and girls of any age through 19 years.

Another Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo is scheduled for August.

The rodeo is being put on by the Wheeler County 4-H Texans. Anyone wishing to enter should call the County Extension Office in Wheeler at 826-5243 or Don King at 826-3249.

The admission price is \$1.00 per person for those 6 years and older.

Emergency Care Attendant Course To Begin May 31

The North Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance Service will sponsor a course offering Emergency Care Attendant certificates. The class is open to anyone interested learning how to treat victims of heart attack or accident. The students will learn CPR, care of accident victims, and bandaging and splinting.

Those interested in the course are asked to meet at the Ambulance Barn at 300 Alan L. Bean Blvd. in Wheeler on Thursday morning, May 31, at 8:00. It had been planned to hold the class earlier in the year and meetings were held to determine interest. It is hoped these same people are interested and additional individuals are welcome.

There is no charge for the course and books will be furnished.

Benefits of taking the classes for personal knowledge include the learning of CPR—the action taken when a person suffers complete heart failure, the care

of accident victims and bandaging and splinting.

It was first intended to offer both an ECA course and EMT—Emergency Medical Technician—course; this has been changed, however, due to the time factor and the EMT course will be offered at a later date.

The ECA course involves 40 hours classroom instruction. This will include 1½ hours lecture and 1½ hours practice of skills each week for a period of 13 weeks. At the end of the course, students will be tested with a written test and application of skills. Certificates are awarded upon successful competing of the course; these are good for a period of 2 years at which time a refresher course ECA is required. The completion of the course qualifies you to work with the local volunteer ambulance service.

This will also be an opportunity for ECA's and EMT's whose certificates are about to expire to renew.

Wildlife Should Remain Wild

LUBBOCK -- This is the time of the year when most species of young animals and birds are seen by people fishing, hiking or camping in Texas. Many well-intentioned persons decide that these young species of wildlife have been abandoned and take them home as a pet.
"There are several reasons these young wildlife should be left in the field since it is not only illegal but it is always harmful or even fatal to the animal itself," said David Dvorak, wildlife biologist.

"Texas law prohibits confining or penning game animals or birds and most persons do not know how or what to feed the young wildlife once it is at their residence," Dvorak continued.
Even if the young wildlife adapts to the human surroundings, they often become dangerous to their captors, pets children and property when grown the biologist continued.

Young animals are rarely abandoned by their parents. Most are hidden while the parent goes off to feed where it can keep a watchful eye on it's offspring.
Many animals and birds are natural carriers of disease and insects which can become hazardous or even deadly to humans. The best known examples are rabies in skunks and fleas on prairie dogs.
Most of these cute animals have sharp teeth and will bite in self-defense. Usually, the young children at home are the recipient of these attacks.
If a person knows the animal is orphaned or abandoned, such as a road kill, contact the nearest Texas game warden or P&WD office giving location of the animal to be rescued.

Remove Mildew Before Painting
Remove all signs of mildew from a home before painting -- or expect the mildew to "come through" the new paint in a few days or weeks.

To remove mildew, use a water-based solution of tri-sodium phosphate, chlorine bleach and detergent -- readily available from paint stores, lumber yards, hardware stores and grocery stores.

Chlorine bleach kills mildew spores and lifts out stubborn stains, while trisodium phosphate cleans and "roughs up" the original paint surface so new paint will adhere.

Detergent helps clean, too, and it keeps the other two ingredients in contact with the old-paint surface for even more effective cleaning action.

Mildew-Removal Formula
Here's the formula: One gallon water, one cup tri-sodium phosphate, one cup chlorine bleach and one-fourth cup detergent.

How to Apply
Apply this solution to the old-paint surface with a long-handled brush that has stiff fiber or plastic bristles. Use a vigorous rubbing action.

Wear rubber gloves and other protective gear to avoid contact with the skin, since the solution can cause severe skin irritation.

Start at the top of an exterior wall and work down. Scrub a five - to six - foot area at a time, then rinse well with a high-pressure nozzle attached to a garden hose. Let the cleaned surface dry completely before applying new paint. Then paint immediately to prevent new mildew growth.

Mildew - Removal Alone
If mildew removal alone is the plan, with no new painting job set for the near future, use the same solution -- but omit the tri-sodium phosphate. Follow the same steps and take the same precautions, since many persons are sensitive to chlorine bleach.

