There is about six furrows in the wheat; this is where the potatoes were supposed to have gone. I even went so far as to bury the potatoes.

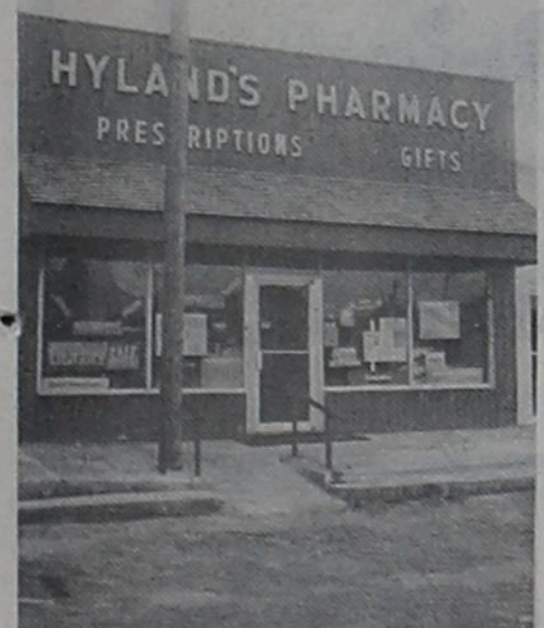

Texas Tech University junior Lisa Dodd of Mobeetie has been named Outstanding Secondary Education Major for the College of Education.

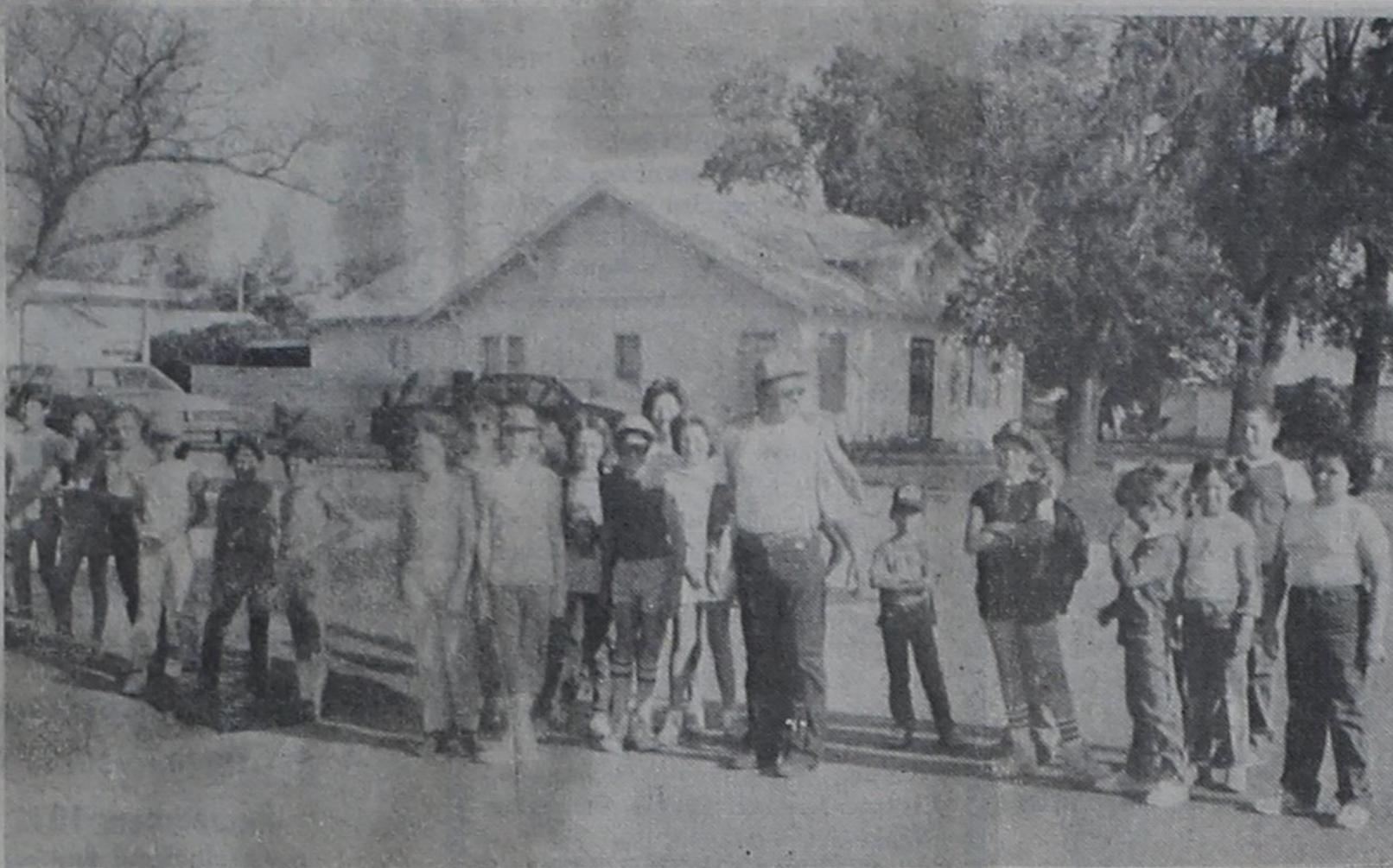
Dodd was recognized at the college's annual awards and recognition banquet.

