Farmer, Ranchers Receive Payments

Wheeler County farmers and ranchers received \$30,006,000 in marketings and government payments during 1977, the Texas Department of Agriculture has announced.

The total included \$6,134,000 in cash receipts from all crops and \$23,016,000 from livestock and livestock products. Government payments made up \$856,000 of the total.

Across the state, agriculture added \$7.1 billion to the economy last year, Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service surveys showed, with receipts from all crops almost balancing those from livestock and livestock products. Livestock receipts totaled \$3.5 billion, followed by \$3.3 billion for crop receipts. Government payments made up \$206 million of the total, including over \$120 million through drought and flood assistance programs.

"With improved livestock prices this year, particularly cattle, we are optimistic that 1978 cash receipts will be higher," commented Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. "These figures only tell half of the story, however. In any discussion including agricultural statistics, the true picture is only presented when you can balance the cash receipts against the actual production costs. During last year, unfortunately, those production costs outstripped most of the profit margin for many farmers and ranchers.

Texas maintained its third place national ranking in cash receipts, despite problems throughout the year. Other first place rankings included: number of cattle and calves, 14.5 million head; Upland cotton production, 5.5 million bales; wool production, 21 million pounds; mohair production, 8 million pounds; number of farms and ranches 197,000; and farm and ranch land, 139.8 million acres.

The state ranked second in the production of grain sorghum, grapefruit, cantaloups, carrots, rice, green peppers, cabbage, onions, American-pima cotton, pecans, honeydew melons and cucumbers.

Clarendon College Schedules Classes

Clarendon College has announced that college classes will be offered in Shamrock and Childress this Spring. The classes scheduled in Shamrock are Math 105 — Intermediate Algebra on Monday nights, Government 213 — American National Government on Tuesday nights, and BA 232 — Introduction to Business on Thursday nights.

Classes scheduled in Childress are Spanish 263 — Practical Oral Spanish, History 233 History of Texas, and BA 263 — Introduction to Business are scheduled for Monday nights; BA 207 — Real Estate Finance and Psychology 204 — Child Psychology on Tuesday nights; and BA 214 — Accounting, English 263 — World Literature, Psychology 133 — Introduction to Psychology, and Sociology 243 — Introduction to Sociology on Thursday nights. All classes will meet from 7 to 10 p.m. each evening. Each of these courses carry three semester hours of credit. Dr. Bob Riley, Dean of Instruction at Clarendon College stated that numerous inquiries have been made from the Shamrock, Wellington and Childress area for college classes and it appears there will be enough students enrolled for the classes to be taught.

Registration for the Childress classes will be held at Childress High School on Tuesday January 16th at 7:00 p.m. Registration for the Shamrock classes will be on Wednesday, January 17th from 6:00 to 7:30 p.m. in the Shamrock High School Library. Classes will begin the week of January 22nd and will conclude during the week of May 14th. Dr. Riley went on to say that "these classes may be of particular interest to area veterans who still are eligible for G. I. Bill educational benefits. For example, a veteran that is married with two children would receive \$224.00 per month if they enrolled in two courses."

UNION HILL TAKES STATE TITLE FROM WHEELER MUSTANGS, 14-7

The Union Hill Bulldogs administered the bitter pill of defeat to the proud Wheeler Mustangs in Abilene two weeks ago and when the Mustangs were forced to swallow it the medicine was doubly hard to take as the Mustangs tasted defeat in their quest for a second state championship and for the first time in their last 32 games.

The 14-7 triumph gave the East Texans the class B state championship and it was their air game that spelled the difference.

A 45 yard perfect strike from Anthony Johnson to Don Aldridge put the Bulldogs on top 7-0 on their first possession of the game and the Mustangs were forced to play catch-up and their valiant efforts fell a touchdown shy.

Wheeler was without the services of their premier running back and linebacker, Marvin Grimes, and Mustangs fans will be hard pressed to believe that this didn't have a direct effect on the outcome although that is what makes football the game that it is.

The Mustangs appeared to be flat in the early going but the quick Bulldog TD could have been a big reason.

Wheeler's defense couldn't be faulted except for the two touchdown tosses and one of those came as a result of a break that went in the Bulldogs favor and might have been the big play of the contest.

With a first and ten situation at the Wheeler 46 late in the second quarter, Johnson was rushed mightily and put the ball up for grabs in the direction of Aldridge.

Aldridge was well covered and Myron Jolly went up for what appeared to be a sure interception but the ball was knocked loose in the melee and somehow Aldridge came down with it.

