Cotton Harvest Is Begun In County

The Wheeler County cotton harvest is officially underway.

Four bales from the 1962 crop had been ginned at the Wheeler Gin up to Wednesday, and Manager Fat Jones said more is expected as fields dry out from weekend rains.

To R. A. Sims and his son, Ralph, went the distinction — and \$25 award for producing the first bale brought here for ginning. R. A. Sims brought the load of cotton to the gin on Wednesday, Sept. 12, and it was processed the following day weighing 440 pounds and was produced from 1,700 pounds of pulled cotton. Sims also has brought in his second bale.

Winning the second-bale award of \$15 was Bob Zybach, with Gaddy Vise claiming the \$10 prize for having the third bale.

The total \$50 in prize money is given each year by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. In addition, the Wheeler Gin ginned the first bale free of charge.

Zybach's bale was brought to the gin Thursday and Vise's the following day. Jones reported that the cotton appeared to be of good quality, but grading results had not been received Wednesday.

Sims planted the cotton which produced the first bale on May 9. He has been farming southeast of Mobeetie since coming to this area in 1907.

With the expansion project nearing completion, more employees are needed at the Marie Foundations factory in McLean, according to Cal Fraser, owner, and Dale Greenhouse, production superintendent.

Mustangs Whip Mangum 14-8; Will Host Erick On Friday

Rain and the Mangum Tigers ushered in the 1962 football season at Nicholson Field, but the scrappy Wheeler Mustangs were able to overcome both and win their first game of the year by the score of 14-8.

The Mustangs meet another Oklahoma team this Friday night, when they play host to Erick. Kickoff time at Nicholson Field will be 8 p.m.

Coach Grady Burnett's Mustangs were never behind last Friday, but the fans were on their feet the last few minutes of play as Tigers tried mightily to score but were thwarted by Dunk Porter's interception of a pass on the Mustang goal line.

Porter ran the ball out to the 20 and the gun sounded on the

next play.

The Mustangs drew first blood in this hard hitting contest with 2:49 left in the first quarter as Porter circled his left end from 15 yards out and crossed the goal line at the flag.

Richard Wallace, sophomore quarterback, passed to Mendall Hunter in the right flat for the extra points and the Mustangs tacked eight points on the scoreboard.

This marked the second time the home team had been deep in Tiger territory, but their first drive was blunted by a fumble on the Mangum five-yard line.

The first half was drawing to a close when Wheeler again scored on a 27-yard pass from Porter to Vanpool, but an illegal use of the hands penalty nullified the score

and the half ended with the Mustangs on the Mangum 15-yard line.

The Mustangs intercepted two of 13 passes the Tigers put in the air and both proved costly to the visiting Oklahomans.

The Tigers had a good drive going late in the third quarter when Daryl Snelgroves brought it to a quick halt with a fine interception at the Mustang 40 and returned it 20 yards to the Mangum 40-yard line.

With the aid of a 15-yard penalty against the Tigers for a personal foul, the Mustangs drove inside the Tiger 10 and another penalty moved the pigskin to the two-yard line. The Tigers stiffened but Hunter cracked over on his second try and the Mustangs boosted their margin to 14-0 with only 23 seconds remaining in the quarter.

The try for the two points failed and the Mustangs were through making the lights blink on the scoreboard, but the Mangum Tigers were far from defeated at this stage.

Edgar returned the kickoff 21 yards to the Mangum 45 and three plays later they were on the Mustang 46 with fourth and one facing them. The center of the Tiger line opened a wide hole in the Mustang defense and Joe Mitchell, an awfully big looking 150 pound fullback, went roaring through and went the distance for the score with some puny Wheeler defense far behind.

Copeland ran the two pointer and all of a sudden the Mustang lead was only 14-8. The score came on the first play of the final quarter. (Continued on Page 4, No. 3)

Mrs. Fulks had been in Kentucky only 1 1/2 weeks when death came at the home of a granddaughter.

He was born near Paducah, Ky., on Jan. 1, 1876, and attended school in Illinois. He moved to Wheeler, Texas, in 1911, where he was married to Nellie Alma McGee on May 14, 1902.

Farmer and Carpenter

Mrs. Fulks preceded her husband in death in 1951.

He was a member of the Baptist Church and a farmer and carpenter during his active life.

Mr. Fulks came to Wheeler County in 1921 and moved to Wheeler in 1949.

He is survived by three sons, George of Amarillo, Ben of Pampa and Leonard of Briscoe; one daughter, Marie Fulks of Wheeler; a sister, Mrs. Emma Culver of Metropolis, Ill.; 11 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his wife, two sons and one sister.

Family Home Burns Monday

A 7-year-old Mobeetie boy, burned early Monday morning when fire destroyed the family home.

The family home remained in critical condition Wednesday afternoon at Highland General Hospital in Pampa.

Jerry Dayton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed White, was admitted to the hospital for treatment shortly after the fire.

Plans had been made to fly the youth to a Galveston clinic for special treatment, but such action is being delayed until further improvement is shown.

