Hooker House Burns Near Mobeetie Saturday

Although firetrucks responded from Mobeetie, Wheeler, Briscoe and Allison, they were unable to save the home of Mrs. Paulene Hooker Saturday night, four miles west on highway 152 and one mile south of Mobeetie.

The fire alarm was sounded about 9:15, however, by the time the fire fighters reached the scene, the house was engulfed in flames. No one was home at the time of the fire as Mrs. Hooker has been caring for her invalid mother, Mrs. Merra Johnson, who lives in Mobeetie for some five months. One of her daughter's and family, Mr. and Mrs. Gene D. Harrison, Cindy and Leslie, have been living there since the electric power failure at their home.

The house and contents, plus a stock trailer were completely demolished by the fire.

The cause of the fire is unknown, but there is speculation that a faulty hot water heater may have started the fire.

The fire was reported by an unknown gentleman who was driving on high 152.

CONTRACT LET FOR WHEELER GYMNASIUM & SHELTER

The Board of Trustees of the Wheeler ISD met in a special session Monday, February 27th. The board awarded the contract for the new educational facility to S. & T. Construction Company of Altus, Oklahoma for a bid of \$92,000. The all brick building will feature a 50 x 90 basement to be used as a storm shelter and future class rooms, a regulation 50 x 90 gym playing floor with individual spectator seating. Dressing rooms and offices will be located on the east and west side of the new structure. Lighting will consist of 30 mercury vapor lamps. The new facility will have tuogonal finish in dressing rooms, acoustical ceilings in the foyer and dressing area and carpeted entrances. Completion date is scheduled for December 1978.

Entertainment was provided by Gary Dean and his band from Arnett, Oklahoma.

