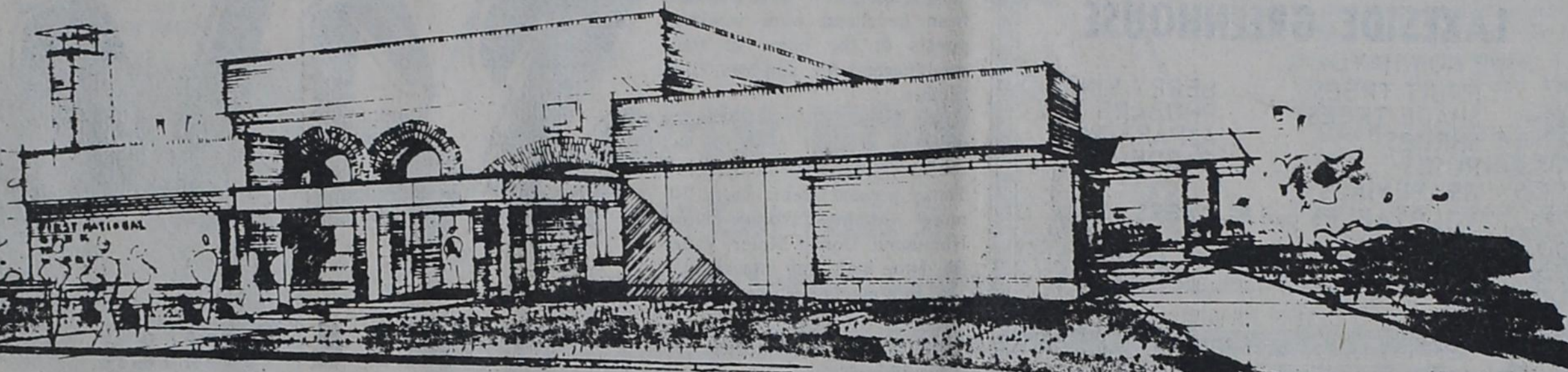

FIRST NATIONAL BANK OPEN HOUSE SUN.



The First National Bank in Wheeler will have Open House Sunday afternoon, March 25, to show their friends and customers the new facilities at 405 South Alan L. Bean Boulevard. The bank moved to its new location March 5, 1979. Dedication of the new building will be at 2:00 with the Open House continuing until 5.

The new building is located east of the courthouse; it is set at a 45 degree angle with the main entrance facing the southwest. The contract for the 11,832 sq. ft. structure was let in June, 1977, and the \$775,000 project was a little less than 21 months to completion.

The structure has 9,600 sq. ft. on the main floor and makes possible the adding of numerous services for the customers. The First National now offers a drive-in window, automatic transfer—savings/checking, and additional safety deposit boxes. A double entry provides access to the lobby with its 18' ceiling; with a number of private offices offering a greater amount of privacy to the customers, adjoining the safety deposit box area, a library which will provide privacy for viewing the contents of individual boxes. In addition to the tellers windows and book-keeping, a coffee room and community room with kitchen and seating for 70 are located on the main floor. The community room opens onto a patio area. A 2,232 sq. ft. basement will provide storage for the bank and will be available to the community for shelter in case of threatening weather.

The drive-in window is located on the southeast side of the building with entry from Texas St. and exit on Sweetwater St.

Bob Vahlberg of Oklahoma City was the architect and High Plains Builders of Amarillo was awarded the contract.

The completion of this new building brings to reality a dream visualized in 1970 with the purchase of the First National Bank in Wheeler. The announcement of the sale of the bank was made by R. J. Holt on Thursday, September 3, 1970; purchasing the stock were a diversified group of farmers, ranchers and businessmen from Wheeler and the trade territory. On September 2, Charles R. Brown of Memphis was elected to serve as president; Adrian Risner was named vice-president. Directors were: Charles R. Brown; Richard Brown, Pete Burton, Robert (Chuck) Hogan, Loyd Lee, Harry Wofford and Jess Moore, all of Wheeler; J. W. Campbell and Joe Gordon of Pampa, and Ed Daugherty of Canadian. The board of directors set a goal of \$10 million in deposits; when this goal was reached a new building would be constructed; the goal was reached in 1975.

A suitable location which was available required some time and work. The first deed was received January 23, 1976; additional deeds were obtained and the clearing of the property began July 24, 1976. Cleared were the Wheeler Hotel, and old service station and the old mill leaving 3/4 block on which to locate the bank.

Groundbreaking ceremonies to make way for the construction of the new building were held Tuesday, June 14, 1977. Turning the first shovel of dirt was Esther Sorensen, a Wheeler County pioneer.

The First National Bank in Wheeler has shown a steady growth the past few years. From \$4,500,000 in 1970 total assets were \$12,000,000 in 1976 and \$17,000,000 in 1979. Capital has climbed from \$500,000 in 1970 to \$1,100,000 in 1976 and \$1,800,000 in 1979. Loans in 1970 amounted to \$2,000,000 and at the present time stand at \$8,000,000. In 1970 total deposits were at \$4,000,000 and today they total \$14,500,000.

