MUSTANGS WIN BI DISTRICT

GYM-CAFETERIA DECISION LEFT TO MOBEETIE VOTERS

The Mobeetie School Board would like to urge all voters of the Mobeetie Independent School District to support the building of a Gymnasium-Cafeteria-Auditorium combination building by voting "For" in the November 30, 1977, Bond Election.

The old buildings that we presently use have served us well these many years, but are not now adequate to continue to allow us to have the kind of school program that we feel everyone in our community would like and expect to have.

For the following reasons we would like to ask for your "For" vote:

- 1. The present gymnasium was originally built in 1929 and can not be remodeled to meet the standards expected of schools today.
- 2. The playing court is non-regulation size.
- 3. There are no public rest rooms to accommodate spectators at our games.
- 4. There is a serious lack of shower facilities for our boys and girls and for our visiting teams.
- 5. We do not have an adequate concession area.
- 6. The present gymnasium will not meet many of the accreditation standards as set forth by the Texas Education Agency.

- 1. The present building was not designed as a cafeteria.
- 2. The building lacks many standard facilities found in most school cafeterias.
- 3. We need more seating area.
- 4. A new cafeteria would afford a place for community meetings or dinners.
- 5. The old building and facilities will not meet all state recommendations for a school cafeteria.

All of the above shortcomings would be corrected by the proposed building. We hope it will not become necessary to increase taxes to support this bond issue, but the possibility exists that a modest increase may be necessary. Our present rate is set at \$1.35 per \$100 assessed # value—which is relatively low compared to most school districts of the state.

We have seen a good valuation increase in this past year, due largely to an increase in minerals, and have been informed from the best experts available that these values should hold or get better for many years to come. Should our values increase as much this coming year as it has this past year, there will

Farm-City Week To Be Observed

Top O' Texas CowBelles are observing Farm-City Week November 18-24. This twenty year tradition is always celebrated at Thanksgiving time. The national theme is "Partners in Economic Progress," and is to bring about a better understanding between rural and urban people to increase knowledge and appreciation of both for the American way of life. The Farm-City chairman from Wheeler is Mrs. Joe Weatherly.

Agriculture is the nations biggest industry with assets totaling almost \$600 billion. The beef cattle industry is the largest segment of agriculture. Each American consumes 84 lbs. of beef on a retail weight basis per year. Eighty three percent of U. S. cattle are in herds of less than 500 head. Most large as well as small operations are family owned. Counting production and living expenses, farmers-cattlemen spend \$125 million a year-all of it going to businesses in cities and towns across the country. The farmer and rancher receives an average of 43c out of each dollar spent for farm-grown food. The balance of the dollar represents the labor and other costs involved in transporting, processing and distributing food. Prices received by cattlemen are determined strictly by supply and demand at the time of sale. That is why prices fluctuate with changes in supply. Agriculture is not a margin-added business where margins are added to costs of materials, like conventional manufacturing and merchandising businesses.

Just 4% of the American population produces food-freezing the other 96% to produce other goods and services. One American farmer-cattlemen produces enough food and fiber for 56 persons. If it were not for agriculture improved production efficiency, inflation would be even more than it is.

Agriculture is the nation's largest employer. One out of five jobs in private employment is related to some phase of agriculture from growing food and fiber to selling it at the super market. "Labor, Land, Capital. We need each other."

A Letter to President Jimmy Carter

GOV. DOLPH BRISCOE OPPOSES NATIONAL HEALTH GUIDELINES

President Jimmy Carter

Dear Mr. President:

On behalf of the State of Texas I take strong exception to "National Guidelines for Health Planning" published by the department of Health, Education, and Welfare in the Federal Register.

The imposition of arbitrary, rigid formulas for determining the appropriate availability of health services and facilities for the citizens of Texas is highly offensive and will in the long run result in rationed health care. When fully implemented, these guidelines will further aggravate the problems that the citizens of rural Texas face in providing adequate health care facilities and in attracting and retaining physicians and other health care professionals.

In Texas we have 12 health system agencies, a series of state health agencies, a large number of interested consumer and professional groups, and hundreds of highly capable local and state elected and appointed officials who are quite capable of determining the health care needs of the citizens of this state without unnecessary federal meddling and interference.

We have made substantial investment in the health planning mechanism that has just been created. We all share the same concerns about cost containment and developing a health care delivery system that meets the local health care needs of our people. These guidelines, however, go too far in failing to articulate exceptions and in placing too much importance on the Washington Bureaucrats' as opposed to the citizens' planning efforts.

