The very versatile group plays anything from the top country songs to the latest disco hits. They also play beautiful Spanish songs and old standards that people always enjoy.

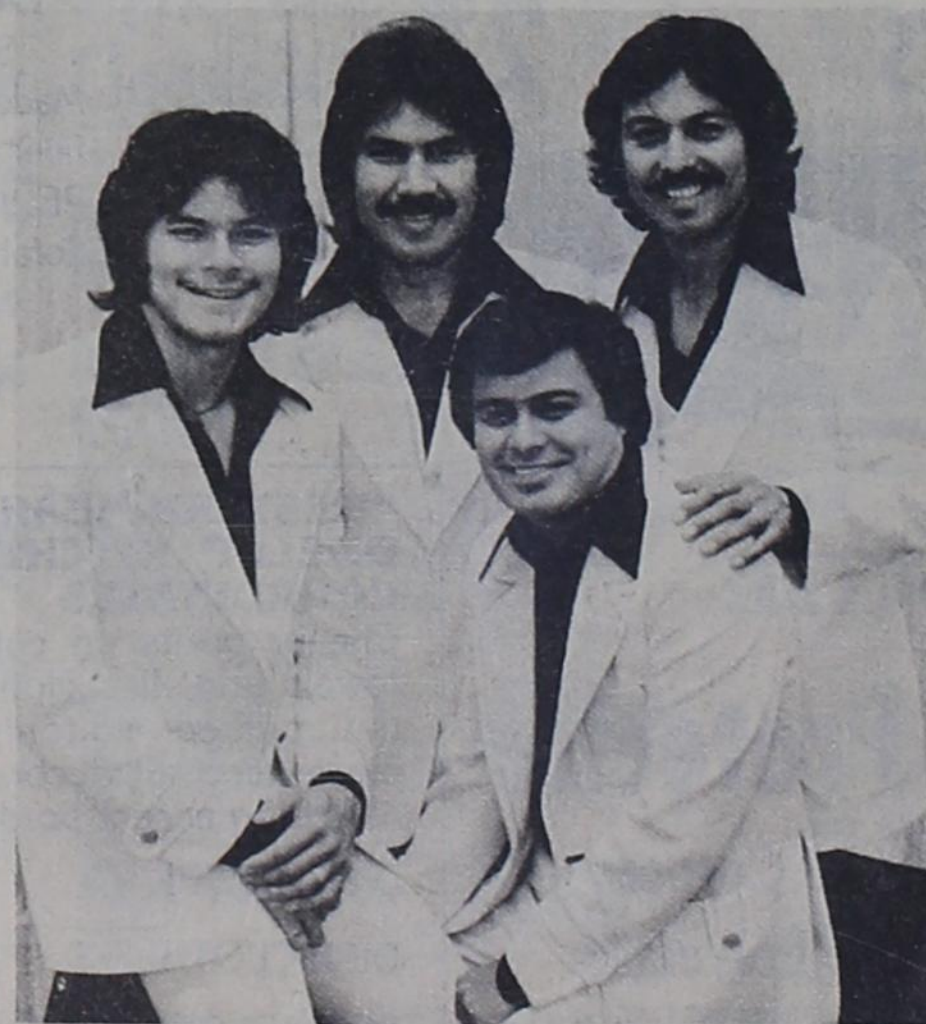
The Motifs consist of three brothers, Phillip, Jimmy and Albert Velasquez plus Curt Balch on bass.

Revenues Received From Sales Tax

AUSTIN—State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that his office has mailed checks totaling \$13.8 million to 898 Texas cities as their May share of the one percent city sales tax.

The May allocation brings collections for the year to \$135.5 million, a 6.1 percent increase over the same period last year.

The City of Houston received the largest check—\$34 million. City sales tax collections there are running 8 percent ahead of last year.

Dallas—where city sales tax collections for the year are up 1 percent—will get a check for \$1.5 million.

San Antonio will get a check for \$731,267, Austin will get \$458,667 and Fort Worth \$451,380.

The local-option city sales tax is collected by merchants along with the state sales tax and rebated monthly to the cities by the Comptroller's Office.

Clerk-Carrier Test Scheduled Tues.

Postmaster Hiram A. Whitener, Wheeler, Texas 79096 and Postmaster Dorothy Walker of Briscoe, Texas 79011 has announced that the Clerk-Carrier examination will be opened to the public May 30, 1978 at 8:00 a.m. and will close to the public June 5, 1978, at 5:00 p.m., and urged that all those interested apply to take the job-related test that can lead to Postal Service employment.

"We have not opened our register in quite some time and an examination of it has lead us to believe that it is out of date, and that many of the names on the register are people who have moved or for some reason are no longer available to take postal jobs," PM Hiram A. Whitener said.

"I do not want to give the impression we will be hiring great numbers of people in the coming months," the Postmaster said. "I anticipate approximately two vacancies will occur in the next two years that will be filled by hiring people from our updated job register. We need qualified people who will be willing to accept employment, and we want to offer people in the local community the chance to compete for these openings by signing up for the taking the exams."

The Postmaster said the Postal Service established the policy two years ago of extending eligibility indefinitely for those on the job register because little hiring was being done. "On October 8, 1978 those who have been on the job register for more than two years will lose their eligibility. They will have to reapply to compete for a standing on the new register," he said.

