Openly We Aid Communism

To what extent should the free and generous people of the United States be called upon or expected to contribute to the welfare of nations which lie within the orbit of communism and who constitute an integral part of the Communist world?

When we understand that the United States is paying the cost of Polish researchers and technicians working in their own country to develop means of increasing animal and poultry production as well as agricultural output, we must recognize that while it is humanitarianism to help feed the hungry it is down-right folly to help build the economy of a nation classified as within the enemy realm.

Also it should not be forgotten that the United States also paid the expenses of a group of Polish specialists who visited our country to learn what they could do about improving methods.

Then the United States sent a large shipment of fodder and feed grains to assist Communist Poland's program of development of more meat.

Can anyone be so naive as to believe that we are going to change the form of government in Poland from communism to freedom by these vast outlays of money?

Is it the policy of our government to spare no effort in helping make a success of the communist regime in Poland?

And what has happened in Poland has happened in Yugoslavia, Indonesia and other areas, and it is the announced policy of our government to continue on a long range basis a foreign aid program that envisages help to them.

Do we hear the voices of our Senators and Congressmen being raised in protest against this contribution to the success of communism?

LAST RITES HELD FOR U. B. TRAYLER

Mr. Trayler was a farmer and a member of the Wheeler Church of Christ. He served his country in the Army during World War I.

Funeral services were held at the Church of Christ in Wheeler with minister E. M. Borden, Jr., officiating.

Survivors include the wife, Mrs. Agnes Trayler; one son, Darwin Trayler, Dumas, Tex.; two grand children; two brothers, Oscar of Tulsa and Charlie of Allison, Tex.; and one sister, Mrs. Ada Hall of Vernon, Texas.

Four brothers and two sisters preceded him in death.

Report of Accreditation Visit

Editor's Note The following is a report from Walter Labay, Clemon Montgomery and Noel Higgins of the Texas Education Agency on the condition and standing of the Wheeler Schools. It indicates that Mr. Cordell and his faculty and board members have been doing a tremendous job and we feel that everyone in the community should read the report.

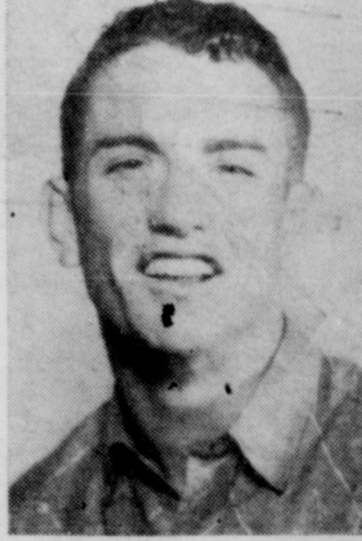
Wheeler Independent School District, containing 141 square miles, is located in the central part of Wheeler County. All schools in the district are located in the city of Wheeler, the county seat, which has a population of approximately 1,200 people. Total valuation of the district for school tax purposes is \$2,789,000, which is primarily on farm and ranch property. The tax rate is \$1.35 per \$100 valuation; \$1.15 of the rate is for maintenance and operation and 20 cents is for retirement of a bonded indebtedness of \$70,000.

Duplicated copies of policies of the school board and of the superintendent were available for interested individuals. Minutes of school board meetings were typed and properly maintained in a journal.

An extensive self-evaluation was made by the professional staff during the past year and a half, and copies of the report were available. Inservice education meetings are held twice per month and there was evidence of sincere teacher interest in the programs.

The Wheeler School District uses an eight-four plan of instructional organization. At the time of the accreditation visit, 249 pupils were enrolled in the first eight grades, and 110 in high school. Classroom space for both elementary school and high school, a gymnasium, cafeteria, vocational agriculture department, and vocational home-making department are in separate buildings on a single campus.

The professional staff consisted of the superintendent, who taught two classes, two part-time principals, nine classroom teachers, and two vocational teachers. In addition, a school nurse and a music teacher are employed on a cooperative basis with four other school districts that spend approximately one day per week in the Wheeler schools. Great Plains Program

Several farm programs are available to encourage soil and water conservation in the Wheeler Soil Conservation District. One of the latest cost share programs is the Great Plains program.