About 1:30 a.m. Monday the family was awakened by fire within their home in Old Mobeetie.

Mrs. White was the first to awake, when she felt flames from a nearby hall way. White then led his wife and 16-month old son out of the house through the bedroom window.

He then ran through the burning hallway into the bedroom and began rushing the four other children through the bedroom window.

Jerry somehow became "turned around" and went into the hall way and dining room, and was overcome by flames and smoke

falling into the fire.

His father re-entered the burning dining room, gathered Jerry up from the floor and made his exit from the house.

Sweetwater Hearing Successful

Bill Brooks, Wheeler County Soil Conservation Service, said SCS personnel would conduct the field examination.

Representatives of State Conservation Boards from Texas and Oklahoma are to be on hand for the studies.

No opposition was voiced at Thursday's meeting, while more than 10 persons gave brief talks about the benefits they believe can be derived from the flood control project.

Stiles and Brooks pointed out that the field examination is only one of many steps necessary before actual construction of the dams on the watershed can be started.

Wheeler Mayor Thomas Daugherty, County Judge J. R. Hefley and other officials of the city and

county were present for the session, as well as representatives of the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District, SCS office and numerous landowners and interested persons.

Oklahoma officials attending were:

Marvin Emerson, executive director of the State Conservation Board; Leonard Solomon, assistant director of the board; Claud Ingram, board member; O. R. Wilhelm, state representative from Beckham County

From Texas, in addition to local and area people, were Bud Norton, engineer for the State Conservation Board; Aubrey Dalrimple, fieldman with the board, and Fred Parkey, general manager of the Red River Authority of Texas.

Leaders of the effort to win approval of an upstream flood prevention project on Sweetwater Creek were "favorably impressed" with the results of a hearing at the Wheeler last Thursday night.

Gordon Stiles, chairman of the steering committee for the watershed program reported this week that he was pleased with the turnout of interested persons.

Many landowners in the watershed spoke during the hearing, voicing the belief that the small-dam project would prevent flood damage to their property.

Following the meeting, it was announced that a preliminary field examination to determine the feasibility of the flood control work would be conducted on Oct. 23, 24 and 25.

Soil Conservation
News . . .

Many farmers in the Soil Conservation District are taking out a good insurance policy against wind erosion these days. They are over-seeding cotton with rye. This is being done mostly with a whirlwind or broadcast seeder. The rye will be up by pulling time and the traffic of harvesting will not hurt the young rye.

After the rye is off, leaving the soil exposed, the rye will take over the soil protection. This is a good conservation practice.

It is very encouraging to conservation minded people to see it being so widely applied.

Many farmers and ranchers are taking advantage of one of the most valuable services offered them by the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District. That is, the technical assistance of the Soil & Water Conservationists of the SCS in developing a sound plan with which to overcome their conservation problems.

These technicians go over a farm or ranch with the SCD cooperators and assist him with the plan. They look at problems that exist and discuss these as well as problems that may exist under continuing operation.

Alternatives of treatment are discussed and decided upon. These decisions are recorded. The SCS technicians then draw up a docket containing an actual aerial photograph of the farm or ranch. Each field is identified as to the land use it will have and the acres in it. A separate page tells of conservation practices to be applied on each field.

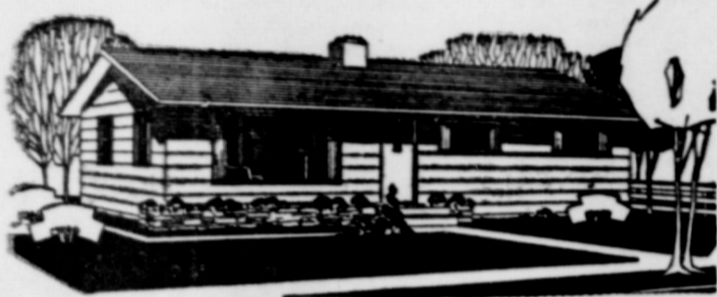
A soils map on an aerial photo is also included to show the location and type of different soils on the farm. A copy of this information is given each cooperator for his use and guide.

SCD cooperators who have recently developed plans are: Mrs. S. T. Richardson, Leon Bullard, L. H. Davidson, Ernest Gordon, Jack Garrison, Paul Green, Gwyn Edwards, and E. M. Rives. Many others are in the process of completion.

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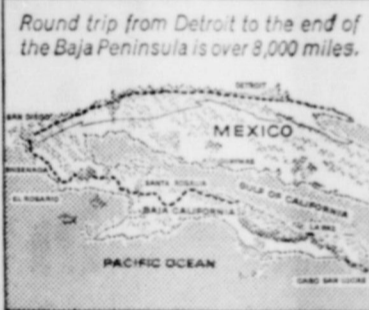

In April, 1954, six-year-old Randy Kerr received the first shot launching the giant nationwide field trials of the Salk polio vaccine. Eight years later Randy presents a Salk Institute lapel button to Crystal Brown, 18, a March of Dimes Teen Age Program leader and delegate from Warwick, R. I. at the 32nd National 4-H Conference in Washington, D. C.

