

ONE VEHICLE ACCIDENT CLAIMS LIFE

A one vehicle accident near Kelton claimed the life of an Allison youth early Saturday morning and injured a second Allison youth. The driver lost control; the pickup left the roadway, flipped several times and came to rest on its top and burned. Both passen-

gers were thrown clear of the wreckage.

Leslie Erskin Grayson, 17, was pronounced dead at the scene. He was apparently killed instantly. Wheeler County Justice of the Peace Lee Bond of Shamrock was called to the scene.

Injured in the accident was Leon Dean Lane, 20, of Allison. Lane was brought to Parkview Hospital for treatment before being taken to Amarillo for further treatment. He suffered sever injuries to the face and injured one knee.

It was believed to have been around 2 a.m. when the accident occurred. The young men were traveling north on Farm-to-Market Road 592. Approximately 3 miles north of Kelton, just before the Sweetwater Creek bridge, the highway makes a slight turn to the right. At this point, Grayson apparently lost control of the pickup.

Due to the isolated area in which the accident happened and the lack of traffic the victims were not discovered until close to 7 a.m., when a crew from Wheeler drove past on their way to work.

Grayson, a junior at Allison, was scheduled to leave Saturday with his class and the seniors for a trip to Hawaii. It was not possible for the class to postpone the trip, so a 7:00 p.m. memorial service was held Saturday evening, May 11, 1985 at Wright Funeral Home.

Funeral services for the Grayson youth were held at 2:30 p.m. Monday in the Allison School, with the Rev. Ronnie Chadwick, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating.

Burial was in Wheeler Cemetery by Wright Funeral Directors. He was born Feb. 3, 1968 in Dumas. He moved with his family from Dumas to Allison in 1976. He was a junior at Allison High School, where he participated in basketball and the FFA program. He was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Survivors include his parents; two brothers, Kirby Lynn Norrell of Amarillo and Terry Eugene Norrell of La Port; one sister, Loretta Sue Eslinger of Dumas; and his grandfather, Earl Lancaster of Bula.

Pallbearers were O.D. Coulter, Jr., Jimmy Donaldson, Johnny Grayson, Terry Grayson, Jim Bob Hall, Carter Trew.

Marijuana Patches Are Sprayed Over The County

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department began spraying the marijuana patches over the county. Six to eight acres were sprayed Thursday afternoon with an estimated 6-8 acres to be sprayed. The Sheriff reported the project involves four locations with the largest to be approximately 5 acres.

After the fields are sprayed, signs are posted warning of the dangers involved in using the sprayed plants.

The effort to destroy the marijuana has had a good response from county citizens and resulted in the arrest and conviction of one individual. Mike Grant was tried in county court Tuesday morning and convicted of possession; he had 1/2 lb. with him at the time of arrest. Grant, 25, was sentenced to 60 days and fined \$600; he is presently on probation and faces possible revoking of the 5 years probation.

One juvenile is presently being reprimanded in relation to drugs; the Sheriff feels this is also in direct response to the efforts of the department to crack down. Sheriff Miller commented, "The majority of our young people are good kids and they are tired of being punished for the actions of a few."

Helping the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department were Texas Ranger Bill Batton, Constable Steve Walker and Joe Hall of the Texas Highway Department. Steve Walker also furnished the pickup to be used for the sprayer and Wheeler Schools furnished the spraying equipment.