The Great Plains Program is a special program for the dust bowl area. Parts of 10 states are included in the dust bowl. Only the western counties of Texas are included in the Great Plains Program.

The Great Plains Program is designed to help establish all of the conservation needs on an operating unit. The farmer or rancher decides in advance how much and when he plans to do the things that need to be done. Funds for assisting in applying the work is obligated according to the plan made by the farmer. The farmer makes definite plans and the funds are allocated on a definite basis. Changes in when a job is to be done involve re-allocating the cost share payment, therefore the farmer is asked to keep as close to his original form plan as possible.

The planning and cost share is made through the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the local district program. Grass seeding, livestock water, cross-fences, brush control, dams, terraces, tree planting and management practices are the main items encouraged through the Great Plains Program.

The Wheeler County Soil Conservation District supervisors encourage the farmers to participate in the conservation program best adapted to his farm.

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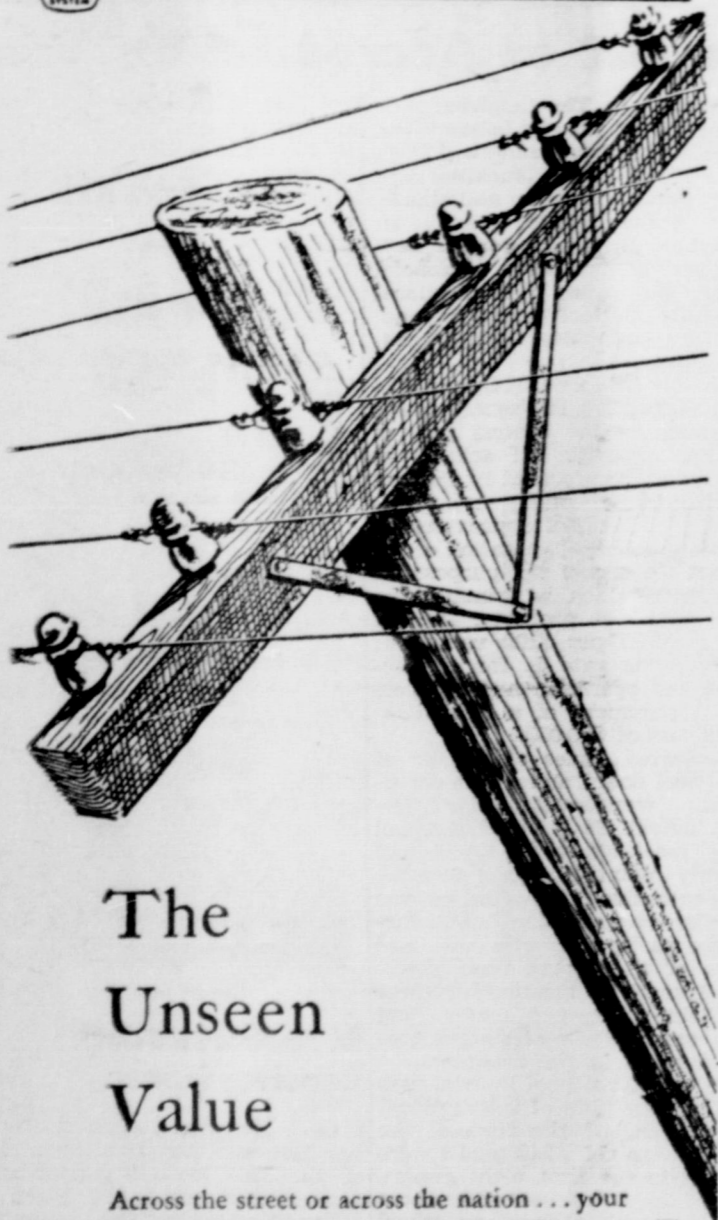

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex. — From here on the Legislature must make every minute count if it is to wind up essential business before the regular session ends May 29.

Despite the dwindling time, fillibusters, postponements and disagreements have slowed progress on tax-raising and other "must" legislation.

The House passed 2 per cent sales tax faces two ultimatums. Gov. Price Daniel said he could not allow it to become law unless the total money-raising program puts more of the tax burden on business and less on individuals. Sen. Henry B. Gonzalez of San Antonio said he would filibuster against the sales tax if it came up in the Senate.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert estimated the House sales tax bill would raise in excess of \$150,000,000 a year. This is higher than other estimates and would provide enough or nearly enough to meet estimated revenue needs. Calvert, by law, has the final and official say-so on tax yield estimates.

