Shannon also had a 9th place Hereford spring heifer bred by Indian Mound Farms. Jamee Batton had the 5th place Hereford winter heifer calf, bred by Indian Mound Farms and 11th place Polled Hereford Winter heifer calf, bred by Wallace Fields.

Richie Kiker had the 15th place heavy weight Hereford steer. The steer was bred by B&C Cattle Company of Miami. Donna Quarles and Jana Corse also had steers.

Shelia Moffett had a 4th place heavy weight Hampshire, 9th place heavy Yorkshire and 16th place medium weight Chester White barrow. Wade Hathaway had a 3rd place medium weight Berkshire barrow.

MIAMI GOES DOWN 47-6

The scoreboard read 47-6 in favor of the state's No. 1 ranked team in Class B football and at exactly 9:52 last Friday night, the Miami Warriors limped off Nicholson Field and the Wheeler Mustangs had cleared their last hurdle to the district championship and a berth in the state playoffs.

A win over the Booker Kiowas this week will give the championship outright to the Mustangs and there will be no sharing the title as last year.

Whether a psychological ploy or not, the Warriors showed up for last Friday's showdown right at kickoff time and they quickly found out that it would have been just as well to have stayed at home.

The Mustangs jumped into a quick 14-0 lead and the Warriors hadn't run an offensive play and the Mustangs continued to pour it on until they had a 34-0 margin at the half and coasted to the 47-6 win.

Wheeler won the toss and chose to receive and proceeded to methodically chew up the Warriors defense and marched 70 yards in 12 plays for the touchdown and the drive was a portent of what the Warriors had to face for the rest of the game.

Marvin Grimes, who had 94 yards for his efforts in the game, lugged the ball on 8 of the 12 plays in the opening drive and Bo Guthrie, Mustang quarterback, sneaked it over from the 2 on third down, Mike Evans booted his first of four good placements

and the Mustangs had a 7-0 lead at 7:16. Philip McCullough fumbled the ensuing kickoff and Tommy Calverly recovered for the Mustangs.

The Wheeler Mustangs already have at least a share of the District 1-B championship and are already making plans for the bi-district clash but have one

more chore to take care of before all of their thoughts can be turned to the playoffs.

The Booker Kiowas are the last opponent that has a chance to

keep the Mustangs from having a perfect record in regular season play and Friday night's encounter at Booker won't find the Mustangs lacking in their desire to wind up with a 9-0 mark.

The young and inexperienced Kiowas shouldn't be too tough an opponent for the Mustangs finale but stranger things have happened on the gridiron and the Kiowas can't be taken too lightly.

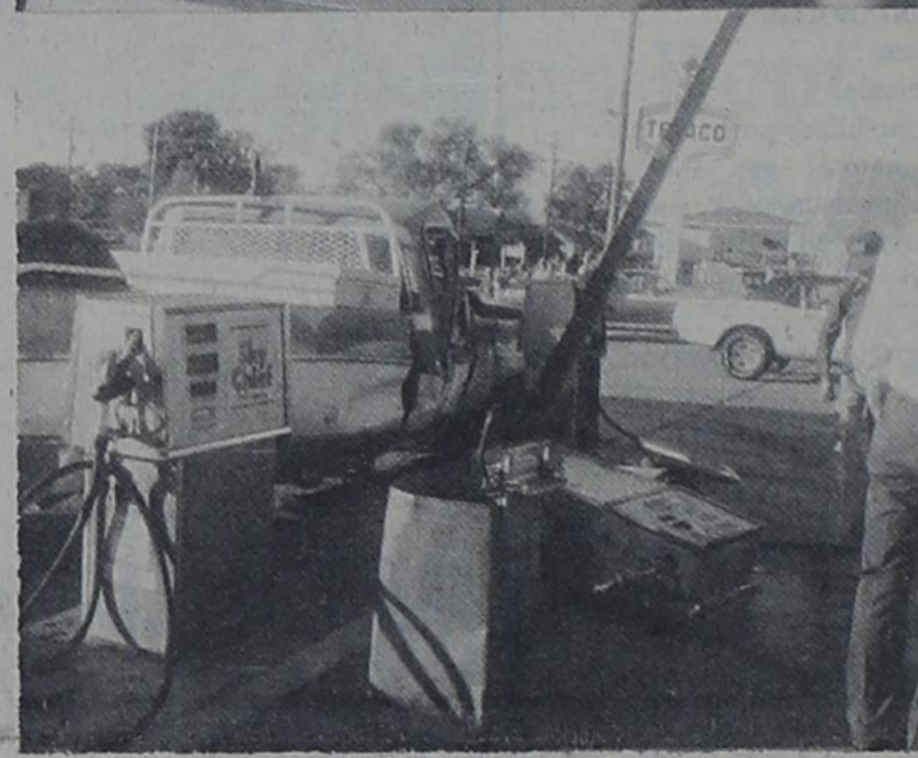
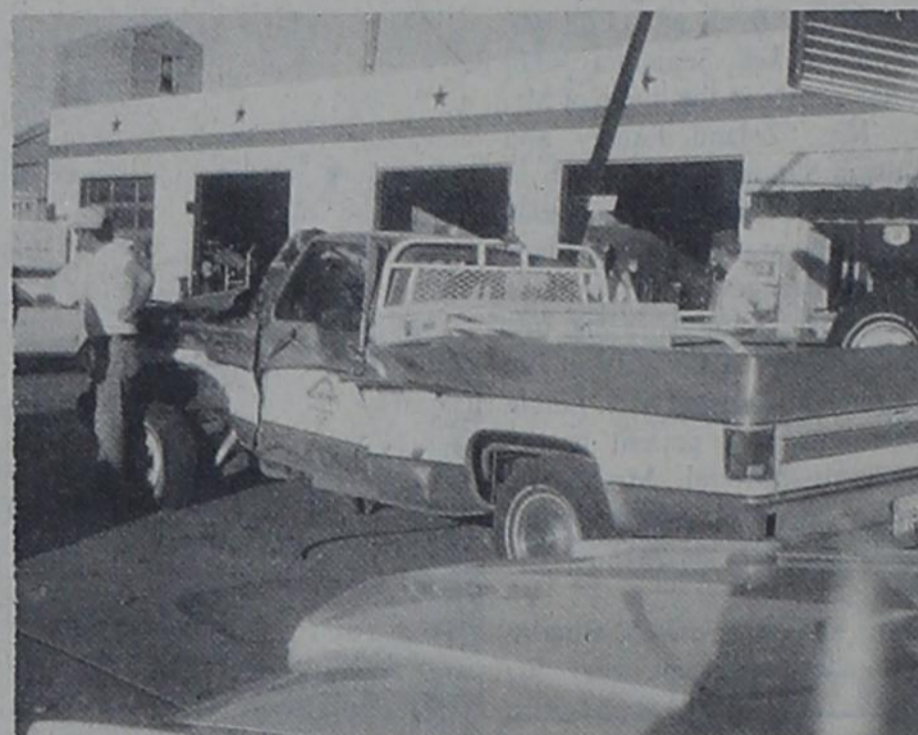
Booker is a basically junior club and will certainly have to be reckoned with in '78. The Kiowas run from both the wishbone and I formations and use a 4-3 defensive alignment but if what other Mustang foes have done is any criteria, the Kiowas will probably change up everything for Wheeler.

