PHILLIPS BECOMES 22ND MUSTANG VICTIM

Mrs. McIlhany Celebrates Ninetieth Birthday Sept. 20

Judge and Mrs. Grainger McIlhany honored his mother, Mrs. M. McIlhany, with a reception on her 90th birthday, Wednesday, September 20th. Assisting with the reception were Mr. and Mrs. Bill Howell of Dallas, sister and brother-in-law of Mrs. Grainger McIlhany, their grandson, B. A. Richardson also of Dallas, and Mrs. R. Wm. Brown of Wheeler. Fifty eight guests called during the celebration.

Decorations were of flower gifts to the honoree in shades of pink, yellow and white. The serving table was covered with a white cut work cloth and centered with a brass bowl filled with a permanent silk flower arrangement in shades of pink, flanked by crystal and brass candelabras. Cakes and punch carried out the pink and white theme.

The honoree wore a hat, pink street length dress with long sleeves and gathered neckline. Her corsage was a white orchid with pink center.

Finding themselves trailing by a point midway in the second quarter, the Wheeler Mustangs finally got it all together and proceeded to show the Phillips Blackhawks why they are the state's number one Class B football team.

The final score was 37-7 but it didn't become easy until in the third period when the Mustangs made a patented goal line stand at their 1 and then Marvin Grimes powered his way into the Blackhawk secondary and raced 93 yards to the Phillips 2 yard line.

Two plays later, Benny Baker went into the end zone from the 1 and the Mustangs led by 24-7 and really had their first comfortable margin.

Play was marred throughout the game by what seemed an over abundance of flags on both teams.

Phillips filled the air with footballs from a shotgun spread formation, one that the Mustangs hadn't expected, but the Blackhawks were powerless on the ground and their lack of a ground game let the Mustangs lay back and play the passing attack.

The Blackhawks did find a soft spot in the Mustangs defensive right side and completed 15 passes for the game but had 5 pilfered by the Mustangs secondary.

Wheeler overcame 2 illegal procedure penalties to put their first touchdown on the board on their first possession as they drove 51 yards in just 7 plays with Grimes getting 34 big yards off right tackle for a first down on the Blackhawk 3.

Two plays later Kent Vise went into the end zone from the 1 but Wheeler's kicking game still left a lot to be desired as Mike Evans kick sailed wide to the left.

The Mustangs had a chance to blow Phillips out of the stadium early when they recovered a fumble at the Blackhawk 47 just three plays after their first TD but Grimes fumbled at the 9 to kill the chance.

Wheeler saw their next chance go by the wayside with a big 15 yard holding penalty after the Mustangs had a first down on the 12. Russell Gaines tried a 23 yard field goal but it was blocked and Myron Jolly's first interception of the game which put the drive in motion went for naught.

Dennis Sullivan recovered a Grimes bobble at the Mustangs 16 midway of the second quarter and Phillips cashed in on the opportunity quickly with a 16 yard scoring toss from Gary

Estes to Sullivan. Mike Cyphers split the uprights with his extra point kick and the Mustangs were down 7-6 and started looking at their hole card.

Their hole card was their powerful ground game and it came through for them on the ensuing kickoff.

Methodically, the Mustangs took 12 plays and drove 67 yards staying inside on every play to win the fight against the clock and went ahead to stay at 1:49 as Grimes went right up the pipe from four yards out.

A quick 5 play scoring thrust with the second half kickoff started the lid closing on the Blackhawks coffin and the goal line stand and Grimes big run slammed it shut.

Grimes carried for three straight times after Baker had returned the second half kickoff 9 yards to the Wheeler 41 and the Mustang's ace in the hole showed the Blackhawks his skill as he powered 22, 1, and 29 yards to give the Mustangs a first and goal at the Phillips 7.

Baker used his power on 2 trips into the right side and Wheeler led by an 18-7 margin after Jolly was downed at the line of

scrimmage on a running attempt for the two points.