## Sheriff's Department Report For April

In April the Wheeler County Sheriff's Office has had 16 offenses reported and investigated by us. We have cleared 6 out of these. They range from minor thefts to murder. We have had an average of 7 people in jail every day to care and cook for.

We had another burglary at Wheeler School. They lost a lot of weight lifting equipment. We are now in the process of investigating this.

On Tuesday April 30th, Deputy Knoll and I talked to the 5th Grade class in Shamrock about marijuana. They are coming to the Court House and jail to visit and see how the County Government works. Any class interested in a tour of the jail and Court House is more than welcome.

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Office is spraying marijuana this week. We have several patches of marijuana around town that have been there for 3 or 4 years and we are going to spray them. We will put up signs, because the chemical can be very harmful if anyone smokes the marijuana after it has been sprayed. We will watch the patches until it is destroyed. This stuff has been planted but not by the land owners, and there may be other patches that some of these people have planted on your place. They usually plant it in a draw of a subirrigated place in a pasture or trees.

We need your help in locating and destroying the other patches. Marijuana is a very dangerous thing and we are doing our best to destroy all we find and prosecute those caught planting, cultivating, selling and using it.

## Lightning Causes 2 Fires

An early morning fire Tuesday heavily damaged the home of Fred and Edna Waters. The residence is located just south of the Wheeler city limits. The Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene at 2:30 a.m. and prevented the house from being a total loss.

According to Fire Chief Daryl Snelgroves. Mr. Waters was awakened and sensed something was wrong. He went into the living room and discovered the fire. He immediately went for help.

The fire started during a severe electrical storm in the Wheeler area and it is believed the fire was started by the lightning.

The damage was estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$15-20,000. The kitchen is a total loss and the remainder of the home has heavy smoke and heat damage.

The firemen spent an hour and half at the scene.

## Holt Field Closed

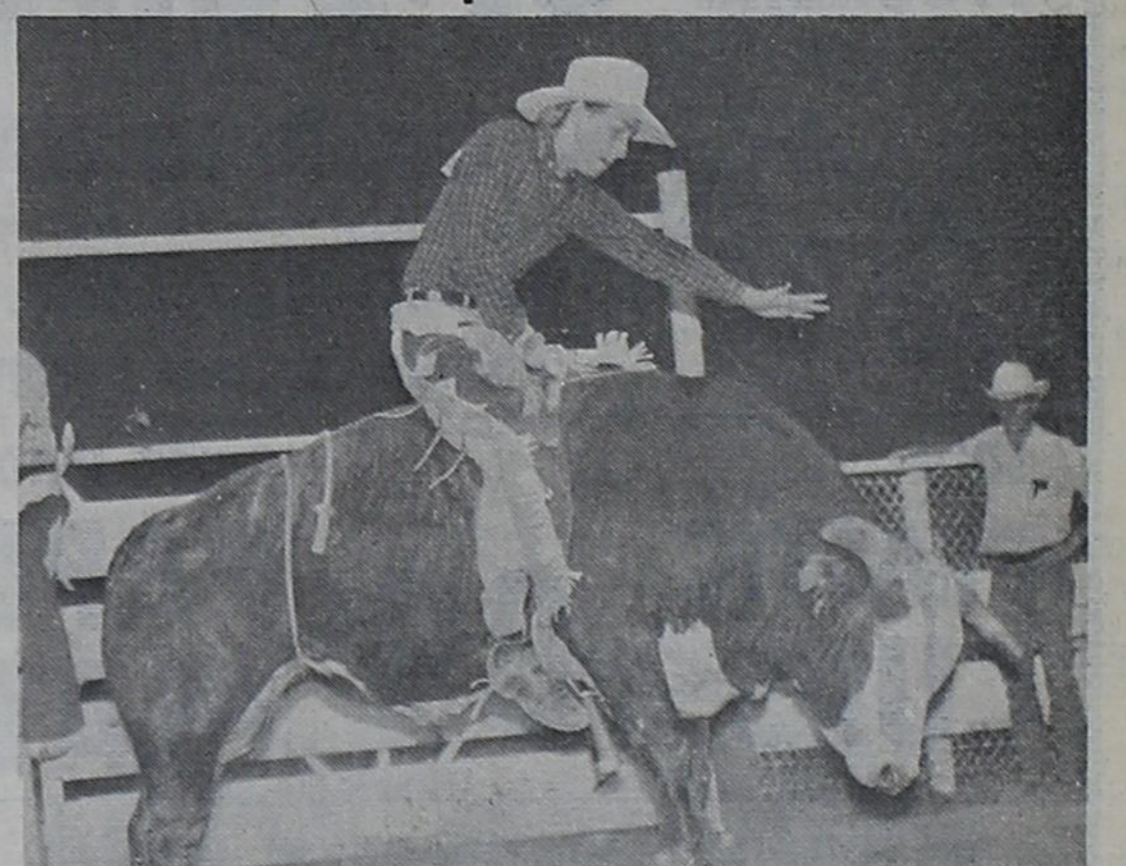
Mayor Louis C. Stas opened the special meeting of May 1, 1985 by stating the Municipal Airport is completed and it is useful to close Holt Airport.