Governor Daniel's veto threat chilled earlier optimism about an early wrap-up of money problems and turned House members to thinking again in terms of compromise and "package bills."

Spending Conference — A ten-man conference committee is at work ironing out the differences between House and Senate versions of the general appropriations bill.

House bill would cost about \$16,000,000 more than the Senate's. Committee task of striking a balance between the two is expected to take three weeks.

Senate members of this important committee are Senators Ray Roberts of McKinney, A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Paris, Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo and Wardlow Lane of Center.

House members are Representatives James Cotton of Weatherford, Bill Hollowell of Grand Saline, B. H. Dewey of Bryan, J. W. Buchanan of Dumas and Malcolm McCregor of El Paso.

Teacher Pay Pushed — Advocates of higher teacher salaries are pushing to get their bill in position for quick final action once the money-raising and general appropriations measures are out of the way.

House Appropriations Committee approved and sent to the floor a bill that would provide the full \$800 a year salary increase sought by teachers.

Goal is to get a pay raise bill passed in both houses, then send it to a conference committee to work out differences. Then at the strategic moment, it would be ready for final adoption by both houses.

Training Methods Scored — House members are pressing for speedy action for a measure that would require less emphasis on "how" and more emphasis on "what" in public school teacher training.

Rep. Henry C. Grover of Houston, a teacher on leave, is sponsor of the bill that would reduce education (teacher method) courses from 24 semester hours to 12 for junior and senior high teachers. For grade school teachers the maximum would be reduced from a possible 60 to 24 semester hours.

One supporter observed that the late Albert Einstein wouldn't have been eligible to teach mathematics in a Texas high school. House voted to instruct the Education committee to report on the bill immediately.

Re-Districting Hits Bump — Senate efforts to pass a senatorial re-districting bill were postponed by Sen. Jop Fuller's fillibustering opposition.

Senator Fuller of Port Arthur opposes the proposed measure because it would continue to combine Orange County with Jefferson (Beaumont, Port Arthur) to form his district. Jefferson County alone has more than enough votes to be a one-county district, says Fuller, and Orange would rather be in another district with counties of the same size.

Pressure to force agreement on a re-districting bill will be very very strong since, if the Legislature fails to act, a non-Legislative Board will take over.

Gloomy Reports — While lawmakers struggled to find new taxes, the news about present taxes was bad all over.

State Treasurer Jessie James reported that Texans apparently are not smoking and drinking like they used to, causing a million dollar slump in tobacco and liquor taxes in April. Revenue dropped from \$8,689,855 in March to \$7,362,176 in April.

Motor fuel tax revenue was also off, according to State Highway Engineer DeWitt Greer. A 3 1/2 per cent drop during the past eight months cost the state \$3,000,000.

Meanwhile in the Third Court of Civil Appeals, the state lost in an effort to collect a state sales tax on component parts of radio sets, such as hi-fi tuners. Court said the law is not clear.

Loan Dispute Flares — Words were hot, but the issue unclear, as Senate committee hearings on a small loan will stretch out.

Critics of the House-passed bill fell into at least two factions: (1) those who felt the interest rates (up to 40 percent on the smallest loans) were too high and (2) those who felt over-all charges should be higher for loans for \$100 and less.

Meanwhile, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson issued a statement blasting "powerful out-of-state loan sharks" trying to "bottle up" regulation.

Texas' unemployment picture is also brightened during March. Total number employed rose to 3,387,300, and unemployment declined by 28,100. But the number of jobless persons was still higher than for the same month last year, said the Texas Employment Commission.

Rep. W. T. Oliver of Port Neches has announced he is a candidate for Speaker of the House in the next Legislature. Oliver is generally regarded as a conservative.

