Check the batteries on your smoke detector.

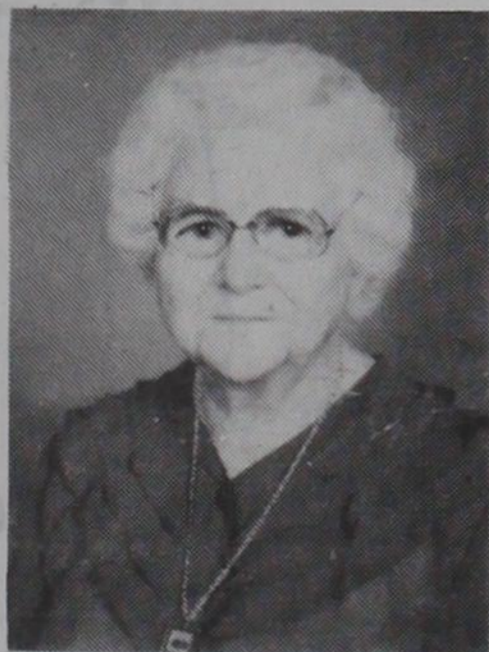
Individuals are reminded twice a year to check the batteries in their smoke detectors. And changing the batteries is recommended.

Wheeler Receives 5.75" Rain; 0.81" Is Measured Sunday

A downpour Tuesday evening left the rain gauge measuring 5.75". An amount of 0.81" was measured Sunday morning.

Rain measurements for Wheeler in October now at 7.25". An earlier measurement for October was 0.69 measured Monday, October 16.

The last measurable amount to fall in Wheeler before the Oct. 16 amount was 0.29" on July 30. The total for July was 0.47".

Wheeler's rainfall was above normal before the drought started at the end of July. The total for January thru July was 19.63" Our official rainfall for the year now stands at 26.88" with cloudy skies and infrequent lightning on Wednesday morning.

The rain is measured at 7:00 a.m. If rain is still falling at 7:00, measurement is delayed until the next morning. Moisture was falling Monday morning and Tuesday morning at 7:00.

Measurements of up to 3.00 were reported in the Kelton area. This amount was reported on Tuesday morning.

The hardest rain for Wheeler was Tuesday evening from 7 until 12 p.m.

With the greyhounds up 21-7 in the second quarter, the Mustangs took control the rest of the way. Finsterwald scored three touchdowns and finished with 149 yards rushing on 29 carries. Teammate Justin Chapman added to the turnaround, running for 102 yards on 19 carries.

The Mustangs finished with 325 of their 379 total yards coming on the ground.

Gruver was led by Aaron Weller with 148 yards on 11 carries and two touchdowns.

Wheeler upped its record to 3-4 overall and 2-0 in district, while the Greyhounds dropped to 4-3, 0-2.

"Little Orphant Annie" is as much a part of Halloween as bobbing for apples. Mama read it to me. I'll read it again this year. I've read it to groups

of Senior Citizens and to kindergartners children. They all love it.

The poem tells the story of a poor little "orphant" girl who came to live with a well-to-do family. She paid for her board and room by doing odd jobs. In the October evenings she'd sit around the kitchen fire and tell the children ghost stories, Halloween stories.

One of her stories was of a bad boy who wouldn't say his prayers. He went to bed away upstairs. His "mamma" heard "him holler, his pappy "heard" him bawl, but when they turned back the covers, he was gone. They never did find him.

Each verse ends with the admonition:

And the gobble uns'll git you if you don't watch out.

The next story tells of a bad little girl who made fun of everybody—even old people. Just as she turned to run and hide there was two big black things that snatched her through the ceiling

and the gobble uns'll git you if you don't watch out.

Mind your parents, your teachers, help the poor and the orphants or the gobble uns'll git you if you don't watch out.

Such poems have been a part of us for so long they must not be lost. Our libraries are full of poems that every American child should know.

It is his or her heritage. Oklahoma pioneers loved such poems and recited them at the literary night at the one-room school.

