## FARM EQUIPMENT SALE THURSDAY, APRIL 20

The Wheeler County Livestock Show Association will sponsor a farm equipment sale Thursday, April 20 at the Wheeler County Agricultural Center in Wheeler according to Don King, CEA. Proceeds from the sale will be used for improvements to the Agricultural Center and to pay expenses of the Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show.

The Association already has several pieces of equipment, including trucks, tractors and combines, tentatively consigned. This equipment is valued at \$5-\$60,000.

Other equipment is welcome in the sale. Anyone wishing to have equipment listed on the sale bill can call Don King at 826-5243 or 826-3249 in Wheeler no later than Monday, March 27. Consignments will be accepted after this date but will not appear on the sale bill.

The livestock Show Association will handle publicity and sale of the equipment. There will be a 5% commission charge and a 1% charge on equipment bought back by the consignor with a minimum commission or buy-back charge of \$2.50 per item. There will be a maximum buy-back charge of \$50 per item with \$150 per consignor.

## J. ALLEN NAMED ATHLETIC DIRECTOR, FOOTBALL COACH

"I am extremely happy to be coming to Wheeler and am anxious to get started in my job", were the words of Joe Allen when he learned that he had been

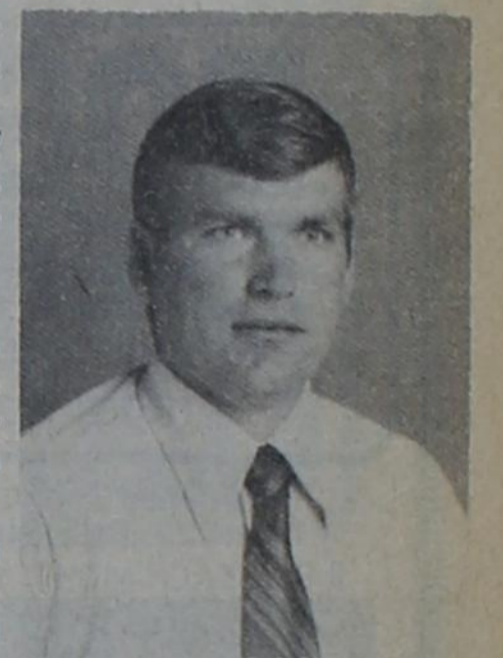
selected as the new athletic director and head football coach of Wheeler High School.

Allen is presently on the staff of Denton High School and was selected from more than 70 applicants to head up the Mustangs football fortunes in 1978.

The dual position became open with the resignation of Preston Smith last month to take a similar position with the Spearman Schools.

The 29 year old new head mentor of the Mustangs graduated from Meridian High School and attended Navarro Junior College two years where he played football and was captain and linebacker and made the Texas Junior College All-Conference team as a linebacker. Allen continued his education and football career at North Texas University where he was a linebacker and graduated in 1970 with a B.S. in PE and Industrial Arts. He got his Masters in Education at North Texas in 1972 and is presently doing work on his doctorate.

Coach Allen was the Junior Varsity head coach at Denton in 1977 and won the district with a 9-1 mark and has a 33-9-1 record

as a head coach in the Denton system.

As soon as school is out, Allen and his wife Lynda and their 4 year old son, Chris, plan to move to Wheeler but Allen will be making trips in the interim to Wheeler to help guide the off season program as the Mustangs prepare to defend their state championship.

In addition to his football duties at Denton, Allen has assisted with the track program the past two years and is currently coaching the weight events and has one of the top discus throwers in the state.

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

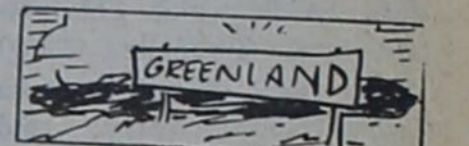

### BOOK REVIEW

"Stranger's Forest", by Pamela Hill is about Primrose Tebb, a pretty young Scots girl who would someday inherit a great deal of land, and Andrew Farquharson, a nomadic, handsome young Scotsman who dreamed of growing a mighty forest on that land—a forest sprung from the "Eye of Polyphemus", a precious seed given to him during his travels in the wilds of Canada. There was one sure way for Andrew to realize his dream and that was to make the twelve-year-old Primrose his child bride—an alliance still permitted in 18th-century Scotland. This tale of love, blackmail, and life-smashing ambition is a triumph of story-telling from a master of gothic romance. In the foreground of "A Vein of Riches", by John Knowles, are the Catherwoods of the Castle—first Clarkson, who has risen upward, thanks to the boom, to a point where he cannot even imagine a life without money or power; then his wife, Minnie, frail-seeming, neurotic, in search of salvation, with a fatalistic conviction that the flow of riches, lavished upon them beyond their deserts, will one day abruptly cease; and, finally, their only child, the boy Lyle, who grows up under the shadow of his powerful father, wonder how he can every get free to live in which he will be taken seriously, no longer by "that boy" but a man in his own right.

