Daughtry is hereby appointed clerk for absentee voting. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting by personal appearance shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

A Special Canvassing Board shall be used for counting absentee votes and Harold Kennedy is hereby appointed Alternate Presiding Judge of the Special Canvassing Board.

SECTION 4: That paper ballots shall be used for said election, which ballots shall be prepared in accordance with the V.A.T.S., Election Code, so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall appear on the ballot in substantially the following form:

"THE LEVY OF A MAINTENANCE TAX AT A RATE NOT TO EXCEED THREE CENTS PER \$100 VALUATION OF TAXABLE PROPERTY"

SECTION 5: All residents qualified electors of the District shall be permitted to vote at said election and on the day of the election, such electors shall vote at the polling place designated for the District Election Precinct in which they reside. In addition, this election shall be conducted and held in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code except as modified by the provisions of the Texas Election Code except as modified by the provisions of Chapter 45, Acts of the 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983, and as may be required by law, election materials and proceedings for this election shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

SECTION 6: A substantial copy of this resolution shall serve as proper notice of said election, and said notice, including Spanish translation thereof, shall be published once each week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the District, the first publication to be at least fourteen (14) days prior to the date of the election.

AREA ELECTIONS APRIL 6

CITY COUNCIL ELECTION

Three places on the Wheeler City Council are to be filled in the election Saturday, April 6. Bobby Vanpool and Berneice Hall are running unopposed for re-election to their places, 1 and 3, on the council. Place 5 is the only contested race on the ballot.

Two names appear on the ballot for Place 5. Walter Simmons and Mark Frankenberg are both seeking the chair being vacated by Jim Hill.

Absentee voting will begin Tuesday, April 2. Absentee voting will be handled through the City office at 505 Alan L. Bean Blvd.

Councilmen are elected for a two-year term.

WHEELER SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION

The election Saturday, April 6, will name two new members to the Board of Trustees for the Wheeler Independent School District. Position 4 is a contested race with the candidate for place 5 running unopposed.

The two names on the ballot for place 4 are Bobby Hill and Shari Porter; Hill is the incumbent in the race. Delbert Thomas placed his name on the ballot for place 5; Cecil Pierce did not seek re-election to the board.

School board members are elected to a three-year term.

Absentee voting will be at the Wheeler School in the office of the superintendent, beginning Monday, March 18, and continuing through Tuesday, April 2.

The only contested race in the Wheeler School Board of Trustee election is for place 4 on the ballot. The following is a brief resume of the two ladies to better acquaint you with the candidates:

SHARI PORTER

Shari Gale Porter is a Vice-President at the First National Bank in Wheeler where she has been employed for the past fourteen years. She is the wife of Jim Porter and the mother of two sons, Jamie and Manson; all four are graduates of Wheeler High School.

Shari, born and raised in Wheeler, is the daughter of Lillian Lee and the late Lonnie Lee; she is a graduate of Wheeler High and Texas Woman's University in Denton. She is a member of the First United Methodist Church in Wheeler.

Prior to her employment at the local bank, Shari taught school in McLean for five years.

BOBBY HILL

Bobby Hill, a local business woman and a former teacher in Odessa and Wheeler, is seeking her second term as a Wheeler Independent School Board Member. Mrs. Hill is married and has three children. She has been active in many Civic and volunteer organizations and is a member of the First Baptist Church.

Mrs. Hill gave the following statement to the Wheeler Times: "I have thoroughly enjoyed my term as a Wheeler Board Member and working for the students, parents, teachers and tax payers of the school district. At this particular time in history of Texas education we are at a crossroads. Because of the new state laws, our school district has a tremendous amount of work facing it, not only in the classroom, but at the board level. Our school board will be making policies to address every aspect of the new laws passed in Austin so that our particular needs can be met. In the last three years I have made it my top priority to attend many state and regional seminars pertaining to the reforms and new laws so that I would be better qualified to address these issues when they were brought before the local board that the "spirit of the law" would be reflected in our local policies. In the future board members will, as never before, be held accountable for the quality of education in their school districts. The Board will be required to be more actively involved in evaluating and improving the school district's teaching and curriculum. Board members must be informed by the administration in order to assess the product the school system is turning out. Texas schools of the future will be more accountable to the public than they have been in the past."

