### WHEELER COUNTY 4-H FOOD SHOW IS HELD AT BRISCOE SAT.

The Wheeler County 4-H Food Show was held November 5 in the Briscoe School Cafeteria with 24 4-H boys and girls participating. First place winners include Marla Pond, Side Dish, Wheeler 4-H; Sally Stacy, Main Dish, Shamrock 4-H; Ricky Williams, Snacks & Beverages, Briscoe 4-H; Lanetta Werhan, Breads & Desserts, Shamrock 4-H and Roberta Maddox, Main Dish, Briscoe 4-H. These 4-H members will participate in the District I 4-H; Mike Phillis, Main Dish, Briscoe 4-H; Sandy Winslett, Snacks & Beverages, Shamrock 4-H and Lisa Meek, Breads & Desserts, Briscoe 4-H. These 4-H members will take the place of any 1st winner that is unable to participate in the District I Food Show.

Others participating in the 1977 Food Show in the Breads & Desserts Division were Phyllis McCauley, Blue Ribbon, Shamrock 4-H; Phill Jones, Red Ribbon, Briscoe 4-H; Hope Coffman, Blue Ribbon, Wheeler 4-H; Pauyline Franks, Red Ribbon, Shamrock 4-H; Mark Shaffer, Blue Ribbon, Shamrock 4-H; Stephanie Mitchell, Blue Ribbon, Briscoe 4-H.

In the Main Dish Division the following 4-H members participated: Michelle Davis, Red

Robbon, Wheeler 4-H; Anita LeBlanc, Blue Ribbon, Shamrock 4-H and Von Jones, Blue Ribbon, Briscoe 4-H. The Sid Dish Division entrants included Sharon Mitchell, Red Ribbon, Briscoe 4-H.

Other winners in the Snacks & Beverages Division were Tammy Turnbow, Blue Ribbon, Shamrock 4-H; Misty Mayfield, Blue Ribbon, Shamrock 4-H; Karon Gollihare, Red Ribbon, Shamrock 4-H and Iletta Werhan, Red Ribbon, Shamrock 4-H.

All 4-H'ers participating in a 4-H Food Project are eligible to enter the food show. The theme of the 1977 Show was "Fall Festival of Food". There were 31 Wheeler County 4-H members participating in the foods and nutrition projects and these will all be eligible to receive an award at the 1978 4-H Achievement Banquet as record books are required for this project.

Special awards of pastry brushes were presented to each participant from Wheeler County and the Wheeler County Home Demonstration Council provided gifts for the 1st place winners.

4-H Foods & Nutrition Project Leaders provided refreshments for the tea following the show.

The District 1-B Champion Wheeler Mustangs wound up their regular season play last Friday night with an easy 43-6 victory over the Booker Kiowas, and the win gave the #1 ranked Mustangs a perfect 9-0 record going into the playoffs.

With scouts in the stands from both Motley County and Ropesville, zone champions of District 2-B, the Mustangs didn't give them a whole lot of encouragement as they kept their leading ball carriers, Marvin Grimes and Dell Ford, under wraps on offense.

Even with Grimes and Ford on the bench when the Mustangs had the ball, the Mustangs built up a 35-0 lead at the half on the strong running of Kent Vise and Duane Childress and the passing of quarterback Bo Guthrie.

The first two times the visitors from Wheeler touched the pigskin they put points on the board and really weren't tested in the contest as they haven't been since their victory over Groom in the season's fourth game.

A 68 yard drive put Wheeler on top early in the game and Vise capped the 7 play drive with a 13 yard dash off the Mustangs left side. Mike Evans, who has blossomed into an excellent place kicker, toed the ball through the uprights for a 7-0 lead.

Ford intercepted a Kiowa pass at the Booker 37 and returned the interception 10 yards to set the Mustangs second scoring march into motion.

Vise got a yard and then Duane Childress broke loose on a reverse and the speedy Mustang picked up 23 big yards to the Booker 4. Vise gouged out 3 yards to the 1 before Guthrie sneaked it across. Wheeler went for two points after Booker was offside on Evans kick and Vise' run was good and the Mustangs had the Kiowas down by 15-0.

Another 68 yard drive got the Mustangs third TD with Childress getting all the yardage except for a 6 yard run by Brett Mosley.

Childress swept the left side on the reverse for 16 and after Mosley got 6, he got the call back

to the other side and picked up 11 to the Booker 36. Guthrie passed incomplete and then hit Childress with a 36 yard scoring toss. Evans kick was no good but he got another chance a couple of minutes later.

Booker fumbled the kickoff after the Mustangs third TD and Wheeler recovered at the Kiowa 32 and the Mustangs headed to the end zone once more.

This 6 play drive was capped with a 14 yard touchdown pass from Guthrie to tight end Sam Schaffer. Evans was good on this try from placement.

Time was running out in the second quarter when the Mustangs held on downs at their 39 and then went into their passing game that netted their fifth touchdown.

Guthrie passed to Myron Jolly

on successive plays good for 21 and 13 to put the ball on the 27. A pass to Childress got 3 yards sandwiched around two incompletions and the Mustangs were fighting the clock.