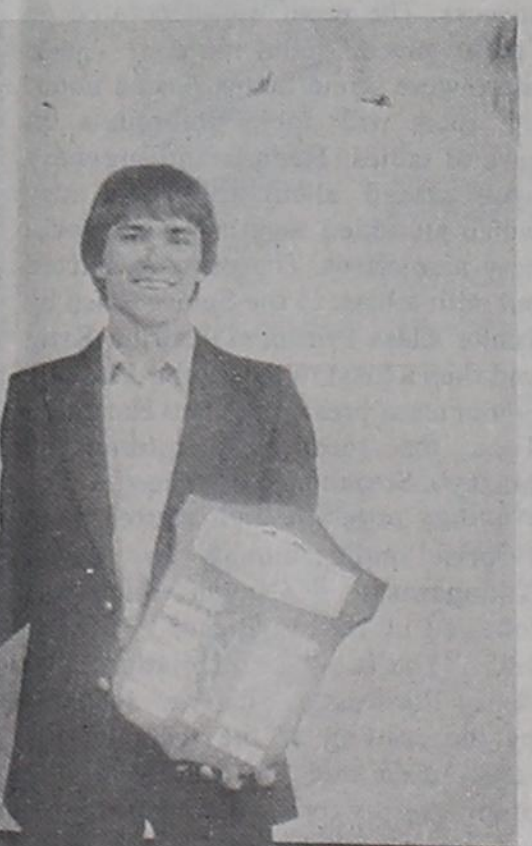

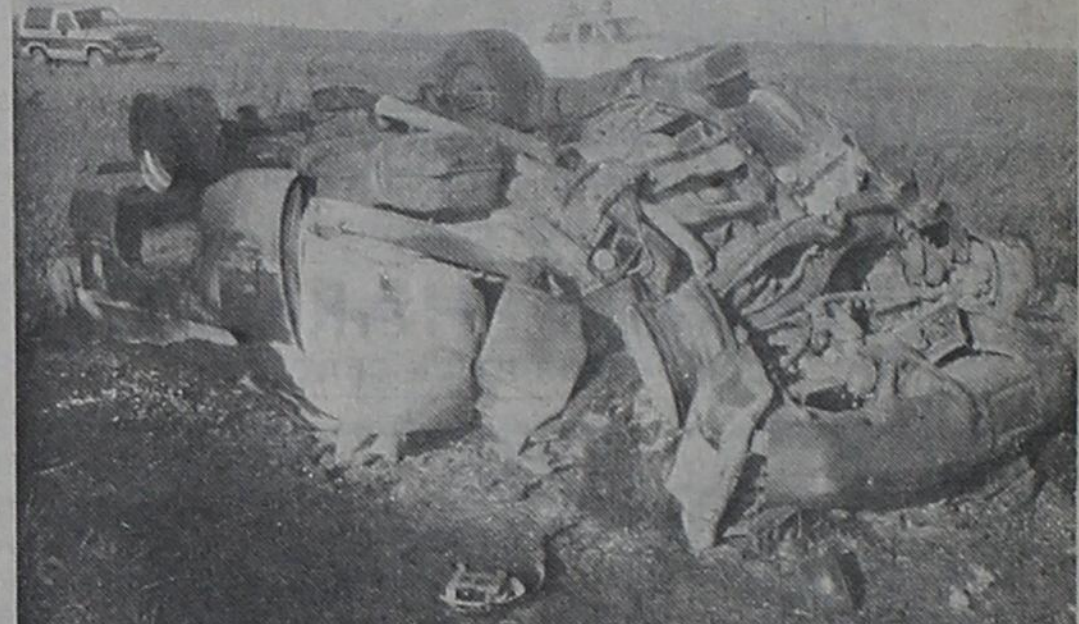

TERMINAL FED HEIFER PROJECTS TO BE EXHIBITED

The 18 heifers that have been fed by 4-H & FFA members in Wheeler, Gray, and Hemphill Counties in the Wheeler County Terminal Fed Heifer Program will be on exhibit beginning at 4:00 P.M., Thursday, May 16 at Beef Cattle Company, west of Wheeler.

The live evaluation of the heifers will be conducted by Bill Thorne, manager of XIT Feeders at Dalhart. Thorne will evaluate each of the 9 pens from their worth to the packer. He will discuss the amount of finish, as well as the probable quality grade and yield grade.

Area cattlemen and others interested in the beef cattle industry are invited to attend and see the type of job the young feeders have done. Feeders include: Todd Baize, Ronny Pepper, Todd Helton, Elizabeth Stiles, Robert Stiles, and Tommy Velasquez from Wheeler County; Tres Hess from Gray County, and

Jason Abraham and Luke Thrasher from Hemphill County.

The feeding period began December 29, and will conclude 140 days later on May 16. The heifers, in pens of two head each, have been fed a custom mixed ration under feedlot conditions. On December 29, they were weighed and processed at Beef Cattle Company. They were weighed and re-implanted at Wheeler Feed Yards on March 9, 70 days into the program.

At the halfway point, the heifers had an average daily gain of 2.66 pounds, the average feed conversion was 7.1:1 and the average cost of gain was \$56.85.

