SUZANNE BUSH HAS 28TH BIRTHDAY SATURDAY

Last Saturday we helped celebrate the 28th birthday of Suzanne Bush. She is a Special Friend of Uncle Zeb's and a ver Special Person in her own right. She has lived more of life at the young age of 28 than many live in a life time. Some of which Suzanne doesn't want to live over again. She lives about halfway between Shamrock and Wheeler now.

When we walked in to room 229 in the Bivens Section of High Plains Baptist Hospital almost a year ago Suzanne didn't seem to have much to expect. She had been in a very serious car wreck, and many serious problems remained. For four months we visited her on Thursday and her cheerful smile from almost an immovable body was always a welcome sight to me. We had many good talks and she shared all of her reckless life leading down to the almost fatal car wreck. She said last Saturday: "Uncle Zeb, I never did tell you an untruth." I believe her. Enough of her past for now. It is the now that is so important. The last time we had visited she was pretty much in a wheel chair. She had two children, and things didn't look so well, but Suzanne was determined this wasn't the end of her active life.

Her mind kept on working and planning. Her mother could take care of her boys, and wanted to. A bigger need developed just a few miles away when her brother was left with three children, one of which was a little special child, that soon after she had come into the world Suzanne had written the following poem. She was now going on six. Suzanne saw her chance to try something most of us thought was impossible, but to her it was the challenge that she needed.

So she left her boys with her mother and moved in with the brother: wheel chair and all. She cooked and took care of the washing. She kept things going even loving and caring for the Special child. God has heard her cry for His help. Suzanne had known Christ since the age of 14. Each morning she prayed for patience, Lord. With that she would tackle the day.

Suzanne became so busy in this new work that she asked Uncle Zeb not to expect a letter. Each diaper and each dish to be washed was a new challenge.

God helped her and she has made it almost and she will make it all the way. Walking is a pretty good effort, but she won't complain, but thanks God for every step. She sees two things with one eye, but a doctor is studying her case with some promise to help her. She has faith that I cannot fathom. She has courage that she seldom sees. To her, nothing is impossible with God, and when one has Mind to Do. Suzann has all this and more. I couldn't find the wheel chair, not even crutches. I just found courage, faith, a determined will to make it. She will.

Some time after the Little Special Child was born Suzanne wrote the following poem. Uncle Zeb and I think it is great and show talent.

Heavens Very Special Child
By Suzanne Bush
A meeting was held quite for from Earth;
"It's time again for another birth."
Said the Angels to the Lord above;
above;
"This Special Child will need so much Love."

Her progress may seem very slow—
Accomplishments she may not show.
She will require a lot of care
From folks she meets a way down there.

She may not run and laugh and play,
Her thoughts may seem quite far away.
Dear Lord, please find some parents who
Will do this special job for you.

In many ways she won't adapt,
She may be known as handicapped.
So let's be careful where she's sent
We want her life to be content.

They will not realize right away
the leading role they're asked to play.
But, with the Child sent from above
Comes stronger faith and richer love.

And soon they'll know the privilege given
In Caring for this gift from Heaven.

They also visited Chuck and Phoeby Heartline and Cindy Meek at Canyon last Sunday and Monday.

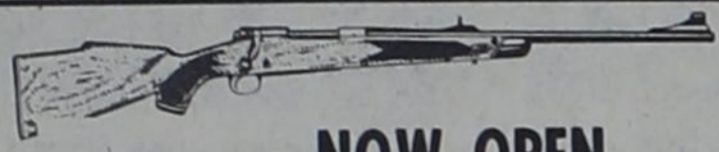

Everyone who takes part in Clean-Up for Fire Prevention activities qualifies to "Be a Hero".

Determined effort to make a place fire-safe is just as important as dramatically rescuing someone from a burning building, says the head of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

Picking up and properly disposing of accumulated trash won't get your name into the headlines," admits NFPA President Charles S. Morgan, "But it will help keep your home and neighborhood and entire community safe from spreading fire."

Why is clean-up important? Because "Fire feeds on rub-

bish," Morgan explains. A fire that starts small can quickly get out of hand when it's fed by such ordinary household combustibles as old clothing, curtains, bedding, mattresses, upholstered furniture, empty boxes, and papers.

Systematically go through especially the attic, basement, closets and garage, the NFPA President suggests. Then discard everything you don't really need and use.

"Be a Hero," and remember not to let sentiment get in the way of a good, thorough Clean-Up job.

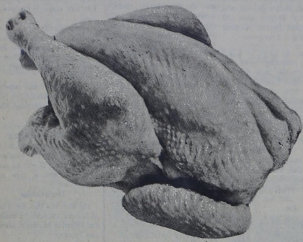