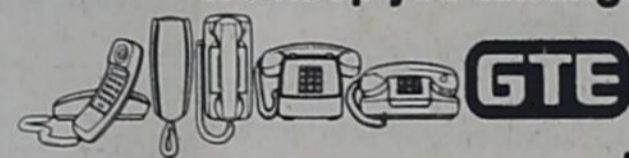

### FREE BRUCELLOSIS VACCINATION

The following information comes from Dr. James Armstrong, Extension Veterinarian: Approval has been made to initiate a Fee-Basic Vaccination Program in the State of Texas. This is a voluntary program and means that a livestock producer can request to have his heifer calves vaccinated with Strain-19 brucellosis vaccine free of charge. Approximately \$450,000 has been allocated for the program for use in fiscal year 1978, so all money must be obligated by August 31, 1978. This Fee-Basis Agreement does not include vaccinating calves at livestock markets.

How can one get their calves vaccinated free?

Simply by calling your local large animal veterinarian. The accredited veterinarians who have arranged to participate in the program will be able to obtain the brucellosis vaccine free and will be reimbursed on completing a vaccination chart. Only eligible female calves will be vaccinated and will be identified by an ear tag and tattoo. Female calves of dairy breeds from 2 through 6 months and beef breeds 2 through 10 months are considered eligible. The completion of administering the vaccine, tattoo, ear tag, and properly filling out and submitting the vaccination forms makes the calf officially vaccinated. The owner of the calves will only have to schedule a time with his veterinarian and confine the calves for vaccination.

How will the owner benefit from a calfhood vaccination program?

1. Properly immunized heifers will be more resistant to the organism causing brucellosis. Even though none of the cattle in the herd are infected, the risk of infection may exist from neighboring herds or purchased non-reactors incubating the disease.

2. Officially vaccinated calves should sell for higher prices if purchased for replacements. Greater resistance to the infection makes them more valuable as replacements if moved to higher risk areas.

3. The more animals that are vaccinated, the quicker the spread of the disease can be controlled. Eventually, the threat of quarantine is minimized.

Producers interested in this voluntary program should contact their veterinarian early, since the money allocated is limited. This is a program many Texas livestock producers have desired. The protection afforded from properly immunized calves

should be of value in your herd health programs.

### Landscaping—A Good Investment

If you could make a profitable long-term investment for your home, would you?

"With proper landscaping, you can realize a return of five to six times your original investment within 10 years."

As a guide, at least 10 percent of the total cost of the home and lot should be allowed for landscaping.

The landscape should be de-

signed to handle each family member's recreational needs. But keeping patterns simple will minimize maintenance while providing the best possible enjoyment for the family.

Landscaping also provides other practical uses. Trees, shrubs or trellised vines can be used to screen work areas from public view. While fences or shrubs give a feeling of privacy, they can also be used to accomplish a family atmosphere or unity when connected or tied in with the den or family room.

Whether a professional landscape architect lays the plans for your future investment or you do the basics yourself, be sure to obtain the needed information to make wise decisions. Excellent

ideas on planning and planting can be found in gardening and home landscaping books at your local library or book store.

### RABIES STILL PERSIST IN TEXAS

Rabies, a malady that has persisted for years, continues to rear its ugly head in Texas. Although most cases are found in wild animals, some domestic animals also continue to suffer from the affliction.

According to data compiled by the Texas Department of Health, there were 382 confirmed cases of rabies in 103 of the state's 254 counties in 1977. Most cases were reported in skunks, 254; followed by bats, 46; and dogs, 45. The remainder of the cases were categorized as cats, 13; bovines (cattle), 11; and equines (horses), 5.

The highest number of positive rabies cases were recorded in Webb County with 38, all in dogs. DeWitt County had 30, rabies causes, 28 of these in skunks. Other leading counties were Fort Bend, 18 cases; Denton, 17; Callahan and Wichita, 12 and Bexar and Wharton, 11.

Although there is little that can be done to reduce rabies cases in wild animals, pets such as cats

and dogs should be vaccinated annually.

