Thompson replaces Watson Burgess who is retiring after serving as SPS manager in Wheeler for 26 years. Burgess has worked for SPS for almost 40 years.

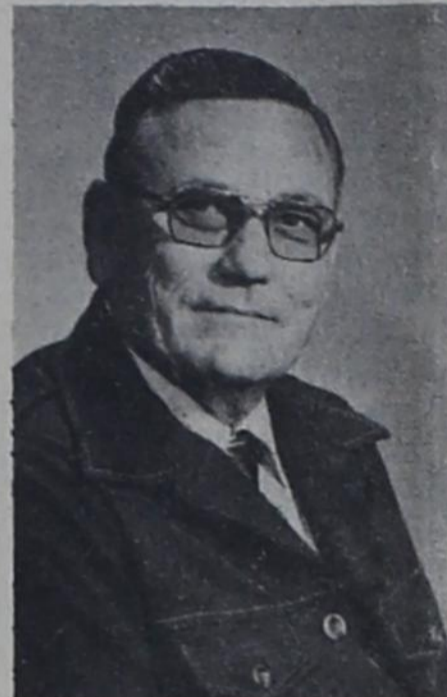

AMBULANCE

The Wheeler County Ambulance Service will begin operation Tuesday, June 1, 1976 under the Supervision of Carl Knoll, County-wide Coordinator. This service is being initiated because of the private ambulance service provided by the funeral homes in Wheeler and Shamrock were having difficulty functioning because of stringent state and federal rules and regulations and gave notice that they could no longer continue to provide service to the county residents. An ambulance will be stationed in Wheeler and another in Shamrock and a third is on order for backup service. These ambulances were obtained through a matching grant through P.R.P.

The ambulance will be manned by trained volunteers. Both Wheeler and Shamrock have organized volunteer groups. The volunteer groups are at this time taking the Emergency Medical Technicians course and will be taking their final exam on Saturday, May 29, 1976. Another course is being planned as soon as possible in order to have more qualified personnel to assist with manning the ambulances. The next course will be held in Wheeler at a time to be decided. The ambulance attendants must have finished an E.M.T. Emergency Care Attendant or a First Aid Course. In addition, the driver must have a chauffeur's license.

The North and South Wheeler County Hospital Districts as well as both cities are cooperating with the County in providing this much needed service. In order to offset a portion of the cost, of the ambulance service, fees will be charged and will be set by the County. The fees will be as follows:

Conservation Ed. Grants Offered

The following is in reply to an anonymous letter written to Ernie McGaughey some few weeks ago.

