CITY VOTERS APPROVE PAVING PROJECT

55 CITY BLOCKS TO BE PAVED, CURB, GUTTER

The bond election called Saturday, July 8, in Wheeler for the issuance of \$300,000 in bonds was approved by 156 of the voters casting their ballots. Of

the 271 voting in the election, only 115 voted against the issue.

The project approved by the voters calls for the paving of approximately 55 blocks in Wheeler. Most of these streets are presently dirt streets which are heavily traveled or require a lot of maintenance. A portion of Reynolds and one block of Eleventh are in the project are covered with badly deteriorated paving. The project will open a number of lots for the building of new homes.

A lot of paper work and townhall meetings are necessary in the months to come before the citizens see the ground broken by the paving contractors.

The voters went to the polls Wednesday, December 4, 1976, and approved a \$300,000 bond election for the paving of 84 blocks. The work on paving began the latter part of May, 1969.

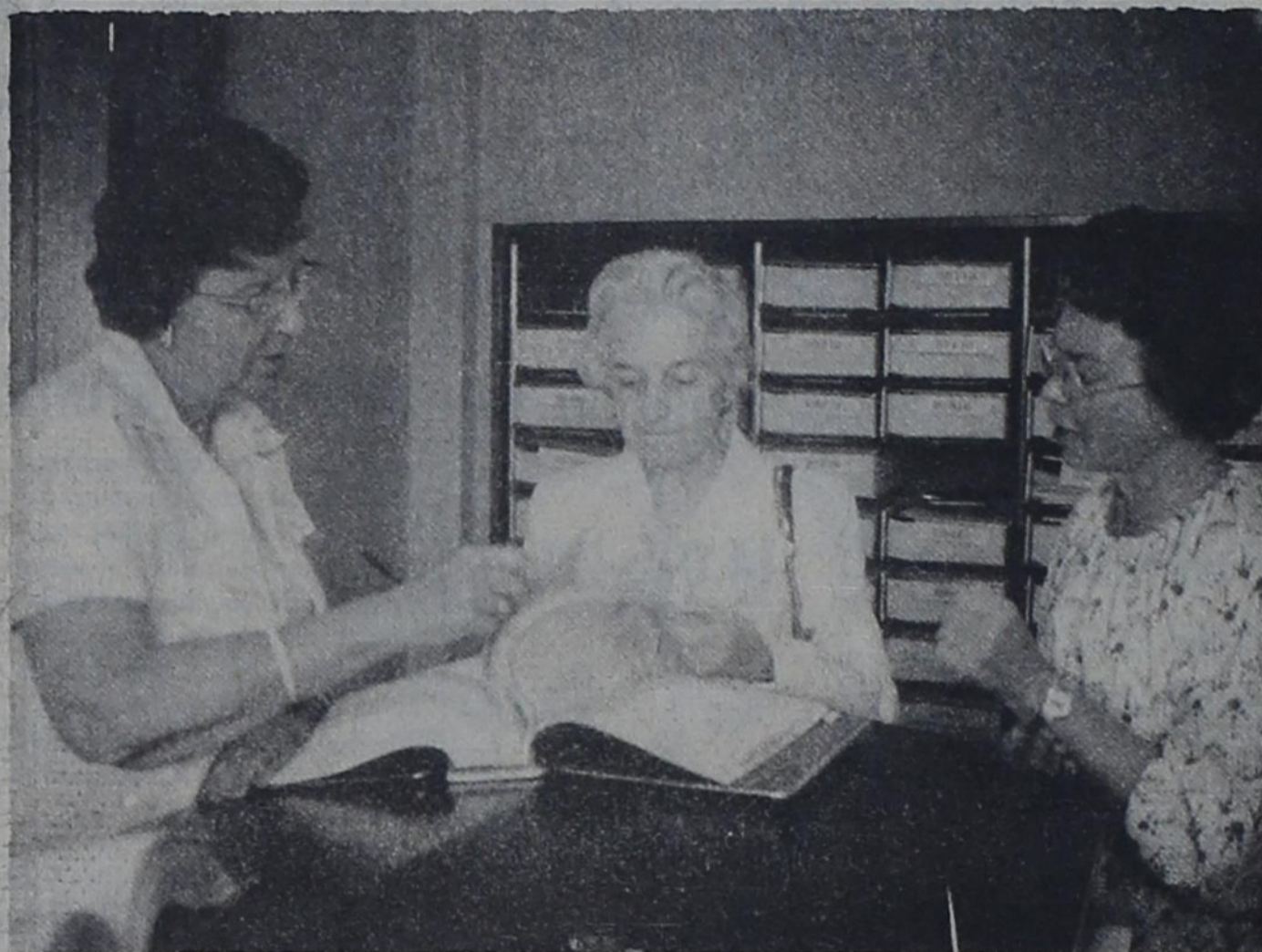

LEARN NOT TO BURN

AVOID LEARNING ABOUT FIRE BY ACCIDENT THIS SUMMER

Plan for fire safety as carefully as you plan for Summer fun. This reminder from the head of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) comes at the start of the season traditionally filled with cook-outs and camp-outs, along with rain-outs (caused by electrical storms which can be dangerous) and konk-outs of such vital equipment as outdoor motors.

The "out" most to be avoided, says NFPA President Charles S. Morgan, is the emergency situation where there's a fire to be put out.

"Whether you're boating, camping, caught in an electrical storm, using a power mower, or just char-broiling a steak in your own back yard, pay attention to fire and explosion prevention," he urges. When soaring thermometers send you to sea, take utmost care especially when fueling and starting motors, warns the NFPA President.