It was my impression and hope that with the passage of P.L. 93-641 a system would be established whereby the health needs of the citizens of our state could be identified by region with the local citizens themselves having a direct role in the process. These needs could then be communicated to the federal

ROPES DEFEATED 24-6

Overcoming a rash of tumbles with a bone rattling defense and a relentless ground game, the Wheeler Mustangs crushed the Ropes Eagles 24-6 last Friday night in Amarillo and advanced to the quarterfinals in Class B football.

Nearly 2000 fans witnessed Wheeler's first excursion into the playoffs since 1968 as the No. 1 ranked Mustangs solidified their position on top of the heap.

The quick striking Mustangs had a commanding 17-0 lead after two quarters and the game was highlighted in the first half by tremendous defensive effort by the Mustangs as they coughed up the pigskin three times in their end of the field but held the hard hitting Eagles from putting any points on the board.

It looked like the Mustangs

were going to blow the Eagles back to the south plains the first time they had the ball as they drove 55 yards to the Ropes 4 but the Eagles held on fourth down.

Forcing the Eagles to punt into the stout south wind, the Mustangs had excellent field position at the Ropes 40 and they quickly took advantage of the situation and were in the end zone in just four plays.

A 20 yard pass completion from Bobby Guthrie to Sam Schaffer put the ball on the 19 and with 2:42 to play in the first quarter, Duane Childress romped into the end zone from 15 yards out. Mike Evans toed the extra point and fans began to wonder just how much the Mustangs were going to be able to score.

Whatever the cause, the Mustangs developed a bad case of putting the ball on the ground in the second quarter and not only did this kill one promising drive but it gave Ropes a chance to not only get back in the game but possible go on top, but the Eagles then found out about the Mustangs defensive prowess.

Dell Ford, who totaled 115 yards rushing and played an outstanding game on defense, lost the handle on the ball at the Wheeler 31 a couple of minutes deep in the second period and Ropes recovered at that point.

Three running plays netted just a yard as Jeff Davis dropped Gary Means for a big 5 yard loss on third and 3 and the Eagles opted for a field goal try but the 46 yard effort was way short.

Wheeler moved from the 20 out to their 48 after the field goal effort by the Eagles and gave the ball back to the Eagles at the 49 when Marvin Grimes fumbled.

The Eagles called on their ace running back, Steven Sims three straight times but the black shirted Mustangs made Sims fumble on third down and Grimes recovered at the Wheeler 44.

Gaining nothing on first down at the 44, in fact, fumbling and recovering, the Mustangs went to Grimes with the pigskin and the hole opened up on the right side and the Mustangs tailback cut back to his left and pulled loose from a couple of defenders and raced 56 yards to tally the home team's second TD. Evans booted the ball straight through the uprights and the Mustangs led by 14 with 4:59 to play in the first half.

After Grimes touchdown, the Mustangs forced Ropes to punt and Means 47 yarder was fair caught at the Wheeler 16 by Ford but the full back fumbled on first down after gaining 6 out to the 22 and Terry Allen recovered for Ropes.

Mustangs were double tough against the run, Ropes chose to go to the air but this attack proved fruitless and Ford intercepted a fourth down pass on the 10 and returned it to the Wheeler 25 to quell the threat.

Grime got 15 in two trips into the Eagles defense before Childress nearly broke loose behind a fine block by Tom Christner and was knocked out of bounds 18 yards later at the Ropes 42.

Time was the big factor now facing the Mustangs as Ford raced through a gaping hole at right guard for 30 more steps to the Eagles 12. Just 16 seconds remained in the first half when Guthrie passed to Myron Jolly at the 11 and he lateraled the ball to Kent Vise and Vise was knocked out of bounds on the 7.

A running play lost 3 and the Mustangs called time before going for six on a passing effort but it was no good and the Mustangs called time after the incompletion to figure out their fourth down strategy.

With the ball on the 10, the Mustangs chose to try and tack three more points on the board and this they did as Tim Patterson booted a 27 yard field goal.

Another interception by Ford

gave the Mustangs the chance to really salt the game away just three plays deep into the third quarter but old man fumble hit the Mustangs again and Grimes' fumble was recovered at the Ropes 4 yard line.

Ropes at this point in the game had been held to no first downs but the Eagles drove to the Mustangs 46 before losing the ball on downs.