"Booker has a good program going and have a pretty sound football team and we expect a super effort out of them Friday," Coach Preston Smith said this week. "We are real happy with our win over Miami and we beat them worse than I really thought we would but the kids really wanted that championship."

Coach Smith went on to say, "This is a great bunch of young men that have worked hard for what they have won and deserve the right to play for the state championship."

The Mustangs coaching staff hope that they can play a lot of the younger players Friday night and give some of the starters that are nursing injuries a little rest.

Wheeler's bi-district foe will be determined next week when zone champions, Motley County and Roperville play for the District 2-B championship.

The truck and an estimated 43,000 load pushed the pickup into the island, knocking over two pumps. No injuries resulted, as nobody was near the vehicles at the time of the accident. The \$20,000 in damages is small compared to what could have resulted if a spark had ignited the gasoline. The incident occurred about 5:05 P.M. Wednesday, October 26.

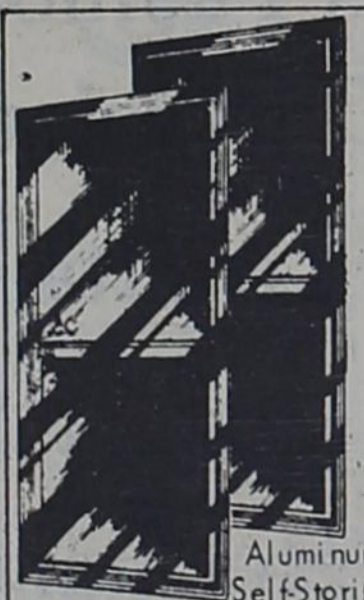

Proper Grazing Leaves Grass

The grass leaf is the factory which produces the food or energy for the plant and puts money in the ranchers pocket. Grazing native rangeland is economical and native grass can be highly productive when properly managed. "Proper grazing is the key to successful range management," according to Charles Coffman, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler. Proper grazing means leaving at least half of the annual production of the grass for a healthier higher producing plant the next year. Some of the perennial grass root system dies and is replaced each year. The foliage that is left on a properly grazed plant will be adequate to build and strengthen the root system. Proper grazing leaves the grass with enough energy to allow reproduction. The ungrazed leaves will become litter after they die replacing some fertility and acting as a mulch to catch and hold the rainfall. When you give your grass a chance to grow your production will increase and so will your profits. The personnel of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation Service are glad to assist with any problems related to grass management. Please call or come by the office in Wheeler.

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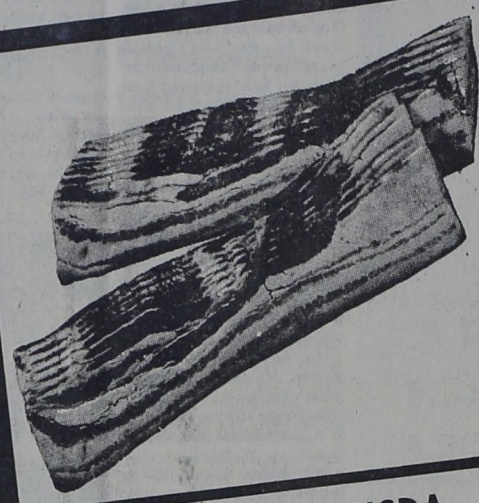
