Wheeler Colts Defeat Claude

The Wheeler Colts defeated Claude 31-8 Thursday evening at Nicholson Field. Leading ball carrier was Jamie Porter with 175 yards on 25 carries. Scott Wright carried the ball 17 times and gained 75 yards. In the first quarter it was a 12 yard run by Jamie Porter that carried the ball over for the first TD of the game. The extra points was made by Scott Wright. Porter made a 6 yard run in the second quarter to add six points to the scoreboard. Porter also earned the team the extra points and the score was 16-0.

The score at half time was 23-0 after a 1 yard run to pay dirt by Porter. Wade Willis kicked the ball over for the extra point. Neither team scored in the third quarter. In the fourth quarter Kelly Callaway carried the ball the final yard and across the goal line. Scott Wright carried the ball over for the extra points.

The final scoring in the game was by Claude as they made a TD in the last few minutes of game. The final score was 31-8. The Colts travel to Booker tonight, Thursday, for the last game of the season. Game time is 5.

Mustangs own Marvin Grimes. "Brent Guy is Booker's ball club you might say and we have to stop him to win the game," Coach Allen told the Mustangs Booster Club Monday night. "Not only is Guy a real tough runner, (he carried the ball 33 times against Groom) but he is their leading tackler on defense playing at line-backer."

McLEAN TIGERS ROUTED BY WHEELER MUSTANGS

Even a numbing norther borne on 20-25 miles per hour winds couldn't cool off the Mustangs last Friday night in McLean as they continued on their drive to the playoffs with a 48-0 drubbing of the host Tigers. The tempo of the game was really set on the first play from scrimmage as Marvin Grimes put a terrific hit on Steve Ellison at the line of scrimmage and the ball went flying free and the Mustangs pounced on it at the Tiger 5.

Grimes then pounded to pay-dirt on a power play at right tackle and the Mustangs had a 6-0 lead just 15 seconds deep in the game. Touchdowns came quickly for the Mustangs after that and they built up a 34-0 margin at the end of the first quarter when Coach Allen began to pour in the substitutes. So outclassed were the Tigers, the Mustangs first offensive unit played one series of downs in the second half and drove into the teeth of the wind after the second half kickoff to the Tiger 4 where they relinquished to the second unit and Rich Brown got the six pointer on a 4 yard sneak. Wheeler's first string backs totaled just 14 carries in the game but they gobbled up 144 yards for their night's efforts. The win gave the Mustangs a perfect 8-0 record for the year and extended the state's longest winning streak in schoolboy football to 27.

ARKLA DONATES TRUCK TANKS

Out in the West Texas Panhandle, grass fires are a constant threat to the safety of residents, crops and livestock. In the more sparsely populated areas, volunteer fire department can be responsible for an area covering as much as 60 miles or more. The Briscoe Volunteer Fire Department serves the city of Briscoe and the County of Hemphill. Included in this area is Arkla's Buffalo Wallow Pipeline District. When the fire chief approached Arkla Foreman Don Rose about the need for a water tank on the truck used to fight brush fires, no more needed to be said. An arrangement was made for Arkla to donate the time and manpower to construct the tank. Five Arkla employees, Tommy Sherrod, Terry Grayson, Robert Jones, Bill Farrell and Gail Ledbetter, worked two full days to fabricate the 400-gallon metal plate steel tank. They have since built another, enabling the volunteer fire department to better handle emergencies in their area of responsibility.

Because of these concerned employees and Arkla's overall desire to improve conditions for those in its coverage area, there is an area way out in the West Texas Panhandle where folks feel a bit safer and can rest a little easier. This Artilcal from an Arkla Company magazine.

WET WEATHER



KINGS KOMMENTS

WINDBREAK SEEDLINGS

If you are interested in ordering seedlings for a wind break, keep in mind that the deadline for ordering is February 12, 1978.

Order blanks for wind break seedlings are available from my office.

Rising energy costs have made windbreak plantings real assets to suburban homeowners as well as rural farm families.