Phillips drove 74 yards before the center of the Mustangs defense, led by Arthur Zepeda and Baker, dropped Estes like a rock for no gain at the Wheeler 1.

Another Jolly interception, he got 3 in the game, at the Phillips 45 and runback to the 27 set the stage for the Mustangs fifth touchdown.

Phillips was guilty of a personal foul on Jolly's runback and the Mustangs had just a short 15 yards to go.

The Blackhawks stopped Baker for no gain but the Mustangs #2 tailback, Jimmy Ryan, gave the Blackhawks another number to look for as he fought his way into the end zone in two plays. Gaines kicked good and only 16 seconds remained in the third quarter.

Wheeler's final six pointer came with just over 3 minutes to play when Coach Allen inserted Jolly at his old split end position and the speedy receiver worked his way free and took a perfect 32 yard pass from Rich Brown and never broke stride to rack up the Mustangs final tally in their third win of the season.

RED ADAIR RETURNS TO COUNTY

WHEELER WELL CAPPED FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 22

Approximately six to eight million cubic feet of natural gas has been lost since a natural gas well exploded Wednesday morning north of Wheeler.

This well, owned by Tri - Service Drill Company and H. L. Brown, Jr., exploded because of a faulty valve, according to Howard Baker, a company man.

The explosion came at approximately 6 a.m. and by 8 a.m. Baker had called the world re-nowned Red Adair and his crew to aid with the capping.

Adair explained admist the noise from the well that his crew was called from Midland, and said that well wasn't leaking a lot of gas.

He added mud would be pumped into the well sometime today in order to cap it.

Baker explained the well was 14,708 feet deep when the explosion came.

He said the well is sitting on morrow sand. "We started out on the morning of the 20th out of the hole when the well blew out," said Baker.

He added, "We were on top of the sand when we started out and

the hydrostatic pressure became too great. It blew out immediately."

Baker explained they closed in the well and the Phillips line blew off. "The valve on the cubing head would not close," Baker said.

This is when Baker decided to call in Adair.

"We called him at 8 a.m. and he arrived at 4:30 p.m."

Adair will try and cap the well tonight, but Baker said until that time comes, the crew will spend their time checking various items.

"I lined everything up, and Red checked it over," Baker said.

Baker said a valve had to be put on the well head, and then mud will be pumped into it.

According to reports prior to press time this morning, Adair and his crew were working on replacing the valve, and the mud had been loaded into tanks.

Baker said, "We will pump 17 pounds of mud down the drill pipes to kill it."

He added, "This is not a normal procedure. The faulty valve is why the mud is being pumped into it."

Adair added, "The main thing is getting prepared."

He said that even though this is the 44 explosion he has worked with since January, and some of them have been overseas, he looks at them all the same.

Adair added that Thursday afternoon he had been able to get the gas to blow out of the side with the aid of his crew.

"We're going to leave it alone until we're ready. It takes time. We'll get it all set up today (Thursday)," Adair said.

Adair and his red-suited crew spent most of Thursday rigging up tanks.

"The tanks are coming," Adair said, "We will load them with mud and get them rigged up to the pump."

How does this blow out compare to others he had seen?

"They're all bad," Adair said.

Adair and his red suited crew arrived at the scene at approximately 4:30 p.m. Wednesday and finished the job by the middle of the afternoon Friday.

MUSTANGS JV REMAIN UNBEATEN WITH 20-0 WIN

Not only did the Mustangs JV keep their unbeaten record intact last Thursday night via their 20-0 win over Canadian, but they have yet to be scored on in their three victories.

Wheeler completely throttled the young Wildcats and only allowed them to cross the mid-field strip twice and then only to the 46 and the 43.

Held scoreless in the first quarter, the Mustangs put a touchdown on the scoreboard in each of the remaining periods and again it was the running of Loyd Remy and Willie Valencia that led the Mustangs attack.

Quarterback Ty Henderson only went to the airways five times in the game and completed two for 21 yards with Valencia and Remy each gathering in a toss.

