

WHEELER BLANKS HIGH SCORING ITALY, 17-0

The Wheeler Mustangs earned their second straight trip to the state championship game last Friday night in frigid weather when they shutout the high scoring Gladiators from Italy, 17-0, and ran their unbeaten string to 31 games. Wheeler held a narrow 3-0 lead

at halftime by virtue of a 27 yard field goal by Russell Gaines in the second quarter and overcame an injury to ace running back, Marvin Grimes, to completely dominate the final two stanzas and advance to the big one this week. Going into the game, Italy had been averaging 32 points per game but as all of the Mustangs opponents have found out, the Black Machine's defense is

something else and is tough as nails when the chips are down. Some poor execution along with some untimely penalties hurt the Mustangs in the first half and probably kept Italy in the game until halftime.

Third and one faced the Mustangs at the Galdiator 6 when Grimes was sandwiched between tacklers and left the game and the Mustangs called on Gaines to try the field goal.

The ball sailed through the uprights for the slim lead at 9:22 in the second quarter and the Mustangs poise and pride came to the top.

Gaines kick came at the end of the 70 yard drive and this seemed to spur the horses on as they forced an Italy punt and headed goalward again from their 41.

Bret Mosley picked up 10 yards on a counter and Myron Jolly garnered another 4 to the Galdiator 45 where adversity hit the Mustangs.

Jolly spun loose from a tackler and passed 30 yards downfield to Sam Schaffer who had worked clear at the Italy 15 and the Galdiators finally pulled the tight end down on the 1 but a flag was down and the Mustangs trudged upfield and watched 15 yards stepped off for an ineligible receiver downfield.

Shaking the penalty off the Mustangs came back and with the help of a 15 yarder against Italy for roughing the kicker, moved to the Italy 11 but the drive stalled with a fumble on third down and a pass was incomplete in the end zone on the fourth down try.

Wheeler got as far as the Galdiator 28 as time was running out in the first half but a pass on a fake field goal was no good and the Mustangs had the narrow lead that could have been much more.

Italy could get absolutely nothing going for them in second half as the aroused Mustangs shut them down and the Galdiators offense was ineffective after their fine quarterback, Vargas, went out in the second quarter with an injury.

Jimmy Ryan replaced Grimes in the ball game and the senior reserve tailback did yeoman duty and lugged the ball 18 times the three quarters he was in the game to lead the Mustangs ball carriers with 57 yards.

On the Mustangs second possession in the third quarter, they were not to be denied as they crisply drove 65 yards to give them some margin in the score before they got practically a gift TD as the game was drawing to an end.

The drive was kept alive with a big third down pass completion from Jolly to Kent Vise to the midfield stripe that was good for 14 yardage.

The Mustangs stayed on the ground the rest of the way and Jolly sneaked over from the 1 with just 42 seconds remaining in the third period. Mike Evans added the extra point and Mustangs and their fans began to breathe easier.

A pass interception by Jolly at the Wheeler 18 killed the only Italy threat in the second half after they got the ball on the Wheeler 33 after a boot by Jolly out of his end zone.

Jolly added three fumble recoveries to his interception to give the Mustangs four big turnovers and the horses came up with 6 for the game.

After Jolly's interception, the Mustangs drove to the Italy 11 and appeared to be sure of putting more icing on the cake

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MUSTANGS AND UNION HILL IN STATE FINALS

Abilene's Shotwell Stadium Site Of Saturday Clash

It all started on September 8 when the Wheeler Mustangs swamped the Shamrock Irish 46-6 and since that time the Mustangs have carved out an 11-0 record and it will end Saturday night in Abilene as the Wheeler Mustangs go after their second state championship in Class B football against the state's second ranked Union Hill Bulldogs.

The Mustangs have raced through Valley, Jayton and Italy to gain a spot in the coveted finals after demolishing 9 other opponents on the way.

Facing the Black Machine from Wheeler will be the Union Hill Bulldogs from east Texas and it will be a challenge the likes of which the Mustangs have not faced to date.

The 7 P.M. kickoff in Abilene's Pete Shotwell Stadium will pit the Mustangs strong ground attack and nearly impregnable defense against a team that possesses great quickness to go along with good team speed.