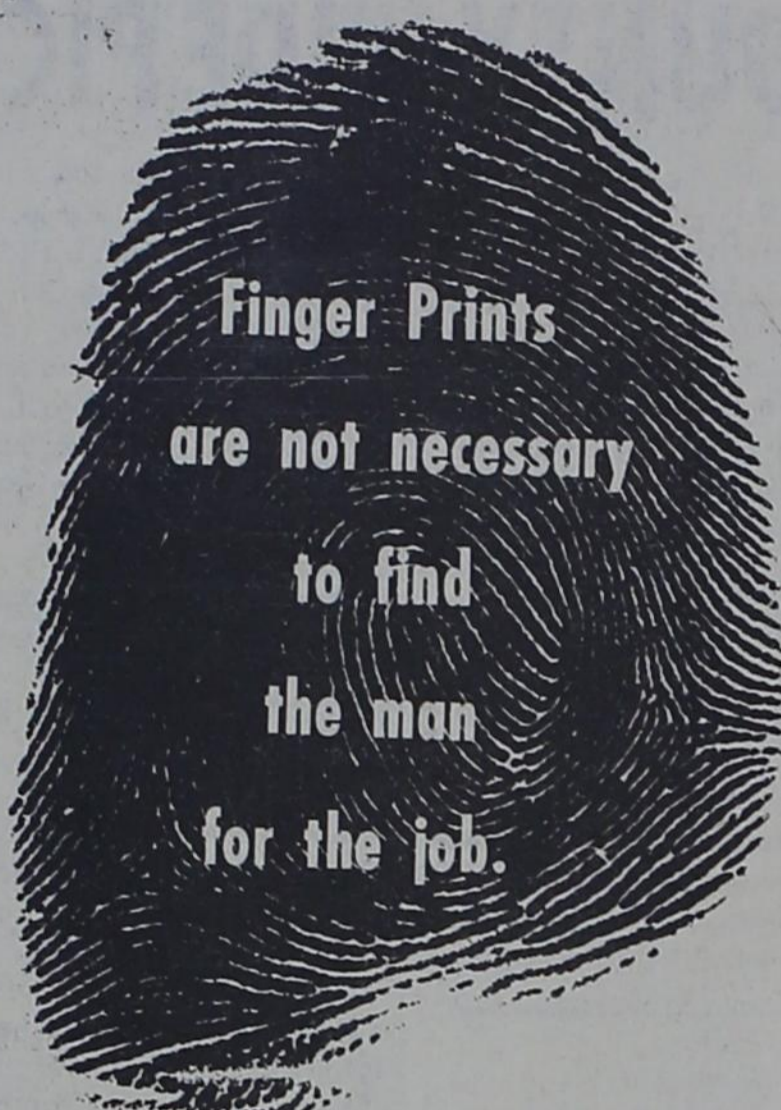
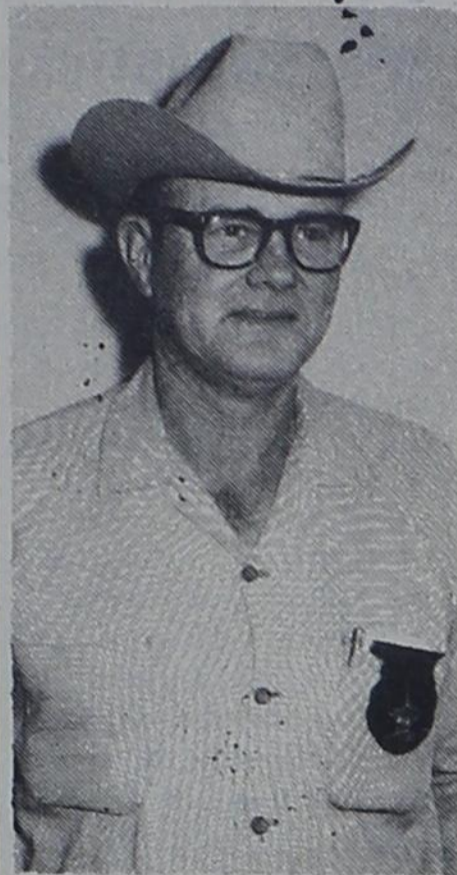

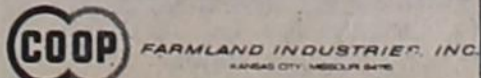

County Agent's Column

The type of plow used in dryland wheat farming in the Southern High Plains can make a big difference in wheat yields according to Dr. W. C. Johnson, USDA Soil Scientist at the USDA Research Center near Amarillo. The scientist stated that 32 years of research show that continuous wheat grown with sweep tillage has averaged 11.4 bushels per acre, while yields on land that was one-way plowed averaged 9.5 bushels per acre. This long term study was started a few years after the Research Center opened in 1938.

The 1.5 bushels per acre increase adds up to 51 bushels over 32 years. That little difference does not seem like much but amounts to about \$360 per acre at today's wheat price.

The same trend holds true when the two plows were compared in a wheat-fallow system where one crop is harvested in 2 years. Here sweep tillage yielded 15.5 bushels per acre and one-way tillage 14.5 bushels per acre.

There are 3 million acres of dryland wheat in the Texas Panhandle. If sweep plows were used, total wheat production would be increased almost 5 million bushels annually. "At today's price, the extra grain would be worth \$6 million," Johnson stated. This research is also applicable to the Oklahoma Panhandle and Western Kansas where dryland wheat is grown on another 4 million acres.