A veterinarian should be contacted for advice on vaccinating other farm animals if rabies are

diagnosed in such wild animals as skunks or coyotes. Vaccines are available for protecting cattle, horses and other animals from rabies if the need exists.

## LEARN NOT TO BURN

Ken Daughtry, Fire Marshal

### Summer Safety

No recipe for a successful cookout at no extra cost:

Blend good fire safety habits into preparations for each hot dish. Apply same to ready-to-grill food such as hot dogs and hamburgers.

The result should be a safe, happy barbecue for everyone. These hints for the backyard chef and guests come from the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the nation's center of information on fire safety indoors and out.

"Burn casualties among both cooks and diners are frequent and sometimes serious," according to NFPA President Charles S. Morgan.

The worst accidents are likely to happen, NFPA studies show, when the backyard chef "freshens" and already-started fire with any of the liquids sold as aids to starting a charcoal fire. The moment one of these liquids hits a live coal, there's a woosh of flame which can envelop the arms and face of anyone nearby in searing, blistering fire.

Play it safe, Mr. Morgan urges, by following these rules: Use with restraint any starting liquids you apply to the charcoal before the fire is started....use only liquids made for this purpose—never gasoline, paint

thinners, alcohol or similar liquids....Never add any kind of a flammable liquid to an already-burning fire...and keep the container holding the starter far removed from the fire.

Better still, use one of the solid starters—chemicals in cake form—which reduce the chance of flare-up.

Keep youngsters at a safe distance too, Mr. Morgan adds.

### Mow With Care

When you unlimber that power lawn mower this spring, don't forget that gasoline can be powerfully dangerous.

This word of caution comes from the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) with the reminder that it takes only a tiny flame or spark to ignite gasoline's flammable vapors.

Here are some guidelines form NFPS for safe power mowing:

1. Do all refueling outdoors where dangerous gasoline vapors can't accumulate.
  2. When refueling, observe the "No Smoking" rule without exception and keep away from all other possible ignition sources.
  3. Wipe up any spilled fuel before starting the motor.
  4. Store gasoline in a tight-closing metal can—never in an easily-broken glass container.

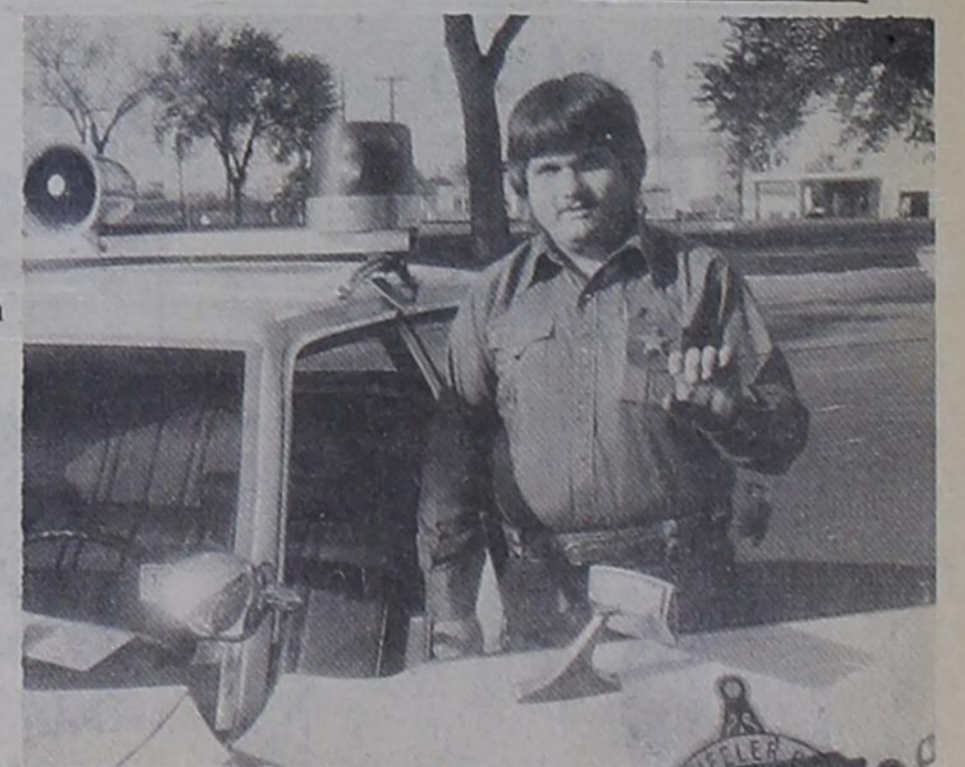