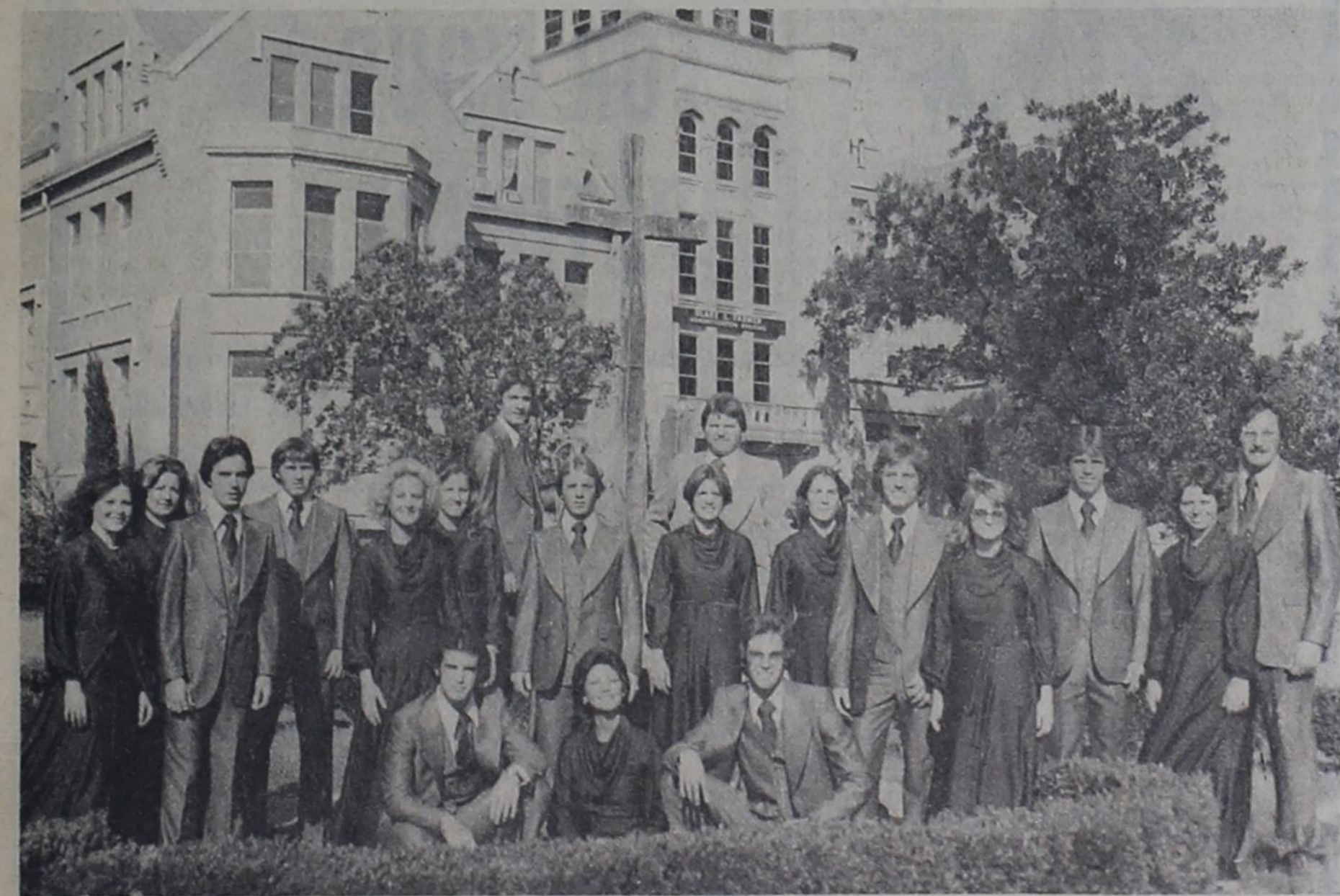

Credit Cards

Consumers can cut credit-card costs and maximize spending power by managing credit-card use in three specific ways.

Efficient credit-card use depends on payment methods, date of purchases and number of different cards used.

Payment Methods
When possible, always pay the full amount due rather than the minimum this will mean no finance charges added to the bill.

Also, consumers can extend their own credit by waiting to pay a bill until just before the due date but be sure to allow enough time for the post office to deliver the payment and for the company to process it.

Generally, consumers have 20-30 days after the closing date to pay a bill.

Date of Purchases
Plan purchases according to the closing date on an account.

A consumer can extend the time between purchase and payment by making purchases just

after the closing date.
Also, if it will be a "must" to pay a finance charge computed under the average daily balance method, try to plan purchases to lessen the number of days any purchases are on account.

Number of Different Cards Used
Lumping purchases onto one card can save money on postage and make record-keeping easier.

Also, if a card holder has a higher credit limit on one account for example, \$800, it is more economical to charge all purchases on that account.

Since most credit cards have a breakpoint of \$500 at which interest becomes lower, any amount over the \$500 would be charged a lower rate of interest than it would be if the total \$800 worth of purchases were spread among several cards.

"The Best from Fantasy and Science Fiction" was edited by Edward L. Ferman. It includes the best short stories and novels published in the magazine by that same title over the past four years, written by the crime de la crime of Science Fiction writers, among them: Robert Black, Joanna Russ, James Tiptree, Jr., and Frederik Pohl. "Black Night, White Snow: Russia's Revolutions 1905-1917" was written by Harrison E. Salisbury. Russia at the turn of the century was a giant lumbering paradox; a feudal autocracy whose industrial growth was outpacing the world; a rigid, ancient culture shaken to its roots by unprecedented intellectual ferment. It was the land of Tolstoy and Dostoyevsky, of newly liberated serfs, middle-class revolutionaries, enlightened millionaires, and reactionary nobles, and perched on the pinnacle of absolute power were the Czar and Czarine, Nichols and Alexandra—two simple, superstitions, remarkably naive people totally unprepared for the uphearsal that would soon sweep their empire from the earth.

Landscape Care & Maintenance

Mr. Everett Janne, Landscape Horticulturalist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be in Wheeler County Wednesday, March 15 for a clinic on Landscape Care and Maintenance. The clinic is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. in the Wheeler School Auditorium.

Mr. Janne will give information on the care of lawns and ornamental plants. He will also be available to answer your questions.

Lice Infestations

Lice cost U.S. cattlemen more than \$50 million annually, so it's important to control them, says an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Carl D. Patrick of Amarillo notes that lice begin to reproduce rapidly with the onset of cool weather, so peak populations on cattle occur in late winter and

early spring. Uncontrolled lice can soon infest a whole herd because with cold weather, cattle tend to bunch up more so that the pests can move easily from one animal to another. Heavy hair coats on animals during cold weather also afford protection for the parasites and allow for increased reproduction.

Both types of lice—bloodsucking and biting-infest cattle. Sucking lice pierce the animal's skin and suck blood while biting lice feed on particles of hair, scale, scab and skin exudation, explains the entomologist.

