WHEELER AND CANADIAN WINNERS OF TOURNAMENT

Three days of basketball action came to a close last Saturday night at the Wheeler gym as the finals of the annual Wheeler Invitational Tournament brought the curtain down on the 1976 event.

The host Wheeler boys, and Canadian girls wound up the three day tournament as champions with victories over Mobeetie and Shamrock in the final two games.

Canadian's Kittens reached the finals by defeating Clarendon

and McLean and behind the hot shooting hands of Kristy Berry and Cristy Cullender the Kittens defeated the Lassies from Shamrock 51-37 to garner the first place trophy.

The Wheeler Mustangs whipped Allison and Shamrock on their road to the finals and

defeated the Mobeetie Hornets 61-57 in the exciting final contest of the tournament.

The Wheeler Mustangettes were third place winners in the girls bracket and received the trophy by virtue of a 62-48 victory over McLean.

Earlier in the day on Saturday, Clarendon won the consolation award for girls when they defeated Briscoe 41-27.

The Canadian Wildcats took home the third place trophy in boys play as they whipped the Shamrock Irish 49-40 Saturday afternoon.

Consolation winners in boys play were the Clarendon Bronchos as the Allison Antelopes fell to the Bronchos by a 58-47 score.

Trophies were presented to the winning teams in each bracket at the conclusion of the tournament

