



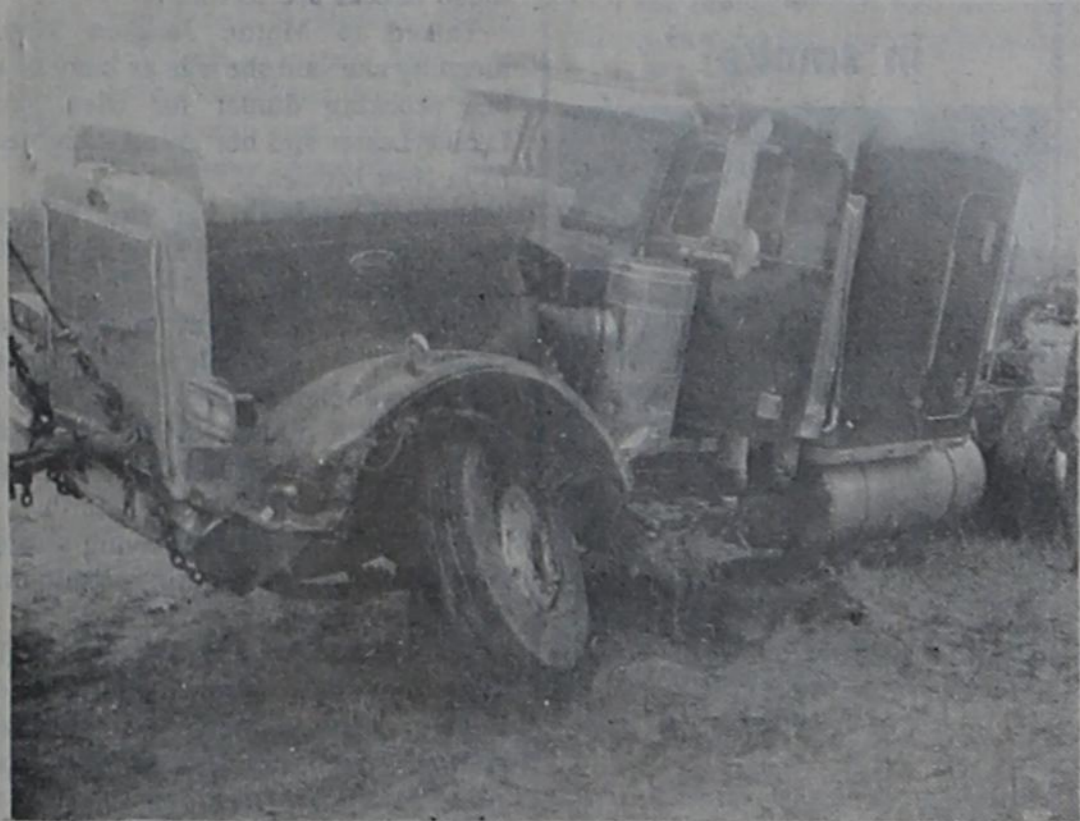

FATAL ACCIDENT NEAR WHEELER SAT.



FATAL ACCIDENT: The first traffic death of 1985 occurred Saturday morning, six miles north of Wheeler. This 1978 ElCamino was driven by Jody Bennett of Perryton; he died an hour after the accident. The brand new Peterbuilt truck was driven by Andy Neeley of Albuquerque; he escaped injury. The driver of the pickup might possibly have lived, had he had his seat belts fastened; the passenger area was relatively undamaged by the impact.



Perryton Man Dies In Head-on

Jody Bennett, a 35-year-old Perryton resident, was killed early Saturday morning in a car-truck accident. The accident occurred 6 miles north of Wheeler on Highway 83; the time was around 2:40 a.m. and a heavy fog covered the area.

The ElCamino driven by Bennett was traveling south on 83. According to the investigating Highway Patrolman, Kevin Long of Shamrock, the pickup crossed the center stripe and struck a semi-truck trailer driven by Andy Neeley of Albuquerque.

The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service and Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department were called to the scene. Bennett was removed from the wreckage and taken to the Parkview Hospital. Bennett's numerous injuries

resulted in his death at 3:46 a.m., an hour after the accident.

Additional concern was caused when it was learned that Bennett had his son for the weekend and the boy's whereabouts were unknown. The accident scene was searched by the County law officers, firemen and ambulance personnel; it was later learned the boy was not traveling with his father.

Funeral services were Tuesday in Perryton. Survivors include the son, of Perryton, the parents and a sister.

Neeley, the truck driver, escaped injury in the accident, but his relief driver, Louis Almdarez, of Laredo was in the sleeper and was struck in the head by the television. Almdarez was treated and released from Parkview.

