Hospital Director Election For Wheeler, Kelton Area

The deadline for filing for director of the North Wheeler County Hospital District is March 9, 1976. Two districts will elect directors this year. They are Kelton and Wheeler. These districts are currently represented by Paula Britt, Kelton and Barry Altman, Wheeler. This election will be held in conjunction with the school election on April 3, 1976. Any qualified taxpayer desiring his or her name to be placed on the ballot

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce will hold their annual Installation Banquet Saturday, February 21, 1976 in the school cafeteria. The speaker for the 7:30 gathering will be Kenneth Wyatt, noted area artist. Officers to be installed for the coming year are Lyndon Loyd, president, Delbert Thomas and Jane Thomas will remain as secretary. Two new directors will be installed at the banquet; they are Bob Roark and Sharon Wright. Loyd has been a resident of Wheeler since May, 1970 at which time he was employed at Beef Cattle Co. For the past 8 months, he and his wife, Novelene, have operated Loyd's and Street's, Inc., Ben Franklin Store. Loyd has not only been active in Chamber, but presently is serving as president of Methodist Men at the Methodist Church of Wheeler and is serving as Interclub chairman of the local Kiwanis Club. In Kiwanis, Loyd devoted untold hours working with the Summer Baseball Program last year and will serve as president of the Summer Baseball Program again this year. The president-elect has served the Chamber as vice-president for the past year and has headed the Retail Merchant's committee. Delbert Thomas is employed at Pete Burton Ford and has served the Chamber on the board of directors for the past three years and served as second vice-president in 1973. Thomas is presently serving his first term on the City Council. Kenneth Wyatt who has been called "the Mark Twain of Art," is also a Methodist minister who has been a banquet speaker for a number of years. The Tulia artist-minister speaker recently completed three paintings commissioned by Panhandle Insurance Agency of Amarillo to commemorate the Texas Panhandle Centennial. Wyatt was born in Wichita Falls. He moved to Stephenville when he was 11 and graduated from high school there before entering John Tarleton College (now Tarleton State College) and McMurry College. He was graduated from Cliff School of Theology at Denver, Colo., before holding pastorate in Texline, Chillicothe, Paducah, Morton and Tulia. Tickets for the banquet are available at a cost of \$4.50 at the First National Bank, The Wheeler Times, Roark's Fine Food, Pritchard's Thriftway, and Loyd's Ben Franklin or any member of the Chamber Board of Directors. A number of plaques will be presented at the banquet. As has been the policy for the past few years, plaques will be presented to the Outstanding Man, Woman, Teenager, Employee, and Farmer-Rancher. Winners in the Christmas lighting contest-business and residential, will be given recognition at the banquet. Two new members of the board of directors will be

Remaining on the board for the next three years will be Lowell Lasley and Lyndon Loyd. Dr. Mike Smith and Charlie Brown have two years remaining on the board. Delbert Thomas and Kent Sims complete their terms on the board this year. Dinner will be served by Zebbies of Shamrock. Beta Sigma Phi will present an award at the Banquet. They will recognize the "Outstanding Individual of the Year." This will be the second year the sorority has made a presentation at the banquet. The City of Wheeler enacted an ordinance on Junk Cars in 1974; this ordinance has not been enforced in the past. The ordinance was published in the January 28 edition of the "Times" along with the warning of the Council's intention to enforce the ordinance. Until the present time all the cars crushed have been voluntarily sold to Mack; however, Police Chief Keith Miller was told at the February meeting of the council to begin issuing notices which give the owners 10 days to abate or remove the vehicle.

February City Council Meeting

The February meeting of the Wheeler City Council was held Monday, February 16, at the city office. The meeting opened with a prayer and the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting. Dr. Tommie Hearnard and Ken Daughtry met with the council. Jerry Heffley reported on the Water and Sewer Department and requested a tire for the grader; the council voted to purchase a recapped tire. Mr. Hooley of Miami had been contacted to pull and repair the north well at the City water works. Heffley was authorized to hire someone to pick up stray and/or unlicensed dogs. If a citizen should miss their dog, they may check at the city office to see if it has been picked up. Notice of captured animals will be posted at the city office and will be held for a period of five days. Richard Wallace presented receipts and disbursements of the city for the month of January. Police Chief Keith Miller reported on department activities. Patrolman Larry Anderson's resignation, effective February 15, was presented and accepted. After discussion on the replacement of Anderson, the matter was tabled for further discussion. Ken Daughtry, a member of the Fire Department, presented a proposed budget for the volunteer fire department. Bills were reviewed and passed for payment.

City Election Saturday, April 3

The City of Wheeler will hold an election Saturday, April 3, to elect a Mayor and three Councilmen. Persons filing for councilman this year will file for one of three places on the council. Place One on the ballot will be filled for a one year term. Ronnie Cox was elected to serve last year and moved shortly after being given the oath of office. Dr. Smith was appointed to serve the remainder of the year. According to city ordinances, this place is to be filled in the next regular election. In the January 28 edition of the "Times" it was mistakenly reported that only two places, two and four, were to be filled by the election. In years past, a person placed his name on the ballot and the candidates with the most votes served on the council. The council decided to number the seats on the council; the mayor and even numbered seats will run on even years and the three odd numbers will run on odd years. Place 2 and Place 4 are to be filled by voters this year. David Cross is serving in Place 2 and Louis Stas is serving in Place 4. At the January meeting of the council, a resolution was adopted call for an election to be held Saturday, April 3, in the school cafeteria in conjunction with the school election. Those wishing to have their name on the ballot for mayor or councilman may file with the Mayor at the City Office on or before Thursday, March 4.

The traditional Valentine theme was carried out in program covers, table decorations, and other appointments. Approximately 70 members and guests attended.

We have had a problem with rain water runoff causing erosion around the Agricultural Center. The pipe will be used to carry the water away from the barn."

He's stuck with cold cuts! Why not beef? Simply because union butchers in Chicago have a contract that forbids stores from selling fresh meat unless a Union Butcher is on duty. An union butcher refuse to work after 6 p.m. or on Sunday or holidays. They've turned beef into strictly a week day, 9 to 5 business, in Chicago. That labor contract is one of the most dramatic examples of a problem that's causing growing concern among beef industry leaders. They feel that organized labor, by blocking every effort at streamlining the beef business has been creating a giant "rip off" in the beef business. It hits both sides with consumers paying needlessly high prices and cattlemen being cheated out of fair profits.

Simply because labor unions won't allow beef to be handled and sold in the most efficient ways it's obvious that many beef sales are lost in Chicago every day. Simply because the late shopper must settle for Spam instead of steak! And economists agree that such a cut in demand eventually gets reflected back to the cattlemen in terms of a little less money for the beef he produces.