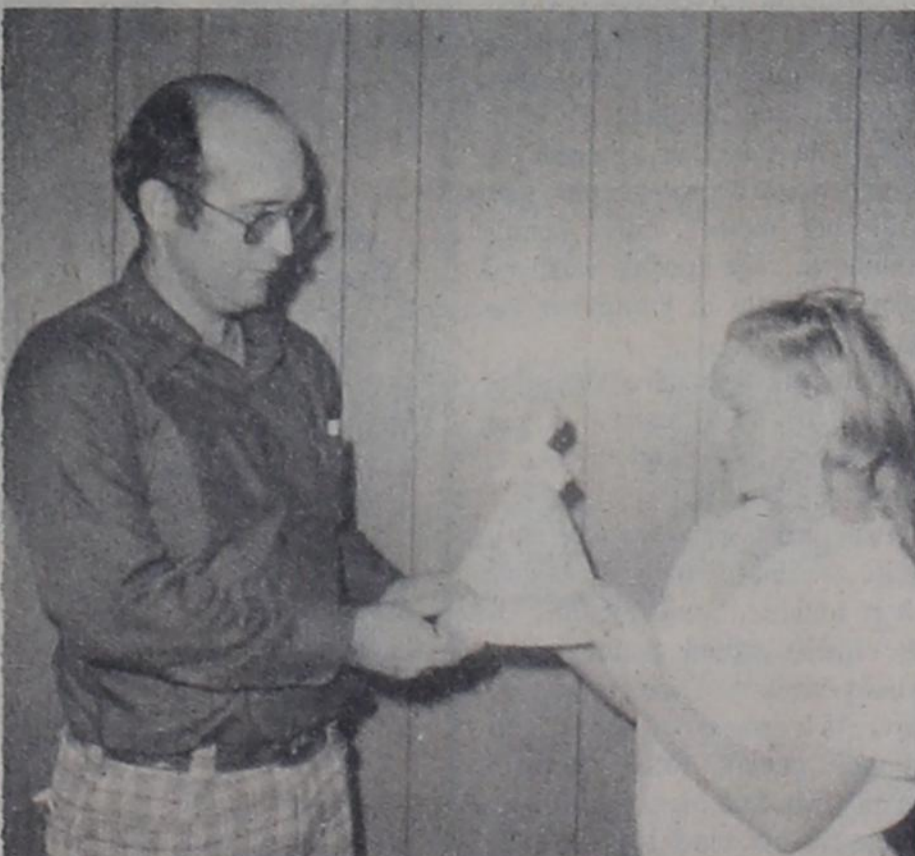

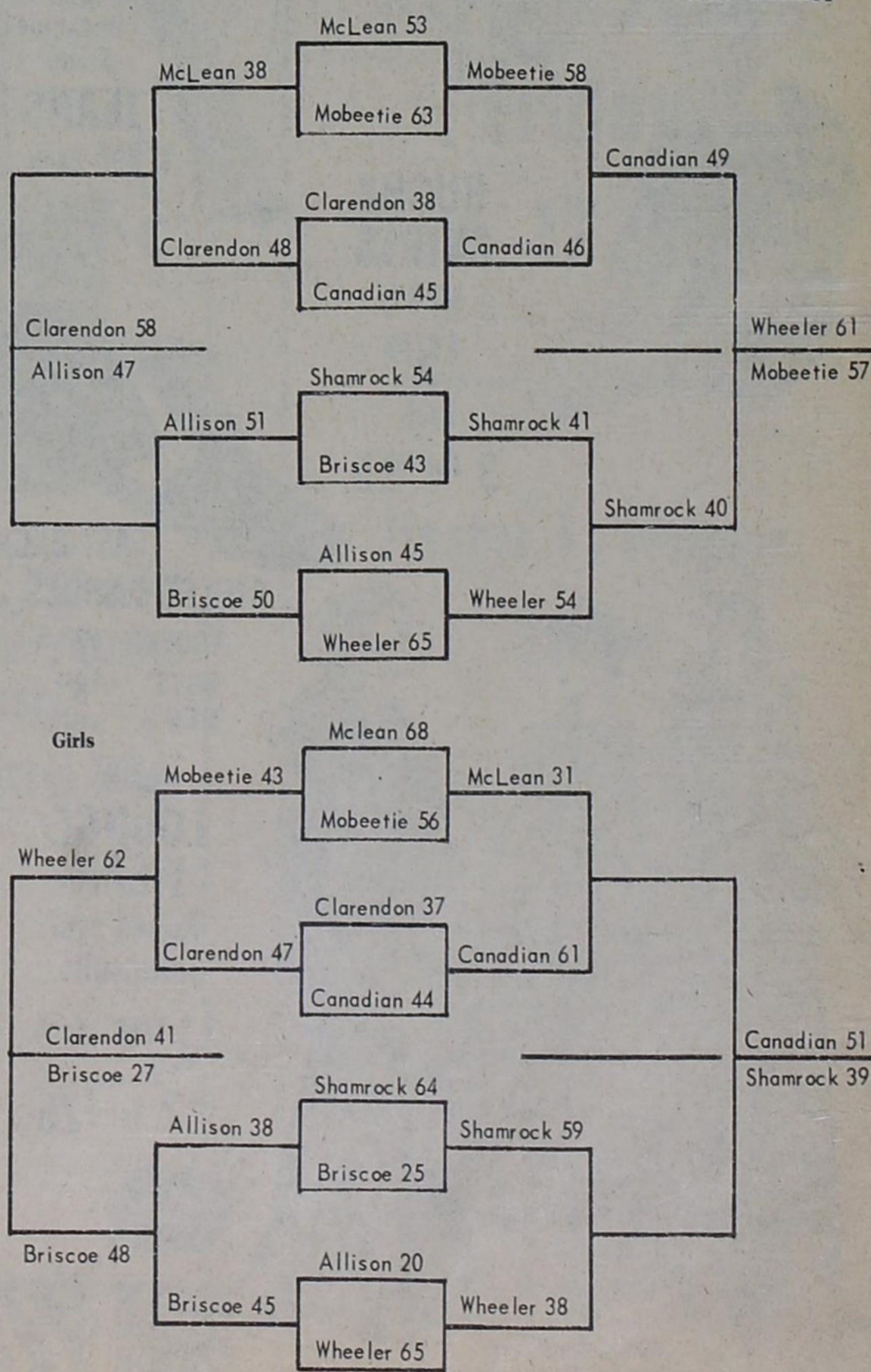

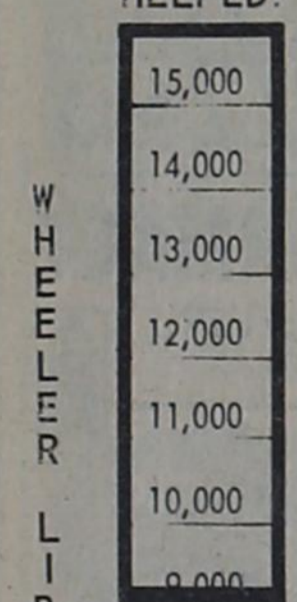

"Generation gap" is a convenient catch phrase for trouble between younger and older people—but what does it really mean?

It may not be everything you think it is—and it may be a few things you hadn't thought of before.

Two expressions of the generation gap are the difference in opinions and values between the young and the mature, along with problems of interaction and communication across generations.

Opinions and values may differ in political or educational issues. Older people may seem "conservative" while younger people may seem "radical."

Communications and interaction across generations may be difficult when parents and children feel estranged from each other, feel less appreciation and trust than they'd like.

But it's not always bad news. Recent studies indicate that the young and old have surprisingly similar views on such things as religion, morals and money. They also suggest that parents and children in America today do have warm relationships which are mutually rewarding.

Naturally, there are bound to be differences between young and old. But they need not lead to conflicts.

One reason for the generation gap is simply historical differences. Each has grown up in a different set of circumstances.

Also, developmental differences often cause a generation gap. Young people are trying to "find" themselves and older people, on the other hand, have different developmental concerns. They are concerned with keeping things in a steady state. They tend to play down differences.

People often see a generation gap caused by these factors as being greater outside their own family than within it. "Sure there's a generation gap, but not in my family," they will say.