Postmaster Whitener and Walker explained those wishing to take the exam could be contacting Postmaster, in person, Post Office, Wheeler, Texas 79096 or Briscoe, Texas 79011 during the period May 30, 1978, 8:00 a.m. through June 5, 1978, 5:00 p.m.

Starting salaries in Wheeler for Clerk-Carrier, Part-Time Flexible, PS-5, is \$6.90 per hour with steps taking rate up to 8.19 per hour over an eight year period. Twelve steps with maximum time between steps of 52 weeks, minimum of 26 weeks.

Beginning salary for Full-Time Clerk-Carrier employees is \$13,916 per annum with steps to \$16,501 per annum over an eight year period. New hires are employed as part-time who are paid at these hourly rates. The hourly rates are just about equivalent to the annual salaries but do not include pay for 9 holidays that full-time employees get.

Starting Salaries for Clerk-Carrier, part-time Flexible, PS-3 in Briscoe, Texas is \$6.40 per hour with steps taking the rate up to \$7.50 per hour over an eight year period.

4-H JUNIOR RODEO DATES JUNE 2-3, AUGUST 11-12

The top Cowboy and Cowgirl in the 2 Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeos this summer will receive \$200 each. The rodeos, sponsored by the 4-H Clubs and 4-H Texans are scheduled for June 2-3 and August 11-12 in the Wheeler Riding Club Arena according to Don King, County Extension Agent.

Postal Packaging Guidelines Given

The Postmasters from Wheeler, Mobeetie, Briscoe, and Allison would like to remind postal customers in their communities that if the Postal Service's new packaging guidelines are followed they can virtually eliminate damage to their parcels.

These Postmasters report that checks at the bulk mail plants show that more than 80 percent of all articles damaged in the mails were improperly packaged.

While the regulations and guidelines adopted recently by the Postal Service are detailed, they boil down to several basic steps that can help assure safe delivery.

First, select a strong carton. Use a fiberboard box with the "burst-test" number printed on it. If the box says, for instance, 125 lbs. it can be used for mailing many types of merchandise weighing up to 20 lbs.

When a person is shipping dense or heavy materials, such as books, stronger boxes are required. For 10 lbs. of books the Postal Service recommends a box with a 175 lb. burst test.

The Postal Service suggests that wrapping paper not be used on cartons. If a wrapper is torn or lost in transit, the mailing address can disappear. Further, the paper adds nothing to the package's strength.

The use of masking and cellophane tapes for closing or sealing is prohibited. In transit they tend to peel off, and they have little strength. String is not recommended. If twine loosens, it can readily catch on processing machinery.

Instead, parcel customers are urged to use the pressure-sensitive, reinforced tapes. They are almost unbreakable.

When marking a package "Do Not Bend", it is required that the container have stiffeners which will protect it from being bent.

In using a second-hand box, it is important to mark out addresses that may have been printed on it along with extraneous numbers that could be confused with the Zip Codes.

A final suggestion: Enclose a return address card in the package so that it can be returned if the mailing label is damaged or lost.

Bausch & Lomb Science Award

Brenda Williams, Wheeler, Texas was presented the 1st Annual Bausch & Lomb Science Award at Wheeler High School. The Science Award—a handsome bronze medal—is presented each year to winners at more than 8,600 participating schools throughout the United States and Canada.

"The Bausch & Lomb Science Award is especially significant," according to Dan Stewart, Science Director who made the presentation, "because it recognizes the senior student at our school who has attained the highest scholastic standing in science subjects."

As winner of the Award, Brenda Williams is eligible to compete for one of several four-year Bausch & Lomb Science Scholarships at the University of Rochester, Rochester, N. Y. Scholarship winners are selected on merit, and stipends, based on need, could range up to \$4,500 per year. Surveys indicate that the Award has encouraged more than 30 percent of the winners to follow scientific careers.

piles" gasoline exposes his family and his possessions to the real danger of deadly explosion and fire, warns the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

In the face of gasoline shortages, many householders and motorists are hoarding fuel without thinking about the tragedies they could cause, says the international center of fire safety information.

Be alert to gasoline's danger signals, NFPA urges consumers. Any smell of gasoline in a storage room or automobile trunk is good evidence of a vapor leak in the container and should be taken care of immediately.

To store gasoline at home, it's best to use an approved safety can—never a glass jug, discarded bleach bottle or other make-

shift container. Keep the gasoline in a well-ventilated area where it can't be tipped or damaged accidentally, and keep it well out of the reach of small children. Never store it in the same room with hot water heating equipment, where a pilot light or sparking switch could set off an explosion of accumulated vapors. This means that home storage areas such as utility rooms and garages shouldn't be used for gasoline especially if heating equipment is located there.

Carrying extra gasoline in the trunk of the car also can create an explosive situation. Gasoline in the trunk of the car also can Gasoline vapors can filter from the trunk into the car's interior where the striking of a match or

an electrical system spark can set off a powerful explosion.

If spare gasoline must be carried on the road, use a metal or approved plastic can that is

absolutely vapor-tight, NFPA recommends. Approved safety cans, which should be used elsewhere, are designed to vent vapors which makes them unsuitable in an automobile. Instead,

use a container with perfect seals on both the cap of the fill opening and the pouring spout. Also, never fill the container completely—leave a little room for the gasoline to expand as it's warm-

ed by the heat of the day and of the car.