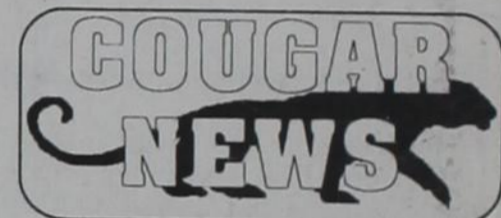
Find a copy of "Little Orphant Annie" in the library.

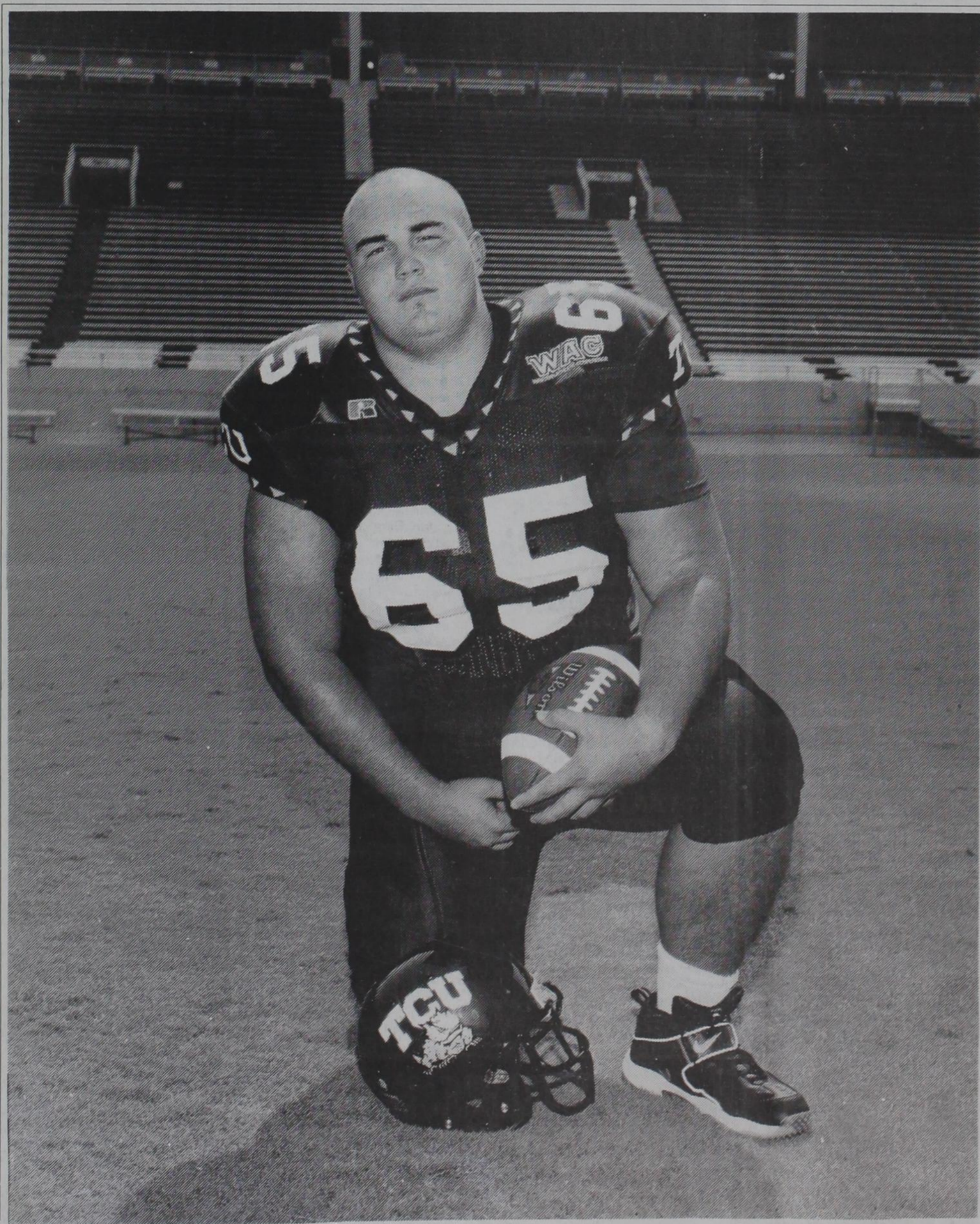

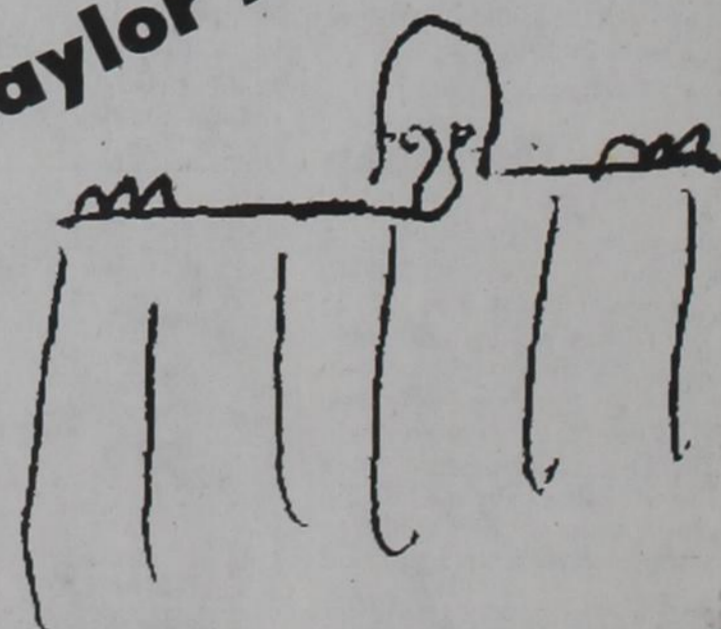

Auto Thefts Down

Austin - Even though there's been a slight decrease in the total number of vehicle thefts in Texas in the last year, the GM pickup truck remains the favorite pick of thieves.

In 1999, there were 91,992 auto thefts in Texas, down from 96,614 in 1998, according to the Texas Automobile Theft Prevention Authority (ATPA), a section of the Texas Department of Transportation.

Three of the top ten most stolen vehicles were pickup trucks. GM, Ford and Dodge trucks were the first, second and seventh choices of thieves, respectively. The Honda Accord edged out the Olds Cutlass as the third most stolen vehicle in Texas.