What can be done about the generation gap? Some ideas might help overcome the situation as follows:

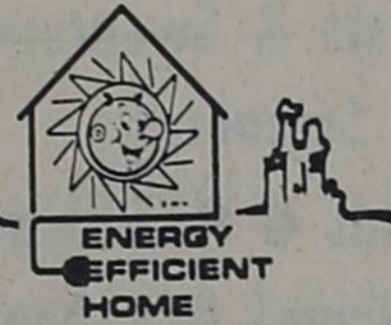

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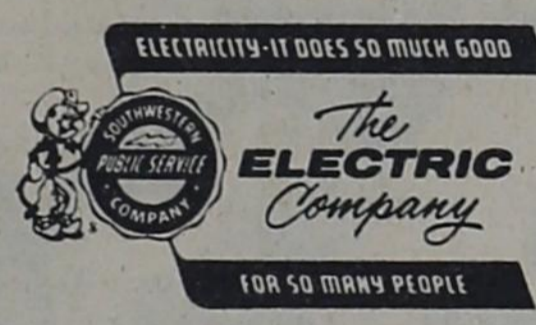

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The plants take water from the soil by way of the root system and moves it to the leaves. Carbon dioxide is pulled from the air through tiny pores on the bottom of the leaves. In the leaves green chlorophyll captures the sunlight. Chemical reactions make a simple sugar by combining oxygen, hydrogen and carbon which come from the air.

The simple sugar is combined with other elements and form proteins, carbohydrates, fats and plant oils. These are used to build new tissues for plant growth.

A by-product of this process is oxygen. Plants take up billions of tons of carbon dioxide and discharge oxygen that animals life needs.

For this process of growth to proceed the grass plant must have a amply amount of leaf surface. Overgrazing of grass plants year after year will cause

the plants to die. It dies because there is not enough leaf surface to produce food to keep growing. Proper use of grasslands is important for beef production to each rancher. A rancher should have a planned system of grazing to improve his grass plants and also produce the maximum amount of beef. The Wheeler Soil Conservation District are willing to assist in any problems related to grass management. Please call or come by the office in Wheeler.

Navy Boiler Technician Third Class Robert H. Brickey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Brickey of Box 211, Wheeler, Tex., recently returned from participation in the maritime portion of the major NATO exercises "Autumn Forge '76".

He is a crewmember aboard the destroyer USS Jonas Ingram, homeported at Mayport, Fla. "Autumn Forge" is the title of the annual training exercises conducted jointly by the nine members of the NATO Alliance.

His ship took part in two major events during the deployment: "Operation Team Work '76" and "Operation Bonded Item". "Team Work '76" involved fleet operations in the North Atlantic Ocean, the English Channel and the Baltic Sea and included a major amphibious landing in Norway.

"Bonded Item" was a coordinated land, sea and air operation which included a major amphibious landing in Denmark.

Admiral Issa C. Kidd, Jr., USN, the supreme Allied Commander Atlantic, coordinated the overall conduct of the exercises and Vice Admiral John J. Shanahan, USN, Commander of the Atlantic Striking Fleet, was the tactical commander of all NATO naval forces.

The primary objective of the exercises was to test and improve the combat preparedness of the allied forces for the defense of Western Europe. They were also designed to evaluate NATO's rapid reinforcement capabilities; to test command and control procedures for coordination of NATO's sea, land and air forces; and to provide unified, coordinated training for the national forces with the Allied European Command.

A 1972 graduate of Wheeler High School, he joined the Navy in November 1972.

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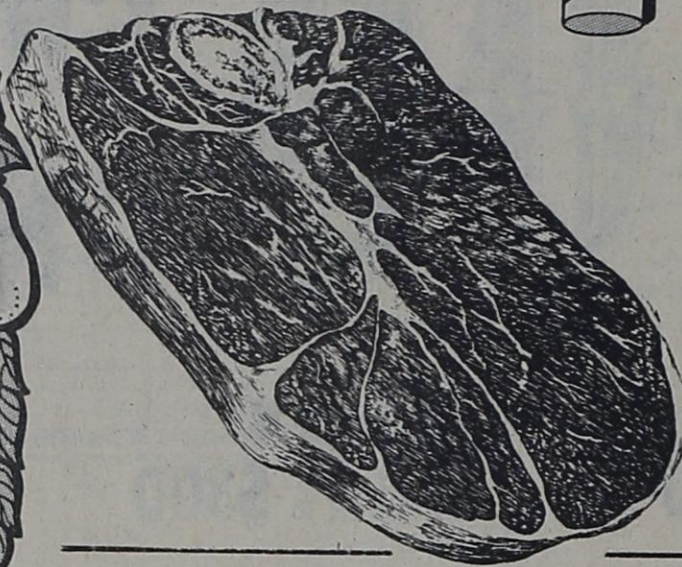
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