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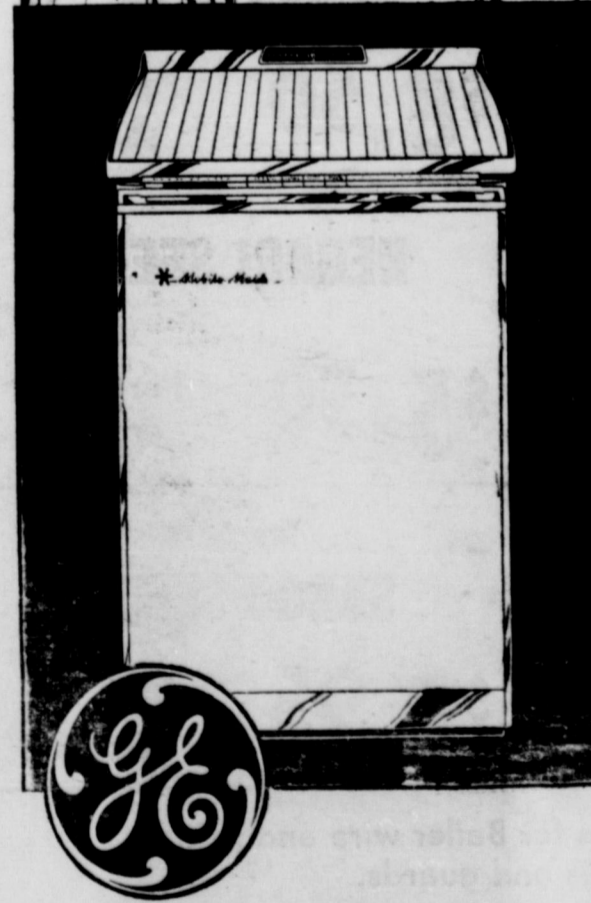

Recent good news is our report from the accreditation Division of the Texas Education Agency concerning their visit here on April 5th. The relationship between administrators, teachers, and pupils indicated a high level of morale. Instructional supplies, aids, and equipment were adequate in all areas except in vocational agriculture and chemistry. Additional hand tools were needed in vocational agriculture, and more chemistry. Approximately \$3,500 was spent for equipping and supplying the science laboratory last summer, and plans were to purchase the remainder of the needed supplies during the summer of 1961.

Room libraries are used in each of the six grades. A central library maintained in the elementary building for grades seven and eight also contains special reference books for the lower grades; a central library is operated in the high school. Even though \$2,000 was spent for library books last school year, and \$2,561 this year, this is an area that needs continued expansion and improvement throughout the school.

The school buildings, although old, are suitable in design and arrangement to meet the needs of the instructional program. Maintenance of the buildings was usually good. The results of approximately \$10,000 spent on capital improvement during the last year was noticeable throughout the school plant. The only needed improvements noted were the replacement of an outside door in the elementary building, provision for ventilation in both dressing rooms in the gymnasium, and additional storage space in the science laboratory.

Recommendation: It is recommended that Wheeler Independent School District continue to be fully accredited.

The Wheeler 440 Relay team went into the state meet with the 3rd fastest time in the state. They followed Lassbuddie 44.1 and Bangs, 44.2. Wheeler's best time came in finals of Regional meet, 44.4. In the State finals the team had two bad handoffs and that's too many to win a relay race. The team was David Tremble, Jerry Hefley, Clayton Bradshaw, and Jim Jolly. The people should be proud of these boys. They were the 8th fastest relay team of about 300 class B schools in Texas. The Wheeler team ran 44.6 in the finals. That was won by Lassbuddie in record time of 43.6.

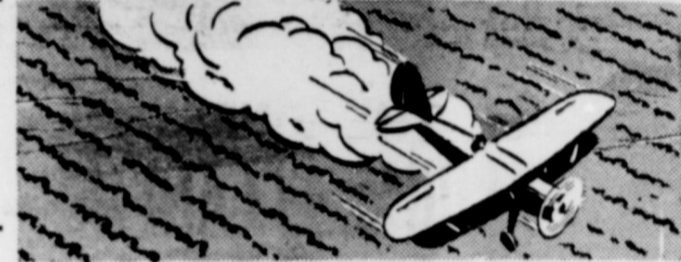

Dead Litter Needed To Establish Grass

The success of establishing grass usually depends on the kind of dead litter in which the seed is planted. A good dead litter keeps the seed in place, holds surface moisture, adds fertility and helps regulate soil temperature.