Local Volunteer Receives Nomination

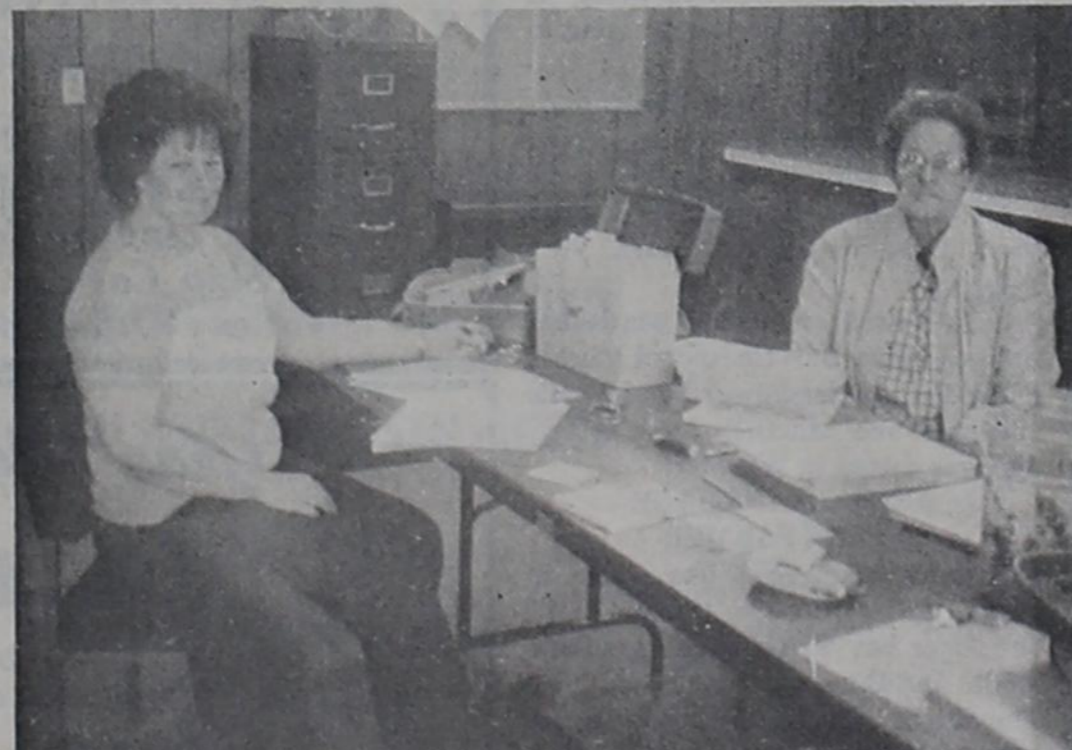

ELECTION SCHEDULED TO PROVIDE MONEY FOR STUDY

The Wheeler County Supply District board has set Saturday, April 6, as the date for an election for Wheeler County voters to favor or disapprove the levying of a tax for an underground water study. The actual wording of the ballot will be decided at the March 11 regular board meeting.

The WCUSD is looking at 3-5c per hundred dollar evaluation tax. With the present evaluation, this would provide \$300,000 to \$500,000 for the study on the availability of underground water.

The board hired the firm Ed L. Reed and Associates, a Midland Hydrology firm, to do the study. The consultants will begin work on the study immediately; should the election fail, there will be no charge to the county. First step in the study will be the compiling of information presently available by using logs from existing wells; from this, the engineers expect to isolate areas which might produce the amount of water needed for Wheeler and Shamrock.

At a February 19 meeting of the board, Joe Reed, a ground water

hydrologist from Midland, divided the proposed study into to phases. The first phase would use existing information and the second phase could involve actual drilling, testing and cost estimates. Costs for the studies would be \$10,000 to \$15,000 and would require 2-3 months; the second phase would cost \$100,000 to \$200,000.

The board hopes to learn the most practical way to assure Wheeler county citizens a supply of water in the future. If an adequate supply underground water is found, the cost of purchasing the rights to the water, producing and delivering will be compared to those of the proposed reservoir which was voted down on January 11.

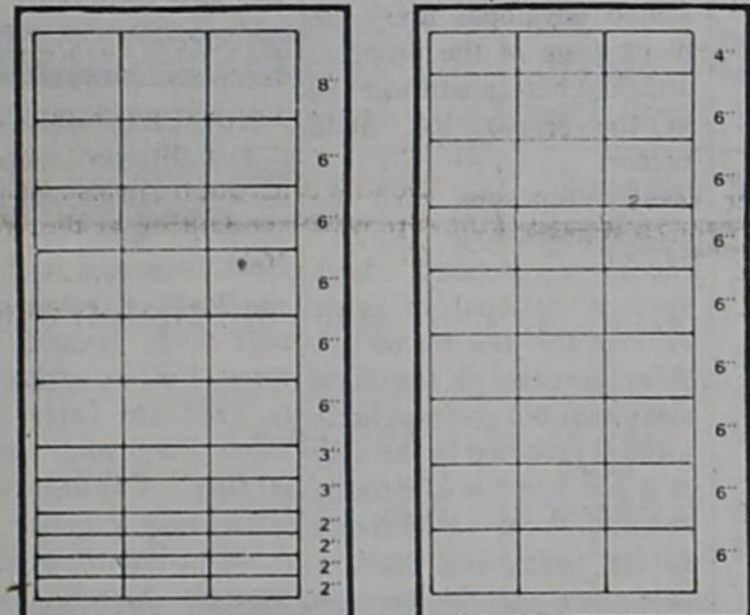

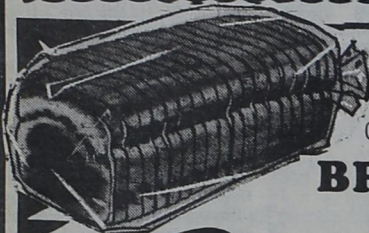

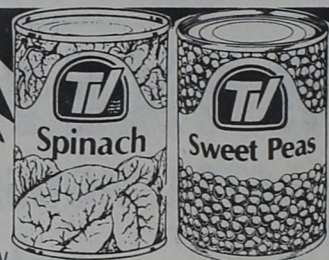