Union Hill, like Italy, is led by their quarterback and the Mustangs success in bringing back the silver football trophy to Wheeler lies in their ability to put

the clamps on Anthony Johnson and get their own powerful ground attack in high gear.

Lack of injuries play a big part in any team's success and the Mustangs have been fortunate in this respect but more than likely will be without the services of Marvin Grimes for the championship game. Grimes injured a knee in the Italy victory but good depth will benefit the Mustangs in this respect.

Jimmy Ryan came into the game after Grimes was injured last week and played a whale of a game and will work at the tailback spot against Union Hill. Kent Vise can also play the position and with fullback Benny Baker back in good shape, Union Hill will have no easy chore stopping the Mustangs vaunted ground game.

Not since 1961 and 1962 when the Dumas Demons won state championships, has a team from the Panhandle won back to back championships and this is the Mustangs goal.

Union Hill defeated Lone Oak last year finalist against the Mustangs, Wortham and Thrall to advance to Saturday's game. Thrall was defeated in last

week's semi-final game, 12-7. The Bulldogs are 13-0 on the year and the win last week was the closest contest they have been in.

The Bulldogs run the veer on offense behind a small but extremely quick line that enables the Bulldog backs to pop the long gainers inside. Defensively, the Bulldogs use a 5-3 but shift into other defenses as the situation merits.

"Their quarterback is really good and is the key to their club," Coach Joe Allen said this week. "He likes to run the option and they have a real good passing game. Johnson has thrown for 48 touchdowns in his career."

Coach Allen went on to say, "This game is what high school football is all about and we are proud to be playing for the state championship and one thing I am sure of about the game is that these Mustangs will get after old Union Hill from the opening kickoff."

Admission for the state finals has been set at \$4.00 and \$2.00 and fans are urged to leave Wheeler by noon or shortly after as it is approximately 225 miles to Abilene.

Pete Shotwell Stadium is located in the southeast part of Abilene and for Wheeler fans, getting to the stadium should pose no great problem.

Fans can either take the Business 83 route until they hit Texas 36 and then south right by the stadium or take the loop around Abilene to the east until they come to Airport Road and take Airport Road and back to the stadium. The stadium can be seen from Airport Road.

The Mustangs will leave Wheeler around noon Saturday and will spend the night in Abilene, returning to Wheeler on Sunday.

It is a long trip and will necessitate taking a lot of time to go but this year's Wheeler Mustangs deserve and need the support of every fan to help bring the state championship to Wheeler for the second straight year.

A Chartered bus will be available for Wheeler Mustang Fans for their trip to Abilene Saturday. The cost will be \$18.93 per person.

The bus will leave Saturday noon and return after the game. For more information, phone: 826-3268.

Wheeler Public Library BOOK REVIEW

In Taylor Caldwell's, "Bright Flows the River," Guy Jerald was living proof of the American Dream come true -- a man who had built an empire out of a worthless scrap of farmland, a man who had risen from the wrong side of the tracks to move gracefully within the inner circles of the very rich. It is a story about power and the struggle for power, about the treachery of dreams and the tyranny of duty, about a man who gains the whole world, but loses his own soul -- almost. For at the prime of his life, Guy Jerald tries to kill himself. It is an old friend James Meyer, who is finally able to break through Guy's suffering and help him face the choice which has threatened his existence.

"War and Remembrance," by Herman Wouk, is a historical romance. The subject is World War II, the viewpoint American. This is a novel of America at war, from Pearl Harbor to Hiroshima. It is a story in itself, and can be read without the prologue, "The Winds of War." The last words of Victor Henry's commentary on the Battle of Leyte Gulf give the theme plainly enough. "Eigher war is finished, or we are." Its one conclusion is that war is an old habit of thought, an old frame of mind, an old political technique, that must now pass as human sacrifice and human slavery have passed. The beginning of the end of War lies in Remembrance.

Post Office Says, Write Clearly

One of the biggest problems postal employees face is illegible handwriting. "At Christmas time, when mail volumes skyrocket, this can become a major problem," the Postmaster said today.