Most grass seed has to be planted very shallow. Without some dead litter protection and added benefits, newly seeded grasses often do not survive. The amount of dead litter needed to establish grass is more for sandy soil than for clay soil. Deep sand needs about 2500 pounds of residue. Clay soil needs a minimum of 750 pounds of residue.

Several varieties of annual plants are desirable for dead cover crops. Grain sorghum, sudan, millet, broom corn and small grain residues left on the surface make good protection for new grass planting. Crops to be followed with grass should not be permitted to make seed. Volunteer crops compete for moisture and plant food needed for the new grass.

Drilled crops provide the best seed cover for grass seeding. No cultivation of the dead litter is needed unless volunteer growth is a problem. Cost share on dead litter crops is available through the Great Plains Program. The Soil Conservation Service technicians would like to assist all farmers and ranchers who plan to establish more grass.

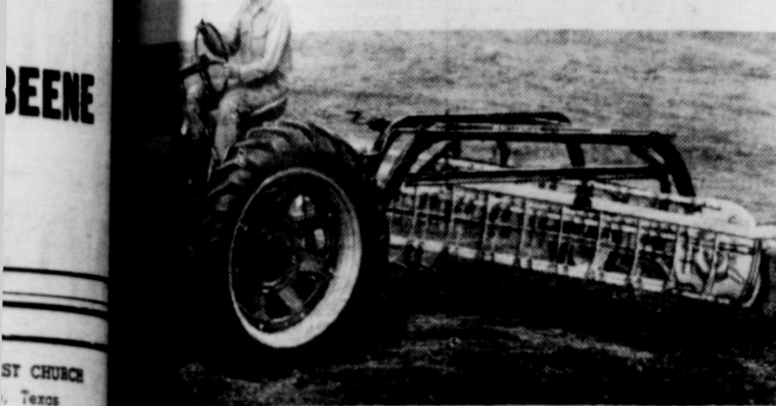

Safe Driving Programs Given To Area Schools

Safe driving must be made a personal habit of every motorist if the slaughter on America's highways is to be curbed, Joe Smetana, Safety Director of the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department, declared today as he spoke prior to conducting driving tests at Mobeetie and Kelton High Schools.

"Excessive speed is the greatest single cause of automobile accidents," Smetana said. In the demonstrations which followed, he pointed out the conditions under which ever 20, 30, or 40 miles per hour can be excessive.

Smetana added, "When drivers know the true facts and base their driving on those facts, highway accidents will drop sharply."

The much-talked-about movie, "Death On The Highway" was shown to the students, teachers and guests.

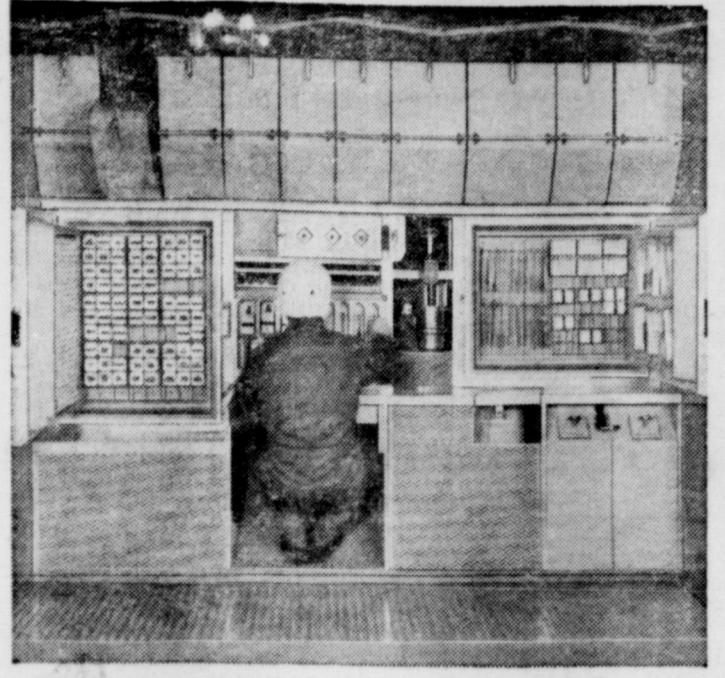
Students and teachers took part in the tests which were conducted in a specially equipped car. The test driver was signaled to stop by an electrically controlled Denotator. As the shell was fired, the street was marked with yellow paint. A second bullet was fired as brakes were applied and a third after the car came to a complete stop. Distances between the shots were carefully measured to determine in feet and inches how far the car traveled before the driver applied the brakes, or the reaction distances, and how it traveled after the brakes were applied, or the braking distance.