Young Randall Kerr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Victor H. Kerr, Oakton, Va., is growing up to the title he has held for eight years—the nation's No. 1 Polio Pioneer.

In April, 1954, he was the first of millions of young school children who participated in the giant March of Dimes-financed field trials which helped prove the safety and effectiveness of the Salk vaccine.

Now going-on-13, Randy is the official leader of today's teen-age Polio Pioneers who are out to build a laboratory wing of the Salk Institute for Biological Studies in San Diego, Calif. To be constructed with funds raised by teenagers representing many schools and youth organizations across the country, the laboratory wing will be an enduring tribute to the youth of America and the historic success of their partnership with science against polio.

"We were just kids when we first got our Polio Pioneer pins,"

says the mature Randy Kerr. "But now we're old enough to realize how much the protection they represented has meant to us and to children everywhere."

A top-notch student majoring in chemistry and math, Randy is completing his sophomore year at the Flint Hill School in Oakton. Like most teenagers, he is far more aware of the giant strides of modern science than many adults.

"Dr. Salk's idea of a center where great scientists can work together for better understanding of the processes of life makes sense," Randy says with youthful positiveness. "Things like heredity and all sorts of disease are complicated. They have to be studied from a lot of different viewpoints if we're going to get the scientific knowledge we need."

The Salk Institute for Biological Studies, scheduled to open in 1963, will be directed by Dr. Jonas Salk. He will be joined by many world-eminent scientists in biology, chemistry,

virology, immunology and genetics, as well as others from such fields as physics and mathematics, to concentrate on finding answers to basic biological questions affecting life, health and disease.

As the No. 1 Polio Pioneer, Randy Kerr will help his teenage cohorts make plans for fund-raising events to support the \$15 million Salk Institute Building Fund. The fund is sponsored nationally by The National Foundation-March of Dimes, through which the American people totally supported Dr. Salk's polio research.

The starting date for the Salk Institute Building Fund campaign—June 1—coincides with Randy's fifteenth birthday.

"I can't think of a better way to celebrate," he says, "than by joining all the rest of the country's Polio Pioneers to thank Dr. Salk in this concrete way for the protection we've enjoyed. As tomorrow's adults, we can look forward to big dividends from our shares in the Salk Institute."

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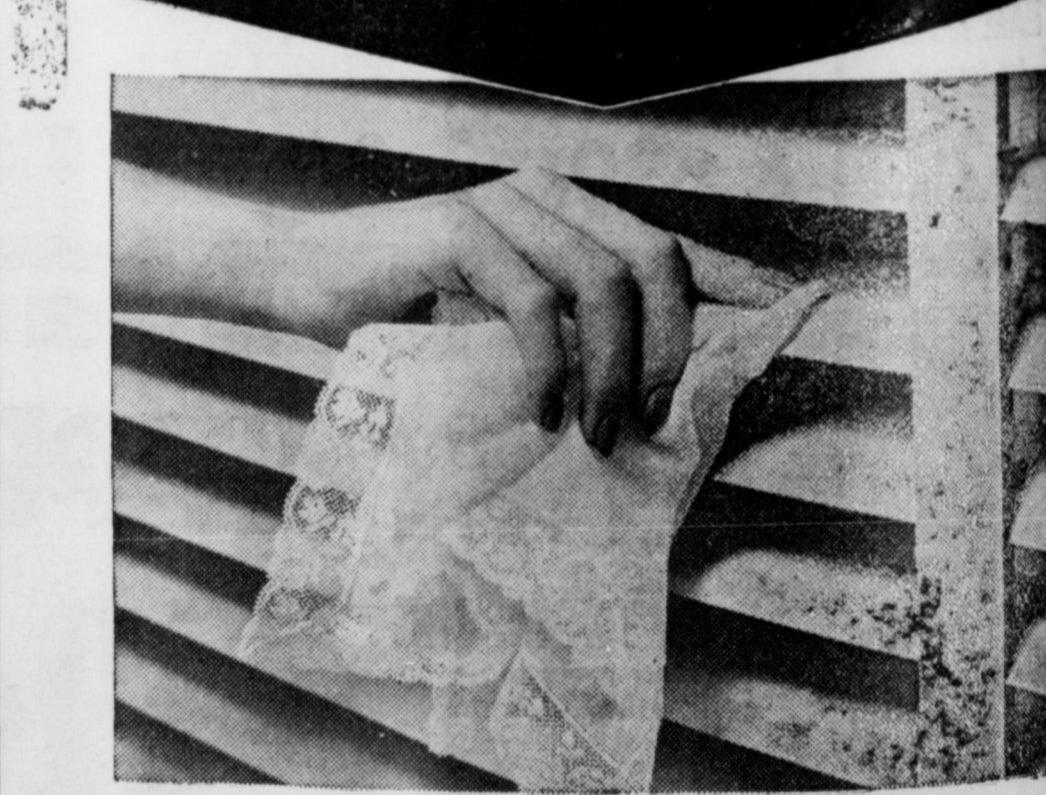
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