After the exhibition, the heifers will be trucked to Amarillo where they will be slaughtered and sold on the rail.

The carcasses will be evaluated and final placings in the program will be determined on the basis of feed conversion, cost of grain, carcass rank, record book, and test scores.

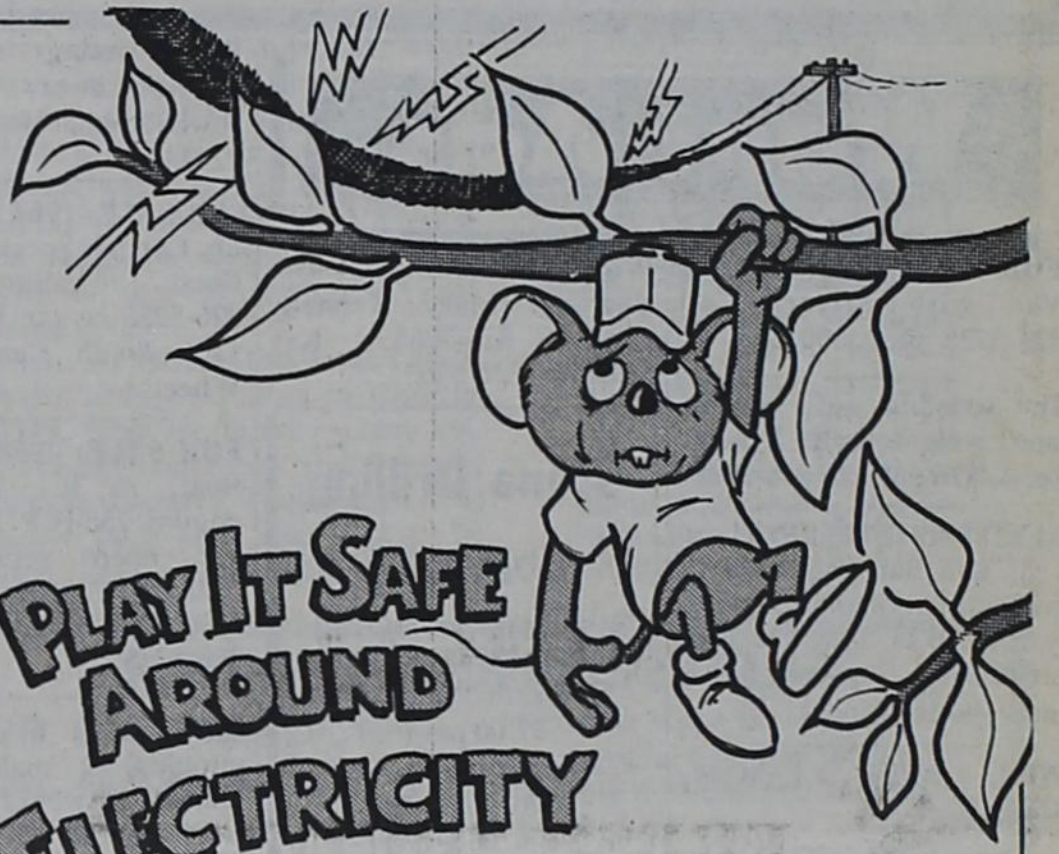

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Tubs Provide Livestock's Water

One of the most limiting factors in livestock production is water. Cattle require an average of 10 gallons of water per day. This amount varies depending upon the season and the type of forage. A dependable, adequate supply of water is important in a grazing management system. One open rangeland, cattle will utilize grass within one mile of water. Rugged rangeland reduces the distance to one-half mile. Proper location of a water source is essential to get the most out of your range. In an intensive grazing system, one water source can be fenced to be used by more than one pasture. A good way to provide water is with a tub, or water storage facility. Each tub should be large enough to furnish a pasture with water for at least one week. During the summer, wind may not blow for 3 or 4 days. A good supply of water needs to be stored to prevent disrupting your grazing system.

There are different types and sizes of water storage facilities. In Wheeler County, tubs are usually about 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet in height and range from 7 feet to 20 feet in diameter. They consist of a concrete base and metal sides. In central Texas, most tubs are constructed entirely of reinforced concrete. They are 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet to 5 feet in height and up to 30 feet in diameter. In west and southwest Texas, tubs are larger. They are 4 feet to 10 feet in height and 15 feet to 30 feet in diameter. They are constructed of steel sides and a concrete base. Smaller troughs are provided for the cattle to drink from.