Lice infestations irritate animals, causing itching, scratching, and rubbing on fences or anything else available. This produces denuded areas, bruises and lacerations on the affected animal. Heavily infested animals will have an unthrifty appearance and will suffer weight reduction, decreased milk production, an-

emia or even death. Lice infested animals may also be more subject to infectious diseases. Heavy lice infestations often stunt calves.

Spraying or dipping infested animals with the proper insecticide is the most effective means of controlling lice, says Patrick. However, properly placed and maintained dust bags prior to lice buildup so that cattle can become accustomed to using the bags. A dust bag station should serve about 30 head. Depending on cattle size, place the bags so that they hang 18-24 inches above the ground. Force-use of dust bags, where they are placed so that cattle must pass under them to get feed or water, begin to control lice sooner than those used free-choice. By allowing a two-to-three week adjustment period, free choice bags can be about as effective as forced-use types.

In a spraying or dipping program an animal must receive a thorough soaking in each or two applications 14-18 days apart to effectively control lice, contends Patrick. The second spray or dip will kill any lice hatching from eggs that were laid prior to the first spraying. When spraying, use a high pressure (250 pounds

per square inch) and thoroughly wet animals to the skin.

For a list of effective insecticides for controlling lice, the entomologist suggests that cattlemen obtain a copy of "Suggestions for Controlling External Parasites on Livestock and Poultry" available at any county Extension office.

Check the label on the insecticide container and pay particular attention to warnings, restrictions and waiting periods, especially if some of the cattle are being prepared for slaughter, cautions Patrick.

Special Activities Highlight Animal AG Conference

The annual Texas Animal Agriculture Conference will be held at the Rudder Center on the Texas A&M University campus, April 3-4, and several additional features have been added this year.

The conference attracts large numbers of livestock industry groups to A&M for its short courses dealing with beef cattle, dairy cattle, horses and swine, as well as programs on range, pastures and forage production.

The various short courses will be keyed to increasing producer

profits, with a variety of subjects included in the individual short courses.

Held in conjunction with the conference will be the dedication of the new Robert J. Kleberg Animal and Food Sciences Center at 4 p.m., April 3 at A&M's West Campus. The annual Agricultural Convocation of A&M's College of Agriculture will follow at 8 p.m. that evening.

Details on each of the short courses to be conducted during the conference are available at the county Extension office, contact me if you are interested.

WALLEYE SEASON TO OPEN

The cold and snow is putting the stopper to most Panhandle and South Plains anglers, but the walleye fishermen are warming up as the walleye begin to move onto their spawning beds.

Although walleye are caught by persons fishing for native species such as bass and channel catfish, special techniques will aid in catching the popular import. Walleye prefer water depths of 15 to 40 feet during the daytime hours. They are found along the bottom over boulders, reefs, and rubble in the more open sections of large reservoirs such as Lake Meredith, Fort Phantom Hill, J. B. Thomas, and San Angelo in northwest Texas and in some 30 other Texas reservoirs.

Most successful walleye anglers fish by slowly trolling lures or bait over such spots as near the bottom as possible. Most use minnow or shad imitations, jigs or jugs baited with a live minnow or worm.

When a walleye is caught, anchor the boat and cast of the location of the strike working the bait in slow, short jerks keeping the bait on the bottom. Walleye move into shallow

water to feed during the darker hours or on cloudy days. Lake Meredith anglers have good success fishing in shallow water during the spawning runs beginning in February and continuing through April. Spawning sites include large areas of gravel, rocks or boulders in shallow water, the riprap along dams, and tributary rivers and streams.

The daily bag limit of five walleye and possession limit of ten will allow the angler plenty of fish for the frying pan. There is no size limitation on the walleye.

Walleye have a firm, flaky, white flesh and many think that walleye have a flavor and texture superior to most Texas native fish. The walleye's shape and size up to ten pounds makes them easy to fillet which adds to the list of possible recipes.

Seafood recipes can be obtained by writing the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, Texas 78744.

The P&WD is planning to stock more northwest Texas lakes with walleye this year including Mackenzie, 180,000; Stamford, 1 million; Buffalo Springs, 1,125,000.

