Wild Turkeys Are Trapped In Co.

A state record was set Friday morning, Feb. 23, on the Puryear Ranch, east of Wheeler, The Texas Parks and Wildlife had the task of capturing wild turkeys for shipment to Donley County and the west coast. The net was placed into position and the bait scattered. When the caps sounded, 116 birds were caught under the net—the most turkeys trapped under one net.

A crew of six men worked with the fowl to remove them from the net and crate for shipment. The birds were removed and 91 were placed in boxes (2x2x4) with three females or 2 males per box. Working with the birds were Dick DeArment and David Sierra from Wheeler and David Dvorak, Richard Cranford, Tim Boone and David Rideout.

Upon arrival at their new home, the birds were released. In Donley County the turkeys were released on the Curri Ranch—a 30,000 acre ranch near Greenbelt lake. On the west coast, they were placed on a game reserve.

Spelling Bee To Be Held Friday

The Wheeler County Spelling Bee will be held this Friday, March 9, 1979, at 1:30 P.M., in the District Court Room, Wheeler County Court House, Wheeler, Texas. This Spelling Bee is an elimination contest to determine who will be the Wheeler County winner that will spell in Amarillo at the Regional Spelling Bee. Each school may have entries in each division—Junior Division (5-6 grades) and senior Division (7-8 grades). Each division may have two spellers, a school winner plus a first alternate. It is real well for each school to have 2 alternates as the first alternate is eligible to enter the spelling contest.

LEARN NOT TO BURN

HOW WE CAN MAKE OUR HOMES SAFE FROM FIRE THE BATHROOM

1. Radios or any electrical appliance which may be touched by someone who is bathing or grasping a water faucet should be kept out of the bathroom.

2. Water and electricity are a dangerous combination. Under certain conditions they can produce electric shock that is fatal.

THE ATTIC

1. Old clothes, broken toys, discarded pieces of furniture, and stacks of magazines should

not be stored in the attic. These things make it easy for a fire to get started and to feed on.

2. A clean attic will make a safer home.

THE GARAGE

1. Oil drippings on the floor should be cleaned up promptly.

2. If paint is kept in the garage, the cans should be covered tightly and kept away from any heating devices. If small quantities of gasoline are kept on hand for power mowers, tractors, or outboard motors, it should be kept in approved safety cans.

3. Electric wiring of a garage

should be done by an experienced electrician.

Amateur "Handymen" are indirectly responsible for many fires.

4. "No Smoking" should be the rule in the garage.

5. If the garage is attached to the house, the door between the garage and the house should be kept tightly closed to prevent the passage of vapors from the garage to the house.

6. Gasoline for power mowers and other power equipment should by all means be kept in approved safety containers. Do not refuel outdoors where dangerous escaping vapors cannot accumulate.

SAFETY RULES TO PREVENT DEATH OR INJURY BY FIRE

X Make all of your plans in advance.

X Never go to bed without knowing the quickest, safest way to leave the house or building.

X Keep the halls, stairs, doors, and fire escapes free from obstruction.

X In a crowded theater, school or other public place, never get excited. Give the fire alarm quickly.

X Remember to close all doors to prevent fire from spreading.

X If door is closed, place foot behind it and open cautiously. Slam it shut if fire threatens to rush in.

X If clothing catches on fire, NEVER RUN. Cover body with rug or other woolen or available material, throwing it downward toward the feet in order to keep the flames from the face.

X If there is smoke, but no flame, tie a wet cloth around your mouth and crawl on hands and knees if smoke is heavy. Crawl along side of wall as a guide.

X If you should smell smoke in a hotel or other place of lodging, report it immediately to the management.

X Keep calm and keep others so. X When stopping at a hotel or other lodging place, always make a careful survey of building as a means of locating fire escape, fire doors to stairways, fire hose, and extinguishers. If you find any unsafe conditions, always report them to the management at once.

Organize Clothes Closets
Organize clothes closets to find things easily, dress faster, and present a more coordinated appearance.

Analyze Wardrobe
First, analyze the wardrobe. Have a "try-on" session. Keep the items that you like, wear often—or at least occasionally, are fashionable and that fit well. Remove seldom-worn items or those not worn in the last year or two. Also, remove garments that do not fit, are old fashioned, or that you simply do not like. Give these items to a family member, a friend, charity, or sell them in a garage sale or second-hand store.

Arrange
Arrange items in the closet so

that everything is easily seen. If the closet does not have an electric light, use a battery operated light.

Organize
Organize clothing into categories with current season's clothes up front. Convenient categories include jackets, blouses, vests, skirts, pants, and dresses. Separate two-piece or multiple-piece ensembles into different categories because you can often wear these separates with other items.

Store, Label
Store items so they are clearly seen to easily coordinate color and texture. Label items not easily recognizable or which are stored in bags or boxes.