Once again, Houston had the most vehicle thefts in 1999 with 24,705, followed closely by Dallas with 23,193.

October is "Watch Your Car" Month and the ATPA warns Texans that even if they drive an old car instead of a shiny new car, they need to actively protect themselves against vehicle theft.

"Auto thieves often steal cars to commit other offenses," said Susan Sampson, ATPA's director of public education, "so any car can be a target."

Once again, Texas statistics show that most thieves are teenagers. Law enforcement agents arrested 9,320 people aged 15 to 19 on vehicle theft charges in 1999.

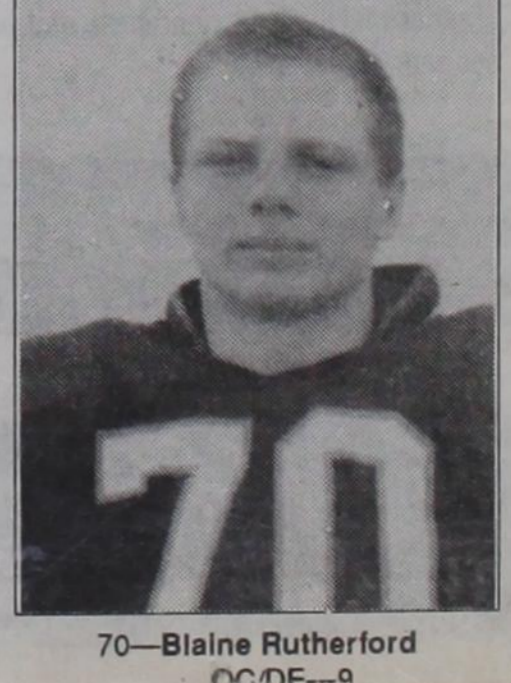

The Pioneers Saturday

It was fun being a pioneer—an old timer—on Saturday.

Saturday was the most exciting day of the week. It was an afternoon to visit friends and neighbors. Everybody went to town. It was a time to hear the news.