A bad snap on a fourth down punt attempt put the Mustangs in the Wildcat 6 at the midway point of the second quarter and Remy got the touch-

down in three carries.

A time consuming 63 yard drive following the second half kickoff put Wheeler into the end zone once more and Valencia powered up the middle from 3 yards.

Canadian had the ball for only four plays in the third quarter and had to punt from their 25 on this occasion and the Mustangs took over at the Wildcat 43 to put into motion their last scoring march.

Once more Valencia went over from the 3 and the Mustangs opted for two and got it with a nifty pass from Henderson to Valencia.

KITCHEN EFFICIENCY
Having all kitchen countertops at the 36-inch height of the range places more emphasis on appearance than function.
Different tasks performed in the kitchen frequently require work surfaces of different heights.
Operations such as kneading, mixing and stirring when done for extended periods put a strain on shoulder muscles.
Work at too low a counter causes a person to stoop, tiring the back muscles.
Work at too low a surface causes the elbow to bend and the shoulders to lift, resulting in increased tension in the small muscles and fatigue.
White the height of existing counters is not easily changed, the homemaker might make some temporary modifications to provide some variation in work height.
For example, a bread board placed on top an open drawer may provide a work surface at a

sitting height.
When mixing or kneading at too low a counter, place the item on a rack to bring it up to a convenient level. Or, raise a low work table by casters or blocks beneath the legs.
When building or remodeling the kitchen, plan counters at varying levels.
For example, build a sliding or pull-out shelf. This makes it possible to sit for performing many kitchen tasks.
Or, lower the counter in the mixing center.
Also, install adjustable shelving at more easily reached heights making the work area more convenient and more adaptable to changing needs.
Convenient kitchen storage arrangements will also reduce the time, effort and energy homemakers spend there.
But finding the best place for everything needed in the kitchen takes organization.
The best way to stretch storage space is to discard articles that

are never used. Store frequently used items in accessible places, and put less-frequently used items in a harder to reach spots.
Having a definite place to store each kitchen article saves time and energy because searching and reaching is required, and everyone who uses the kitchen should know "where things go."
Group items together that are

used together and store them near where they are first used. For example, sugar, shortening, mixes, bowls and measuring cups belong at the mix center. Potholders, turners and stirring spoons should be stored near the range.

On Sunday the meal was catered by "Rich's Fried Chicken" of Lubbock. Ricahrd is the son of the late Hubert Sivage.

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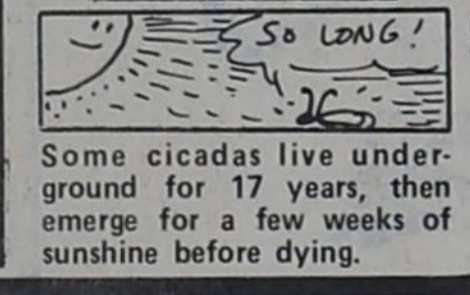
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Wed. Study Club Begins New Year

Foster Whaley Addresses Kiwanis

Foster Whaley, Democratic Nominee for State Representative spoke to members of the Wheeler Kiwanis Club on Mon., Sept. 25.

Whaley reviewed legislation that was passed during the special session of the State Legislature this summer.

"In addition to repealing the sales tax on utility bills the inheritance tax was amended and the exemption raised to a substantially higher level," Whaley said.

An amendment was passed that will be on the ballot on November 7 which will make a host of beneficial changes in the state constitution according to Whaley.

Among them are:

1. Removal of intangibles (stocks, bonds, and savings accounts) from the property tax base.

2. Exemption of household goods.

3. Mandate that farm and ranch land be taxed on productive value.

4. Mandate a \$5,000 homestead exemption by school districts for all residential property owners, and permit the legislature to give from zero to \$10,000 additional dollars to those vote age 65.

5. Impose a limit on the growth of state government to that of the state's economy as determined by law.

Whaley said this was the most significant legislation affecting taxation that had been passed in over three decades.

The legislature passed a bill that would set up a \$450 million state fund to reimburse school districts for losses created by the mandated reduction in taxes.

