## Monthly Sheriff's Report

Sheriff Doyle Ramsey reports 17 prisoners held in the county jail during the month of September. This brings the total for 1977 to 208.

## Mustang Roll On, Higgins Falls 53-18 \$400,000 BOND ISSUE CARRIES FOR NEW GYM

The Wheeler Mustangs took one more step up that championship ladder last Friday night with a breather against the visiting Higgins Coyotes and walked off with a 53-18 victory.

A larger crowd than was expected saw the offensive show which had 71 points and 851 total yards waltzed out of the grass of Nicholson Field.

Not only did the high powered Mustangs rack up the points and total offense but the Coyotes had 321 yards for their efforts and they went back to the north plains with somewhat of a moral victory by putting 18 points on the board.

Once again Marvin Grimes

led the Mustangs by rushing for 4 touchdowns but also led all ground gainers with 160 yards in just 12 carries.

Grimes had TD runs of 29, 42, 27, and 8 but had to share the long range efforts with fullback Dell Ford who had a 56 yard scoring jaunt on the games second play, and with a couple of promising freshmen running backs, Benny Baker and Tommy Calverly.

Baker romped 48 yards to paydirt and Calverly had a 45 yard six pointer and he also joined Ford and Grimes with over a 100 yards rushing for the game.

This was the Mustangs last encounter with the Coyotes for at

least two years as the Coyotes drop back to six-man play next year.

A 47 yard scoring pass from halfback Wade Hostutler to quarterback Audie Waite and a 20 yard run by Joe Smith got the two Higgins touchdowns and their other two points came when a snap sailed over Myron Jolly's head on a punt and Jolly had to fall on the ball in the end zone.

After scoring the first four times they had the ball and once

more before the half for a comfortable 33-0 lead, the Mustangs cleared the bench in the last half and the mixture of starters and subs got 20 more points in the final two stanzas.

Two Mustang starters didn't play a down as they were slowed by injuries and the Mustangs coaches felt it better to rest them for the upcoming games against McLean and Miami. Mike Lee and Tim Patterson watched from

## ANNUAL SCOUT FUND DRIVE

The Annual Fund Drive will kick off Tuesday morning, October 25, with a 7:15 a.m. breakfast at the First Methodist Church, Charlie Brown—Drive Chairman—announced.

Two additional staff members share time with this community: Joe Chambers, Scout Executive, and A. O. Cox Field Director—both men have been active in training local leaders to work in Cubbing and Scouting.

Construction of the new plant will begin next year and is scheduled for completion in 1982. Plans also call for a second 565,000 kilowatt unit to be completed in 1985.

Boots lend the finishing touch to any costume—skirts, dresses, gauchos or pants.

Boots are usually expensive, so consider them an investment and choose style, height, fabric and color with PURPOSE in mind. To wear from season to season, select a classic style and a basic or neutral (earth-tone) color. For fashion wear, style is probably the first consideration, and for functional boots, look for quality—in both construction and fabric.

While suede or leather boots may be the most comfortable—because natural fibers "breathe"—boots made of rubber or vinyl are more water resistant, especially those that are molded without seams.

However, suede and leather can be treated—at the factory or at home—to repel water. Special sprays will shed light rain and snow (but heavy rain and snow will generally still soak through.)

For greater warmth and dryness, seams should be securely stitched, sturdily made, and lined.

Smooth tricot linings make a boot easy to pull on and off and may provide adequate warmth for mild winter weather. Pile linings provide greater warmth; the denser the pile, the greater the warmth.

Pile may be wool or synthetic. Synthetic linings may be more durable, but are not as absorbent as wool, often leaving feet with a clammy feeling.

Boots with ridged or skid resistant soles, whether leather or synthetic, are safer on ice and snow. Avoid smooth soles.

To assure fit, try on both boots. Sizes vary from brand to brand. Be sure that boot tops provide adequate width for your calves, whether pull-on or zip-up style.

Pile-lined boots may fit more snugly; you may need a slightly larger size.

Also remember in selecting boots:

trim and ornaments should be firmly attached.

back seam should be centered and firmly stitched.

zipper closure should work smoothly and have a protective placket underneath.

inside should be free of rough spots, wrinkles, bulky seams or loose threads.

Keeping a wardrobe fashionable doesn't mean replacing it every season. Small changes and minor additions can update many items in a wardrobe for a "now" look.

One fashionable winter look is the coordinated suit and shawl. To a solid color or tweed suit, add a plaid. To a plaid suit, add a solid color shawl. Simply fringe the edges of a big square and drape it around the shoulders.

Ribbons are an inexpensive means of updating, too. Wear one as a bow at the neck of a soft shirt to add "pizzazz". Use wide grosgrain for a belt with dresses or skirts.

Also, combine ribbon and braid to add rows of color and lengthen a skirt at the same time.

To give jackets and coats new life, add braid to them. Outline the lapels edges, and pockets for an updated look or to hide frayed edges.

For blouses and skirts, use lightweight trim.