GROUND BREAKING

(A "LIVING HISTORY" REPORT)

The community of Wheeler and the citizens of the area are about to witness and be a part of a great historical event for us. Our bank has been operating in the same building for the past 70 years and now because of the increase in population and because of the added affluence of the people, our directors have decided that we are in need of larger facilities in which to better be served.

On the 30th of October, in an interview with Mr. Charles R. Brown, who is the president of The First National Bank in Wheeler, Mr. Brown stated that the First National Bank in Wheeler is presently in the midst of a historical event that will be talked about and remembered for years by the town of Wheeler. During the interview with Mr. Brown, he commented that the bank was founded in 1908 as a Citizens State Bank. From that name it went to the First National Bank and then back to Citizens State. In 1950 it became First National Bank in Wheeler as it is today. It has been located in the same building since its beginning.

The president and directors were made up of members of the Holt and Porter families and others.

Mr. Brown stated that when the present board of directors acquired the bank in 1970 it was a three million dollar bank. At that time, they could foresee into the future and set a goal for a new building when the bank reached ten million. They felt they would need this building to better serve the people of this area. The directors felt that the bank needed a drive-up window, larger safety deposit boxes, larger teller work-areas and a room for community meetings.

In order to get a new building for a national bank the bank has to have prior approval of the Regional Administrator of National Bank in Dallas. After approval has been obtained they are allowed 50% of their capital, surplus and undivided property in which to invest in their total facilities which includes land, building, furniture and landscaping.

One of the first things they had to consider was how they should pay for the building. Some of the choices were: 1. Should they borrow from another bank. 2. Use the capital structure to pay as they went along. 3. The directors and stockholders to furnish the money and lease it back to the bank. After many conferences and discussions, they decided to use the capital structure and pay as they went along. This affected the capital structure because some of the money which would normally be loaned out is presently being used to pay for the building.

Another major decision was the location of the building. They made three or four attempts to purchase property around the town but were unable to do so. Finally they were able to obtain property where the old feed mill, old service station and one of the oldest buildings in town, known as the "Old Hotel," had been. These old landmarks were torn

down and thus began the new First National Bank building in Wheeler.

The president and directors are Charles R. Brown, Adrian Risner, Chuck Hogan, Loyd Lee, Richard Brown, Tom Christner, John C. Vise, Jess Moore, O.B. Burton, A.W. Campbell and Joe Gordon. These directors have spent many long hours in planning this event. The plans were finalized and the contract was let and a date for "the groundbreaking" was set.

In June of 1977, for the traditional groundbreaking all of the directors had golden shovels and each one of them broke ground for the new bank building. One of the early pioneers, Miss Esther Sorensen, was invited to speak on this occasion. Stockholders, members of this community and people of the area were in attendance for this history-making event.

The basic operation of the bank will be the same, except that it will be operated on a larger scale. The square footage of the building will be increased approximately 10,000 feet.

The plan was to be in the new building by Christmas of 1978 but because of delay difficulties, things are running about three months behind. They now hope to be in by January or February of 1979. During the interview Mr. Brown expressed his hope for everyone to visit the new First National Bank in Wheeler.

Cora Alice Wallace, 85, died Friday, March 16, 1979.

Her grandfather was the first County Judge of Denton, and her great-grandfather, John White, operator of one of the first stores in Dallas, transported supplies by oxen.