**Fungla Disease on Peaches**

I am writing this because of many requests wanting to know what is wrong with the peaches for the last few years. I blamed my next door neighbor Joe Van Zant's spraying of wheat. He was kind enough to come down to see what was wrong. As you know he is County Extension Agent for Gray County so maybe this will help someone like me.

The disease is called peach leaf curl and is found in all areas. If you have it you will know because it effects the leaves, flowers, tender shoots and fruit of the peach tree. Young developing leaves are characterized by puckering, thickening and curling. The diseased leaves become pale yellow to light green and are shed after a short time.

On young twigs the disease appears as small seldom noticeable swelling on the branches.

Development is related to the temperature at the time the leaves leaf out and the available moisture. Surface moisture in rain dew or mist adds to the infection.

After the disease is evident control is difficult. Prevent the disease with dormant sprays. Copper Fungicide sprays are satisfactory after the leaves have fallen off.

Kocede 101 is the material of choice and should not be applied until leaves drop in the fall.





## PLAY IT SAFE AROUND ELECTRICITY

### REMEMBER THESE SAFETY TIPS

- Watch for power lines when climbing in trees.
- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.
- Do not trim trees near power lines.
- Do not set ladders or scaffolds near power lines.
- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

## TAXPAYER' INFORMATION PAMPHLET AVAILABLE

Marilyn Copeland, chief appraiser for the Wheeler County Appraisal District, offers district residents a tip to help them save on their property taxes.

According to Copeland, a pamphlet available from the district office explains how the property tax system operates in Texas and highlights possible tax savings for property owners.

The State Property Tax Board in Austin publishes "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities!" under provisions of the Texas Property Tax Code, Copeland said. (She noted that the information in "Remedies" applies to property taxes collected by all types of local government counties, cities, school districts and special districts such as hospitals and municipal utility districts.)

Homeowners may qualify for a variety of property tax exemptions offered by taxing units on residence homesteads, Copeland said. In Texas, a residence homestead is essentially the house and yard used as the owner's principal residence. The taxpayers' pamphlet explains the exemptions and tells how to qualify and apply for them.

For example, all homeowners in a school district are eligible for a \$5,000 general residence homestead exemption. Also, certain disabled taxpayers and those aged 65 or over may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of their homesteads.

"A taxpayer who was 65 or older on January 1 of this year is also entitled to a tax freeze, or ceiling, on the tax bill from the school district on his house and yard," Copeland added. "This ceiling is based on the taxes assessed when a taxpayer receives the over-65 school homestead exemption for the first time. The ceiling remains the same as long as the elderly taxpayer owns the homestead, or unless he makes an improvement like a swimming pool or an addition to the house."

The chief appraiser pointed out, though, that elderly homeowners need not apply again this year if they obtained the exemption and tax freeze from the school district last year. Only those who became 65 during 1984 and those who have never had the

exemption and freeze must apply for 1985.

Copeland said that any taxing unit may also decide to offer a general "percentage" homestead exemption which can be granted this year for any percentage up to 30 percent off the appraised value of residence homesteads.

The taxpayers' pamphlet also describes other exemptions which are available in this district, upon application, to disabled veterans and to other disabled citizens or those aged 65 and older.

