LIVING HISTORY

LIFE AND TIMES ON A TEXAS PANHANDLE RANCH DURING THE 1930'S

By Paul Hicks These are true happenings related to me by recording on a casssette tape by a seventy-three year old lady, named Mrs. John L. Numm. She tells facts that show how it was with her family through the depression years. She still lives in Shamrock on part of the original block where her family settled after losing

their ranch. "Papa had paid down on seven sections of land southeast of Shamrock. There was a huge old ranch house on the highest hill. We thought it grand with its carbide lighting system, and upstairs, and a cistern on the screened in back porch. No, there wasn't a bathroom out there in the country. Nobody had one! We had a nice twoholer outhouse and we had a long tin tub expecially made for bathing. It could be carried to any room by its two handles and filled with hot water from the reservoir on the side of the wood

and coal cookstove in the kitchen. The well water was gyppie-very hard. Soap wouldn't lather in it. Bathwater looked like thin butter milk. A water-softening system later helped some. But mostly we used cistern water drinking and cooking purposes. We drew the water up in a bucket with a long rope on an overhead pulley. A bucket of water was kept on the kitchen table. A long-hangled dipper served as a drinking vessel for everybody. A cistern is a big underground storage tank. Gutters all around the house eaves funneled rain water into this tank. If rains were scarce one had to be very

dried on the same towel. We liked this new home and our cattle and farm land but suddenly the price of cattle we sold for a living dropped so low that hard times set in. The depression was on! There was danger of losing this home which did happen later. The stock market crashed. Banks closed.

Nobody had any money much. Groceries were purchased with the "cream and egg" money. We milked cows and saved the cream up all week. From some of the cream we churned our butter, but the rest along with every egg we could spare was saved to sell. On Saturday's the whole family loaded up in the wagon along with the cream can and egg crate and shuffled off to town to visit, sell the eggs and cream and use the money to buy staples and a few extras for next week. In winter these trips were less frequent. Sometimes we would buy steak for ten cents a pound, a pound of beans for five cents, and a penny's worth of candy was

We all picked cotton in the fall. School closed up for two months so all the kids could work. our cotton money was used to buy school clothes. Shoes were less

than a dollar, dress and shirt material was ten cents a yard. Women and girls made most of our clothes, bedclothes, quilts, and fancy embroidered sheets to use for bedspreads. Crochet was popular handwork. Mama taught me how and one winter I made a bedspread. My sister liked to tat. She made all the trimmings for our Sunday dresses. Only socks, shoes, boys underwear, and necessary coats were bought in town. We all wore hand-me-downs.

We raised garden stuff and everything we had to eat. We canned and dried foods for winter use. Turnips and sweet potatoes were banked up in holes in the ground. White potatoes, pumpkins, squash, pears and apples

kept nicely in the dirt cellar. Hog killing days, rendering lard, grinding sausage, and preserving the bacon and hams in the smokehouse and salt boxes is another whole story! During a calf. The meat was shared with cost \$3.50 for two pounds sacks.

O+ Dialing For Wheeler Phones General Telephone equipment installation and testing crews are beginning the final stages of

work to complete the addition of 0+ direct distance dialing equipment that will allow Wheeler customers to dial their phone's Memphis Division Manager J. H. Davis.

The new service will become operational February 16, 1979. "To dial your own operator assisted calls such as collect, credit card, third number billing and person-to-person," Davis said, "you dial the digit 0 plus the area code of the distant city if different from 806 plus the seven digit number of the telephone

being called. "It works the same as 1+ direct distance dialing except you dial 0 intead of 1," Davis said.

Customer information including dialing instructions will be sent to Wheeler customers prior

to February 16. He added there will not be changes in the existing 1+ Dialing procedures, emphasizing 1+ calls are the cheapest way to call long distance. In some instances, several station calls 1-9 can be made for the price of one

Davis explained when dialing and 0+ long distance call needing operator assistance, after the customer has completed dialing an operator will come on the line to determine and perform the special service required- collect, credit card, third number billing or person-to-person. The equipment will then automatically record the number of the one party service customers as well

as send the call to its destination. Customers with party line service, and occasionally one party customers when there is a number identification failure in the equipment, will be asked for their number after they have completed dialing the call

Davis pointed out that there is a possibility of some service interruptions during the installation of this new equipment. Every reasonable precaution will 1-23 be taken; however, should a service interruption occur, immediate action will be taken to correct the problem.
