A near capacity crowd jammed the Wheeler Schools cafeteria on Monday evening to honor Wheeler High School athletes at the annual All Sports Banquet. Randy Matson of Texas A&M University was the speaker for the occasion and related some of his experiences as an athlete and an Olympic Gold Medal winner and what motivated him to excel and how these experiences could apply to today's athletes. 1978-79 was a good year and a rewarding one in athletics for Wheeler as the Mustangs were state semi-final champions in football, tied for the district crown in basketball and finished second in district in track. The Mustangettes wound up second in the district in basketball and had three regional qualifiers in tennis competition and five qualifiers to the regional meet in track. The excellent meal for the banquet was prepared and served by Nancy Bond and Teresa Taylor of the food services department of the Wheeler schools. Highlighting the awards portion of the program was the awarding of the Mustang Award and Mustangette Award and the presentation of individual medallions to each member of the 1978 Mustangs football squad.

The Mustang Award, which is presented to the Mustang football player that most shows the traits of leadership, character, desire and ability, was presented to Marvin Grimes, senior running back and linebacker by head coach Joe Allen.

The Mustangette Award, with the same qualifications as the Mustang Award, was presented by coach Charles Carter to Beth Willis, who completed her eligibility this year.

Outstanding individuals in each sport were announced by their respective coaches and given a plaque for their achievements. These plaques will remain on display in the school trophy case.

The outstanding athletes and their sport were as follows: Football — Offensive Lineman, Mike Lee; Offensive Back, Marvin Grimes; Defensive Lineman, Marvin Grimes, and Defensive Back, Mike Lee. ## COUNTY AGENTS Report

JOE DON KING County Extension Agent

A swine production meeting has been scheduled for Tuesday, May 8 at 7:30 p.m. in the meeting room of the First National Bank in Wheeler. Everyone interested in the swine production is invited to attend according to Don King, County Extension Agent.

Dr. Bob Cohen, Area Swine Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will discuss various items of concern to hog producers. They will include health, nutrition and reproduction. The meeting will be especially planned for the small operator that has only a few sows.

Everyone, including 4-H and FFA members with swine projects is invited to attend. Education programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Swine Meeting  
Dr. Bob Cohen, Area Swine Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be at the swine production meeting Tuesday, May 7, at 7:30 p.m. in the meeting room of the First National Bank in Wheeler. He will cover topics including nutrition reproduction and health.

Everyone interested in swine production, especially the small producers is invited to attend. Elm Leaf Beetle Control.

Each year many of the trees in Wheeler County are partially defoliated by the elm leaf beetle. The elm leaf beetle eats the green part of the leaf, leaving the veins. This results in a lace-like appearance of the leaf. It is actually the larva of the beetle that does the damage.

Season-long control of the elm leaf beetle can be obtained by applying D1-Systow, a systemic insecticide, in mid-May. The 2% Di-Syston granules should be applied at the rate of 15-20 ounces per inch of tree trunk diameter. The Di-Syon should then be watered in thoroughly.

If Di-Syston is not used, foliar application of diazinon at the rate of 1 pound of emulsifiable concentrate per 100 gallons of water or Sevin at 2 pounds of 50% wettable powder per 100 gallons of water may be used. These should be applied when the larvae are on the tree.

The Crop and Livestock Reports From Farmers and Ranchers Needed During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and midyear livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Crop and livestock reports provide a dependable, unbiased picture of Texas' most important industry—agriculture. The estimates in these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing, and marketing plans.

Farm organizations and legislatures use them in planning programs. The estimates are also used in establishing the various government program acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state and county.

Extension economists and private farm and ranch management consultants use them as a basis for advising farmers and ranchers.

Exporters use them in planning and promoting the sale of agricultural products abroad.

Prompt and accurate completion of the survey forms provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs.

All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final

In addition to the original American Youth Symphony & Chorus, there will also be tours in the summer of 1979 for the American Youth Symphony Band, American Youth Studio Jazz Band, American Youth Chorus West, American Youth Swing Choir, American Youth Concert Band, and American Youth Texas Band & Chorus. A Humanities Study Tour, sponsored by AYSC has developed over the past four years and has motivated several other academic groups such as the Criminal Justice Tour and the European History Tour. This summer there will be six additional academic goodwill tours concentrating on British Literature, Environment and Design, Foreign Language, Business Fashion Merchandising, and Science and Mathematics.
