WHEELER LIBRARY RECEIVES \$5,000 GRANT FROM TRULL FOUNDATION

The Trull Foundation is located in Palacios, Texas. It is a successor to the B. W. Trull Foundation which expired in 1973. It was established by the widow of B. W. Trull, together with their four children, R. B. Trull, Jean T. Herlin, Gladys T. Brooking and Laura T. Shifflett. Two of the children, R. B. Trull and Jean T. Herlin, serve as trustees. The other three trustees were selected from outside the family and are Coleen Claybourn, J. Fred Huitt and H. H. Sisson. The Trull Foundations purpose and activities are primarily directed to local giving, with emphasis on Protestant Church support, higher and secondary education, and youth activities.

Mrs. Richard Brown, Secretary-Treasurer of the Wheeler Library Board, has had correspondence with Mrs. Coleen Claybourn, Secretary of the Trull Foundation, and with Jean Trull Herlin, a trustee. She reported the reason Wheeler was selected to receive a grant was because of Palacios Library, Inc.

Like Wheeler Library, Palacios Library had to struggle to find adequate financing and its books, to were largely hand-me-downs. Then, in 1961 Hurricane Carla destroyed about one half their books and knocked the library off its foundation. While the town was struggling to get back on its feet, the head of the Corpus Christi Library System arrived with 1,000 books in the back of her station wagon. She had gathered them from libraries all over the state as a gift to Palacios Library.

They salvaged what they could of the old books and moved into a wing of a vacant hospital nearby. Then in 1967 they built a downtown library with private funds. About this time a foundation



made them a grant of \$5,000 which allowed them to purchase needed books. Palacios library now has 18,500 volumes, plus fifty magazines, some records and a few copies of fine paintings which may be checked out.

Mrs. Herlin's husband is chairman of Palacios Library Board and she is a volunteer worker on the desk and the Book Selection Committee.

Because she remembers what a boost their grant gave Palacios, Wheeler was fortunate to receive a similar \$5,000 grant from the Trull Foundation to aid our program.

The meeting will be at 7:30 in the Commissioners Courtroom. It is hoped ECAs and anyone interested in being a part of the organization will be present.

The latest addition to the Panhandle EMSS is a helicopter which is available when needed in any part of the panhandle.

SPS Plans New Improvements

Southwestern Public Service Company will invest more than \$500-million during the next five years in new equipment and improvements, Berl Springer, president and chief operating officer of the electric company, announced today.

Expenditures for 1977 will be about \$84.5-million, while the projected expenditures for the other four years range from \$84.5-million to \$116.5-million, the later expenditure scheduled for 1981. The new equipment and improvements are necessary so that SPS can continue providing electric service for the 45,000-square mile area it serves.

"During the five-year period, Southwestern will be required to borrow about \$300-million to meet these construction expenditures," Springer said.

Two additional generating facilities to be installed during this period will increase the SPS system capability by more than 700,000 kilowatts, bringing the total capability to almost three and one-half million kilowatts.

Harrington Station, northeast of Amarillo, will be the site for the two new generating units. Construction has just started on Harrington #2 and it is scheduled to go on the line in 1978. Harrington #3 is scheduled for completion in 1980. Both generators will have a capability of 350,000 kilowatts and will use coal as their primary fuel.

"During the later part of the five-year period, substantial expenditures will be made on a fourth unit, in the 550,000 kilowatt range, presently planned for completion in 1982. This unit will also use a coal-fired boiler," Springer said.

Southwestern has been using low-sulphur coal from Wyoming at its Harrington Station for about five months. Approximately 11,000 tons are delivered twice a week by a 110-car unit train. The Harrington units each use about 1-million tons per year.

Southwestern Public Service Company, through its fuel subsidiary, TUCO INC., is continuing its aggressive program to assure adequate fuel supplies.

"The Company's traditional suppliers of natural gas have been successful in acquiring additional reserves and, at the present time, indicate they have adequate supplies to meet their delivery needs," Springer said.

"The introduction of coal as a fuel to this area should act as a stabilizing factor for the cost of electric service, and we do not contemplate asking the regulatory authorities in our service area for an increase in electric rates during fiscal 1977."

Transmission lines and transmission substations scheduled for completion during the five-year period represent an investment of about \$75-million with more than \$10-million being invested in 1977.

The construction of distribution lines and substations during this same period will require an expenditure of almost \$20-million.

Southwestern Public Service Company has offered \$100-million plus a plant site for the

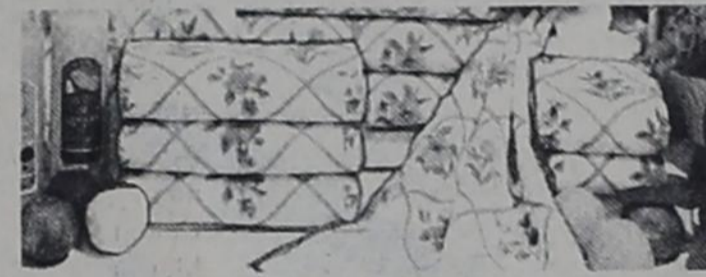

The purpose of HBA is to be the coordinating force in support of the GCFR design and development work aimed at the construction and operation in the late 1980's of a 300,000 kilowatt power plant demonstrating the gas-cooled concept.