The Mustangs got their final touchdown two plays deep into the final period after Jolly intercepted a Ropes pass at midfield and the Mustangs covered the 49 yards in 7 plays with Ford going over from the 1. Ford gave great second effort to get the ball into the end zone as he appeared to be stopped at the line of scrimmage. Evans completed the Mustangs scoring with his extra point kick at 11:33 to play in the contest.

Ropes averted a shutout by driving 74 yards for their score in the waning minutes of the game and Sims capped the drive by plunging over from the 2.

Guthrie spoiled the try for two points as he banged John Cowan to the ground at the 1 after Cowan received the short pass from Means.

WHEELER FACES JAYTON IN QUARTERFINAL GAME FRI.

The next step in Wheeler's quest for a state championship in football unfolds this Friday night in Vernon when the Mustangs play the Jayton Jaybirds.

Only eight teams remain in contention for the crown in Class B football and when the dust clears this weekend, fans in this area are hoping that the Wheeler Mustangs will be one of the remaining four teams.

Coming off their big win over Ropes last week, the Mustangs certainly can't afford to relax one bit and can't savor that victory long as Jayton poses a problem that the Mustangs haven't faced much this campaign.

The Jaybirds are the biggest football team the Mustangs have faced this year and they will outweigh the Mustangs both offensively and on defense.

Friday's 7:30 game in Vernon will pit two teams with the same

basic offensive philosophy and that is a strong running game is essential and Jayton has the people to make this philosophy work. Gene Cleveland, a 182 lb. senior, is the Jaybirds top running back and he is a strong runner who the Jaybirds have counted on. Stopping the Jayton running attack may prove to be quite a chore for Coach Preston Smith's charges.

Duane Childress injured a knee slightly in the Ropes game and is a doubtful performer in the Mustangs scheme of things for Friday night. Bret Mosley will start in Childress' split back position.

Jayton runs a 6-2 on defense and have used their size in the past to wear down opponents.

"We probably played as well defensively in the first half last week as we have all year but we will be to continue to play that way and better if we reach our goal of being state champions", coach Smith said this week "We didn't play well at all on offense and we certainly have to start

Council Meeting Monday Evening

The City Council met Monday evening, November 21, for their regular meeting. Dale Farley from ABM Co. and Sheriff Doyle Ramsey met with the council.

Minutes of the October meeting were read and approved by the council.

Bids for the purchase of a billing machine were opened. Two bids were received. Burroughs and Central Accounting, both of Amarillo, submitted bids. All bids were rejected.

Dale Farley explained the operation of the electronic billing machine which has been donated to the City of Wheeler by Beef Cattle Co. The machine was used by Beef Cattle until it could no longer fill the needs of the company. The equipment will be installed at the City Office Monday.

Jerry Hefley reported on the activities of the water and sewer department. He requested a 50' extension of the sewer line on west 12th street; the request was granted. The City is the process of laying 500' of sewer line on 12th street at the present time.

A request for the extension of the sewer line in the rise addition was denied since the full lot was not in the city limits and the sewer line in the alley at this location is not deep enough for the extension.

Richard Wallace with Baldwin and Rucker presented the receipts and disbursements for the month and explained the same.

Bill Owen met with the council and reported ground work for several projects were underway. Owen brought an application for help to upgrade the park. Owen had attended a meeting in Amarillo on the Federal Flood Insurance. He presented a resolution for the city concerning Federal Flood Insurance; the resolution was accepted.

Bills were presented and approved for payment.

Doyle Ramsey met with the council to discuss the contract with the county for police protection. It was determined the Mayor Burton meet with the Co. Commissioners, December 12 to pursue the matter further.

The meeting adjourned at 10:00.

EDITORIAL

Feathers began flying in Americas turkey coops in 1863 when, by Presidential proclamation, the nation observed its first official Thanksgiving Day. On October 3, 1863, President Lincoln asked Americans to celebrate the last Thursday in November as a day of general thanksgiving. They complied on November 28.

Periodically, since the Pilgrims' feast in 1621, Americans had celebrated some form of thanksgiving. During the Revolutionary War, for instance, a day of national thanksgiving was annually recommended by Congress.

In 1789, President George Washington went on record as the first President to issue a formal call for thankfulness. He set aside November 26 that year as a national day of thanksgiving for the adoption of the U.S. Constitution.

In 1939, President Franklin Roosevelt, wishing to aid business by lengthening the number of shopping days between Thanksgiving and Christmas, moved the holiday up from the fourth to the third Thursday of November. Congress reversed that notion two years later. On December 26, 1941, President Roosevelt approved a joint Congressional resolution designating the fourth Thursday of November Thanksgiving Day.