Three plays later, Johnson whipped a perfect strike to Bobby Bradford in the corner of the end zone and Union Hill had a 14-0 bulge at halftime.

The Mustangs were able to get to the Union Hill 28 and 35 in the first half but came up pointless.

The Bulldogs proved to be more opportunistic as they put their 14 points on the board on their only two deep excursions into Mustang country.

Mike Lee recovered a fumble at the Union Hill 45 early in the 3rd period and the Mustangs began to move.

Pounding the inner Bulldog defenses, the Mustangs got back in the ball game with a 10 play drive that was culminated with Kent Vis getting the touchdown on great second effort from 2 yards out on fourth down. Mike Evans toed the extra point and the momentum was changed from blue and white to black and gold.

The rejuvenated Mustangs held the Bulldogs and forced a punt and Jolly returned the kick 17 yards to the Union Hill 36.

Ripping off 6 yards on first down, the Mustangs appeared to have the Bulldogs where they wanted them but the play was wiped out by a holding penalty and instead of having second and four at the Union Hill 30, the Mustangs faced first and 25 from

their 49.

Wheeler got to the Union Hill 26 in the waning minutes but lost the ball via a fumble and the winning streak was over and tears flowed freely in the Mustangs dressing room.

Even in the bitterness of defeat, the Mustangs remained

poised and showed true sportsmanship as they off the field with heads held high.

The game was the final for 9 Mustangs who have played such a great part in what has been the most glorious days in Wheeler High sports history.

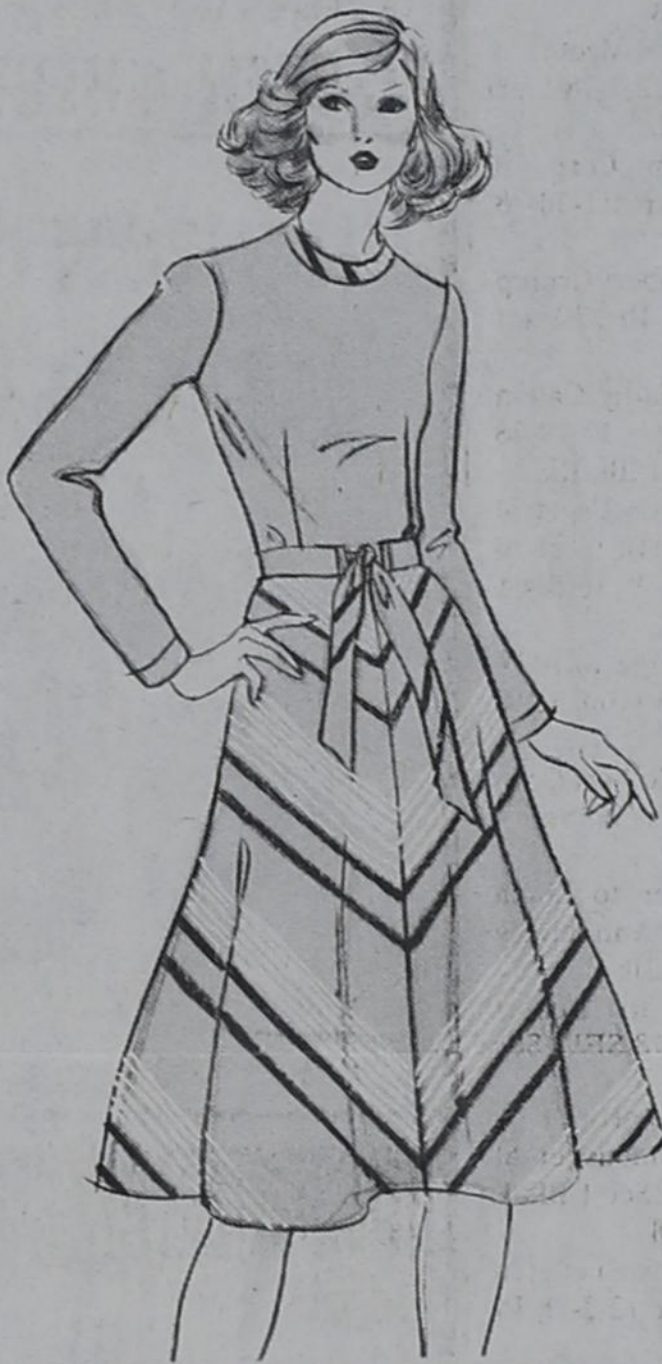
