M. KENT SIMS ENTERS RACE FOR CO. ATTORNEY

M. Kent Sims, a lifelong resident of Wheeler County, has announced his candidacy for the office of Wheeler County Attorney, subject to the Democratic primary in May. Sims, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lyndon H. Sims, received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering from Texas Tech University in 1969 and a Doctor of Jurisprudence Degree from Texas Tech University in May, 1972. With special permission from the Texas Board of Bar Examiners, Sims was able to take the Bar exam prior to graduating from law school and having passed the bar, set up his practice in Wheeler in June of 1972.

Sims has recently become one of the few lawyers in the State of Texas to become a Board Certified Estate Planning and Probate Specialist, having passed the necessary written examination and certified as to the other requirements by the State Bar of Texas.

While in undergraduate and law school Sims received numerous honors such as serving on the Law Review Board of Editors, being named to the Deans Honor Roll on several occasions and receiving recognition as the top student in Estate Planning at the Tech Law School.

Sims practiced law as a sole practitioner until January of 1974 when Lowell Lasley from Tulsa, Texas, became his partner to form the general law partnership of Sims & Lasley. Sims and Lasley then joined with Joe Hayes of Canadian, Texas, in October of 1976 to form the partnership of Sims, Hayes & Lasley.

BOTH TEAMS WIN SPORTSMANSHIP TROPHIES

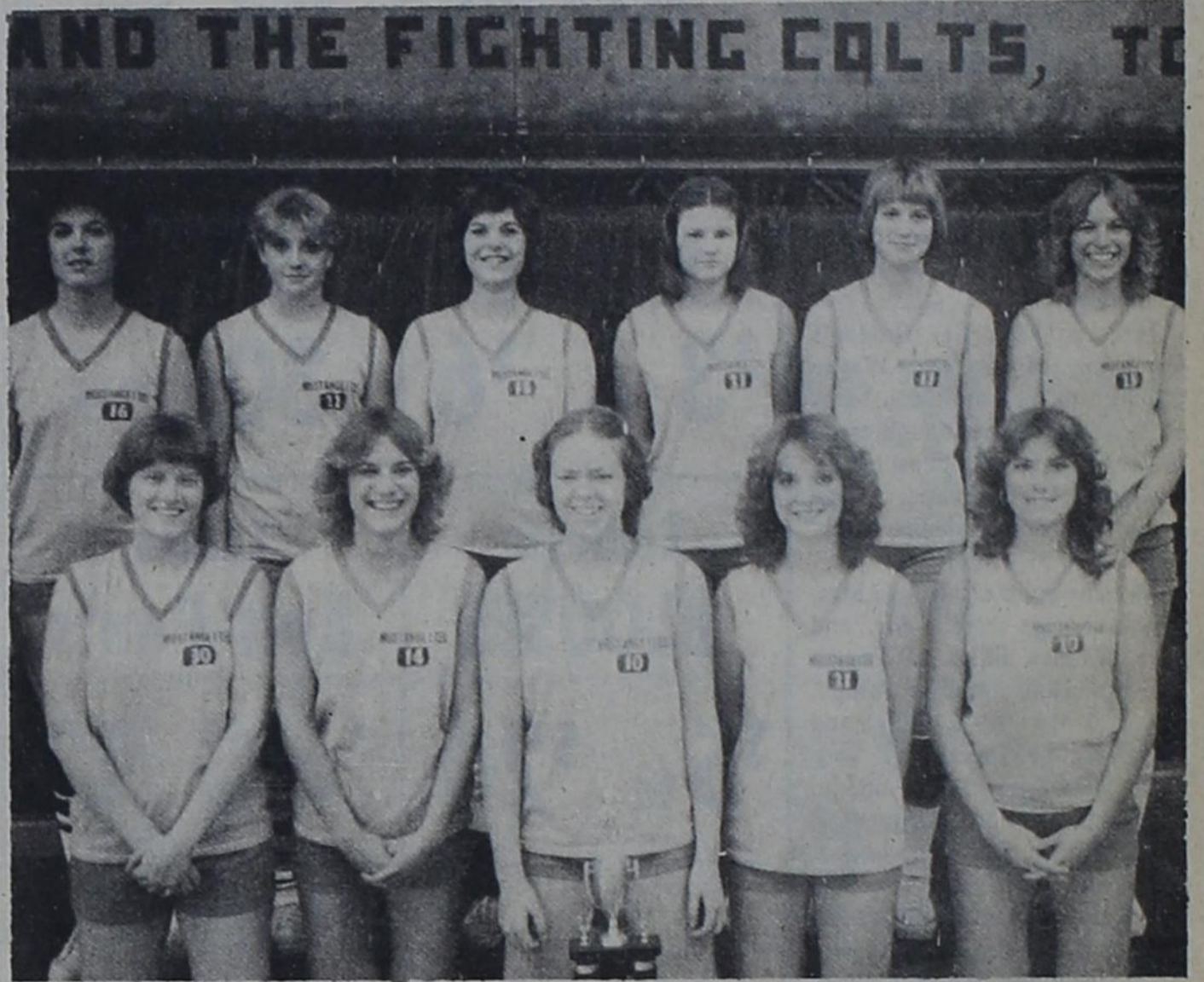
Varsity, Jr. Var. Scores Reported

Heating, Utility Bills Effect Cost Of Food Stamps

The Wheeler County food stamp office at Shamrock wants food stamp households to know that if their heating or utility bills go up this winter, the amount they pay for their food stamps may go down.

Under new food stamp rules effective January 1, 1978, households may be able to get prompt adjustments in their food stamp purchase price if heating or utility bills increase.

Food stamp purchase prices are based on net income, after itemized deductions. When deductions for heating and utility costs increase, purchase prices may go down if there is less income available to the household for food.

The food stamp office says Wheeler County food stamp households will now be able to use their most recent utility bills to claim a larger deduction, if they have paid the bill or intends to pay during the month and will have enough money to do so.

If heating and/or utility bills

go up by more than \$25, households may have their cases reviewed right away. If the higher bills entitle the households to a lower purchase price, they will be able to buy their food stamps at the lower price within 10 days. If they have already bought their food stamps for the month, they would have their purchase price adjusted for the next month.

Households whose utility bills have increased less than \$25 will have the change processed according to normal procedures.

Allow utility bills include heating and cooking fuel, electricity, water and sewer, garbage and trash collection and basic telephone service.

Food stamp households will receive a notice explaining the new procedures by Jan. 15. To find out if they qualify for a lower food stamp purchase price, households with increased utility costs should contact their local food stamp office and ask to have their case reviewed.