If the shortage of water has interfered with your grazing management system, a water storage facility can help you solve the problem. For assistance in designing a water storage facility, contact the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler.

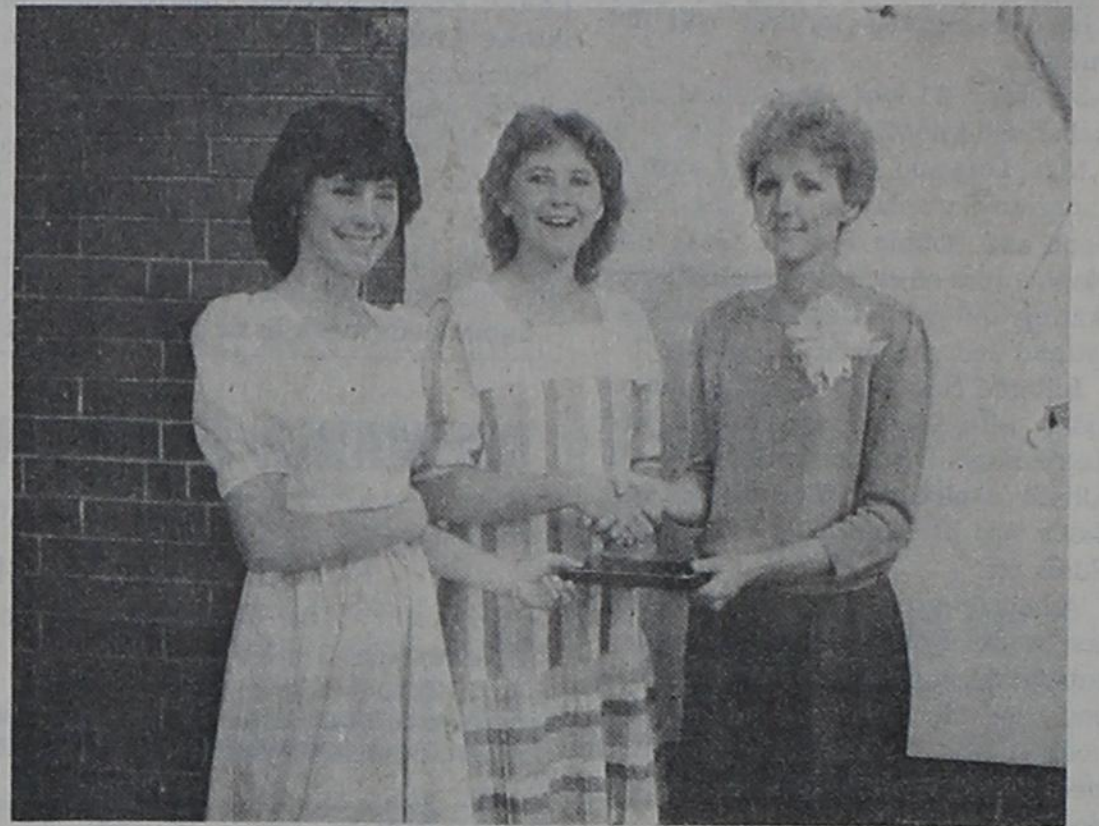

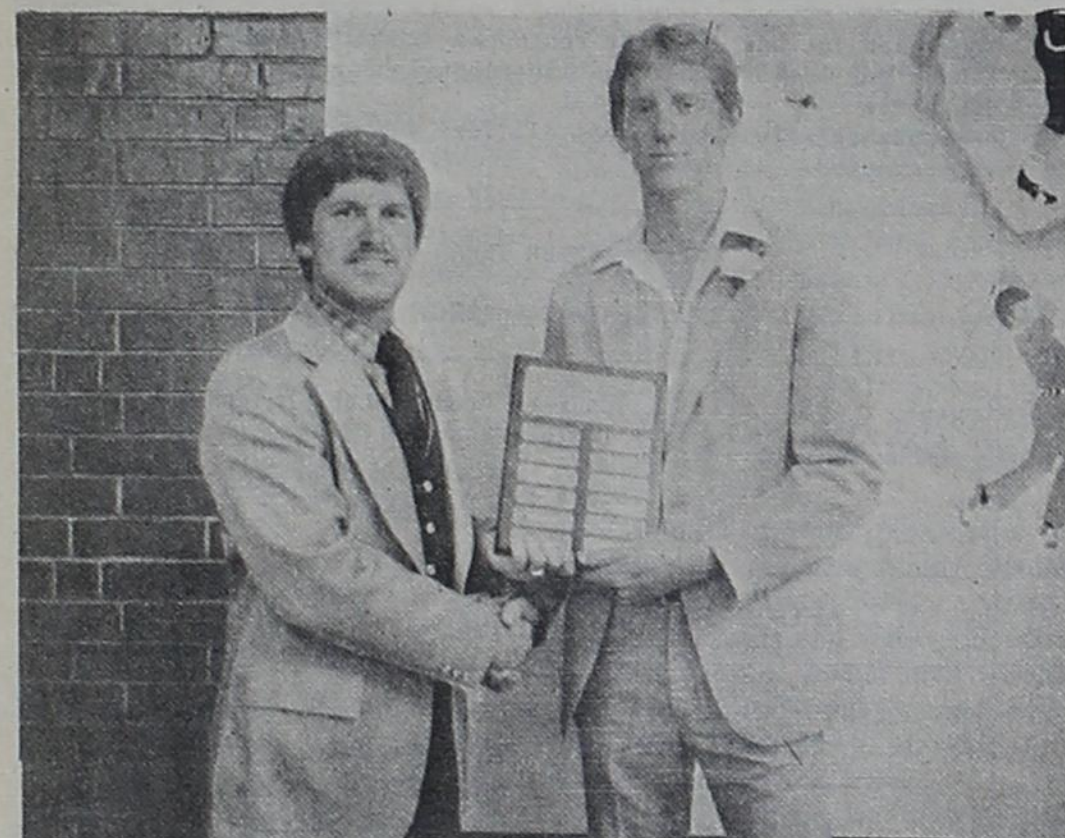

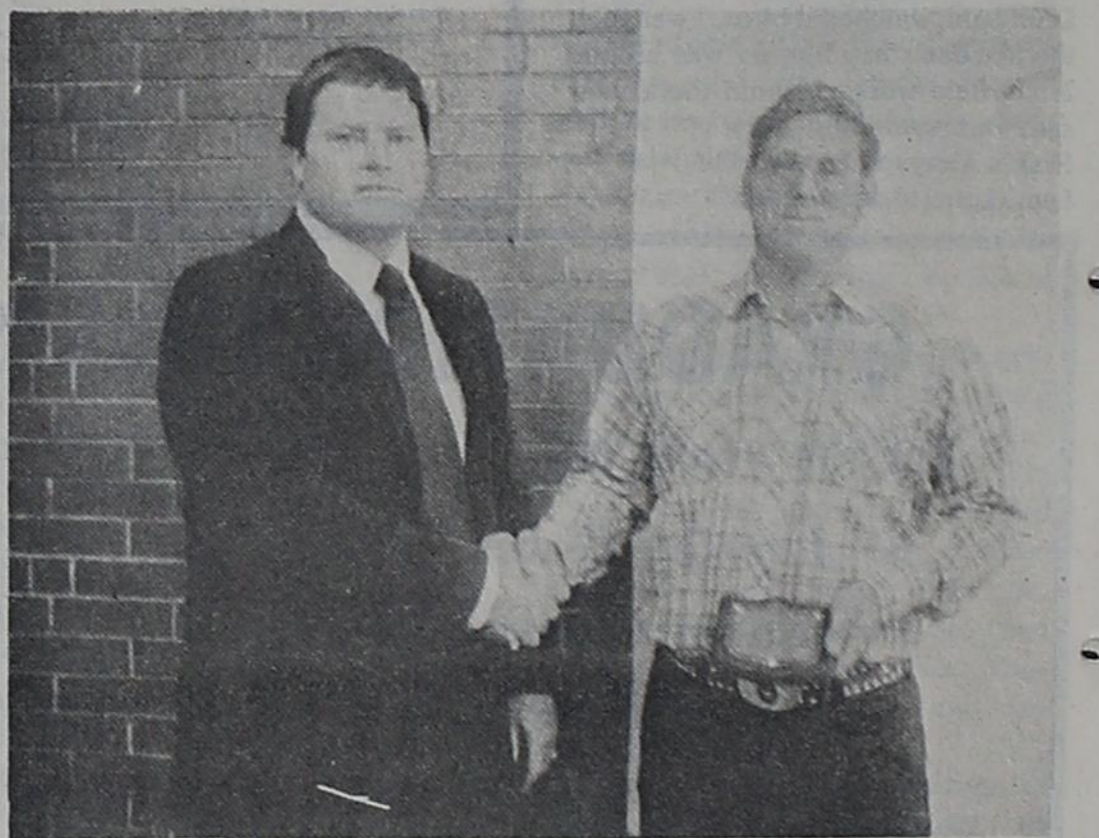

SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED

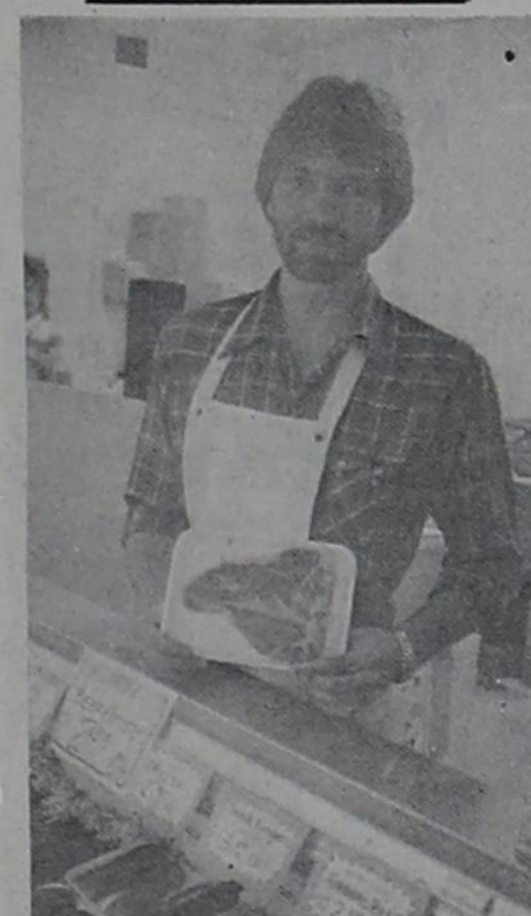
More than \$1,400 in scholarships have been awarded by the mathematics and physics department at West Texas State University, Canyon.

Wheat Field Day Scheduled May 23

The annual Wheat Field Day to be conducted at the USDA Conservation and Production Research Laboratory located west of Bushland. The field day will start at 1:00 p.m. on May 23, 1985. Wheat research at Bushland looks especially good this year because of above average rains according to Dr. B.A. Stewart, Director of the Research