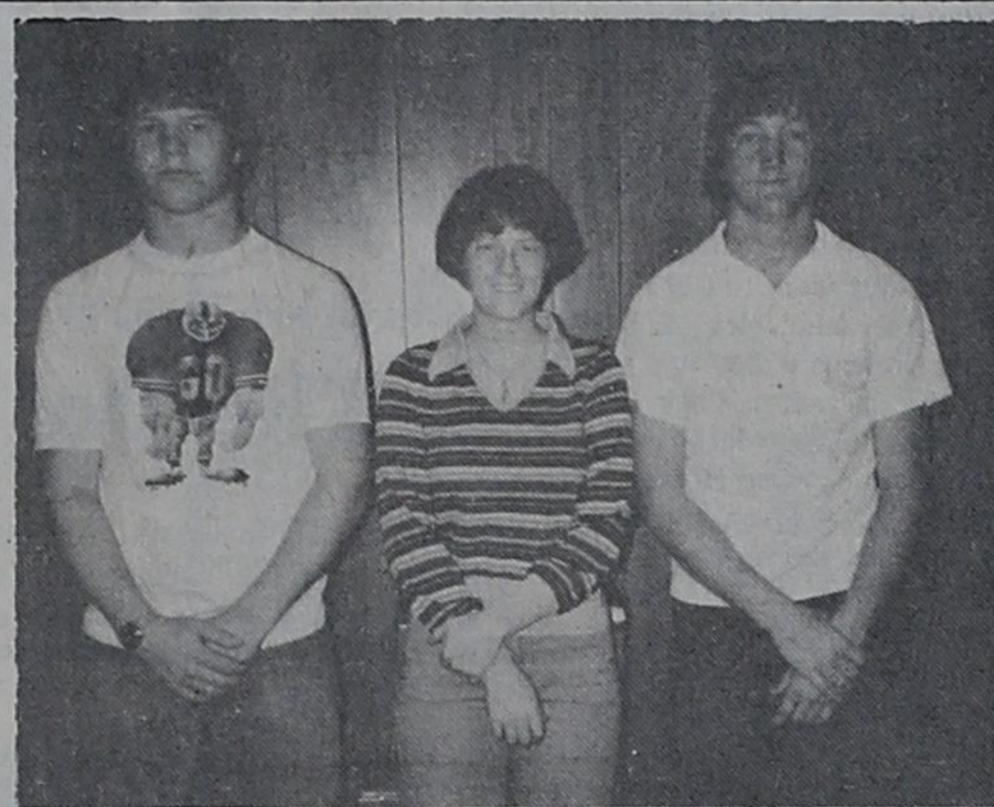

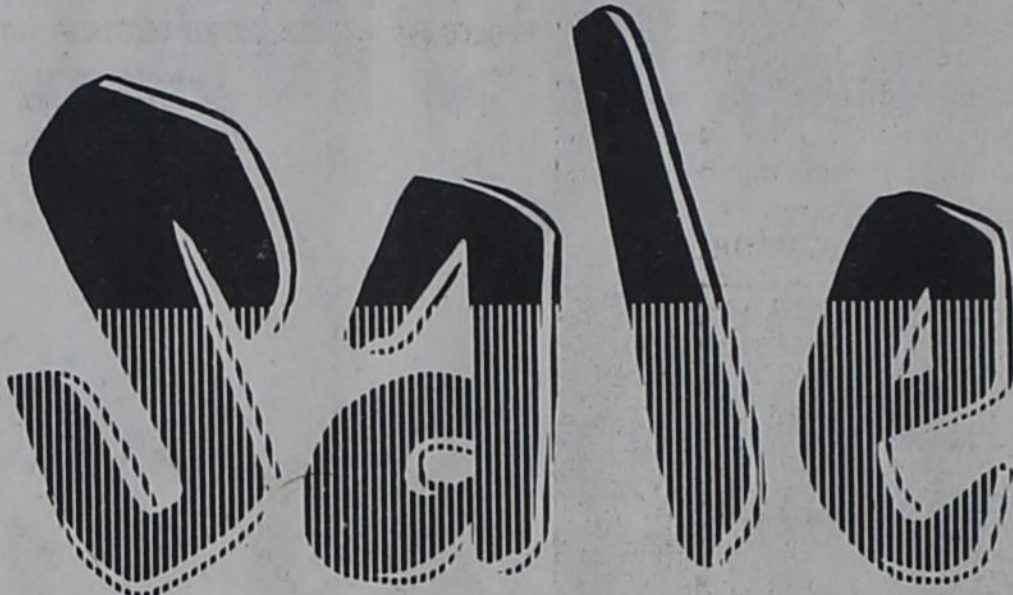

capitol comments

By Foster Whaley
At this writing (3-13-79) the House has just finished debating Article I of House Bill 1060 (substitute for the original HB 1060). This bill has 13 separate articles and will implement the Tax Relief Amendment that carried by 82% in last November's election. Article I covers the Appraisal of farm land on productive value. All of Tuesday, March 13, was used in debating this issue. A host of amendments to cripple this article were proposed by a small urban block. Almost all were turned down by a two to one margin. A few minor amendments for the improvement of the bill were incorporated. All losses suffered by a school district as a result of using the productivity method are to be repaid the school district from surplus in State Treasury.

Today, we will take up article II which deals with taxing timber land on productive value.

Other articles deal with taxing intangible property, household goods and effects, motor vehicle exemptions, residence homestead, exemption for elderly, limit on tax increases, replacement of lost school district revenue and limiting legislative Appropriations to growth factor in Texas. In my opinion, the debate on this bill will take the rest of this week.

FUEL PROBLEMS

I am having calls from wholesalers about allocations of fuels. This is especially true on diesel fuels. We plan to meet today with an official from the Governor's Office of Emergency Fuel Allocations Program.

MEASLES EPIDEMIC POSSIBLE IN 1979

A measles epidemic may hit Texas and other states in 1979—because many children immunized when vaccine was first available are not completely safe from measles (rubella or 10-day measles).

Measles outbreaks are occurring in Texas and elsewhere—with East Texas counties also reporting cases among students in grades 7-12.

VACCINATE THESE CHILDREN
Health authorities urge parents to have the following children immunized:

Children you think are immune because "they already had measles" but who saw no physician during the illness—and never

received a doctor's diagnosis.

Only if a doctor diagnosed measles can parents be sure children are safe.

Children who were immunized with a killed measles virus vaccine.

Children who were immunized with a live virus vaccine before 1968.

Children who had the measles immunization record—or safety from measles—should contact their physician or local health department for advice.

WHAT TO ASK FOR
According to health authorities, to be safe from measles, children need the "live, further-attenuated measles vaccine" which is in current use. This vaccine has proven to be safe and effective, they report.

WHY THE PROBLEM?

Today's threat of epidemic partly stems from the not-so-effective measles vaccine given to children at the age of 12 months. Cases of measles are now being reported in these children who were thought to be fully protected.

New findings show that vaccination with a live virus at the

age of 15 months or after is more effective.