Mildew - Resistant Paints
Before applying a new coat of paint, consider buying mildew-resistant paints for the home. These are available in all colors for outdoor wood surfaces. To help combat mildew attack, consider paints formulated with fungicides -- such as chlorinated phenols, phenyl mercurials, zinc compounds or copper compounds. If you choose one of these, carefully observe all precautions on the label, since many of the chemicals in mildew-resistant paints are poisonous. Also, instead of buying mildew-resistant paints, you can buy fungicide additives and mix them with ordinary paints. Another idea is to buy zinc oxide or spar varnish and mix it with oil-base paint -- to make the paint less susceptible to mildew by drying the paint to a hard film. However, these tend to make paint crack and peel, and this can pose equally serious problems.

CANYON -- Many lakes in northwest Texas are now receiving stockings of non-native game fish such as walleye, striper and striper hybrids, and, smallmouth bass which will fill the acres of water not used or inhabited by our native species of fish.

"The goal of 40-50 million walleye eggs is high, but a good season at lake Meredith and additional eggs from other states should fill our stocking needs," said Joe Kraai, P&WD fishery biologist.

Many lakes will or already have been stocked with walleye including: Fort Phantom Hill and Clyde lakes near Abilene; Moss Creek City lake near Big Spring; and, White River and Buffalo Springs lakes on the South Plains according to Kraai.

One of the biggest news items among fishermen in Texas is the Florida Strain of the largemouth bass stocked in several lakes in our state. Most of the large Florida largemouth have come from central or east Texas, but the P&WD has already stocked these fighters in Lake Theo at Caprock Canyons State Park near Quitaque and more will be stocked in Greenbelt lake near Clarendon.

Smallmouth bass fishing is growing with a new state record now on the book. Both Lake Theo and White River lake will receive stockings of these scrappy fighters this spring.

The striper and striper hybrids continue to make news at many West Texas lakes. Lake Diversion near Wichita Falls will receive these fast-growing hybrids this spring.

These releases are only a part of the continuing P&WD fish stocking program with a goal of furnishing Texas anglers a variety of fighting, good-eating fish to catch. Additional stockings of native fish such as largemouth bass and catfish are scheduled this spring and summer, also.

Jane Butler Visits Here From Near Arctic Circle

Life at Fort Yukon, Alaska, eight miles north of the Arctic Circle, is pleasant, slow-paced, and challenging, according to Jane Butler, who is visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Robertson, 1417 Cooley.

Jane came here with her son, Jason, 3, and her daughter, Kellee, five months, for her annual visit with her parents. She will be joined here soon by her husband, Doug, and then the family will travel to Miami, Fla. to visit Jane's brother, Larry Robertson, and to return to Fort Yukon in mid-June.

Jane Robertson Butler has lived in Fort Yukon for the past seven years. She grew up in Borger, graduating from Borger High School in 1967. She attended Frank Phillips College and West Texas State University.

In 1972, Jane went to Fort Yukon, to visit her brother, who was employed with an air service there. She met Doug Butler of Kapowsin, Wash., owner of an air charter service, and became his wife.

She did not have great difficulty adjusting to a new way of life, for as most persons from "the lower 48" she was appreciative of the slower tempo, fascinated by the long periods of daylight during the summer, and willing to accept the positive in a new environment.

"What is difficult for me," she said, "is adjusting to life when I come back to Texas. There are so many people, there is so much traffic that it's scary."

Jane pointed out that her small son is also bewildered by local life. When his grandfather was watering the lawn, little Jason, accustomed to being frugal with the use of water, asked, "Why is Grandpa washing his grass?"

"Water must be hauled to homes in Fort Yukon," Jane explained.

"We now have running water in our house. It comes from a holding tank, which must be filled periodically. Most homes have 55 gallon drums of water in the kitchen. There are few bathrooms, but we do have electricity and telephones."

The Butlers live in a frame house in the village of 750 persons including 150 white, four Eskimos, and the rest Athabaskan Indians.

"Most of the houses are log cabins," Jane said, "we lived in one until two years ago, when we got a frame house."

Jane had to be flown to Fairbanks to have her children. Her mother came to be with her last December when Kellee arrived.

"Doug keeps busy," Jane

said, explaining that her husband delivers groceries, fuel and other freight to nine villages around Fort Yukon, and that he hauls freight for government agencies in the town.

"In the fall, he flies hunters out to the wilderness to hunt caribou, moose, and sheep," she said. "In the winter, he takes groceries and mail to trappers and brings in their furs."

Jane said that no roads lead to Fort Yukon, as the only way to get there is by air. She said that there are cars and motor bikes in town, and that they are used on dirt roads.

"In a small town," she said, "we get to know everybody, and do a lot of visiting. We get together to play cards, or have dinners in each other's homes. Most of the people are from other states and have been in Alaska for many years. The teachers are usually newcomers, though."