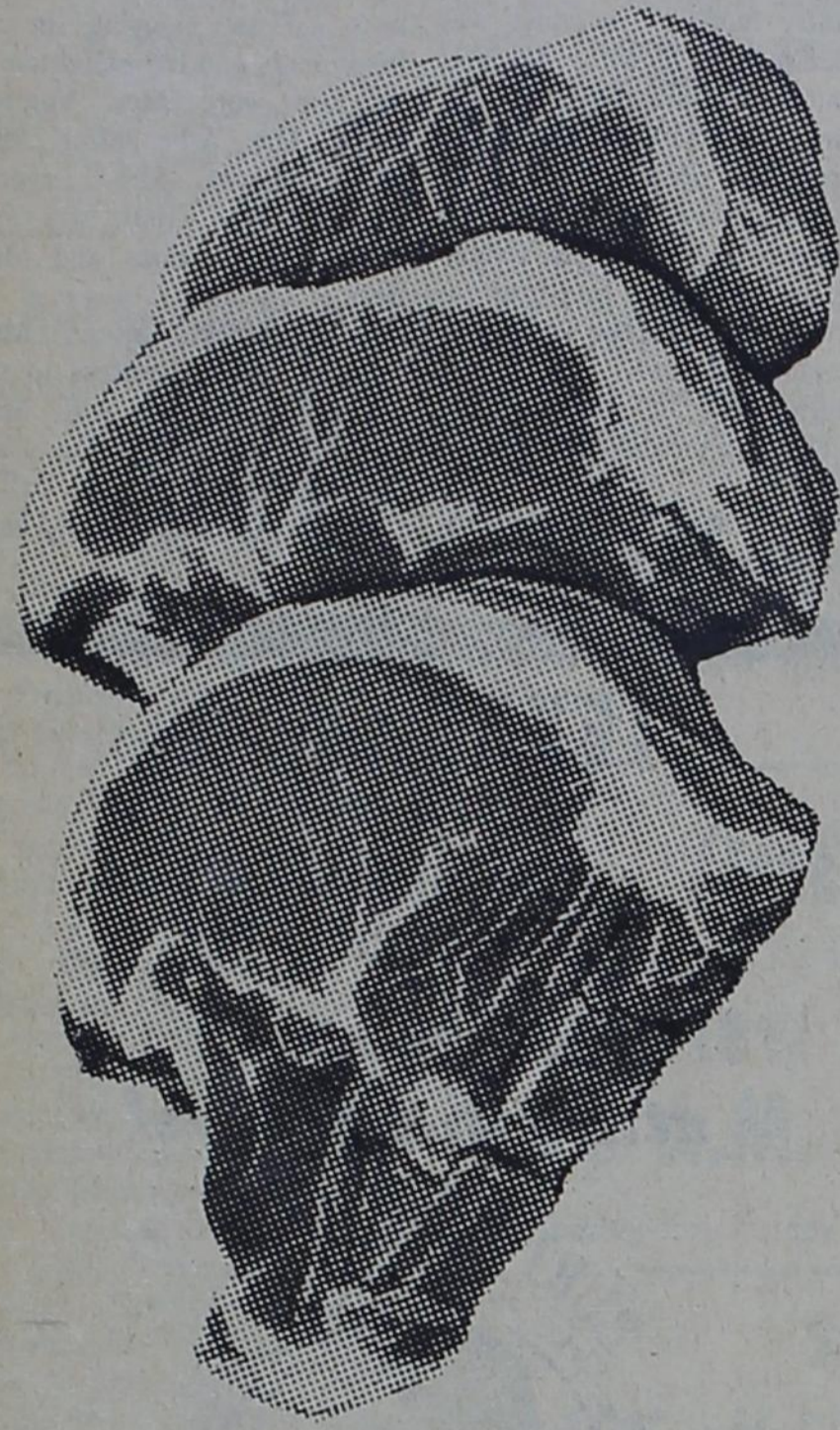