MEASLES CAN BE HARMFUL
It is important to protect children against measles and its complications which include encephalitis and brain damage.

Death also may occur in one of every 1,000 reported measles cases.

The essays are based on interviews with persons in Wheeler or the surrounding area who have actually experienced a historic event. It might have been anything as history is everywhere, lying quietly, waiting for people to bring it to life. This series of "Living History" will run for the next several weeks so that you may enjoy some of the history of Wheeler and Wheeler county.

THE McILHANY'S

Mrs. Golda Grainger was born September 20, 1888, in Bonham, Texas. She attended college at Southwest Texas State Teachers College, located in San Marcos, Texas. This is where she met and married Mr. Mort McIlhany.

After being married the McIlhany's moved to Fort Worth. Mort worked in a hardware store. His job wasn't an easy one and he did not enjoy it.

Early in 1916, a relative of Mr. McIlhany came to visit them and told them of Wheeler. He told Mr. McIlhany to move to Wheeler and go into his own business. Mr. McIlhany decided they would move to Wheeler.

The McIlhany's and their possessions came to Shamrock, Texas, by train. A man met them at Shamrock in an old covered wagon pulled by mules. Mrs. McIlhany said that the man had to really whip the mules when they went across the Red River so they would not sink in quicksand.

When they got to Wheeler she said there was not much here. The buildings were just old plank buildings. The courthouse was in Mobeetie until they voted to move it to Wheeler.

Mr. McIlhany decided to open a small grocery store in the buildings he now owned. The McIlhany's were fortunate in finding their first home in Wheeler. A friend of Mort's had built a large home in town but found he wanted to live on his ranch. He let the McIlhany's live in his home in town. While living in this home, their first child was born May 31, 1916. The following year the rancher decided to move back to town, so the McIlhany family moved across the street to a smaller home. This is where their second child, Grainger Walter McIlhany, was born on April 28, 1918. In 1919 Mort purchased a very small home near town. It is in this home that Mrs. McIlhany continues to live.

One night in 1920 the entire downtown section of Wheeler burned completely. The merchants decided to rebuild with bricks and concrete structures. The downtown section was quickly re-built.

Shortly after the grocery store was rebuilt, Mr. McIlhany opened McIlhany Dry Goods. Mrs. McIlhany taught school for three years at Briscoe. Mort told her he needed her help with the store so she quit teaching and began working at the store. She has been working there ever since.

Things were going great for the McIlhany's during the twenties. Then the Depression hit hard and by thirties its effects were quickly felt in Wheeler. People had little money to spend on goods so they simply stopped buying.

Mr. McIlhany found himself with a big problem in the grocery store. People needed groceries, but no one had money, so most items had to be sold on credit. Mr. McIlhany knew not everyone would pay their bills, but he had to sell on credit simply because if times did get better he knew many people would pay their bills. Some people found Mr. McIlhany was the only merchant who would sell on credit. These people of Wheeler bought only what they needed. Mrs. McIlhany said that many people committed suicide because they were so far in debt and they knew there was no way out.

Mrs. McIlhany said she would usually only sell things on credit to people that she knew. She said one day a woman came in the Dry Goods Store crying. So Mrs. McIlhany asked her what was wrong and she said her husband had just died and she wanted material to make him a nice suit to bury him in and she said it was the last thing she could do for him. Mrs. McIlhany felt sorry for her and so she let

