Deputy Sheriffs Art Taylor and Jim Dewees captured two escapees from the Granite Reformatory at Granite, Oklahoma Monday afternoon about 5 P.M. in a wheatfield two miles southeast of Sweetwater, Oklahoma. **Local Health Group Activities**

Frank Nelson, a resident of Amarillo, is currently serving as President of the 30-member Governing Body of the Panhandle Health Systems Agency (PHSA). The PHSA is responsible for health planning throughout the Texas Panhandle.

The Panhandle Health Systems Agency is working hard to maintain and further develop quality health care at reasonable costs for all residents of the 25 northern Panhandle counties.

The major task now before the PHSA is the development and approval of a Health systems Plan (HSP) and an Annual Implementation Plan (AIP).

The HSP is a broad planning document which specifies long-range goals and objectives for the Panhandle area. These goals and objectives relate to the health status of area residents and the health care delivery system designed to serve them.

"The AIP is a more focused operational document which outlines high priority goals, objectives, and recommended actions that can realistically be accomplished within one year," Nelson stated.

In order to meet the challenge of better health planning, five separate task forces drawing on local and regional expertise have been working on problems related to health education and information, preventive services, chronic and degenerative conditions, maternal and infant health, and mental health. Task force reports and recommended actions will be completed by early February.

Public comment on the HSP and AIP is encouraged. Drafts of the plans can be obtained during the second week in February from the PHSA, P.O. Box 9257, Amarillo, Texas 79105, or from Governing body members.

A public meeting is being scheduled for March 9th in which the plans will be reviewed and public comments received. It is hoped that many residents of the Panhandle will find time to participate in this health planning process.



Appliance Consumer News

Before replacing a major appliance that needs repair, consider its projected life expectancy--repairs may cost less.

Life-span estimations for selected household appliances:

Appliance	New	Used
Freezer	20 years	9 years
Refrigerator	15 years	7 years
Gas Range	13 years	7 years
Electric Range	12 years	6 years
Dishwasher	11 years	7 years
Washer	11 years	5 years
Electric Dryer	14 years	5 years

These figures indicate how long, on the average, households keep appliances.

The data does not show long a given appliance model will last.

It provides a general basis for estimating the service life expectancy of major home appliances.

**CLOTHES DRYER BUYING**

When buying a clothes dryer, take time to consider the various features offered--which ones are desirable, which ones will be used and which ones fit in the budget.

Clearance sales on clothes dryers during the next few weeks offer savings as retailers try to make room for newer models.

Before shopping these sales, consult consumer buying guides for a description of various features and read ads closely.

Then consider whether a gas or electric model is preferred.

A gas model initially costs about \$30 more than an electric one, but the gas model is more economical to operate--at least at present fuel rates.

However, consumers should weigh fuel costs now against fuel costs of the future.

Today, with present fuel costs, gas models are more economical to operate than electric models but in the future, they might not be.

Next, take time to consider which features are desirable and which ones will be used.

More expensive models have features such as lights, illuminated control panels, door windows and end-of-cycle alarms.

Examine dryer controls closely the simplest kind of control is the electric timer in combination with a no-heat and single temperature heat setting. The user estimates the amount of time needed to dry the load and the appliance automatically shuts off when the time is up.

Thermostat and timer controls allow the user to select both time and temperature.

Automatic-type control mechanisms monitor the temperatures inside the dryer and automatically shut off the dryer when the clothes are dry. This system eliminates the guess work of the manual timer system.

Locate the lint trap on the dryer. It must be cleaned every time the dryer is used so determine if it will be easy to use.

Some filters are fixed and the user pulls the lint out, in others, the filter is removable.

Finally, be sure to compare the warranties and service available on each model. Are parts and labor covered and for how long? Who will service and repair the dryer?

**Inadequate wiring signs**

Spot "warning signs" of inadequate wiring and save money.

Three signs can indicate inadequate wiring in the home: TV picture "wincens" or shrinks in size when an appliance is plugged in.

--fuses blow or circuit breakers trip frequently.

--lights flicker and dim when appliances are turned on.

"In addition to causing inconvenience, these signs indicate that appliances are wasting money when they cannot perform their full jobs.

"Too many appliances running on the same circuit can cause a "voltage drop".

With a voltage drop of only 10 percent, a lamp loses 30 percent of its light and heating appliances produce at only 70 percent efficiency.

When remodeling a house, be sure to install adequate wiring or present and future needs.



## Quail Season Through Feb. 12

The annual quail season continues through February 12 in regulatory counties of Texas and many hunters are winding up their 1977-78 hunting season on the West Texas quail hunt.

The daily bag limit of 12 birds was easier to fill early in the season while the habitat was overabundant with birds, but winter hunters are still finding plenty of birds to shoot in most areas of the Panhandle and South Plains. Cold weather often kills or retards vegetation that provides needed forage, and populations can be reduced drastically when this occurs.

According to Texas Parks and Wildlife field reports, there seem to be several areas that were dry early last fall which now have had either rain or snow and the dogs are working the coveys and singles to the benefit of the hunter.

Gun pressure is not nearly as much of a factor in year-to-year quail survivals as are the habitat, weather and food supply. If your property or hunting area has the necessary ingredients for quail, the reproductive potential of quail is so high that they will quickly replace reduced populations lost to severe cold, rain or snow.

## Sandhill Cranes In Different Areas

A lack of water and little food are two of the many factors which lead thousands of sandhill cranes into new or little-used areas near Andrews, Abilene and San Angelo this winter.

This influx of cranes allowed would-be duck and goose hunters to participate in the three month season which ended January 31, but caused avid crane hunters to search for birds in the traditional areas of Lynn and Terry counties south of Lubbock.

A state-issued crane permit was required of each crane hunter prior to hunting the bird and the Austin P&WD office issued 4,929, down from last years record 5,060.

All crane hunters issued a permit will be receiving a questionnaire asking for more important aspects of the hunt including days hunted, birds bagged and/or lost, and location of hunt.

As crane hunting becomes more popular, it is estimated that more waterfowl hunters will participate in the hunt next fall.