With the over-population of rough fish in most Texas reservoirs, a better utilization of the resource has been the introduction of walleye which prefer shad for food. Most native Texas species of fish are not large enough to feed upon the gizzard shad and none of the large Texas predatory fish occupy the open expanse of water where the shad are found.

With the warm climate and long growing season of Texas, walleye tend to grow faster than in more northern areas. The present state record walleye from Lake Meredith, weighed 10 pounds and four ounces with even larger fish caught by P&WD fishery personnel during the survey work done annually on the lake.

In the Panhandle and South Plains, walleye grow to 14 inches and weight one pound in their first year. After reaching maturity, the females surpass the males in length and weight and a mature female walleye may spawn as many as 80,000 eggs each spring.

More information about walleye fishing is available from the P&WD offices with updated catch reports furnished by most bait and sporting goods dealers at the lakes.

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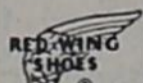

Area Farmers Form Direct Marketing Units

Wheeler Texas (FFC)—Farmers in a 15 county area of the Eastern Texas Panhandle are participating in a program featuring the production of grain on contract for specific markets.

Project Coordinators for the initial project in the local area are Virgil Simmons and Kenneth Killingsworth.

Simmons has charge of a 73 acre seed increase project east of Wheeler while Killingsworth, manager of the Kelton Gin is Seed Placement Agent for the Area.

Wheeler County is a part of the Eastern Panhandle unit of the new national organization, U.S. Food & Fiber Producers Assn. Officers and directors of the area unit as well as the location of a regional office will be announced this month.

Over 1,000 acres were planted under the direct marketing contracts last fall by growers in Collingsworth and Wheeler Counties in 40 to 80 acre units. Field days are being scheduled for the first week of May in both areas.

While marketing and management services are the prime objective, a wide variety of services will be made available to Association subscribers over a period of the next few months. Project will be supervised by five regional offices, each staffed independently with specialists trained to administer services created specifically for each individual area.

The first phase of operation is geared to serve 20 charter members in each of the primary 100 county target area. Costs of services are generally computed on a per acre basis and vary in proportion to the level of services subscribed to by each user.

The basis of the innovative new organization is built around what is termed "the designated use marketing program" which deals with the direct marketing of specific varieties of crops to designated users with identity preserved. Research has been under way on the project since 1962. Production of existing crops such as wheat, oats, rye, barley, corn, milo, and certain oil seed crops are included along with new crops like Triticale, Fobabean with some, even Urilines, contemplated within the next four years.

Income from Association subscribers will be utilized in a number of ways including a broad-scale comprehensive research and development segment concentrating on the development and acquisition of new varieties, the utilization of the same, along with new cultural practice methods and market development. The main economic principle involved is built around that of vertical coordination where a quality control may be achieved from "gene to consumer".

Each area will have a functioning unit comprised of President, Vice President and Secretary served by the State Office of each region in volved. While the organization will have a Washington office to provide a liaison and information flow and knowledge transfer to members of Congress, its key activities will

be to spawn new innovative marketing and management techniques to support the production principle of contract production of specific varieties under designated use contracts.

A key segment of the initial operating structure includes the organization and affiliation of a number of feedlots coordinated through a sister organization termed the U. S. Rationale Feeders Association. The Association is being structured to provide research and counsel to livestock and poultry feeders utilizing the new food and feed grain 'triticale' in a wide variety of rations.

Research deals in specific use of various varieties, the proper way of processing for each type of livestock or poultry, and specific ration formulation keying on lease cost formulation and blends whereby the higher quality and quantity of protein in triticale can be utilized to its optimum, which in a number of rations have been found to be up to the 50% level.

While the new rye/wheat cross is receiving maximum attention, a number of high yielding utility wheats from the world's wheat collection are under scrutiny for feed uses as well as higher protein bread wheats that may be raised with identity preserved and marketed directly to America's baking industry, through cooperating mills and elevators involved in the direct marketing chain.

It is the firm belief of the staff and management of the U.S. Food & Fiber Producers Association as well as of the supporting services and organizational group that have had a part in crafting this new concept, that the total result of this new realignment will be a stronger, more profitable, agricultural segment in the regions served.

Direct contact with the individual cooperating subscriber will be through a "Producer Service Agency" office in each county, which will be staffed by trained personnel and tied directly into the state office for utilization of the wide variety of services involved. The producer field staff will be comprised of at least one "Project Coordinator" per county who will be specially trained to provide counsel in the realm of agronomy and information relating to the various management tools provided through the county producer service office.

