



First a very good hand lotion. HAND LOTION

1 pt. soft water 4 tablespoons Glycerine Castile soap (Size of walnut) 12 drops carbolic acid

Heat water, add soap and boil to dissolve thoroughly. Remove soap and water mixture from fire and add the glycerine and carbolic acid. Shake well. Store in bottles.

FACE CREAM

the Activity Center on the campus of TSTI. A blue ribbon committee composed of business and industrial leaders from the Amarillo area were given an orientation in connection with the role and scope and history of the vocational school as well as a briefing of the Campus Masterplan.

Tom Patterson of Amarillo who is vice-chairman of the TSTI Board of Regents addressed the Advisory Committee members and said that the success of the school will depend on the community effort and the support that the Advisory Committee gives TSTI. As for the image problem that TSTI has, Patterson said, "it's not that TSTI has a bad image...nor does it have a good image it's void of image". Board of Regents Chairman J. H. Kultgen also addressed the new organization and called on committee members to help the school gain support from local and state legislators.