"The use of ZIP Codes by mailers does help speed up the process because often if the city and state are unreadable the ZIP Code will direct the mail to the post office from which it will be delivered. Clerks in that post office, being more familiar with local residents may be able to figure out the person to whom the mail should be delivered."

another significant problem is the number of parcels delayed or actually undelivered because of poor wrapping or packing. The Postmaster urged that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around inside.

Parcels are generally shipped in bags, and often heavier items rest on top of smaller, lighter packages. The Postmaster encouraged mailers to be a bit cautious and insure all packages.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side, and should have the address written somewhere on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off. It is a good idea to also a list of the contents.

Poor packaging an dillegible or incorrect addressing accounts for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.

HOLIDAY IDEAS
Front Door Christmas Greetings.
Special Christmas greetings begins at the front door.
With a little extra time and a smidgen of imagination, even a simple doorway can pronounce a warm welcome with expressive creativity.

For example, let a wreath or arrangement express nature by using such items as pine cones, shells, sand dollars, or cactus skeletons.

Or, small, cleverly arranged accessories from the kitchen will express a gourmet meal theme.

Wooden spoons or small copper molds held together with copper wire will alert a visitor to "Goodies" inside.

Also, consider these special door greetings:

Attach miniature God's Eyes (ojos de Dios) to wreath forms with toothpicks and metallic thread.

Wrap apples, oranges, or other fruit in plastic and attach them with bright red ribbons.

Small wooden ornaments, tiny mirrors, or other items can spruce up any store-bought wreath. Consider children's toys, also.

Use dried articles such as flowers and corn with a bow for a harvest season look.

As an added bonus, use small

wreaths on tables as rings around candles throughout the holidays.

Simple meals are the key to beating the higher cost of entertaining this year.

Start early—get the family together to hunt bargains and have time to think of cost-cutting ideas.

Check over holiday linens. Perhaps table cloths and napkins need to be freshened or pressed. If replacements are necessary, consider permanent press or holiday paper ones. Also, holiday guest towels and kitchen towels may need to be laundered after the year's storage.

If overnight guests are expected check bed linens and blankets. Freshen blankets in the dryer on "air" setting or hang outside to air. Vacuum mattress and wash mattress pads to give the bed a fresh smell.

Check over china and glassware to make sure they are clean and sparkling. Seldom-used pieces will need to be washed. After polishing the silver, wash it in hot suds and rinse, wipe dry and rub with a soft cloth.

—The more luggage on the outside, the more room for people on the inside.

—Traveling eight hours, with stops, is long enough for one day with children and for most adults.

—Just talking with each other casual conversation can make the trip enjoyable.

—For each child, have a bag of favorite toys and a few new surprises, a pillow, and a change of clothing.

—Establish safety and house-keeping rules in the car.