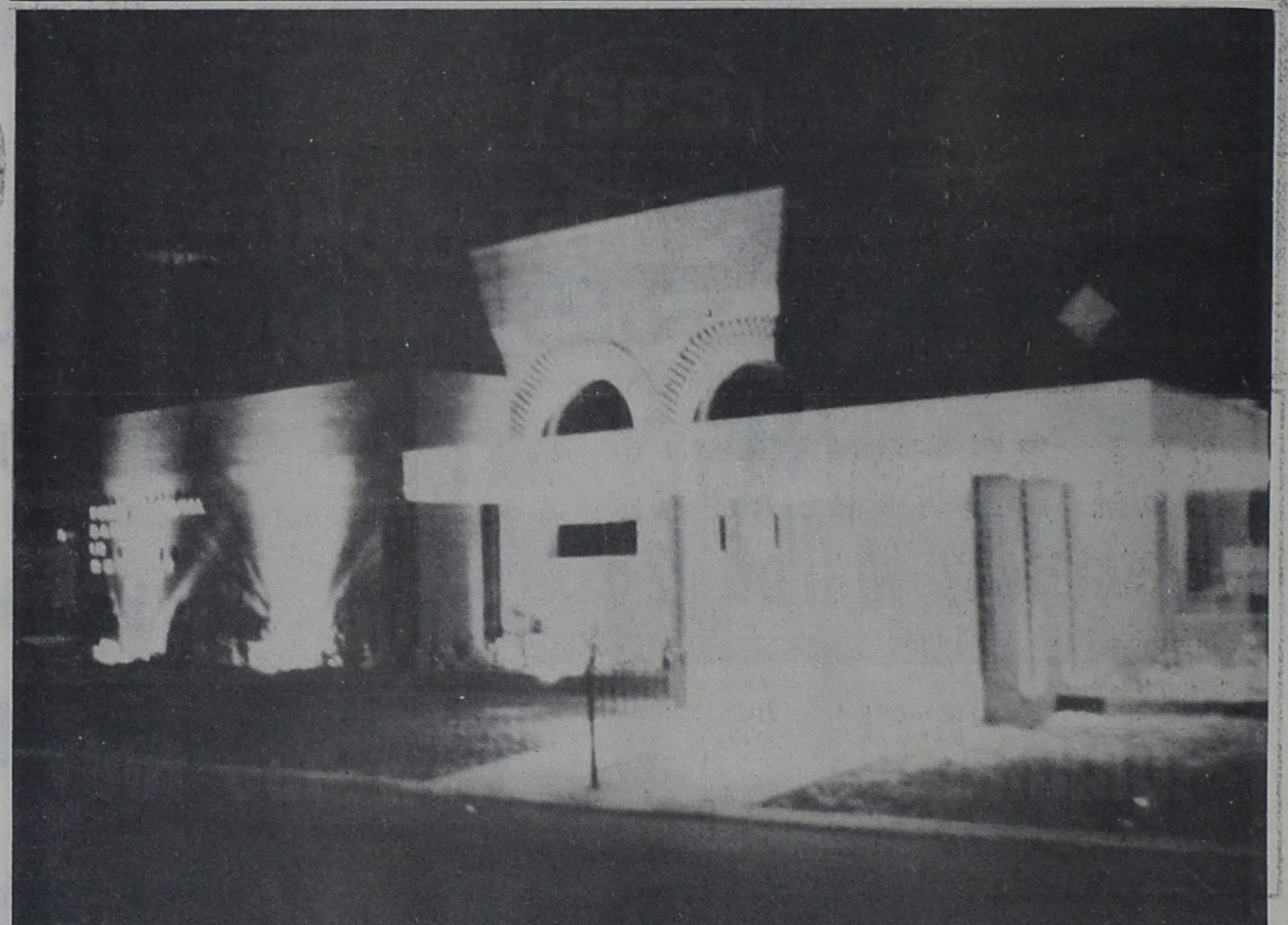

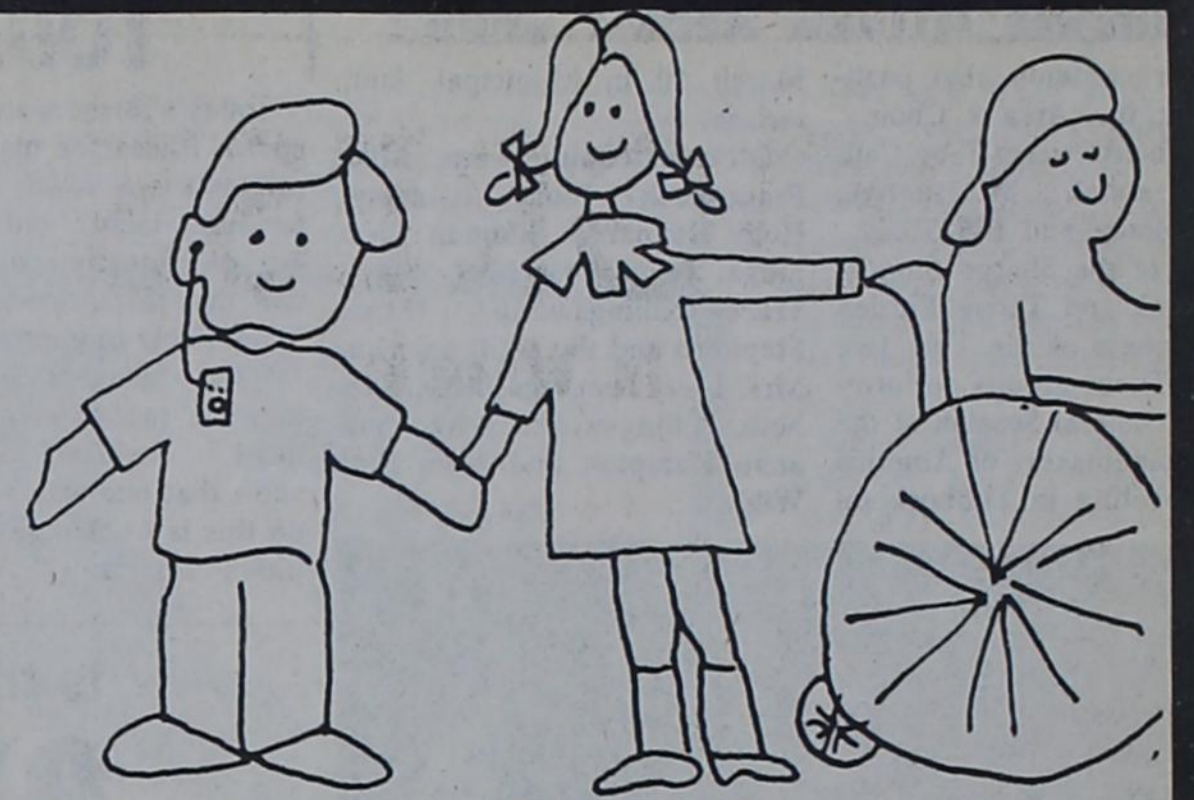

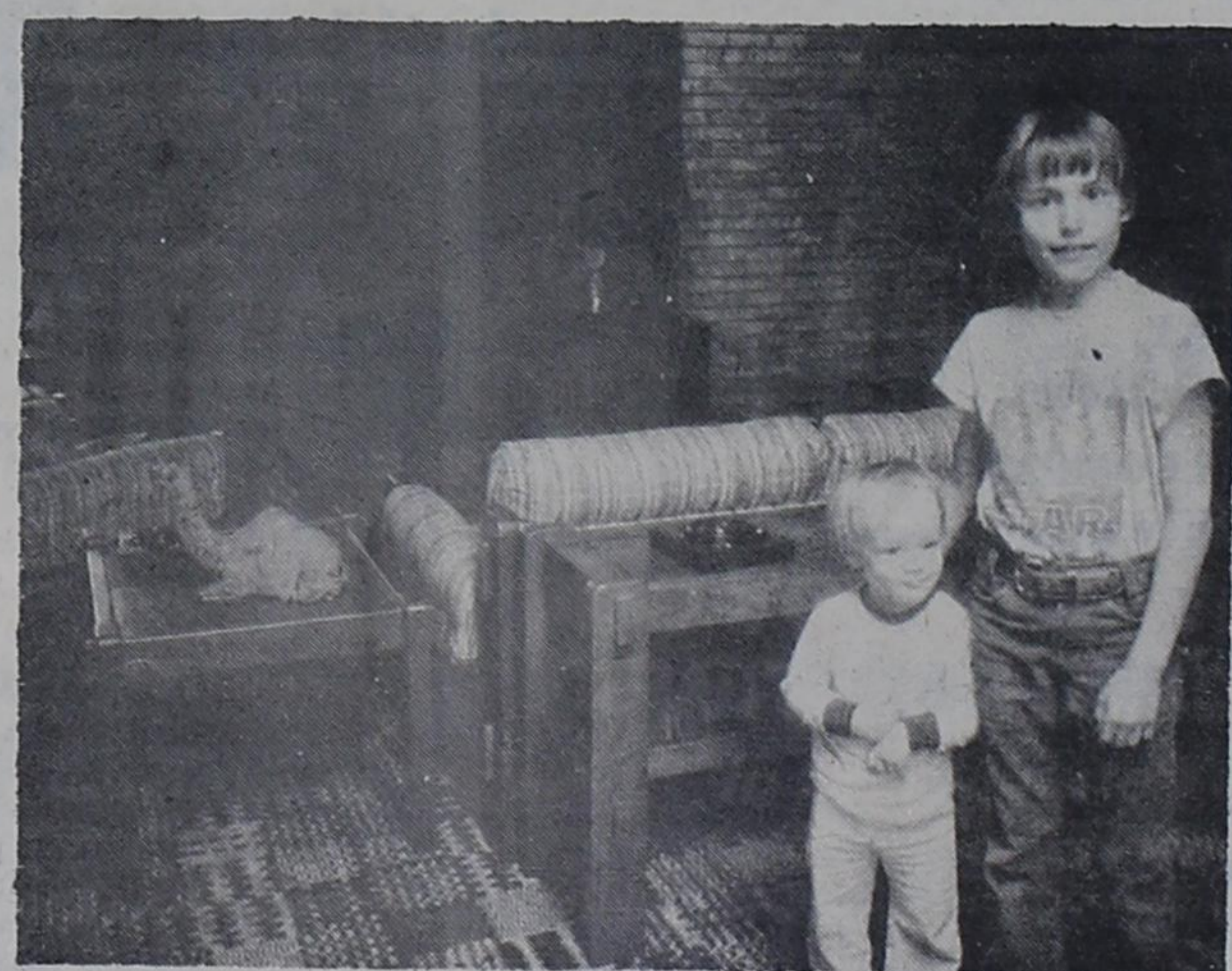

TODAY'S FARMERS

Today's farmers are in a tough spot. Prices for many of their products are down, while costs for fuel, labor, and equipment are up. Equally upsetting is the fact that this price-cost squeeze is not likely to improve soon.

"The farmer's best bet to improve profits is to cut overhead. Reduced tillage trials show that one way a farmer can do this is to change the way he plows his land," said Lavon Williams District Conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Wheeler.

Conservationists with the SCS reduced tillage the system of the future.

"The fact is, many farmers plow too much. A lot of this has to do with tradition. But, reduced tillage methods can be the out they're looking for," said Williams.

In some cases, seedbed preparation trips can be cut down, directly into the stubble of previous crops, without other preparation. Sometimes, this is the only way to successfully grow two crops in one year.

Reduced tillage can be real money-saver when it comes to fuel and labor cost. Conventional land preparation and planting may take five to seven gallons of fuel per acre. But, when tillage are reduced, fuel use is cut substantially. Also, fewer tractor trips mean less labor. The time and money saved by shifting to reduced tillage systems can be used for other improvements.

"Leaving the stalks of sorghum, corn, and other crops on the soil is an effective conservation measure. Reduce tillage and you reduce erosion. It's that simple," Williams stressed.