Fringe benefits of windbreaks can be protection for cattle and a refuge for birds and other wildlife.

A well designed windbreak will reduce wind speed, prevent drifting snow and lower heating bills. Even a small windbreak can make outdoor living and working conditions more enjoyable during the winter. Plant screens also help reduce noise pollution from busy thoroughfares.

The location of the windbreaks is the key to their effectiveness. Evergreen windbarriers on the north and west sides of the house can cut 10 to 40 percent off winter fuel bills. Junipers and pines provide the most protection.

Windbreaks should be planted four to six times the height of the windbreak away from the house. Species that will mature to about one to one-and-a-half times the height of the house are recommended. Large trees should be located 100 to 150 feet from the north or west side of the house and roads to prevent snow drifts.

For maximum protection, three to six rows of trees are needed on farmsteads and one to two rows in suburban areas. Six to eight-foot spacing are appropriate for most evergreen plants used for windbreaks.

Trees for windbreaks should be planted in late winter or early spring.

CROP AND LIVESTOCK REPORTS FROM FARMERS AND RANCHERS NEEDED

From mid-November to early January, thousands of Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the final acreage, yield, and

production of crops and end-of-the-year livestock and poultry numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Reliable information on what is produced, how much, and where is important to farmers, ranchers, and others in making production and marketing decisions and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

These are also essential farm organizations and legislators in promotion, planning, and enacting wise legislation and are used in establishing acreages and payment levels to producers under the various commodity programs.

The collection and publication of agricultural statistics are a cooperative effort between the Texas Department of Agriculture and USDA. This cooperation avoids duplication of effort, promotes economies, and increases

the effectiveness of statistical reports. All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

County statistics for 1977 and January 1, 1978, are available on Livestock, poultry, Dairy, Field Crops, Small Grains, Cotton, Vegetables, Fruits and Pecans, and Cash Receipts from the Sale of Texas Farm Commodities. Bulletins can be obtained from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, P. O. Box 70, Austin, Texas 78767, or by writing Reagan V. Brown, Com-

missioner of Agriculture, P. O. Box 12847, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

PEACH TREE BORERS

The peach tree borer is the most destructive pest of the peach trees in Wheeler County. The borers feed near the soil line between the bark and wood often girdling the cambium layer of the tree. When this occurs, the tree soon dies because all water and nutrients are transferred from the roots to the leaves through the cambium layer.

The best way to determine if a peach tree is infested by these borers is to inspect the trunk of

the tree at the soil line. When large masses of gum which contains a brown sawdust like material is found at the base of the tree, peach tree borers are present. Peach trees should be inspected several times each year to determine if control measures are needed for this pest.

These borers can be controlled by an application of paradichlorobenzene crystals applied around the base of the tree during the period of October 20 to November 15. The use of these crystals in the proper manner will, in most cases,

eliminate the festations. The crystals should be applied when the soil is dry and the temperature is 55 degrees F. or above. Weeds should be removed from around the base of the tree and the soil leveled one foot from the tree trunk. Place the crystals in a narrow groove encircling the tree about two inches from the tree trunk. Care should be taken to

keep any of the crystals from coming in direct contact with the tree. Clean soil should be placed over the crystals so as to form a cone-shaped pile about six inches high around the base of the tree. When putting and compacting the soil around the base of the tree, care should be taken not to put any of the crystals against the tree. During the winter, the peach tree borers that are at the base of the tree will be killed. In late March or early April, the con-shaped pile of dirt should be removed from the base of the tree.

The amount of paradichlorobenzene crystals to be used is determined by the age and size of the tree. In general, one half ounce of crystals should be used for two to three year old trees, three fourths ounce for four to five year old trees and one ounce for mature trees.

Where peach tree borers are a problem, the use of this control measure for this pest will greatly lengthen the life of the peach tree.

Further information on control of the peach tree borer is contained in MP-999, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects for Commercial Fruits and Nuts." This publication is available through your County Extension Agent's Office.