Laboratory. Field tours to research plots will begin after a few remarks by Dr. Stewart and Bill Nelson, Executive Director of the Texas Wheat Producers Association.

New wheat varieties, including TAM 107, TAM 108, and several experimental lines, on both irrigated and dryland, will be featured at the event. Research on irrigation of wheat, no-tillage production of wheat, and grazing of wheat also will be shown and discussed with field day visitors.

Participants at the field day will receive a publication describing all phases of wheat research being conducted at the research laboratory.

Wheat is the number one crop in Texas primarily because of outstanding research done by Dr. Kenneth Porter, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Wheat Breeder at Bushland. This field day is a good opportunity to view his research, see future varieties, and learn new techniques for producing wheat.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

Planned Grazing System For Livestock

Grassland and other forage that were grazed short during last year's drought are in a weakened condition and will recover faster if managed properly during the current growing season. Producers who sold their livestock last year should develop a grazing plan that considers the needs of these weakened plants before new herds are purchased. The better range plants are in a weakened condition because of the drought. The more rest these plants receive this year, the faster they will regain their productivity. Producers who are socking back now should stock at a lower rate for at least one year to give the grass a chance to get ahead of the livestock.

There is adequate moisture right now, but there is no guarantee that drought conditions will not return by the end of the year. Now would be an excellent time to install a planned grazing system so that all pastures could be rested at least once during the growing season. Cropland could be planted to forage sorghum in order