Jane reported that the climate is very dry, so that the cold is bearable.

"The average winter temperature is 35 degrees below zero," she said, "but it is often 65 degrees below. In summer, the average temperature is 75 degrees, but I've seen it get as high as 104."

She told about the 24 hours of daylight in the summer, when it is difficult to adjust to brightness, and when the sun doesn't set at all on June 21. Then she contrasted the winter months, when the sun doesn't rise on Dec. 21, and when her husband has only four hours of flying time, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. She admitted getting most tired of winter darkness, and not minding the two to three feet of snow that covers the ground all winter.

"The biggest difficulty," she said, "is the high prices. We pay \$150 a month for electricity in the winter, and we do not use it for heat, as we have oil heat. We pay \$1.99 a dozen for eggs, \$1.89 for a loaf of bread, \$1.29 a pound for apples, and \$4.29 for a half gallon of milk."

"Doug and Jane plan to sell their service and work on a management contract for the next two years."

"Then," Jane said, "we will leave Fort Yukon. We want to get back to 'the lower 48', closer to Doug's parents in Portland, Ore., and to mine in Borger, Texas."

Wherever the Butlers go, they'll be able to adjust to their environment, flying away now and then to renew themselves in other parts of the world.

WTSU faculty members, such as Dr. Robert Sawvell, acting head of the WTSU Geosciences Department, are also working to broaden on campus the program's base of support.

At first critical of the program, Sawvell said that he now feels that "For the money spent it is the most successful program in recruiting high school students to WT."

He has presented the information about the program to the University's Faculty Council, which consists of elected representatives from WTSU's entire faculty, as well as the individual faculty members.

"I felt that it was time that the faculty got involved in a program which statistics show to be successful not only in recruiting students but retaining them," he said.

GSPA Calls For USDA Investigation

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association has called for a Congressional investigation of USDA's failure to administer the 1979 Feed Grain Program, according to the law passed by Congress in 1977. The House of Representatives Committee on Agriculture Chairman Thomas S. Foley, was officially requested to conduct a formal hearing into the problem, in a letter (dated May 21) from GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp.

The Purpose will be to insure that USDA administers the Feed Grain Program as Congress intended. The Agriculture Act of 1977 established a formula for determining grain sorghum target prices. Grain Sorghum Producers Association is asking that this formula be applied.

Dr. Howard Hjort, Director of Economics for USDA, recently admitted to the Subcommittee on Livestock and Grains, "There is in fact a discrepancy. The \$2.30 will have to be increased very likely to \$2.35, in order to be consistent with the law." GSPA contends that the increase should be 10 to 18 cents (depending upon which USDA cost of production figures are used.)

Harp told the Chairman, "The grain sorghum farmers of the United States are in critical economic condition at this time. They need all possible help to survive the present low prices. The tenant farmers in the United States was \$3.62 per hundred weight, and this is after paying storage and interest on grain from harvest time until the middle of May. This is an average net loss of \$1.40 per hundred, plus storage and inter-

est. The 59 cent deficiency payment for the 1978 crop certainly does not bridge that gap. The loss will probably be larger in 1979, due to the increased cost of production and the prospects for another bumper crop. We need your help."

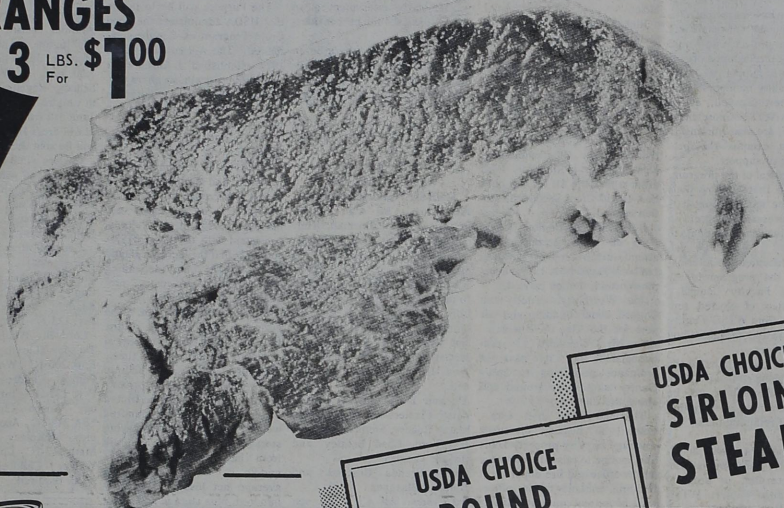
