Vanpool has been in charge of 2-6 transportation while on the council is completing an unexpired term, having 2-7 been appointed by the council.



bility of asking the voters for a one year tax for the purpose of providing funds for the study of the situation. A study to determine the water available underground can cost from \$25,000 to \$210,000; this would include drilling numerous wells to determine sand

and anticipated life. Marilyn Copeland, Chief Appraiser of the Wheeler County Appraisal District met with the WCWSD to present factual information on 1982/83/84 appraisal rolls, and also information on exemption laws as quoted from the Property Tax Code by the State Property Tax Board. Mrs. Copeland had been asked by Harrison Hall to meet with the board to give a direct report on the Wheeler County tax base.

Mack Wofford of Pampa with Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, Inc., an engineering firm out of Lubbock, and Ken Smith, a bondsman with Schneider, Bernet & Hickman, Inc. of Dallas, met with the board; these individuals and their respective firms worked with the board in the recent election.

A number of interested individuals from both Wheeler and Shamrock met with the board including both mayors.

Hall reported his trip on Friday, January 25, to be informative and informed the board that the Texas Water Commission would help in any way they could. Teh state maps show the Ogalala water under the north half of Wheeler County; this means, according to Hall, you can drill almost anywhere in the county and get enough water for a windmill, but does not mean you can do the same and get enough water to serve a city.

When a city drills and finds a suitable well, there is no assurance of the life of the well. The Shamrock "West Field" at the time it was completed was estimated to have a life of 30 years; time runs out in '88, if not before, according to Woodrow Sims, board member and Shamrock city manager at the time the field was completed.

In a comment about the rumored effort to make the lake area a game reserve, Hall remarked, "If we kill everything about this reservoir, we may be cutting off our nose to spite our face!"

Having been a teacher for 40 years before I retired, I feel those of us who attended Wheeler schools when I did were extremely fortunate in having excellent, devoted teachers. In New Jersey our judicial systems, national and state, have, literally, "tied" the hands of teachers who try to enforce discipline. Many excellent teachers retired because of this.

Those of my generation were so lucky to have lived in Wheeler, a small town filled with so many great people. I hope my generation and those who follow will try and set good examples as our friends and parents did.

My grandfather Gunter came from North Carolina, Haywood County near Ashville which is not too far away from Guntersville. We assume we are relatives. Grandpa used to say that Haywood county had more Gunters than white people.

Grandpa saw my grandmother, Caldonia Isaaks a part Cherokee when she was 16. He told her he was going to marry her. She hated his "guts", but they got married. She, a 100 lb woman, could out-work many men. She had 14 kids. Many went to college. One aunt received a doctorate degree.

The Isaaks owned a lot of land near Las Cruces, N. Mexico. Once I asked my great uncle Jeff Isaaks how much land did he have? He said he did not know exactly-about 30 miles long and 10 miles wide. This was in the Oregon Montains. Once I stopped off and visited my weathly relatives when I was driving to California to see my sister Gladys in El Cajon.
