The proposed project consists resurfacing of the existing 24 foot pavement to provide two 12-foot travel lanes, with 4-foot paved shoulders, and with minor grade changes where steep grades warrant. Also included is a curb and gutter section, beginning at S. H. 152 in the City of Wheeler and extending approximately one-half mile, to provide four traffic lanes and two parking lanes.


Route of the proposed project is along the present location of U. S. Highway 83. Additional right of way will be obtained as required for backslopes and culvert extensions to meet safety requirements, with the exception of the curb and gutter section where no additional right of way will be required. In areas where steep slopes occur, maximum right of way requirement will be approximately 150 feet. There will be no displaced persons, or relocations of businesses or farms, as a result of this project.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, environmental studies, and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the office of Mr. O. V. Johnson, Supv. Resident Engineer of Wellington, Texas.

O. Box 909, Childress, Texas,

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic, and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's office, or to the office of Mr. Lewis H. White, District Engineer of Childress, Texas, on or before April 16, 1977.

In the event such a request in received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.