WHEELER COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT

In a special session the Wheeler County Water Supply District, the five members of the board voted to adopt the resolution, calling for an election of Saturday, April 6. The voters are being asked for a tax levy of 3c per hundred dollar valuation to pay for a study of the underground water situation in Wheeler County.

Voters will vote for or against the following: "Shall the Board of Directors of the Wheeler County Water Supply District be authorized and empowered to levy, and cause to be assessed and collected, an ad valorem tax at a rate not to exceed three CENTS (.03c) per \$100 valuation of taxable property in said District for maintenance purposes, all in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, including Chapter 46, Acts of 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983?"

Absentee voting will begin Monday, March 18, and continue through Tuesday, April 2. Absentee ballots

may be cast at the office of the County Clerk in the Wheeler county courthouse between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

KELTON SCHOOL BOARD

Kelton Independent School District will have two new members on the Board of Trustees after the election Saturday, April 6. Three names appear on the ballot for Kelton.

Seeking one of the three-year terms on the board are Ralph Graves, George Harris and Billy Buckingham.

Absentee voting in this election will be handled through the office of the Superintendent at the Kelton school. Those wishing to vote absentee may cast their ballots during school hours between March 18 and April 2.

MOBEETIE SCHOOL BOARD

The four candidates on the ballot for election to the Board of Trustees for Mobeetie are unopposed. Three individuals are seeking three year terms and the fourth will be filling an unexpired 1-year term.

Seeking full terms on the board are Nadean Morris, and appointed incumbent; Mark Hefley and Randy McCurley, incumbent. Appointed incumbent Archie Summers, Sr. is asking for election to the chair he presently holds.

Absentee voting will be at the school between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m., beginning Monday, March 18, and continuing through Tuesday, April 2.

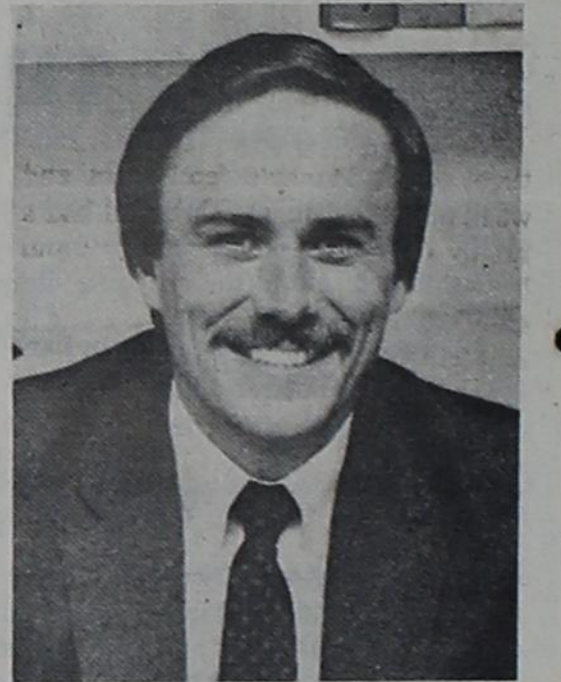
BRISCOE SCHOOL BOARD

Mr. Chenete's wife is a cousin of the George's, Roy Glen, Lee, Hollis, Gertrude (now Mrs. Wes Hill), Mrs. Lee Kiker, and others around Gageby. The letter follows:

How to find my 480: On a still day look on the ground. On a windy day look in the air. After a rain the house is white. It also has a green roof which can be seen a mile away. But don't mistake this green roof for a wheat-field as nothing grows green in this country.

Soil: Leave it to the smart Indians who did well with it. They traded all of Roger Mills county to the white men for a jug of Red Eye. 100 acres are broke—so is every man who tried to farm it. The fertility is excellent. The soil will raise cane, cucumber burrs, tempeps, tumble weeds, maize, kaffir corn, bunions, high blood pressure,