Double Hanging Bars

A double bar, one placed over the other, in half the closet enables you to hand two rows of separates, thus doubling closet space. Closets without this feature can usually be easily converted.

Display
Visibly display items in the closet, when possible, rather than storing in drawers.

Belts, scarves and shawls and sweaters are easier to see and coordinate if not hidden in a drawer. Fold sweaters and other stretchy items over padded hangers or fold on a shelf or store on shelves in a see-through vertical bag.

Out-Of-Season Storage
Store out-of-season or special-occasion clothes on the back rung, in drawers, or in another closet, if available.

'GENERIC LABELING' OFFERS CONSUMERS ANOTHER CHOICE
"Generic" or "Unbranded" products—also known as "No-Name" or "No-Frills" labeling—offers consumers "another" choice.

Traditionally, retailers have sold two major types of brands—national or name brands and store or private label brands.

"Generic" products come in plain packages and carry no brand names or trademarks. The labels are generally black and white with bold lettering, state only the basic name for

each product—such as "sweet peas" and the essential complementary information—such as ingredients, net contents and name of manufacturer or distributor.

Generic items carried by food stores number from around 10 to 100, but most stores carry between 25 and 50 of these products, according to USDA interviews with 15 chain stores and three wholesalers that handle generics.

Many retailers said they may slowly increase the number of items, but had no plans to extend beyond 45 or 50. Retailers generally carry only one size of any item.

Virtually all firms carry some type or style of canned corn, beans and peas. Other popular food items are canned tomato products, canned fruits, canned vegetable juices and drinks, packaged macaroni and cheese dinners and larger sizes of dry pet foods.

Carried less frequently are ready-to-eat cereal, baking needs including oils and shortening, tea bags, peanut butter, mayonnaise, cheese and packaged processed meats.

Most retailers place all generic products together in the store in one mass display.

Responses of retailers indicate that consumers can expect to save an average of 25 percent

over national brands and about 15 percent, depending on individual product and retailers.

Sources of savings on cost of generics are product quality—cheaper ingredients reduced advertising and promotion, and less expensive packaging and labeling.

The standard minimum specification for generic food items was USDA Grade C, with some Grade B to fill in where needed. National brands and top-line store brands, on the other hand, use primarily Grade A and some Grade B.

All three grades are safe, wholesome and nutritious and are packed under the same sanitary standards.

The USDA Grades B and C are acceptable quality for table use, cooking and casseroles, sauces, tarts and puddings. Grade C products may have less uniform size, color, texture and maturity.

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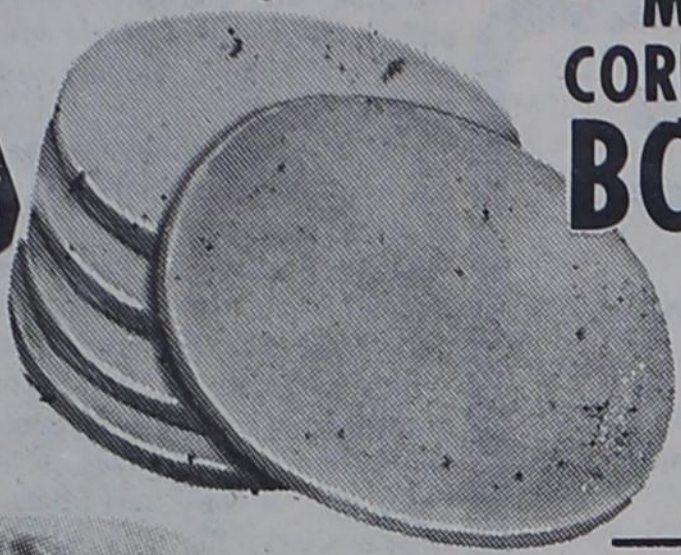

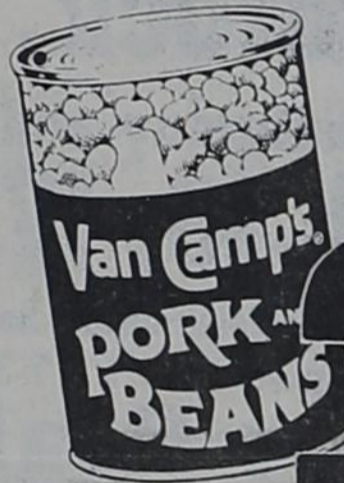

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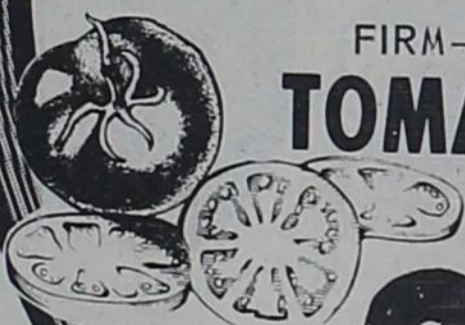