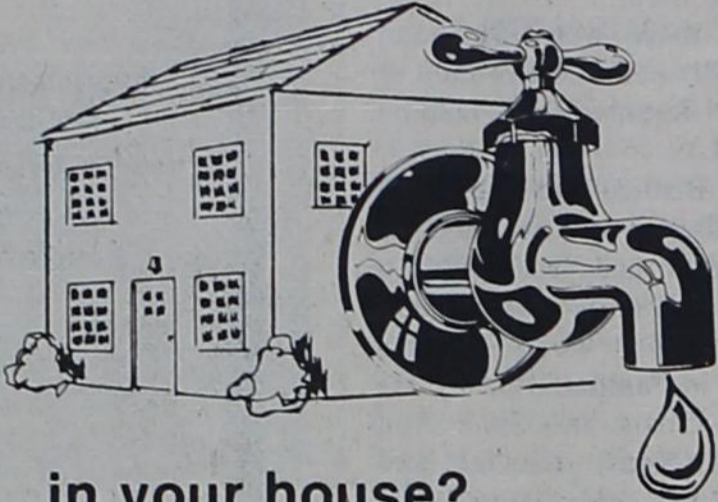

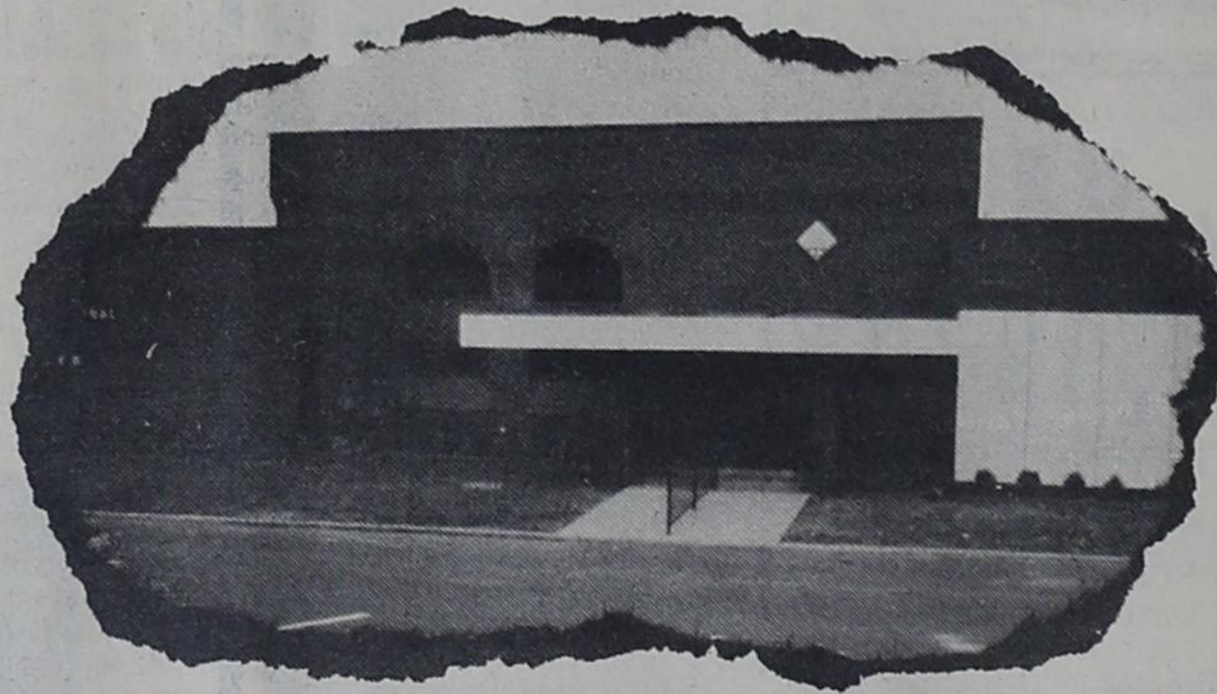

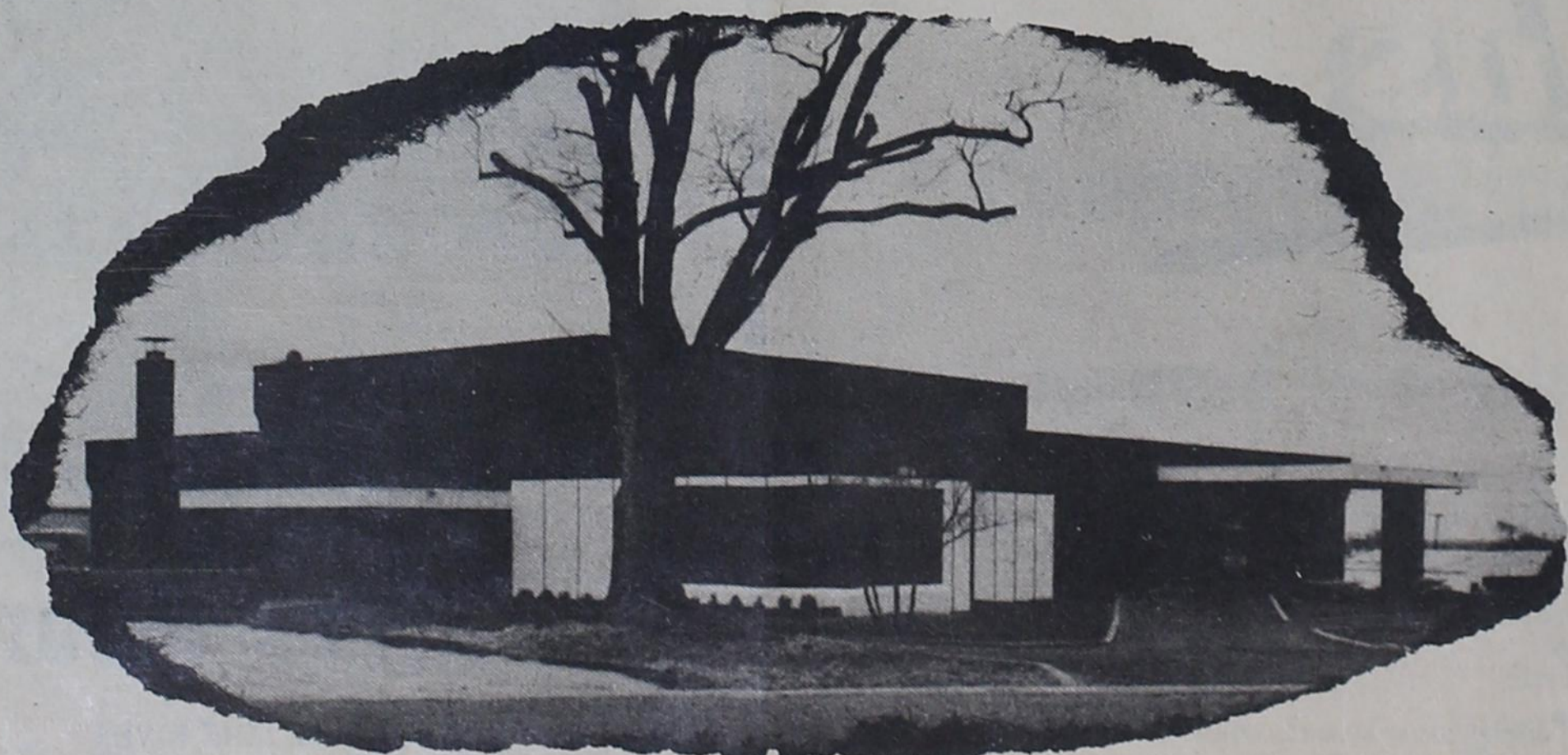

The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year. The shot will cost \$4.00.

The licenses will cost \$1.00 for males and spayed females and \$2.00 for females.

For those people who have had their dogs vaccinated, but have not purchased a license, it will be necessary to take the animal and proof of vaccination to the clinic to obtain the dog license. All dogs in the City Limits are required to be licensed and vaccinated.

Area citizens are urged to bring their animals in at this time

to be vaccinated against rabies. For those owners who are unable to bring their pets to the clinic, call 826-5821 during the time the clinic is being conducted and a member of the Key Club will be on duty to pick up the animals.

Cats Should Be Vaccinated

her take the things she needed on credit. The woman told her she would pay her as soon as possible. The next week Mrs. McIlhany heard the woman had just gotten married and moved to Oklahoma!

Once during the depression, the grocery tickets burned up so many of the people did not pay their bills because they knew no one would know.

During the Depression, the people of Wheeler drew closer together. Church meetings were well attended and the fellowship was a true source of strength and hope. Neighbors visited with each other quite often.

