Girl Scouts To Start Cookie Sale

Each year, residents of Wheeler, as well as people across the country, look forward to the Girl Scout cookie sale. And it's cookie time again as Girl Scouts of Quivira Council prepare to begin their sale at 4 p.m. Friday, February 2.

Proceeds from the cookie sale are used to maintain the council's two camps, used by Girl Scouts throughout the council's jurisdiction. Camp Mel Davis, near Lefors, is used for troop camping, day camping and councilwide camping events. Camp Cibola, near Clarendon, is used for resident camp, troop camping day camping and council-wide events.

Each troop uses its portion of the proceeds for troop activites and special events, as well as for troop and camp equipment.

Girl Scout cookies date back to the beginning of Girl Scouting in 1912, when the girls and their leader baked cookies, selling them door-to-door to raize money for their troop. In the fall of 1933, after many years of baking their own cookies, the Girl Scouts had another idea. Armed with recipes furnished by two Girl Scout volunteer adults, the Commissioner of a large metropolitan council approached the president of a local baking company and succeded in getting the bakery to bake and package Girl Scout cookies. 

My father would spend hours on the creek watching and hunting squirrels or fishing and different things like that. The toys that he and his friends played with they made. They would make cars out of blocks of wood and use pop bottle caps for wheels. They would also make rubber band guns by cutting out a piece of wood in the shape of a pistol, then wire a clothespin on the back of it and cut a piece of rubber off of an innertube and fasten it to the clotherspin and shoot them at each other. They would play in haystacks or make teepee's out posts. Occasionally they would go to a ball game, baseball or basketball, depending on the time of year. Most of the nights were spent listening to the radio, reading, playing cards, or playing checkers. The people spent more time together than we do today.

My father grew up during a great transition on the farm. Before electricity was brought to the farm, life was not exactly a bed of roses. 

'Fools Die," by Mario Puzo, focuses dramaticslly on forty years in the life of an orphaned American boy named Merlyn who, in time comes to understand how he relates to the magician of arthurian legend. Merlyn's books bring fame and fortune and open doors to the literary cateries of New York and the Hollywood world of film moguls, actors, agents and beautiful women. 



New Name For Home Dem. Clubs

A new name for "home demonstration" clubs Extension Homemakers Clubs will go into effect January 1, across Texas, and Wheeler County clubs will join the effort.

For their new names, Wheeler County clubs will change the words "home demonstration" to "Extension Homemakers."

These include the Wheeler Dealers Extension Homemakers Club, the Briscoe Extension Homemakers Club, the Seamar Extension Homemakers Club and the Shamrock Extension Homemakers Club.

This change is affecting the statewide network of Extension Homemakers clubs at all organization levels including munity, county, district and state, according to Mrs. Irene Zybach, Wheeler County Extension Homemakers Council chairman.

To create the new name, members of the statewide Texas Home Demonstration Association recently voted to change the state organization's name Texas Extension Homemakers Association a 20,678 member organization of community club members from across Texas.

Each club and county council will be considering a local name change to coincide with the state organization name.