The extra yield with sweep tillage is caused by increased soil moisture at planting. Straw mulch on the soil surface decreases both evaporation and runoff during the fallow, the scientist speculated. A 25-year average with continuous wheat shows that available soil moisture to 6 feet was 4.1 inches at planting with

sweep tillage. Soil moisture on one-way plowed land was 3.5 inches. Other long-term experiments show that 1 inch of soil moisture at planting increases wheat yields 3 bushels per acre. In this experiment the 0.6 inch of soil moisture increased yield 16 bushels per acre.

Dr. Paul Unger, another USDA Soil Scientist at the Center, aided Johnson with the study and determined that sweep tillage helped conserve valuable soil organic matter. At the start of the experiment, top soil contained 2.4 percent organic matter. In general, the wheat fallow system decreased organic matter faster than growing a crop of wheat every year. By 1971, with wheat fallow and one-way plowing, organic matter had dropped all the way to 1.5 percent. When sweep tillage was used 17 percent organic matter was left. There was about 0.2 percent more organic matter where continuous wheat was grown. The sweep plow again had an advantage over one-way plowing, Unger stated, "Frequent plowing and turning under straw rapidly depletes organic matter."

Nitrate-nitrogen determinations were made in conjunction with organic matter measurements. In 1970, wheat-fallow areas that were one-way plowed had 462 pounds per acre of nitrate-nitrogen in 6 feet of soil while sweep plowed areas had 289. In either case there was enough nitrogen to produce several dryland wheat crops. This difference was reflected in wheat protein but not yield. In 1975, wheat from one-way plowed land had 16 percent protein and wheat from sweep tillage areas had 13.5 percent protein. The 13.5 percent protein is about average for the dryland wheat and a little higher percentage than what is expected in irrigated wheat. Lower protein with sweep tillage was caused by less nitrogen in the soil and higher grain yield. Lower nitrogen in the soil with sweep tillage decreased straw growth and favors grain production. In 1973 and 1975, wheat after one-way tillage on fallowed land produced 17 and 24 percent more straw per pound of grain than sweep tillage. Extra vegetative growth with one-way tillage used soil moisture needed to produce grain.

In laboratory studies, the scientists found that plowing method did not affect soil aggregation, soil density, and water intake. However, straw on the soil surface with sweep tillage greatly decreased the wind erosion hazard. The scientists concluded that sweep tillage is a soil conservation practice that pays. Grain yield is increased at the same time wind and water erosion is decreased. In addition, precious soil organic matter is conserved.

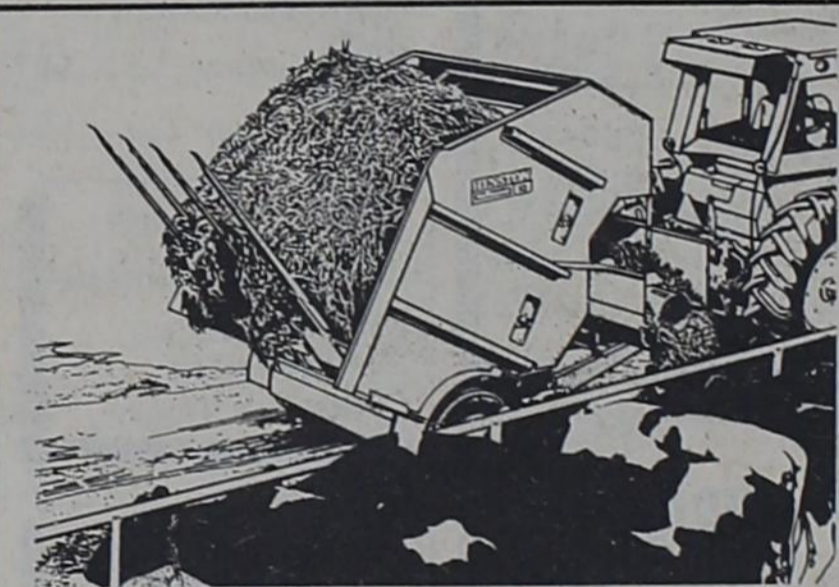