Before these operations get under way, strictly observe the

"No Smoking" rule and make sure the boat is completely "dead," with all engines, motors, fans and heating devices shut down. Wipe up any fuel spills at once. Ventilate the craft until all fuel vapor odors are gone before attempting to start the engine.

Stay Safe Afloat

On the water as on land, good housekeeping helps keep fire away, Morgan adds. Wipe up any leaking oil; don't accumulate old papers, clothes or trash; make sure the stove is of a type approved for marine use—never fueled by gasoline; and comply with U.S. Coast Guard regulations covering portable fire extinguishers which must be on board.

Landlubber activities have their own serious fire hazards too. NFPA files show that many a carefree camping trip has ended in sudden tragedy—people trapped inside burning sleeping bags and tents, open flames igniting clothing, portable stoves and campfire burning out of control, and many other accidents which probably could have

VIAL OF LIFE PROGRAM

Please consider the plight of the elderly citizen who lives alone—usually not by choice but because family is gone, friends have moved, resources are limited. In fact, anyone who lives alone shares the same concern. "What, if and when I need help, call for it and it arrives, I'm not able to communicate information vital to my survival?" The Vial of Life is designed to give assurance that the needed information is available when it is needed.

The program was first introduced by Deputy Sheriff Richard Marsh of Temperance, Michigan. The members of the

Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance Service and the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department are sponsoring such a program in Wheeler County, Texas.

The program consists of making available to all residents of Wheeler County a plastic vial which will contain an information sheet with all pertinent information. This information sheet will be completed by volunteers. It will then be placed in a plastic vial (furnished) and taped to the upper shelf of the refrigerator on the right hand side.

By standardizing the procedure and placement of the vials, any emergency personnel entering the home will know exactly where to look if information is needed.

We would like the opportunity to speak to any group interested in obtaining this service. Also, any individual may take part by calling 826-5961, the County Judge's Office, and leaving their name and the most convenient time and date to contact them. Any organization can obtain speakers to discuss the program by calling the same number and informing us of the time and date a speaker is needed.

Commissioners County Meet

The Wheeler County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday, July 10. Business included the purchase of a loader and the hiring of an appraisal service. Two special meetings on the budget were scheduled.

Two bids were received for the purchase of a loader for Precinct 1. The low bid of \$38,566 was accepted; this bid was submitted by Plains Machinery of Amarillo. The second bid was submitted by West Texas Equipment in the amount of \$45,875.

The commissioners agreed to pay the expenses for one fireman from Shamrock to attend Fire School. The school will be July 24 through 28 at College Station. The cost of the week-long school will be \$425.

The budget for the year was approved with revisions to be made at a special meeting July

24. The fiscal year for the county is October 1 through September of the following year. The budget hearing will be July 24 with August 10 being the date for adoption.

Pritchard and Abbott of Ft. Worth were hired by the commissioners for their appraisal services in the county oil and gas fields. The contract is for a two year period at 52%.

The resignation of Peggy Rose effective July 31 was accepted. Mrs. Rose is the County Extension Agent's secretary.

The starting salary for the extension agents' secretary was raised to \$450 upon recommendation by the two agents, a raise would be given within six months.

"Waterproofing compounds used on cotton sleeping bags and tents can make these items extremely flammable," according to the NFPA President. "Often made from a paraffin wax, these rainproof finishes can turn a sleeping bag or a tent into a gigantic blazing 'candle' in only a minute or two. There simply is not time for escape.

"Try to use camping equipment made of flame retardant materials. Any increased cost is well worth the price in terms of life safety in case of fire.

"Practice common sense in using other gear and in setting up camp," Morgan adds. Locate the sleeping area well away from fires used for cooking and warmth. Allow only flashlights inside the tent—never candles or portable lighting devices which burn with an open flame.

Beware of Lightning

Also important is knowing what to do if caught in an electrical storm—most common during the warm-weather months—whether on land or water.

Outdoors, leave hilltops and open spaces such as golf courses, beaches and fields; avoid standing under isolated trees or next to wire fences. If swimming, leave the water as soon as a storm starts your way. Indoors, if the building is not lightning-protected, avoid contact with metallic heating and plumbing fixtures, the telephone, and metal-encased electrical appliances.

"Seek shelter from an electrical storm in a building equipped with lightning rods, in an enclosed car, or any good-sized structure," Morgan suggests. "If caught outdoors, get into a low area—a ditch or cave—or thick wood. Whatever you do, don't let the tallest thing around be you."

Closer to home, even the friendly barbecue can be dangerous. Worst accidents are likely to happen when the backyard chef "fresheens" a going fire with kerosene or one of the liquids sold as aids to starting a charcoal fire. The "Backlash" when these liquids hit a live coal can instantly envelop in flames the arms and face of anyone nearby.

Correction

Okra recipe received from extension service had omitted —2 cups vinegar.

PICKLED OKRA

Fresh okra
1/2 cup water
1 tablespoon salt
1 teaspoon dill seeds for each pint jar
1 hot red pepper
1 hot green pepper
2 cloves garlic
2 cups vinegar

Place one-half teaspoon dill seeds in bottom of each sterilized jar. Wash okra and pack as tightly as possible in jars being careful not to bruise. Add one-half teaspoon dill seed, red and green peppers and garlic. Bring vinegar, water and salt to a boil and pour this hot mixture over the okra. Seal the jars and allow to stand two weeks. Serve icy cold. Makes approximately four pints.

PROCESSING

Process sealed jars of okra from either recipe for five minutes in boiling water bath while hot—immediately after putting it in the jar.

Processing destroys any bacteria, yeasts or molds which occur in the air and, therefore, can easily contaminate food in transfer from the kettle to the jar and cause spoilage.