Replace worn turtleneck tops with cowl-collar tops. Convert the turtleneck into a vest by cutting out the sleeves and reshaping the neckline. Finish edges with strips cut from the sleeves or with lightweight braid.

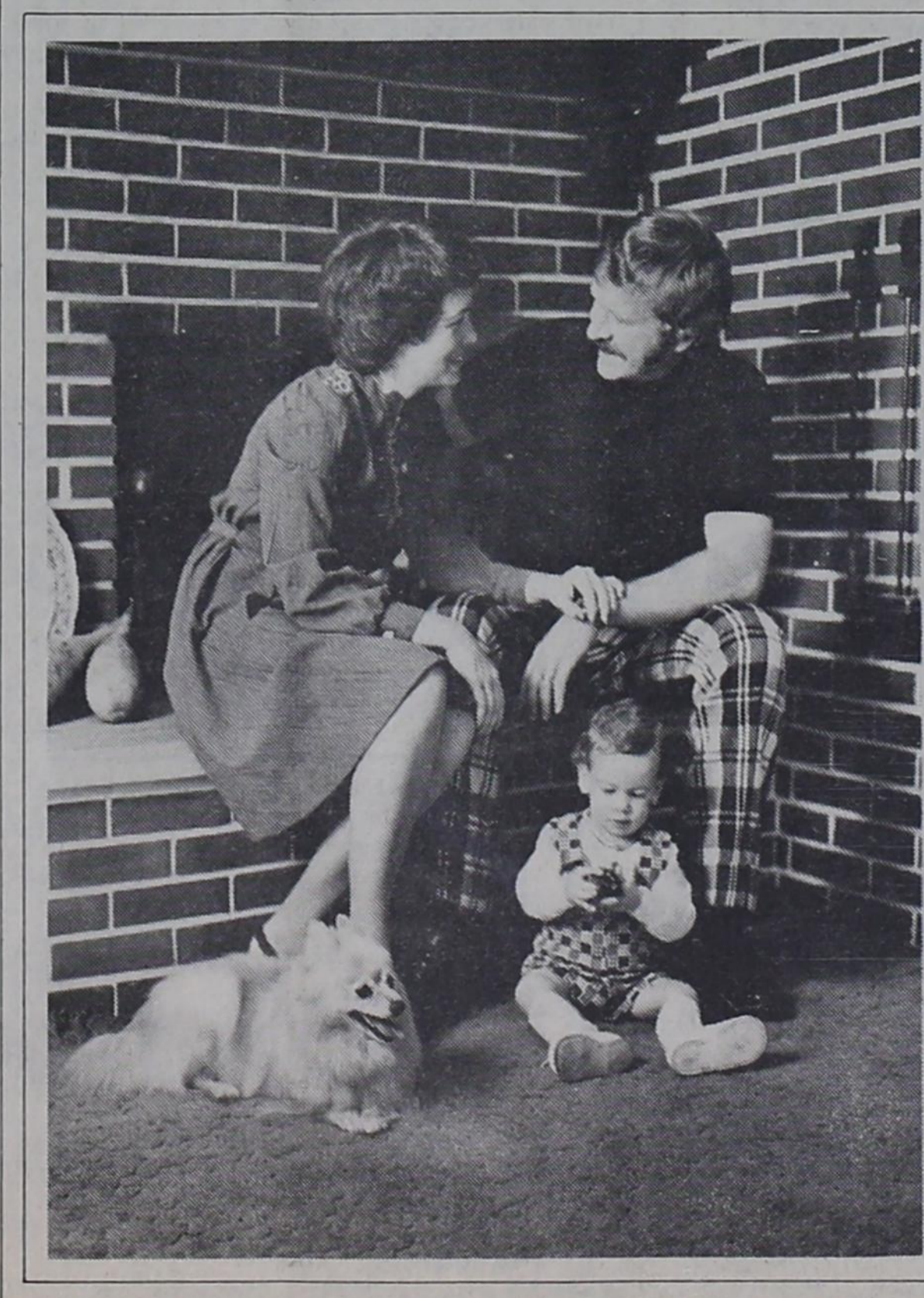

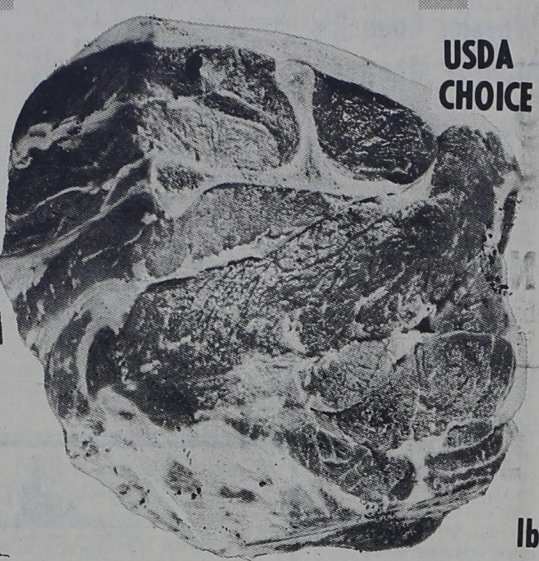