Another type of tax relief explained in the pamphlet is the special productivity valuation available to landowners. If the owner and the land qualify, agricultural "1-d" and open-space "1-d-1" acreage may be taxed on its value based on what the land produces rather than on what it would sell for in the open market.

Owners of land taxed last year on its productivity value under 1-d-1 open space provisions do not have to reapply, unless requested in writing by the appraisal office to do so.

"More complete information on special land valuation, tax renditions and exemptions is available from appraisal district personnel as well as in the pamphlet," Copeland said.

She said that the "Remedies" pamphlet also contains information about the appraisal review board (ARB) which examines appraisal records and hears appeals to be sure property values in the district are equal and uniform. This section of the pamphlet outlines the steps for making an appeal to the ARB and ways to prepare and present the protest.

"We urge our residents to read the pamphlet and make any applications they need to get all the tax relief to which they are entitled," the chief appraiser said. "Remember, applications must be filed with the appraisal office before" May 1, but for good cause the Chief Appraiser may extend the deadline for furnishing the information for a period not to exceed 15 days.

## Conservation Practices And Wildlife

Conservation practices serve many uses. A proper conservation system helps the farmer and rancher conserve soil and water, get more out of each land use, and help meet the needs of wildlife. Your Soil Conservation Service can help you determine the quality of wildlife potential. SCS conservationists offer management assistance to conserve soil and water and to increase or improve the habitat for desired wildlife species. They can suggest recommend plants that benefit wildlife and are adapted to your area.

Practices such as conservation tillage, cover and green manure crops, stripcropping, grassed waterways, terraces, windbreaks, and field borders are especially beneficial to upland game species such as quail, pheasants, and wild turkeys. Other ways to improve wildlife habitat include planting different crops. Rotating between two or more different crops can provide a wider variety of residue which in turn will provide food for a wider variety of wildlife. A pond can serve several functions. It can help to control gully erosion, provide water for livestock and wildlife, and provide a place for ducks to feed and rest. Severe gully erosion should be protected from continued grazing and allowed to heal. This would protect your land from further erosion, thus saving the productive land, and it would provide an environment for wildlife. Proper grazing use keeps the higher quality plants healthy which in turn provides more forage for livestock. With proper grazing use, brush and invaders have difficulty becoming established. Proper grazing use, also serves to provide food and cover for ground nesting birds such as quail.

## Old Mobeetie Association Meeting

GOING BACK TO 1950, about THE MOBEETIE JAIL OF 1886

Last week Henry Johnston and Jap Bailey came to see me, for a short visit. Henry had found a letter while going through his old papers and found a letter dated, March 24, 1950. It was from Dan F. Sanders the son of Marvin Sanders who was sheriff of Wheeler County 1902 through 1908. (by the way he was the last Sheriff who had lived in the Mobeetie Jail while Mobeetie was the county seat.) At the time Henry received the letter he was Commander of the Worthington—Red Post of Mobeetie number 509. The post was very active at that time and had purchased the jail in order to restore and preserve it and use it for the Legion Post.

Dan had noticed an article in the Amarillo Paper that the Mobeetie American Legion was restoring the old jail, that had been standing there vacant for a number of years. "I had long hoped that someone would restore and use it", stated Dan. Here is a part of the letter Quote: "During a part of the time my father, M. V. Sanders was sheriff of the county we lived in the jail from 1904 to 1908, when the county seat was moved to Wheeler. In fact we were living there when the negro mentioned in the newspaper article, escaped through the trap door in the roof, going over the south side of the roof falling when part way down the wall; he surely did "BUST" our old cast iron wash pot into a dozen pieces. He made good his escape while his brother, in crime 'Nigger Bud', he was called, sang through the bars on the north side of the jail to quite a group of town people gathered around. No one suspected this as part of the escape since this singing was a regular thing two or three times a week.

Though I was rather young at the time I can recall a number of things which occurred during our residence there. In fact I was born in an adobe house just East of Old Mobeetie, down on 'Dobe Creek' later known as the, old Powell place, and I still have a warm spot in my heart for Mobeetie.

Best of luck to you post in your enterprise.

Track season ended for another year as the Wheeler Colts competed in the district 2-A track meet at Booker.

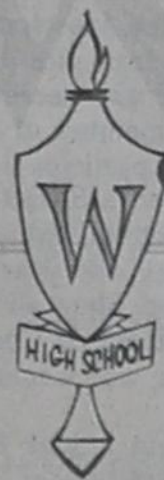
As a team the Colts finished 2nd in the meet with a total of 124½ points. Gruver, with its superior depth, finished 1st in the meet with 175½ points.

#### Todd Lee Alvey Wins Bausch & Lomb Award