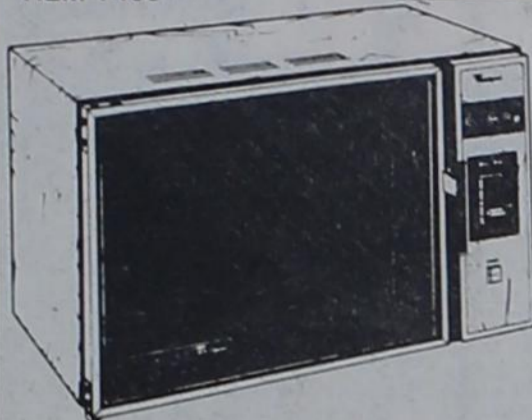

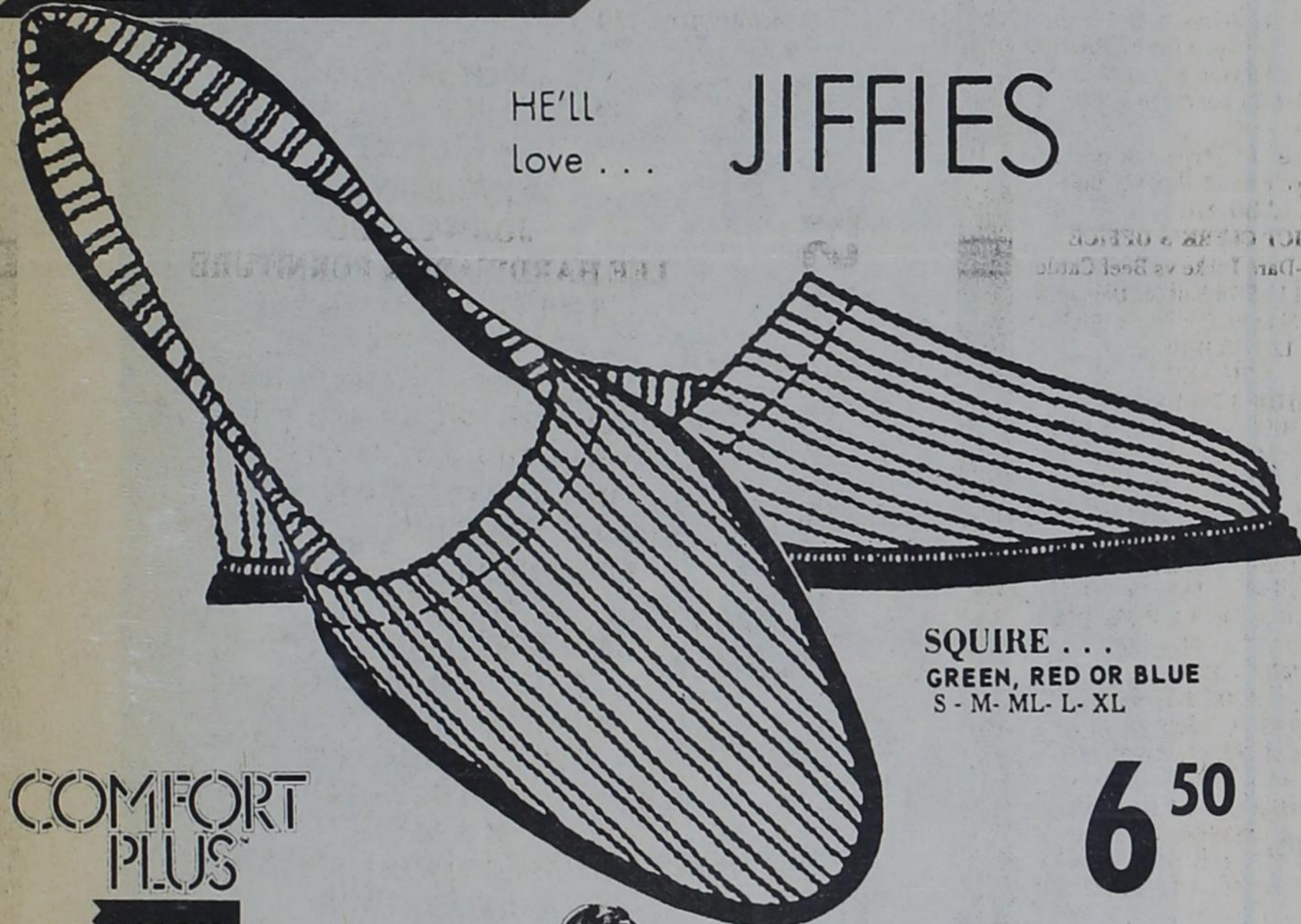

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Farmstead headquarters is the one area where windbreaks are most beneficial. The trees effectively block the speed of the wind. It is estimated that a well planned and established windbreak can also save up to 30 percent of heating and cooling costs. The windbreak also improves the beauty and privacy of the area.

Wildlife cover is another benefit derived from windbreaks as the trees provide cover and in some cases food for many species of small wildlife.

A windbreak consisting of two rows of evergreens such as Eastern Red Cedar or Ponderosa Pine can provide year round wind protection. Additional rows of other trees such as ash, plum or pecan will provide wind protection plus delightful shade during the summer.

The cost of establishing a windbreak is surprisingly small. Potted evergreens cost one dollar each with bare root seedlings costing less. Anyone interested should contact any Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District Director or the Soil Conservation Service office at Wheeler.

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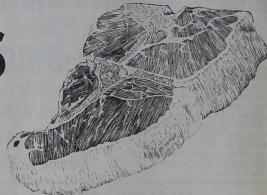
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