Christmas was always a happy time for the McIlhany's even if there was no money to spare. Mrs. McIlhany found a Christmas tree too expensive so she cut a big limb and decorated it with green paper, popcorn and other trinkets. She gave her children some books and put them on the tree. She filled their stockings with fruit and candy.

Even though times were terribly hard for the McIlhany's, many citizens of Wheeler did far worse. The population of Wheeler fell rapidly in the thirties as many people simply gave up and headed west to look for work.

With the depression of the 1930's also came the great dust bowl of the plains. Mrs. McIlhany remembers that the year of 1933 and 1934 produced constant dust storms. She said that when the first storm hit, the sky was dark and black. Everyone was really scared and no one knew what it was. The McIlhany's went to the cellar fearing a tornado. When they came out everything was covered in dust. Many storms followed the first. Days looked like nights; there was dust covering everything.

However, the Depression and the dust storms were not to last forever and things soon got better. Business picked up for the McIlhany's and soon things were going well again. Mr. McIlhany soon discovered he had cancer and died in 1945. He is buried at the Wheeler Cemetery.

Mrs. McIlhany sold the grocery store, but continued to run the dry goods store. Today Mrs. McIlhany still lives in Wheeler and continues to operate the dry goods store.

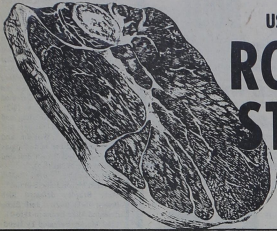
