## Fed. Land Bank Lowers Interest

J. Chas. Whitfield, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Memphis, announced today that the Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 7-3/4%. This reduction will be effective on August 1, 1977, and will affect \$1.04 billion in variable rate loans to 18,026 Texas farmers and ranchers. This billing rate change will be effective on both farms loans and rural residence loans.

The variable rate loan was introduced by the Houston Bank in July, 1969 and provides for the rate to fluctuate with the variation in the cost of money. A more favorable money market has made this billing reduction possible. Whitefield stated, "This continues to demonstrate the Bank's policy to furnish credit to Texas farmers and ranchers at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices."

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long-term real estate loans on farm and ranch land and rural residences throughout Texas and now has \$1.3 billion in loans outstanding. The local association makes and services loans in Wheeler, Collingsworth, Hall Donley, Childress, Cottle and King Counties.

## Erosion Inventory For Wheeler Co.

Lavon Williams, District Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler has announced that personnel of the Wheeler Soil Conservation Service Field Office are currently in the process of conducting an erosion inventory of Wheeler County. "This is a part of a nationwide inventory authorized by the Rural Development Act of 1972," Williams continued.

Williams points out that the areas to be inventoried are three specific points located in a 160 acre block. "Both the points and the blocks were selected at random by a computer. Extensive information will be assembled concerning these points," Williams continued. The operator of the land will be contacted for past crop and yield information. Cooperation from the individuals contacted will be greatly appreciated, stressed Williams.

"This years phase of the program will be completed by mid September and the consolidated report will be in the hands of Congress by November 1. The findings and conclusions of the inventory, plus the second phase which is scheduled for 1978, will be used by Congress and Soil Conservation experts to chart the future of conservation in our nation" Williams concluded.



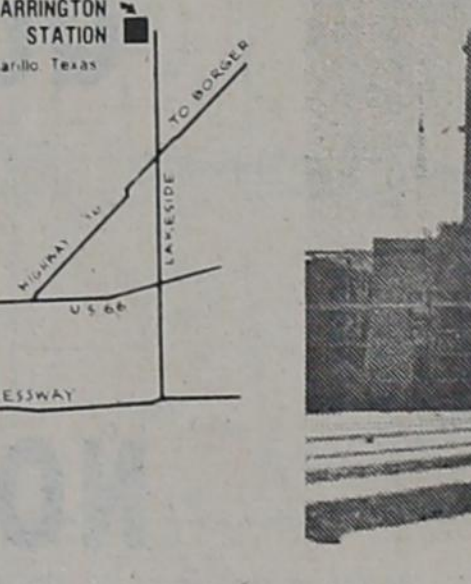

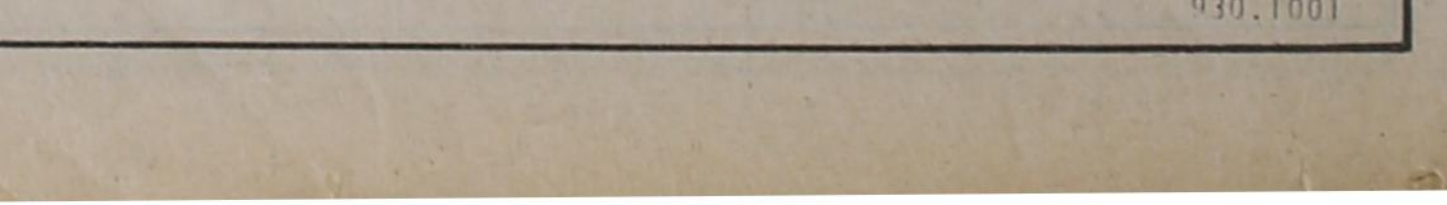
