The individual was angry over my reference to everything being "open and above board" in the publication of the legal notice concerning the changes relating to the reorganization of the Wheeler County Water Supply District. A bill was introduced for adoption by the state legislature with some 1500 (the exact number not stated) signatures from Wheeler citizens. This bill asks that the Wheeler County Water Supply District board be elected with an additional number of other changes in the bill which originally created the district.

I was aware of the petitions being circulated to call for the election of the members of the WCWSD board, as opposed to their appointment. As I stated last week, I really see nothing wrong with the idea of elected officials. BUT, when these "1500" citizens were asked to sign the petition, were they shown all the changes to be made in the legislation and did they agree with the limitations being placed on the board. AND, are these limitations in the best interest of the majority of the citizens.

Why not go with the change to elect the board members and leave the changes in powers to the "elected board."

Were you one of the "1500" signers of the petition? If so, it might be wise for you to read the proposed legislation.

An added note: I did find out why the notice was not in the "Times". According to my visitor, they didn't want it messed up.

As I told the "visitor", "I am sorry I made him so angry." But, having been on the "pro" side of the issue for the past few elections, it is fun to be on the "against" side of the legislation issue and only have to "create a doubt."

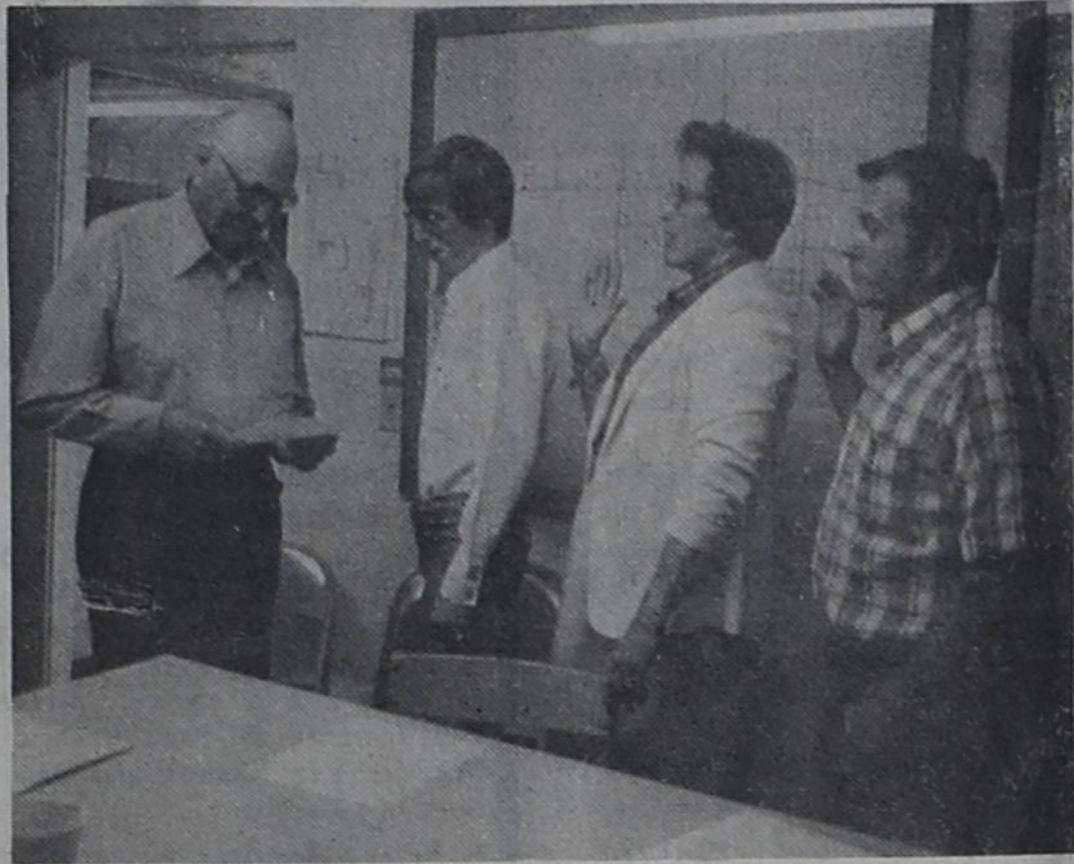
Anyone needing an immunization shot may get one, free of charge, at the Kelton School, Friday 19th, 1985, at 1:30. This is provided by the Public Health Department.

To Postal Patrons

CORRECT MAILING ADDRESSES

Most of us at one time or another have been asked by retail stores, banks and government agencies to fill out a variety of forms. The one thing most of these forms have in common is the request of our names and addresses. It is important that we provide our mailing addresses when filling out such forms because that store or agency may sell its list to other agencies for mass mailings. If we use something other than our mailing address, our mail could get delayed or misdirected.

For example, if you live at 123 W. Elm St., but your mail come to P.O. Box 15, then your mailing address is P.O. Box 15. This Mailing address must appear on the line immediately above the city/state/ZIP Code line. If, however, you also want to show your street address, you should write it in the following manner;

Bobbie Q. Public
123 W. Elm St.
P.O. Box 15
Anytown, IL 61234-0015

The only address that is kept in Postal Service files is the P.O. Box address. Business customers with address lists that include your address simply as 123 W. Elm St. will not be able to match that address to Postal Service files. And that in turn can make it more difficult for mailers to qualify for the discount on Carrier Route Presort or ZIP+4 mailings.

In fact, firms that are in the business of supplying ZIP+4 codes for other firms' address lists are finding that they can match only 85-90 percent of the addresses. An analysis of the non-matched addresses indicates that some 70 percent are attributable to incorrect information provided by the customer.

So the next time a business or agency asks, "What's your address?", make sure you supply them with your mailing address.