Look around. Horse and buggies lined up wall to wall. Some rode horseback. Some walked. No cars.

Very few women. They stayed home, many of them pregnant, to mind the babies, do the work, get ready for Sunday.

There were lots of wagons. There were also wagon yards where you could feed the horses and spend the night—sort of a horse motel.

People bought groceries in large quantities and took them home in a wagon. They also brought poultry to town to sell and the weekly cream and eggs were hauled in a wagon.

People lived on the cream and egg money. Milking was done by hand. Everyone had a cream separator.

Separating the cream from the milk was a big job and washing the separator was even bigger. The scent of milk filled the house. Some families churned the cream and sold the butter.

Every Saturday the cream and egg money paid for the week's groceries. Mama's turkey money was extra, sold in the fall to buy school clothes and school books and a meager Christmas.

clean seedbed. A covercrop is mandatory when planting a native grass mixture.

Primary purpose for planting a covercrop is to reduce soil loss, improve soil tilth, conserve soil moisture, increase water infiltration and provide protection for the small grasses. A covercrop is small grains such as wheat or rye, which is allowed to grow before maturity and then shredded to prevent seed production.

Native grasses can be planted as early as December 1st and no later than June 1st. Plant wheat or rye crop between September 15th thru October 15th at rate of 50 lbs. per acre. Shred or chemical control small grains in April or May. Plant haygrazer crop between June 1st thru July 10th at a rate of 4 to 8 lbs. per acre and also shred or chemical control prior to seed production. Please leave wheat or rye stubble undisturbed until native grass planting. Your local Natural Resources Conservation Service would like each CRP producer to notify the NRCS office before planting their covercrop.

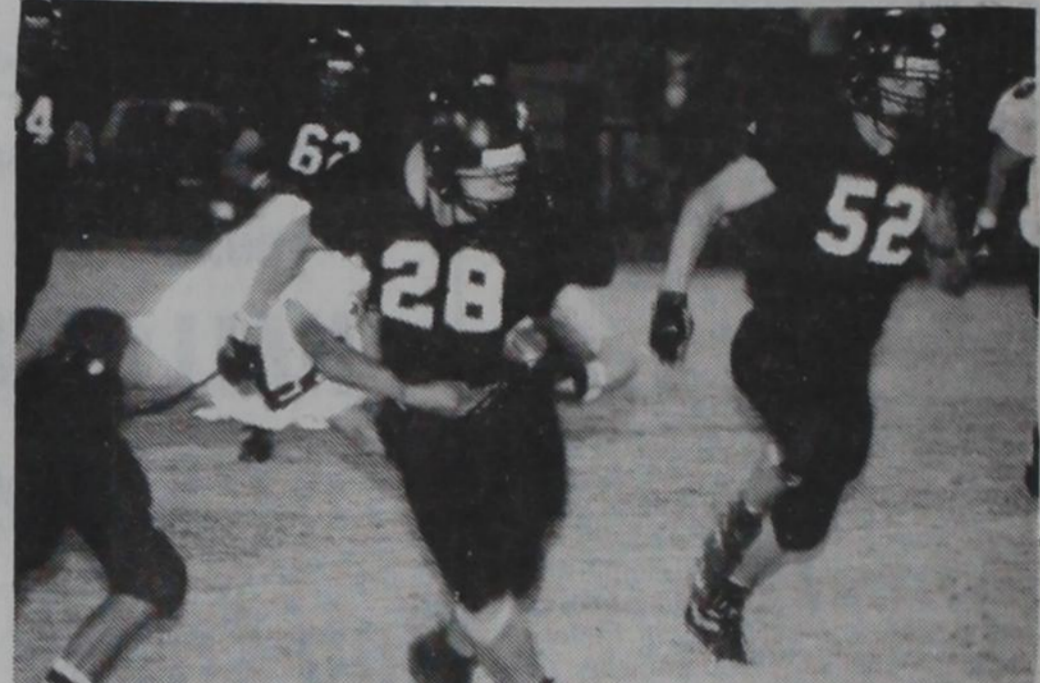