Childress picked up 8 big yards on fourth down to give the Mustangs a new lease at the 16. Schaffer gathered in an 11 yard gainer before Guthrie hit Jolly with a 5 yard scoring toss. Evans boot made it 35-0.

A new set of running backs started the third period for Wheeler and behind the crisp blocking of the Mustangs forward wall, Tommy Calverly and Benny Baker led the Mustangs on a 72 yard drive following the second half kickoff for their final touchdown.

From the Booker 36, Baker found lots of running room at left tackle and galloped into the end zone. Going for two points again, the Mustangs were successful as Calverly punched it across to run the score up to 43-0.

Booker mounted a short 35 yard drive for their only score late in the game to avert a shutout and the Mustangs had attained their perfect season.

### CHAMPION MUSTANGS AWAIT BI-DIST. OPPONENT

It will be Friday night before the Wheeler Mustangs will know who their opponent will be in next week's first round of the state playoffs for the Class B football championship.

The Mustangs do know that their opponent will be either Motley County or Ropesville and these two zone champions will meet Friday night in Petersburg to determine the District 2-B champion.

Supt. Bynum Smith and athletic director Preston Smith will be in Petersburg Friday night and will meet immediately after the game with officials of the winning school to choose a date and site for the bi-district encounter.

In all probability, the bi-district game will be played on Friday night, November 18, and several area towns have expressed an interest in hosting the game. Amarillo's Dick Bivins Stadium was a possibility until it was announced on Wednesday that the Tascosa-Monterrey game would be played there.

4 tablespoons Glycerine  
Castile soap (Size of walnut)  
12 drops carbolic acid

Heat water, add soap and boil to dissolve thoroughly. Remove soap and water mixture from fire and add the glycerine and carbolic acid. Shake well. Store in bottles.



## Crop & Livestock Reports In Mail

From mid-November to early January, thousands of Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service.

Reliable information on what is produced, how much, and where is important to farmers, ranchers, and others in making production and marketing decisions and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas Agriculture. It is also the basis for determining allotment and payments levels to producers by USDA under the various commodity programs.

Cooperation by producers is the key to all crop and livestock estimates. Farmers and ranchers have recognized the need for accurate and timely statistics by participation in the program since its start over a century ago. All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate. This is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

County statistics for 1976 and January 1, 1977, are available on Livestock, Poultry, Dairy, Field Crops, Small Grains, Cotton, Vegetables, Fruits and Pecans, and Cash Receipts from the Sale of Texas Farm Commodities. Bulletins can be obtained from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, P. O. Box 70, Austin, Texas 78767, or by writing Reagan V. Brown, Commissioner of Agriculture, P. O. Box 12847, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

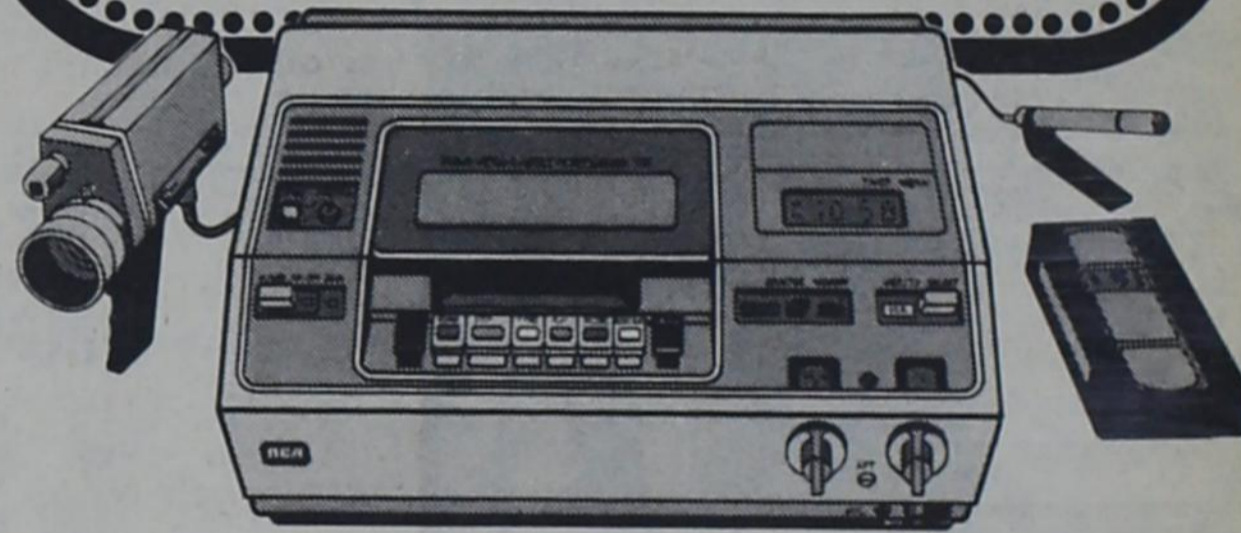