A program explaining the operation of U. S. Food and Fiber Association 1978-79 contract marketing program and producer association services will be held at the Wheeler Production Credit Assn. Meeting room Monday Eve starting at 7:00 P.M. March 6 in Wheeler. All involved in the production, processing, financing, transportation or marketing of food and fiber products are invited to attend.

Energy Seminar Set In Amarillo

Ways that Panhandle residents can make wise use of precious energy--from cooking, heating and lighting homes to the use of landscaping to conserve fuel supplies will be explored Thursday, March 9, in a one-day seminar at the Hilton Inn there.

The free seminar, "Living in an Energy-Conscious World," begins at 9 a.m. and concludes at 3:30 p.m. It is sponsored by the Panhandle Economic Program (PEP) of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. PEP is a citizen self-help organization designed to assist families in 20 Panhandle counties to have a better way of life in all phases of economics, explained Paul Gross, Extension district agent for agriculture, who is PEP coordinator.

The background for the day-long program will be set by Max Sherman, president of West Texas State University, and Mrs. Sue Farris, Extension district agent for home economics, who is advisor to the PEP task force on energy.

Sherman will review the energy situation and recent state legislation on energy. Mrs. Farris will review the task force activities.

The effects of insulation as practical energy-and money-saving method will be explained by Jim Simms and Jerry Martindale, electrical and insulation contractors. The proper use of caulking, weather stripping and window treatments will be discussed by Mrs. Patricia Seaman, Extension housing specialist at Texas A&M University.

Living in an energy conscious world will be discussed by a panel composed of Mrs. Lynn (Bourland) White, Extension home economics specialist, Texas A&M; county Extension home economics agents Mrs. Alby Peters of Moore and Mrs. Elaine Houston of Gray; Betsy Culp, Extension clothing specialist, Amarillo; and Mrs. Seaman.

Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District Directors Clarence Zybach and Darville Atherton, accompanied by Soil Conservation Service District Conservationist Lavon Williams, recently attended the semi-annual meeting of the Panhandle Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts in Amarillo. The meeting was highlighted by a slide presentation on outdoor education by Bill Hill, Principal of Puckett Elementary School and a slide presentation on Section 208 deals with non-point source pollution of lakes and streams. 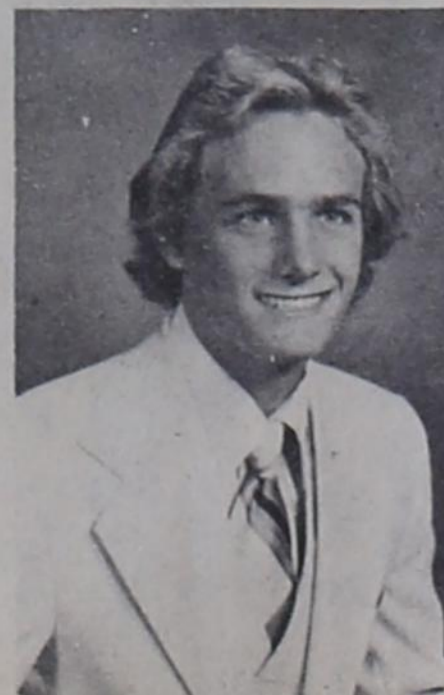

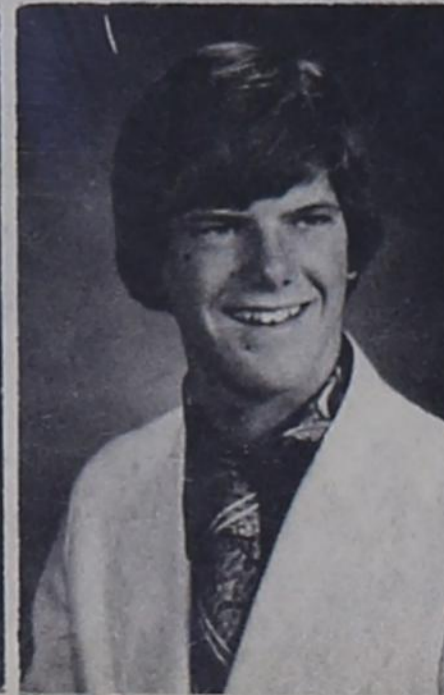