Smetana emphasized the fact that a driver who observes the speed laws carefully is not a safe driver if he neglects many other items such as proper signaling for turns, approaching an intersection in the proper lane for a turn, the proper way to turn around and many other things which are essential for safe driving.

The safety demonstration which was brought to Mobeetie and Kelton, under the sponsorship of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau is part of a long range program of traffic safety now being conducted by the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department.

Out of This World Kitchen



When it's mealtime in outer space here's where the crew of an American space vehicle could have it. This mockup of the Space Kitchen recently constructed by Whirlpool Corporation for the Aeronautical Systems Division, Air Force Systems Command, shows how all foods and beverages required by a three man crew on a fourteen day space mission could be stored and prepared.

Canned and dried foods will be stored in pull-down pivoted bunks, one of which is shown swung down for demonstration purposes. Bunkers run the entire length of the kitchen. Below bunks at far left with door open is the freezer. Door of freezer contains racks of bite-size sandwiches. Immediately above head of the make-believe spaceman is a three cavity heating oven. Canned foods are placed in oven, automatically heated to 170°F in approximately 30 minutes. Partially visible below oven is rack of feeding nipples. Nipples are attached to canned foods, then cans are attached to food expelling devices shown fastened in place in feeding tray located in front of the man. Would-be space-man is reaching for polyethylene tube containing coffee.

To his right is the cold water nozzle for reconstituting liquids such as milk or fruit juice. Next to nozzle is water transfer pump. Stored within the interior of the refrigerator shown at far right are tubes of reconstituted liquids, sandwiches and canned foods which the astronaut has removed from freezer, placed in refrigerator to thaw. Below refrigerator is hot water nozzle, disposal areas for wet and dry waste. Although containing versions of most appliances found in American homes, the Whirlpool Space Kitchen weighs only 800 pounds, is 7½ feet high, 10 feet long. Following delivery to the Air Force, the Space Kitchen will undergo extensive ground testing by Aerospace Medical Laboratory personnel at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio.

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A "MUST" FOR ALL OF US

Today, we are told, there are many sound, imaginative plans to move rapidly ahead in the battle against cancer. The immediate problem, according to the American Cancer Society is that funds from the annual Cancer Crusade are not sufficient to take these plans off the drawing board and put them into action.

Nationally, the public has increased support of the Society's programs to a three-year average of about \$30,000,000 annually. This has been generous, but it is not enough. The Society says that "even this average of giving does not provide sufficient funds to cover all research projects already approved and considered 'musts' by Society's various scientific committees and the Board of Directors."

A "must" in the Society's rating system of applications considered for grants simply means that a group of scientist eminent in a specific area of cancer research after study of the proposal agree that it must be done if we are to move more rapidly ahead. We agree with the scientists that "musts" and we know that during the May Crusade the public will respond to the challenge.

Most of us have heard the question asked "Does all this money spent on cancer research bring us any nearer solution of the problem?" It does. Progress is being made, but because of the nature of the disease, progress is slow and difficult. We can now report that there are, as the Society says, "more than 1,000,000 living Americans who have been cured of cancer." That is progress.

Progress has been made against uterine cancer, the second most deadly cancer in women. Development of a simple "smear" test, in which the Society has invested many thousands of dollars, has made it possible under ideal conditions to virtually eliminate this cancer as a cause of death. New knowledge of cancer and new possibilities have been opened through research that can not be effectively evaluated today. Only time can give us the answer to what bearing they will have to the "break-through" when it comes.

A "must" for all of us is support of the American Cancer Society. The Society is currently supporting 651 research grants at a cost of \$17,661,470. Much more money must be raised to make it possible to support many more grants.

Mrs. W. D. Lang is the co-chairman of Wheeler. Last year over two thousand dollars was raised in the entire county with Wheeler contributing only \$260.00. This year, let's give Mrs. Lang all the support necessary to put Wheeler at top of this important program.
